

WORLD CUP WINNERS 1983



BREWEX 1983 CHALLENGE CUP WINNERS INTERNATIONAL BOTTLED LAGER CHAMPIONSHIP

HISTORICAL NOTES ON RUGBY LEAGUE IN THE SOUTH by Tom Webb

THE first game of Rugby League football, then known as Northern Union Rugby Football, to be played in the South took place at Stamford Bridge, Chelsea on February 2nd 1908. This was between the Northern Union and the New Zealand tourists which resulted in a win for the visitors by 18-6 on the occasion of the second test. New Zealand also won the third test played at the Athletic Grounds, Cheltenham by 8-5. The attendances were reported as 15,000 and 4,000 respectively. These figures encouraged interested parties to invite Wakefield Trinity and Warrington to stage a game at the Memorial Ground, Canning Town, West Ham, which Trinity won by 11-6. The attendance was a disappointing 500 when the game took place on April 18th, 1908.

When the next tourists, the Australians came a season later, a game was staged at Park Royal, London where the Acton and Willesden club operated in 1935-36. The Australians claim this as the first test but we counted it as an England v. Australia game, not a Northern Union v. Australia test. The attendance was only 2,000 with receipts of £70.

The Australians sent another touring party in 1911-12 and one game was played at Craven Cottage, Fulham. This time in a representative game, but not a test match, England beat the Australians by 11-6. The attendance was 6,000 and the receipts £226. The tourists also played "Wales and the West" at Bristol, winning 23-3. The attendance of 1,000 and receipts of £65 were very disappointing.

The war intervened and it was not until 1921-22 that the third Australian party visited this country. An England side defeated the visitors by 5-4 at Highbury with most satisfying support figures of 19,000 and £830. This was a "one off" occasion as the following season 1922-23 England played Wales at Herne Hill, winning by 12-7 when the attendance was only 2,584 with £250 taken at the gates.

Not until 1929-30 was another game played in the Capital and the Australians defeated

Wales at Wembley by 26-10 before a crowd of 18,000.

Of course Wembley dominated our efforts in the South and the playing of the Challenge Cup finals at the Stadium has become part of the game's traditions. Interest grew and when Wigan Highfield were in difficulties they were invited to play at the White City which they did in 1933-34 under the title of London Highfield before returning to the North to become Liverpool Stanley, later Liverpool City and currently Huyton. Games were normally played in midweek under floodlights but the attendances were not encouraging enough for the game to continue at that venue.

A couple of years later two London clubs, with double barrelled names, Acton & Willesden and Streatham & Mitcham entered the league when Sidney E. Parkes decided to promote the game. He undertook to carry on for two years and although Acton & Willesden and Streatham & Mitcham entered the league when Sidney E. Parkes decided to promote the game. He undertook to carry on for two years and although Acton & Willesden folded after one year, Streatham & Mitcham carried on for a second season. The Streatham club did not last out and clubs with unfulfilled fixtures were granted two points so that the final league table could be completed. Thus by the end of 1936-37 season the experiment to have London Rugby League clubs in operation ended.

After the second world war an amateur organisation grew up in the London area, Bill Hogg promoting the Mitcham club while other clubs were formed at Brixton and Slough. Eventually that gallant effort failed in spite of the organisers getting the War Office to permit Rugby League to be played in the forces. The Coldstream Guards played the occasional game.

Following the Hunslet v. Wigan Challenge Cup final in 1965, the amateur game was revived and it has continued in spite of difficulties until today the Southern Amateur League consists of two divisions, backed up by schoolboy and youth teams.

The advent of Fulham has been a wonderful advance for the game and the spread of the game to Kent for the coming season promises greater things for the game in future.

FULHAM'S FIRST VISIT

A LITTLE bit of Rugby League history is made today with the visit to Watersheddings for the first time of London club Fulham, whose entry in the Rugby League in the summer of 1980 set the trend for the birth of newcomers Cardiff, Carlisle and Kent Invicta.

Until now, when both Oldham and Fulham find themselves in the First Division, fate has decreed that the two clubs be kept apart. We have not even met in a cup competition, so today's match takes on added significance with the Londoners here for the first time and Oldham looking forward to their first trip to Craven Cottage later in the season.

Under the guiding hand of manager Harold Genders and coach Reg Bowden, Fulham have done remarkably well so far in their first three years in the Rugby League.

In their first season they earned promotion and though they failed to hang on to their First Division place the following season they were relegated from 13th position and only one point away from safety.

Last season, of course, they won the Slalom Lager second division championship to fully warrant once more their place in the top flight.

They possess a strong and experienced side which, at full strength, could give any side in the game a run for its money.

Chris Ganley, an under-24 international, is first-choice full back, though he has a very capable deputy in former Widnes player Steve Mills. One of the most versatile members of the Fulham squad is David Allen, another ex-Widnesian, and he can also play well at full back as well as most positions in the back line — and second-row, too!

Fulham boast what they believe is the best trio of club wingers in the game in Hussain M'Baki, the former Morrocan RU captain, Steve Bayliss, the former St. Helens player from Wales, and Adrian Cambriani, an ex-Welsh youth RU international.

Trevor Stockley, the former Wigan and Salford player, links up at centre with goalkicker Steve Diamond, a £7,500 buy from Wakefield Trinity.

Diamond has the distinction of playing in every one of Fulham's games since he joined the club more than two seasons ago.

John Crossley, a prolific try scorer and very fast off the mark, plays at outside-half alongside one of the game's most celebrated names, Reggie Bowden.

There is no need to relate here what Bowden has achieved in a glittering career. He is, indeed, the King of the Cups, having been captain of Widnes during their remarkable spell of cup winning in the 1970s.

The forwards of Fulham are equally well known in Rugby League. Their front row is especially experienced with Harry Beverley and Tony Gourley at prop and John Dalgreen, described by Genders as "the best hooker in the game" in the middle of them.

Dalgreen played for Britain at Wigan last season in the second Test and was regarded by many as unfortunate to lose his place to Brian Noble of Bradford for the third Test against the Aussies.

Joe Doherty can fill in admirably for Dalgreen, and the Londoners are equally well covered in the back-row where several players chase the three available positions.

David Hull (ex St, Helens and Widnes), Peter Souto (former Cardiff RU club and Wales 'B') and Sean Hoare (a £32,000 buy from Rochdale Hornets) all contest the second-row spots together with the latest recruit, former Widnes forward Alan Dearden, who has signed for a series of trial games.

Martin Herdman, who has played for Wales, is also in contention while the favourite for the loose-forward job is Tony Kinsey, who used to play for Widnes colts.

IF Australia get their way in having the international signing ban retained next month it will prove a considerable blow to many English clubs.

It will also be a big setback to many of the Australian players.

From the start of moves to lift the ban it was generally accepted that most of the top Sydney stars would not be involved in coming to this country.

But a large number of promising Queensland and Sydney district players are lined up and keen to gain experience of playing styles and conditions in this country.

Certain top clubs over here have hinted that they feel it is a bit of a waste of time bringing over Australian players who would have to return home as early as January and February.

The feeling exists as to why unsettle some of your own players by leaving them on the sidelines for men who won't be able to remain to help the club out at the height of the chase for honours.

There is sense in this but then the majority of players prepared to come over would not have been needed to go back so early.

Naturally there is the worry among a lot of officials that we will become so saturated with overseas stars that we will neglect developing our own stars and the game will suffer.

Again this is a fair point when you consider what has happened in cricket and that we have a situation where they could well select a Test side now without a single player having been born in this country.

It is a case of getting the balance right because our game needs personalities and characters as much as any sport to survive.

But back to the ban for League secretary David Oxley is still optimistic that it will be lifted when he and League chairman Jack Batemen fly to Auckland for the meeting.

He says: 'With clubs in both Australia and Britain going through a difficult time financially and with the ever present need to capture public interest it could be that a system based on player exchange will be agreed.

We will be talking with Australia and Britain right up to the meeting on September 29 in an attempt to draw up mutually beneficial conditions for the transfer of players between the two countries.




