

WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

A HAPPY New Year to you all as we look forward to this our first home game of 1984. The visit of Leigh recalls memories of how they won here in the first round of the John Player Trophy in November, which signalled the start of a rather disappointing run for the Oldham club.

However, there were signs at Leeds last Monday that we have perhaps started to climb up the ladder again. Though beaten 16-12 as Leeds chalked up their seventh consecutive victory under coach Maurice Bamford, we staged a remarkable rally in the second half to come back from 0-10 down and go into a 12-10 lead.

It took one flash of magic from John Holmes to finally beat us only ten minutes from the end as we showed the sort of form that served us so proudly in October.

Let us all hope that we have turned the corner and that we are now set fair for a good start to 1984.

The first round draw for the State Express Challenge Cup was due to be made on the BBC television sports programme, "Grandstand", yesterday afternoon, but it was clearly too late for inclusion in this programme.

We can merely hope the draw favoured us kindly when the balls came out for the first two preliminary round matches and the first-round proper. The tournament is worth £120,000 in sponsorship this season, £70,000 of which is put up as prize money.

Money is bound to occupy the attention of all clubs during 1984, and we are hoping the weather has been kind so that we can perhaps have a gate today to match the 6,000-plus that watched the November cup-tie between the clubs.

The postponement of the Featherstone game on December 11 means that we had only one home game during December – Salford on Boxing Day. The gate for that match, just under 4,000, was disappointing on a traditionally popular day such as Boxing Day.

As we have no game on January 15 and then we go to Wigan on January 22, we will have had only three senior games at Watersheddings between the visit of Hull KR on November 27 and the visit of Castleford on January 29.

Under such circumstances money does not come in too quickly and it is indeed vital that everyone associated with the club, and all who like to support it, tries to pull out a little bit extra to lend a hand.

One does not like to continually draw the attention of members and supporters to our various fund-raising activities, but it really is essential that they prove a success if we are to maintain our progress over the last few years.

One accepts that in the last few weeks our results have been disappointing, but most teams go through lean spells and it is during those hard times that a club needs the loyal support and backing of its "team" on the terraces more than any other.

The second-half display at Leeds was very encouraging indeed and if we are to confirm that promise today and in the matches ahead we could do with as much support as possible, both vocally on the terraces and in the shape of help for the lottery and the other fund-raising functions.

Our next home game is against Castleford on January 29 — the same week-end as Great Britain play France at Avignon in the first of the two Tests. As we have Andy Goodway, Mick Worrall and Des Foy in the squad for that Test, we might have to do without all three of them when we seek to pull off a notable double against the championship-chasers.

To make matters worse, Nick Wright might still be under suspension and Mick Parrish also faces the threat of a one-match ban for the Castleford game following his sin-binning at Leeds.

It was his third trip to the bin this season, each for a ten-minute spell, and that gives him six disciplinary points which is liable to earn him an automatic one-match suspension.

HISTORICAL NOTES ON LEIGH

FOLLOWING the loss of the club's ground at Mather Lane during the last war, the Leigh club secured temporary headquarters during 1946-47 after being debarred from taking part in the first of the post war-seasons, 1945-46. Lack of a suitable ground had caused the Rugby League authorities to refuse Leigh admission to the league. Meanwhile the Leigh Athletic Club ground at Charles Street was secured and in 1945-46 Leigh defeated St. Helens in the first round of the Lancashire Cup before losing in the next round to Oldham.

In that first season the revived club was the last unbeaten one in the League, not suffering a defeat until November. However, the club only finished around the half way

mark in the final league table.

In 1947-48 the Leigh club was again the last to surrender its unbeaten league record, and again the team finished in mid table at the end of the season. In the Lancashire Cup St. Helens provided the opposition in the first round of the competition, and this was the occasion of the opening of the Kirkhall Lane ground, now known as Hilton Park. Work on the new ground continued and permission was sought to provide covered acommodation. New developments still suffered from war-time restrictions and permission to provide cover had to be obtained from government bodies.

Tommy Sale was club captain at the time and he led the supporters in tremendous efforts to prepare the ground and after the opening game, to improve it and bring it up

to the highest standards.

Following the resumption of the club's career, steps were taken to sign new players. Todd, Miller, Ackers, Woods and Kerwick were among the first new recruits when they

joined Tommy Sale, Riley, Aldred, Pendlebury, Ryan, Daley and Coffey.

After Ackers was injured, Leigh signed Jim Ledgard of Dewsbury. The Leigh programme once described him as "Gentleman Jim, the 'Boot'". Jim had started to play Rugby League football at the Sandal Council School, Wakefield when he was nine years of age. He did not start kicking goals until a couple of years later. He played for the Yorkshire Schoolboys and gained a county championship medal.

Joining the Wakefield Trinity Supporters' Club 15-16 side he then switched to Rugby Union. He was given trials at Leeds where Eddie Waring was the manager but the club decided not to sign him. Dewsbury obtained his services and after four years at Crown Flatt he moved to Leigh for a fee of £2,650, the then record transfer fee. He played his first game against Featherstone Rovers in that 1947-48 season kicking 13 goals, becoming an instant favourite at his new club. He later kicked 15 goals in a game for Great Britain against Wide Bay (Queensland) in 1950.

Other great stars joined the club, Trevor Allen the famous Australian Rugby Union star costing £5,000. He had followed Jeff Burke another Australian and Ken Beattie from

New Zealand.

Rex Mossop, now a famous broadcaster in Australia also joined Leigh playing alongside Allen, Ledgard, Bill Kindon, Charlie Pawsey, Tommy Bradshaw and Owen Bevan,

brother of the Warrington flier.

One outstanding signing caused more publicity for the Rugby League game than most others and his career was shorter than the rest. MacDonald Bailey, the great athlete was signed and the new floodlights were used for the first time for his debut with the club. However, other signings such as Malcolm Davies, Peter Davies, Foster, Breare, Kitchen, Hoskings, Robinson and company were to prove great successes with the club.

OUT FOR REVENGE

THE Oldham club will today be out to avenge their 20-12 defeat by Leigh in the first round of the John Player Trophy at the beginning of November.

John Woods and Steve Donlan put the skids under us on that occasion as Leigh knocked us out at the first hurdle, just as they had done at Hilton Park in the previous season.

Certainly, there is a keen and competitive atmosphere about Oldham-Leigh clashes these days, possibly the result of Peter Smethurst having coached both clubs in recent times.

An added tit-bit now could be the appearance of Adrian Alexander, who is at Hilton Park under Oldham's rent-a-player scheme.

Alexander played a big part in Leigh's march to the semi-final of the John Player Trophy, in which they were beaten by a Leeds team which we almost toppled at Headingley last Sunday.

The big Londoner was not in the Leigh side that beat Wakefield last week-end — Wally Lewis and all — but there is always a chance that he could make an appearance in the Leigh squad today, and that would certainly cause a lot of interest among our fans.

Since the cup-tie between the two clubs in November, Leigh have also obtained the services on loan of St. Helens and former Salford and Rochdale player John Butler, who played at full back against Trinity.

Des Drummond and John Woods form an all-international right flank while local lad John Henderson teams up with Phil Fox on the left wing.

Steve Donlan is proving a very useful stand-off half, indeed, and is certainly proving the wisdom of coach Tommy Bishop's decision to switch him and Woods around earlier in the season.

Donlan has a vastly-experienced and hard-tackling half-back partner in New Zealand Test scrum-half Shane Varley, who brought with him Jeff Clarke for trials.


Clarke quickly impressed at Hilton Park and now commands a regular spot in the second-row of the pack.

Alf Wilkinson, Derek Pyke and Alexander are chief rivals for the two prop places while local lad Gary Ainsworth and Former Fylde RU man Ray Tabern battle it out for the No. 9 position.

Tony Cottrell, signed from Leigh Miners, made his senior debut in the second-row against Trinity, partnered by Clarke.

At loose-forward, Leigh possess a teenager who looks to have a big future ahead of him, 17-year-old schoolboy John Westhead.

Points are vital for both clubs today and the result should be a keenly-contested encounter in which Oldham will be anxious to get their own back for the cup defeat, and also pick up First Division points after a run of only two wins in their last seven outings.






