



OLDHAM R.L.F.C.— A Brief History

The Oldham club has had a chequered history since its formation away back in the summer of 1876. The officials of the Oldham Harriers, interested in cross country running developed an interest in the growing sport of Rugby Football and were amongst the pioneers of the Oldham Football Club. In those days Rugby was as often played 20 a side as 15 a side.

A challenge match was played between members of the Oldham Lyceum and Oldham Parish Church Institute and it is understood that other challenge matches were played before the club actually came into being. A meeting was called at the Prince Albert Hotel, Union Street West, Oldham when Charles Hodgkinson the then Chief Constable of Oldham and Alfred (later Lord) Emmott and the Mayor of Oldham were present. This was in the summer of 1876.

The club started in a modest fashion, one of the fixtures being with Rochdale Hornets "A" team. By the end of the season the club had two teams and with Rugby Football spreading in the town and district, more and more interest was created in the club. Gradually the fixture list was improved and by the end of the first season games were arranged for the second season with Wakefield Trinity and Dewsbury who then bore the word Athletic in their title.

When the first team travelled to play Wakefield Trinity in the opening game of 1877 – 78 season, the second fifteen played the rest of the club who fielded 24 players, and beat them by two goals and seven tries to one try. The first team at Wakefield comprised two full backs, two threequarters, two half back and nine forwards.

When the Lancashire Senior Competition was established in 1892 by the Lancashire Rugby Union committee, Oldham were considered to be one of the leading clubs and finished in a middle of the table position.

In 1893 – 94 Oldham were champions and a year later finished as runners up. At that stage the leading Lancashire and Yorkshire clubs were breaking away to form the Northern Union as they were so dissatisfied with the Rugby Union.

In the first season of the Northern Union, 1895—96 Oldham made a profit of £1,148 the highest ever made by a rugby club. That was after spending over £1,000 to improve the stands.

Oldham were the first Lancashire club to win the Northern Union Challenge Cup (now the Rugby League Challenge Cup) and won the championship of the Northern League three times before the first world war, twice finishing as runners-up. Twice the club finished runners-up in the Challenge Cup and won the Lancashire League Championship and the Lancashire Cup above once in that same period.

After the war Oldham made history by appearing in four successive Challenge Cup finals, which no other club has so far accomplished. However, the greatest disappointment suffered by Oldham supporters for some 45 years is that the club has never appeared in a Wembley final.

Towards the late 1950's the club entered another golden phase of its history when honours came thick and fast for both club and players. What a galaxy of talent had arrived at Watersheddings in those glorious days. Bernard Ganley set up a goal scoring record, since broken by Dave Watkins, from the full back position. The threequarters included John Etty, Alan Davies, Johnny Noon, Dick Cracknell, Dennis Ayres, Vin Nestor and Terry O'Grady. Half backs during the period were Frank Stirrup, Frank Pitchford, Frank Daley and Alan Kellett.

The pack included giants of the stature of Derek Turner, Sid Little, Jack Keith, Charlie Winslade, Des McKeown, Ron Rowbottom, Roger Dufty, Don Vines, Ken Jackson and Geoff Robinson.

In 1984 the club has five players, Terry Flanagan, Des Foy, Mick Worrall, Ray Ashton and Andy Goodway who went on the last tour of Australia, New Zealand and Papua-New Guinea. Mick Parrish failed to score recently after a run of over 30 games. Mick Morgan, Alan Currie and Paddy Kirwan have all played in County Championship games.

Add Álan Taylor, Brian Caffery, Green Vigo, Paul Loundes, Tony Ogden, Colin Hawkyard, Mick Taylor, Paul Taylor (Australia), Chris Phelen (Australia), Wally Jones, Tom Nadiole, new signing Martin Foy and Gary Walczak and the present set up at Watersheddings is in line for a revival of former glories.

Brian Batty on Rugby League

Watching the Wallabies completing the Grand Slam must have brought back certain memories of another Australian side for followers of Rugby League.

The speed, power and fine supporting play produced by the Wallabies bore a resemblance to the style of that wonderful record breaking Kangaroo side of 1982.

Perhaps that is not surprising when so many of the Wallaby stars have had a taste of League in their formative years and that Union players in Sydney and Brisbane are set such a fine example by League men.

As Mark Ella admitted, he has played League as a youngster and so have many members of his talented family.

The same goes for winger David Campese, who looks as good as many wingers in League but would not get into an Australian Rugby League Test side.

Not with the likes of Eric Grothe, John Ferguson and Kerry Boustead—to name but three—around.

What Ella did for the Wallabies and so staggered Union people in Britain was simply to run with the ball and not attempt to kick it out of play with a negative outlook.

I have enjoyed watching the Wallabies because of their refreshing approach to Rugby Union in contrast to so many sides over here—the French excepted of course.

The fantastic coverage afforded to the full tour by the BBC has been marvellous for Union fans and sports followers in general.

But it only brings home the tragedy of how the BBC so badly neglected the 1982 Kangaroos who could have captivated the same audiences given half a chance.

Some of the exciting midweek displays by the Kangaroos would have gone down so well in midweek sports programmes—the clashes with Hull, Wigan and Leeds for example.

But in comparison the Kangaroos were largely ignored and that must go down a lot, I believe, to the politics involved when we examine the projection of Union and League.

Perhaps now the standards of home Union sides have been so cruelly exposed the merits of League as an entertaining sport will be better appreciated.


