



On the field of play we look forward to an enjoyable holiday fixture against Salford today and then a trip to meet Leeds at Headingley on January 2.


The next home game should be a cracker with another bumper crowd - Leigh here on Sunday, January 8.



# HISTORICAL NOTES ON SALFORD

by Tom Webb

WHEN the game was played during the first world war, players only received broken time payments, that is any wages lost through playing for a senior Rugby League club were made up by the club. Professionalism as such was outlawed as clubs were running on a shoestring.

During season 1918-19 the game restarted officially, although there had been war-time emergency leagues and friendly football. The Salford club was one of the first to support a scheme to pay the players as distinct from just making broken time payments. It is ironical that when the club offered the players ten shillings a match (50p) and half-acrown for winning (12½p) the players turned down the offer. They wanted £1 per match and refused to play unless they received that amount. In February 1919 the players refused to play Broughton Rangers at The Cliff and Salford had to cancel the match.

The players were suspended for six matches and the subsequent fixtures were fulfilled by the "A" team. Among the leading players of those days were W. Harry Launce, a Cornishman, Walter Clegg, W. Dai John, Ernie Woods, Jack T. Bevan, E. Sykes, George Currie, H. Whitney, James A. Burgess from Runcorn who had just ceased to exist, George Callender, A. Livesley, Tom Coates, Edgar C. May, Reg M. Clifford, Joe Ratcliffe, Willie Thomas the captain and later a director, J. Knott and B. Wanklyn. I don't know which of the foregoing were on strike and the Salford City Reporter's accounts of the club at the end of the war were, to say the least, a bit sketchy.

War time matches concerning Salford, Broughton Rangers and Swinton were played on gate sharing principles which ensured that each club would get shares of good gates to counterbalance the days when weather reduced the attendances at matches.

Older spectators will remember Salford in their prime just before the second world war. What a galaxy of talent they had assembled to play under the supervision of Lance Todd! How much would the players cost today with our inflationary prices?

In 1937-38 the Reds' players included Bert Day who made 43 appearances, Harold Osbaldestin 42, Paddy Dalton 41 (his name was W. Dalton but he was always Paddy — what was his first name?) Billy Watkins 39, Joe Bradbury 38, Barney Hudson 36, Albert Gear 36, Dai M. Davies 36, Gus Risman 34 (he kicked 101 goals for the Red Devils that season), Alan Edwards 33, Billy Williams 32, Jack Feetham 32, Bob Brown 31 and Harold Thomas 30. They were backed by Sammy Miller, C.G. Reeve, Emlyn Jenkins who was transferred to Wigan, N. George Harris who left Weaste for Keighley, Herbert Cambridge, Leslie Pearson, Tommy Harrison, J. Turner, D. Schofield, J. Spruce and an Oldham lad Joe Gardner. Alan Edwards scored 22 tries, Gus Risman 18, Albert Gear 17, Barney Hudson and Bob Brown 16 each.

The directors in the last two seasons before the war were C.B. Riley chairman, J.B. Goldstraw, J. Priestley (I think he was a leading referee once), H. Sides, H. Bratherton, F.M. Wellwood, J.W. Hammond who only died just over a year ago, A.G. Wild, former player and later the Lord Mayor of Salford, W.H. Hughes, V.C. Williams, J. Leonard and F. Mattinson. Lance Beaumont Todd was secretary-manager.

By 1954 J.B. Goldstraw was chairman and J.W. Hammond had succeeded to chair by 1962. (I haven't season by season details of the club as I have for Oldham). Brian Snape was on the board in 1962 and later he became club chairman and chairman of the Rugby League Council. He has now given way to John Wilkinson who has a new part time club secretary in Graham Morris, who wrote along with John Huxley the book "Wembley Magic".

# SALFORD'S BIG CHALLENGE

SALFORD come to Watersheddings today for a traditional holiday encounter seeking every possible point in their bid to climb away from the bottom four relegation zone.

They were promoted last season from third place in the Second Division, having won 24 of their 32 matches to pick up 48 points and finish behind champions Fulham and Wakefield Trinity. In fourth place were Whitehaven.

Up until just before the Christmas period, three of those teams — Whitehaven, Salford and Wakefield — occupied the bottom three places in the First Division.

In recent weeks both Wakefield and Featherstone have shown distinct signs of making up ground lost earlier in the season, Trinity hitting the headlines with their capture of Australian star Wally Lewis in a major bid to drag themselves clear of the bottom four.

Rovers had a run of four wins out of five, though two of those were in the John Player Special Trophy.

Nevertheless, Salford know they have much to do to try and keep themselves in the first division this season and they certainly will be firing on all cylinders today.

A major change took place at the Willows some weeks ago when Salford and coach Mal Aspey parted company, and the coaching job went to one of Salford's best-respected sons, Mike Coulman.

The big forward joined the Reds way back in 1968 from Moseley RU Club in the Midlands and in an accomplished career, which earned him international honours at League to follow those he won at Union, the big fellow has scored more tries than any other forward in Salford's history.

He has now retired from the playing side of things, but he is working hard as coach as Salford try to blend together several youngsters with one or two more experienced campaigners.

They don't come any more experienced than Peter Glynn, Steve Nash, John Wood and Denis Boyd.

Similarly, there are numerous youngsters in the ranks, among them Paul Shuttleworth, Gerard Byrne, Paul Fletcher, and Paul Groves.

Though Shuttleworth was signed as a half-back from Batley Boys, he is now performing well at full back and is said to be one of Salford's most improved players.

Glynn joined Salford in the swop move that took Steve Rule to St. Helens in the close season and he is equally at home at stand-off, centre or wing, where he has played in several matches lately.

Centre Byrne, snapped up from that prolific nursery, Wigan St. Pat's, is running in the tries with uncanny regularity, while Stewart Williams is always a dangerous player, and winger Keith Bentley, signed on loan from Barrow, is capable of causing the tightest defence a good deal of trouble.

Stand-off Fletcher, still a teenager, is a local lad who has come up through the Salford colts set-up, while his partner Nash is without doubt one of the best and most respected players in the game.

Nash has served Featherstone, Salford and Great Britain wonderfully well throughout a long career and he deservedly starts a benefit with Salford in the very near future.

In the front-row of the pack, the Reds possess two hard men in John Wood, signed from Fulham, and Denis Boyd, who had a spell on loan here at Watersheddings, before finally settling at the Willows in a permanent move from Carlisle.

Sammy Turnbull and Steve Dickens, the ex-Leeds and Keighley player, could form the second-row with former Leigh forward Mick McTigue at loose-forward.




