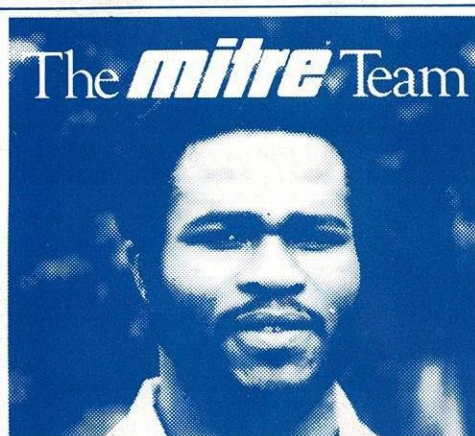

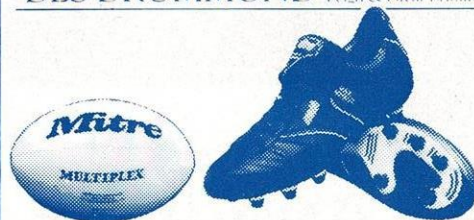

Unfortunately, having absorbed ever increasing printing costs which have rocketed over the last couple of years, we have reluctantly been forced to increase the face value to a more realistic price, but hopefully we have maintained the quality and will strive to improve and increase content.

Each season brings changes, Derwent Park being no exception — Harry Archer deciding to call it a day after a season in charge.

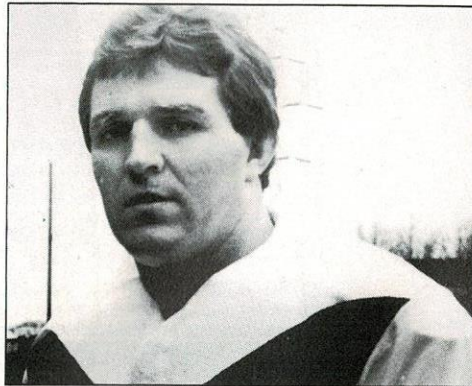
However, Jackie Davidson is a more than adequate replacement and links-up with coach Bill Smith in what promises to be an interesting and fruitful partnership.

FOCUS ON Oldham

FROM the fledgling day of the Northern Union when Oldham were one of the most powerful sides in the land, to more modern times. The Watersheddings club have had a penchant for Cumbrian born players... Owens, Dixon, Fletcher, Kelly, Spottiswoode, Parkinson and Robinson are names from another age but all were seasoned Cumberland county players during service with the Lancashire (now Greater Manchester) club.



Legendary Cumbrian Jim Lomas —

first captain of a British Touring side to the Antipodes — was another to wear the famous red and white hooped jersey; while 'Pop' Shearman and the immaculate Ike Southward both left Town to join the "Roughyeds." Ike's moves between the clubs twice breaking the world transfer record with fees totalling £21,652.10s — a massive amount for a rugby league player in the late 50's, early 60's — and his 31 tries in 1959/60 still stand as a post-war Oldham record.

But perhaps the Cumbrian who gave our visitors the greatest service was Joe Ferguson who made a mammoth 634 appearances between 1899 and 1923.

Born at Crosby Villa, Joe made his debut on 2nd September 1899, against Morecambe and played his final game 24½ years later on 28th August 1923, in an 'A' team Lancashire Combination Cup match with Wigan at the age of 44.

He had represented Lancashire for six seasons before a rule change in 1906, gave Cumberland first claim; they immediately made him captain — an honour he held until 1923 — and during this time led the county to two championships in 1909/10 and 1911/12.

An outstanding goalkicker, it was Joe's boot that brought the first of the titles with a last minute drop against Yorkshire. His superb kicking was also a major feature of Cumberland's 25-5 success over Baskerville's 1907/08 pioneer Tourists

A gifted goalkeeper, Joe was tempted to take up soccer before and after his retirement from rugby league; in fact he won a long range kicking contest with a clearance of 83 yards over Sam McLure (Blackburn Rovers) and Liverpool's Jack Cox.

Joe Ferguson never did take up soccer professionally and sadly he died in October 1936. He was 57 years old.

RAY ASHTON—Classy and creative scrum-half, sharp and elusive noted for his long range passing. One of three Oldham players to represent Europe last April against Oceania at the Stade de la Cipalle Velodrome in Paris. Toured Australia and New Zealand with Gt. Britain during the summer. Joined Oldham in March 1979 from Widnes amateurs St. Marks.

IAN BIRKBY—Gifted footballer who joined Oldham permanently last November from Castleford in a £10,000 deal after a period on loan. Former Gt. Britain Colts international. Made his league debut for 'Cas' against Leigh in 1977 and won a Yorkshire Cup Winners medal in his time at Wheldon Road.

MICK COOMBS—Strong running back-row forward. Linked up with the Watersheddings club in 1979 from home town Leigh Miners Welfare A.R.L.C. Valuable squad member.

STEPHEN DOBB—Promising ex-Oldham, Lancashire and Gt. Britain Colts winger signed in 1980. Toured Australia and Papua New Guinea in 1982 after making his international debut against France Colts at Leeds the previous year.

TERRY 'FLASH' FLANAGAN—Typical British loose-forward with loads of skill and ball playing ability. Last minute replacement for Gt. Britain tour. Former Saddleworth Rangers (Oldham) junior. Father Bill and brother Kevin have also played for Oldham.

DES FOY—Middle-back with lightning pace. Ex-England schoolboy star who signed professional forms for Widnes in July 1980 in preference to his home town club Oldham where his father Derek was Colts coach. Joined the "Roughyeds" two years later in a deal that took former Town forward Brian Hogan back to Naughton Park. Toured Down Under, playing in the opening Test against Australia. Represented Europe last April.

ANDY GOODWAY—Aggressive, superb tackling prop forward who also Toured with Gt. Britain during the summer. Few forwards can match his non-stop workrate. Signed from Castleford amateur side Redhill in 1979.

JIMMY HORNBY—Wigan born winger released by the Central Park club at the end of 1982/83 after winning Gt. Britain under-24 and Lancashire County honours. Took part in the "Superstars" contest at Derwent Park several years ago. Arrived at Oldham last July.

WALLY JONES—Former Rochdale Hornets prop-forward acquired for a bargain £2,000 on the M62 Motorway in 1982. Signed for Hornets from Latchford Albion A.R.L.C. and spent a period on loan with Blackpool Borough. Twice broken arm robbed him of under-24 honours.

STEVE LITTLER—Vastly underrated full-back who is an excellent catcher of the 'bomb'. Signed in 1979 from Leigh Miners Welfare A.R.L.C. Made his debut two years later against Hull Kingston Rovers.

ALAN MCCURRIE—Industrious Cumbria County and former Hensingham A.R.L.C. hooker. Began his professional career with Whitehaven before £10,000 took him to Wakefield Trinity in September 1978 and a Wembley appearance. Moved to Oldham in October 1981, in exchange for Billy Harris. Unusually for a number 9, Alan has scored hat-tricks of tries for each of his clubs. Gt. Britain 'Shadow Squad' 1983.

MICK MORGAN—Enterprising ball-playing forward who won England international and County honours with Yorkshire. Trumanns 'Man of Steel' in 1981/82. Began his professional career with Wakefield Trinity, then saw service with Featherstone Rovers and Carlisle before his move to Oldham three seasons ago.

TOM NAIDOLE—Another former Wigan winger snapped up last season when he was surprisingly freed by the Central Park Club. Strong runner and fine competitor.

MICK PARRISH—Consistent goalkicking centre who at 21 years of age became the youngest ever player to play and score in every game during a season. Former Gt. Britain Colt who cost £20,000 when signed from Hunslet in September 1980. Previously with Morley R.U. club.

ALAN PLATT—Yet another Leigh born player in the Oldham ranks. Powerful forward who was a member of Leigh's 1982 Championship winning side. Ex-England schools and Gt. Britain Colt. Joined the club in 1979, following in his father Don's footsteps who also wore Oldham colours. Useful goalkicker.

MICHAEL TAYLOR—Exciting winger, big, strong, fast. Joined the pro game from Britannia A.R.L.C. (Huddersfield) after being introduced to the club by former Under-17 coach Ivan Williamson.

MICK WORRALL—"Mr. Perpetual Motion!" Warrington born back-row-forward and fifth member of the Oldham side to Tour the Antipodes during the summer. Former Gt. Britain Colts international. Signed for the Watersheddings side in 1979. Had the honour of being the only English forward selected for last seasons Europe v. Oceania game in Paris.

NICK WRIGHT—Maori international full-back. Kicked six goals against the Cumberland League at Whitehaven last November. Played eight games for Oldham last season and was due back this month. Plays for the Manakau club in Auckland.

GREEN VIGO—Electrifying threequarter, back in the fold after a time away from the game. Signed from Swinton in August 1982, after spending the early part of his career with Wigan. Faced Town in that never to be forgotten 1977/78 Lancashire Cup Final.

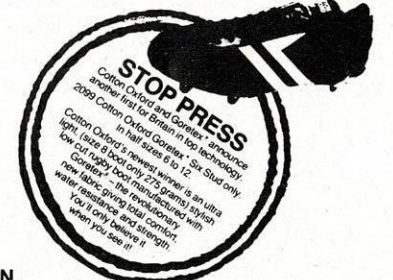

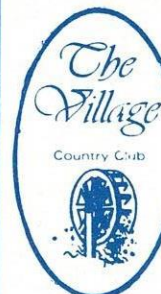

Whatever he receives will be used wisely and I hope that when the opportunity arises you will support Ian's year — making it a really lucrative one.
