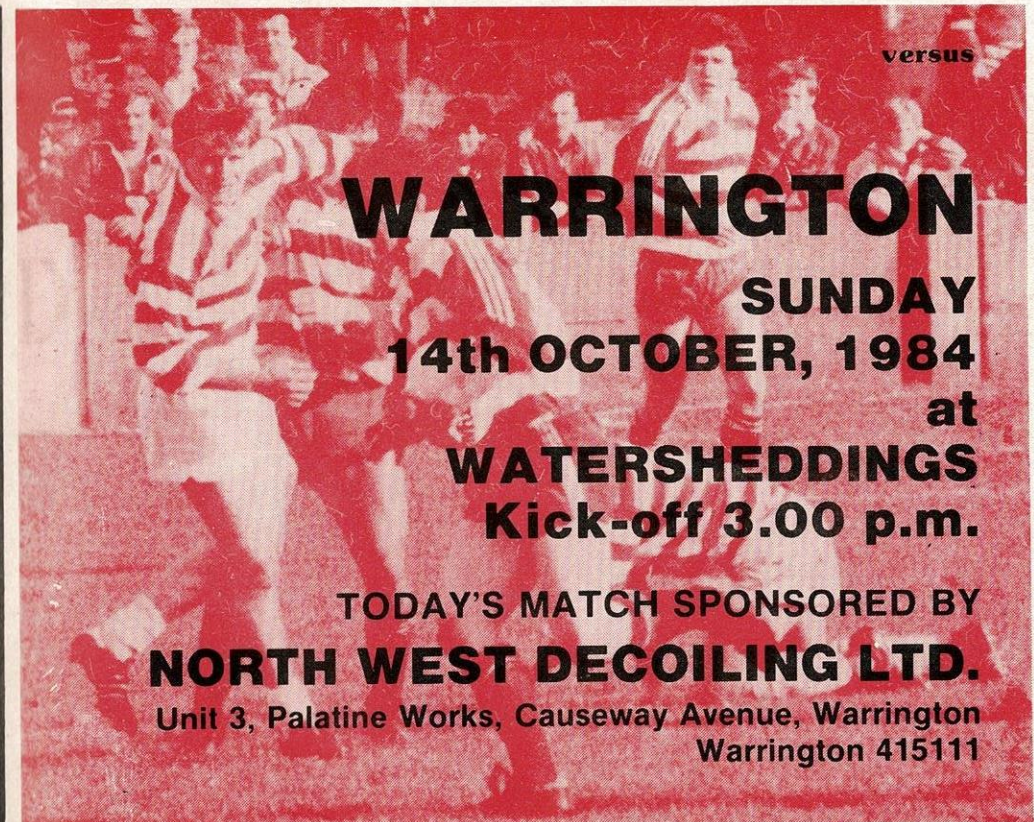

# WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

TODAY is the BIG day for our Lifeline operation — the day when, at the match against Warrington, we make the very first of our weekly draws for £1,000 and our vitally important Lifeline Appeal springs to life. This very day some lucky Lifeline member will be better off by £1,000 and, don't forget, this is merely the start of a weekly draw that will continue indefinitely and not only give subscribers a chance to pick up a nice little nest egg every seven days but will give the club a real chance of financial stability without which there can never be real lasting success on the field of play.

It is appropriate that we should make our first draw today because Warrington, our opponents, were the first of the Rugby League clubs to get into the Lifeline scheme of things and they are now enjoying great success. So far, we have had excellent support and co-operation but it is absolutely crucial that we continue to build on the progress we have made so far. We set ourselves a target of 1,000 Lifeline members by the date of the first draw today but that, of course, is only the start and within the next few months we will be pressing on to try and double up and sign up 2,000 members. Les Bostock, our Lifeline manager, has been working hard with the help of many people, not least some of the players, to keep the entries coming in thick and fast and Les can be contacted during the day at the Lifeline offices in Clegg Street on 626-4501. He is not only keen to sign up as many Lifeline members as possible but also to find agents to operate in the Sholver, Holts Estate and Chadderton areas.

Not only individuals but also groups of people in pubs, clubs, offices and workshops are joining our scheme and though there are many similar stories coming in it is interesting to reproduce a recent story in the Oldham Chronicle about Lifeline experiences at the Cross Keys public house in Uppermill.

A week ago they had 34 customers signed up in our scheme, each paying 50p per week, to produce combines of four. They were confident of reaching 40 by today which will give them ten shares in each draw or more to the point a massive 520 chances a year of winning £1,000 between them.

Philip Kay, the landlord, has done a magnificent job for us. He is not the only one, of course, and it just goes to show what can be achieved if we all pull together for the successful future of Oldham RL Club.

Ray Hicks of the Three Crowns at Scouthead donated £150 to the Lifeline appeal thanks to a raffle among his regulars, the local referees are to hold a sports quiz soon in aid of the same cause, and the Players' Association, formerly known as the Ex-Players or Cherry and Whites, have organised their first sportsmen's dinner at the Belgrade Hotel on November 14 to boost the Lifeline appeal.

Commercially, a new lottery ticket has been placed on the market and this will cover the next few weeks before we introduce a special Christmas ticket which will concentrate on such seasonal prizes as colour televisions, Christmas hampers, wines and spirits and a £500 holiday voucher in conjunction with Thomas Cook.

We are also holding regular Monday night match video recordings in the social club and there are plans afoot to make our match video tapes available for hire out purchase.

It is all happening on the Lifeline and commercial fronts, so make a note of who to contact for further information — Les Bostock on 626-4501 for Lifeline information and Terry Conroy on 620-4870 for lottery or other commercial matters.

In the meantime best of luck to everyone who will have a number in our grand opening Lifeline draw today. Don't forget, though, this is just the start of our WEEKLY jackpot, so if you have not already done so please hurry to enlist.

On the field of play, which is what it is all about, we continued gloriously in our early-season success with our first win at Leeds for 19 years followed by a victory over Leigh at Watersheddings. A magnificent and late rally, which saw us score two spectacular tries through Des Foy and Green Vigo, took us to victory at Headingley to preserve our 100 per cent record.

Seven days later we took on Leigh and we managed to do the job again, though this match was very tight as the Hilton Park men hit back strongly after we had built up an early 12-0 lead with tries by Foy and Vigo, both goaled by Mick Parrish. In the end we won 12-8, to set the scene for our trip to Barrow where we had won only once in eight outings spanning 14 years.

Injuries have continued to hit us hard and we lost three more players as a result of knocks received in the Leigh game. The unlucky Alan Platt was in the wars again when he damaged his knee ligaments and another lay-off for Alan is now feared.

Tom Nadiola, who had had two splendid games at Leeds and against Leigh, damaged a knee which ruled him out of the trip to Barrow, and Mike Taylor sprained his ankle which might also keep him out for a short time.

On a brighter note, Mick Worrall and Ray Ashton are now back in light training and making steady progress, while our two Aussie recruits will arrive during the next week, first Paul Taylor on Tuesday and then Chris Phelan five days later. There is, alas, not much sign of improvement in the condition of Wally Jones, whose damaged knee is causing considerable problems.

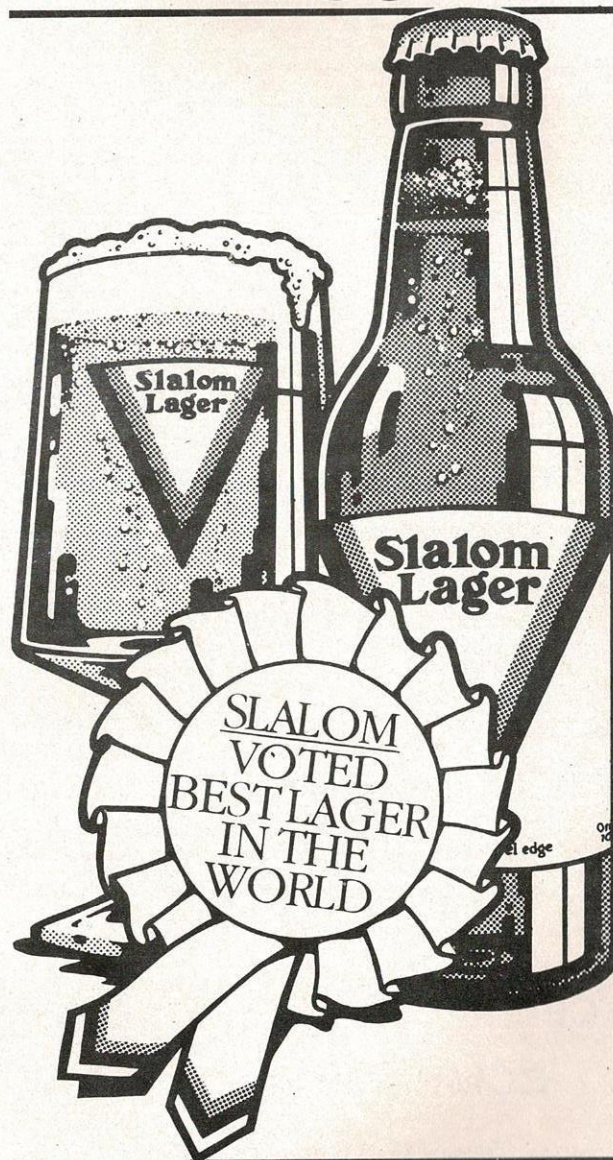

## HISTORICAL NOTES ON WARRINGTON

THE WARRINGTON programme of September 28th, 1948 gave details of some transfer fees paid by the club during the period 1920 to 1938. The fees paid might seem low by today's standards but they were considerable at the time before the inflationary spiral hit us.

Here is the list given in the programme. Tom Blinkhorn from Wigan Highfield 1928 £400; Nat Bentham from Halifax 1930 £400; Billy Belshaw from Liverpool Stanley 1937 £1,500; Dai M. Davies from Broughton Rangers 1927 £650; Billy Dingsdale from Broughton Rangers £600; Francis Gregory from Wigan 1938 £300; W. Lavin from St. Helens 1920 £85; J. Marsden from Dewsbury £350; Jack Oster from Oldham 1932 £450; Jack H. Prescott from Hull 1920 £75; Chris Redmond and Albert Johnson from Widnes 1923 £300; Jack H. Woods from Barrow 1934 £600; and Tom Flynn from St. Helens 1926 £400.

Of the players mentioned Albert Johnson and Nat Bentham had already been on a tour of Australia and New Zealand while Tom Blinkhorn, Nat Bentham, Billy Belshaw and Billy Dingsdale all subsequently played in England's international teams against Australia.

Frank Shugars took part in the first tour of "Down Under" in 1910 and when the Northern Union tourists had two games on the same day Danny Frawley and Australian who had spent some time at Warrington played for a touring side. Not until 1920 did the "Wire" provide tourists when Arthur G. Skelthorne and Billy Cunliffe were given representative honours. Billy Cunliffe paid a second trip when he was selected for the 1924 tour. In 1936 Jack Miller and Jack Arkwright toured as did Jack Harry Woods who had left Warrington for Liverpool Stanley. These players were Warrington's contributions to international football at the other side of the world, in pre-war days.

In 1934 Jean Galia brought the pioneer French Rugby League side to play some games in this country, including a Rugby League XIII at Wilderspool. The Frenchmen were taken to see a game before playing their fixtures. It was a Cup-tie with no holds barred. Bob Anderton asked the interpreter if the Frenchmen had learned anything from watching the match. "Oh, yes, we have learned quite a lot of things, for instance we did not know that after tackling a player you could put your hand on his face to assist you in getting up off the ground".

The teams on St. Patrick's Day 1934 were as selected when the home thirteen was Jim Sullivan captain (Wigan); Alf Ellaby (St. Helens), Fred Harris (Leigh), Ernest Winter (Hunslet), Stanley Smith (Leeds); Dai Davies (Warrington), Jack Garvey (St. Helens); Nat Silcock (Widnes), Billy Watson (Keighley), Albert Worrall (Leigh), Alec Troup (Barrow), George Saddington (York) and Paddy Dalton (Salford).

The men from over the Channel were Cassagneau; Lambert, Nouel, Barbazanges, Samatan; Mathou, Vignial; Blanc, Porra, Duhau, Dechavanne, Galia and Recaborde.

The home side won comfortably by 32-16 and the novelty of seeing the new Rugby League nation brought 11,100 spectators flocking to the Wilderspool Stadium with most satisfactory receipts of £545.

That season, 1933-34 saw Billy Holding kick 112 goals towards his grand total of 838 for the Wire. Tommy Thompson headed the try scorers with 15, closely followed by Jack Garratt and Australian Bill Shankland 14 each, with Billy Dingsdale and Charlie Seeling 9 each and Dai Davies 8 with Candy Evans and Jim Newcombe next in line with 5 each.

Career totals included Billy Dingsdale 153 tries, Tommy Thompson 112 and Bill Shankland 74 for the players appearing for Warrington in that season. Bill Shankland also kicked 70 goals, Tommy Thompson 14 and Billy Dingsdale 4.



## WELCOME TO WIRES

WARRINGTON come to Watersheddings today in a similar situation to Oldham — with one player on international duty and several others injured.

Like our own Andy Goodway, Warrington winger Phil Ford will be involved in the Wales versus England match at Ebbw Vale, though Ford will be turning out for Wales while Goodway plays for England.

The Wires, again like ourselves, have a few players on the injured list such as Ronnie Duane, Steve Hesford, John Bevan and Mark Forster.

Duane, the big, blond centre, damaged his knee early on in the tour of Australia last summer, and though he is back in light training, it will be some time yet before he is ready to resume his career at Wilderspool.

Hesford, the goalkicking full back who has been one of Rugby League's most prolific scorers over the years, is recovering from a cartilage operation, though he has a very able deputy in Paul Ford.

Forster has a broken hand while Bevan, a great servant for the Wilderspool club since turning pro from Welsh RU several years ago, has a knee injury that has prevented him from playing in all but the pre-season matches.

The Wires, nevertheless, can field a side that, on paper, looks good enough to test anything in the First Division and the fact that they have already beaten Hull at home suggests they will soon be rapidly climbing the First Division table.

Against Halifax last Sunday, Paul Ford was at full back with Paul Cullen and Ian Duane — the brother of Ronnie — in the centre positions and Brian Carbert and Phil Ford on the wings.

Reg Bowden, one of Rugby League's most famous names, took over as coach at Wilderspool in the close season and eventually Warrington registered him as a player, so that he now brings his influence to bear on the field of play as well as on the training pitch and from out of the dug-out.

If Bowden is at scrum-half and Ken Kelly is at stand-off, where is there a half-back pair in the game to beat them for experience and know-how?

Warrington have again engaged the services of massive Maori prop Pat Poasa for the battles in the front-row and he will probably figure on the open-side this afternoon, with former Oldham player Roger O'Mahoney as hooker, and another tough customer, Aussie Bob Jackson, at No 10.

Having left Fulham to take over control at Wilderspool, Bowden moved quickly to sign Jackson as soon as the opportunity presented itself and he is said to be a good forward in the true Aussie mould.

Bob Eccles, potentially one of the most lethal of second-row runners, could be in the second-row with under-24 international John Fieldhouse alongside him.

A year ago, Eccles was transfer-listed at a massive £80,000, but only recently he came off the transfer-list and settled his differences at Wilderspool.

Fieldhouse is a good, hard forward, who has earned his representative honours, while the Wires possess a young and intelligent footballer at loose-forward in Mike Gregory.

Another experienced forward at Warrington is Tony Worrall, elder brother of our own Mike, but he was recently put on offer at £50,000 and appears not to be in the contention for a pack place just at present.

The Wires had a disappointing start to the season, losing two matches which could have gone either way. In the first game of the season they lost by just two points to Widnes and later they suffered defeat by Castleford at Wheldon Road with the last kick of the game.

They lost heavily at Featherstone in a poor display and went down at Leigh in the Lancashire Cup after leading 12-2 at one stage.

But they emphasised their potential with a splendid home victory over Hull and, potentially, they are still one of the strongest outfits in the First Division and certainly one that will give us a tough test today.

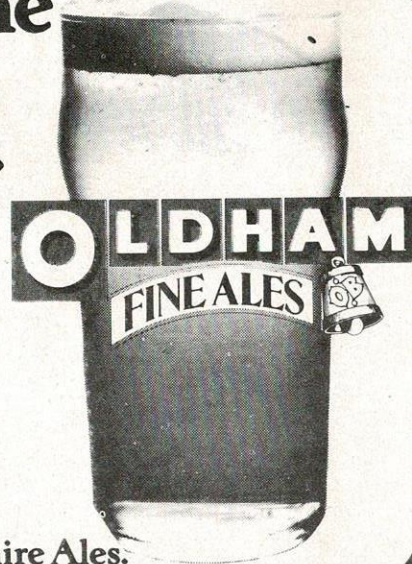

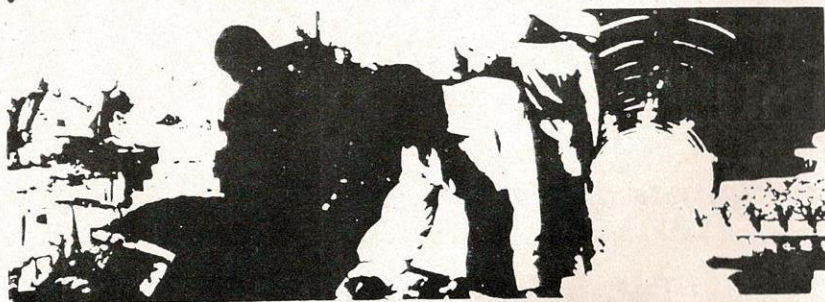

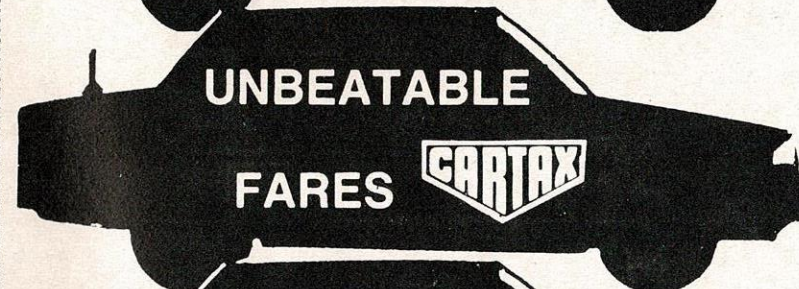

MAL MENINGA descends on the English scene with his awesome reputation swelled by yet another personal success on his home soil. The giant centre captured the imagination of British fans on the Kangaroos record breaking tour of this country in 1982. It was this form and the man's great presence that prompted St. Helens to make a move for Meninga when I disclosed last March that he was not only available but keen to play with an English club. Now fans and rivals throughout the game wait to see if he can make as big an impact in the First Division as he did when surrounded by such a galaxy of Australian stars.

When Big Mal played in the Test series against Britain in the recent series he completely lost his kicking touch although he scored that vital try in the Second Test in Brisbane.

But since then he has been in magnificent form in Queensland and came from behind to stride off with the top award as Brisbane's leading pointscorer.

He won a holiday week on the beautiful Dunk Island off the Queensland coast for two people flying there — if time allowed.

Meninga needed 14 points to win the title but he collected them with ease, scoring 18 points from two tries and five goals. He went on to finish with 140 points for his club Brisbane Souths in the scoring competition while his clubmate Phil Veivers was on 66 points in seventh place.

Winger Veivers, who can play full back, is a talented and underrated player who should fit well into Saints side and do a first class job.

Meninga's powerful defence earned him tremendous praise with Souths and Saints are obviously looking to him to steady up their side and prove a real inspiration.

A likeable character, Meninga is a fine sportsman who is expected to prove as popular off the field as on it. I know Saints fans are looking forward to his first 80 minutes football here just as much as they did the now legendary Tom Van Vollenhoven. And if Mal can make it as big as the great South African then Rugby League as a whole is in for a treat.

THEY say that one of the chief pleasures of watching sport is the memories you treasure of great moments and great characters. And before this season could get into its exciting stride I found myself reflecting more on the past than the future.

First it was Mick Adams who set me thinking along nostalgic lines and then Steve Nash followed him into retirement to wind up yet another wonderful career. And I don't mind admitting I was just as saddened to see Steve put away his boots because he's another Great Britain star who has always earned my admiration for a number of top qualities.

Steve developed into one of the finest scrum halves we have produced and his courage, sheer determination and remarkable defence won him respect throughout the world.

The Aussies quickly discovered he could play them — and beat them — at their own game. They first acknowledged his ability during the 1972 World Cup and really had to sit up and take notice of him on the 1974 tour.

I will never forget the look on Artie Beetson's face when Steve tangled with him in the Brisbane Test but the giant Aussie ace was full of praise for the British star afterwards.

Steve went on to greater heights in his many memorable performances against the Aussies when he walked off with the man of the match award in Sydney in 1977 in the World championship final. It was a superb feat considering Britain lost the final and it will be a long time before I forget those great battles between Nash and Raudonikis.

But there was a lot more to Steve than his non-stop approach on the field where he hated to lose and would shed both sweat and blood in the cause of country and club.

Steve has always possessed a rich sense of humour, always enjoyed a joke and he could be relied upon to liven up a dressing room in both triumph and defeat. I do not think you can pay him a higher compliment than by saying his decision to finish, after serious eye and knee injuries in recent years, will be felt as far away as Australia.
