



In town today...

OUR visitors today, Oldham, have had an excellent first half of the season, always being amongst the first division pace-setters and having won 11 of their 16 fixtures. They must stand a very good chance of winning the Championship for the first time since 1957

In our match in late October at the Watersheddings, Oldham beat the Rovers fairly comfortably 26-8 in a game which saw Aussie newcomer Paul Taylor and Mick Worrall (returning after injury) star for Oldham. Green Vigo, Worrall, Andy Goodway, Mick Taylor and Mick Parrish scored tries with the latter landing three goals.

The current Oldham success is based upon the foundation of a strong pack in which former Rover favourite Mick Morgan is a leading light. Mick, who is playing as well as ever, commenced his long career with Wakefield Trinity and in addition to his spell with the Rovers also figured in the York team and with Carlisle when he was secondin-command to present Rovers' coach Allan Agar. In the match at Oldham Mick was very prominent with his ball-playing skills. Another skilful ballplaying forward in the Oldham pack is hooker Alan McCurrie who hails from Cumbria formerly having played with Whitehaven and Wakefield Trinity.

Oldham also have pack aces in Gt. Britain forwards Andy Goodway (who was signed from Castleford junior rugby), Mick Worrall and Terry Flanagan who all visited Australiasia with the 1984 Tourists.

In addition to these internationals Oldham have an Australian recruit in forward Chris Phelan who comes from Brisbane and in the last Australian season represented Parramatta in the Sydney competition. He also toured Britain with the Queensland team in 1983 and played in all three games, scoring one try.

The Oldham pack could also contain prop-forward Tony Ogden, Tom Nadiole and big Wally Jones.

Oldham have recently suffered a blow in scrum-half Paddy Kirwan receiving a fractured hand which will keep him out of the game for six weeks. However Gt. Britain tourist Ray Ashton will no doubt step in and Ray has been a thorn in the Rovers' side in many past encounters between the teams.

At stand-off Aussie Paul Taylor has been playing exceptionally well and we all remember his superb tackling in his debut game against us in the game at the Watersheddings and he also had a hand in three of the five Oldham tries. Paul is a team-mate of Chris Phelan at Parramatta in Sydney and can play equally well in one of several positions and was tipped in his homeland as a full-back at Test level

Amongst the threequarters we will see centre Mick Parrish who was Oldham's record signing for £18,500 from Hunslet in 1980. Mick is a prolific goal scorer (he scored over 100 last season) and must be one of the hardest tacklers in the game. His cocentre could be another Gt. Britain tourist in Des Foy who was Oldham's leading try-scorer with 13 tries last season along with Ray Ashton.

On the wings it is likely we will see South African Green Vigo, who formerly played with Wigan and speedy Mick Taylor. Reliable Alan Taylor has been the occupant of the No. 1 jersey in recent games although Brian Caffery has also played in this position.

In charge at Oldham is General Manager Frank Myler. Frank was coach to the 1984 Gt. Britain tour to Australasia and has been with Oldham since May 1981, having previously been connected with Rochdale Hornets, Widnes and Swinton. Brian Gartland is the Club Coach and has also been the Lancashire Colts Coach. Oldham have been well represented at Colt International level and their playing register includes Internationals Ashton, Kirwan, Flanagan, Mike O'Rourke, Steve Dobb, Alan Platt and Paul Lowndes.





Cup Clashes

Each week in this column we feature a famous 'cup clash' from the history of our opponents of the day.

Although Oldham have lifted the challenge cup on 3 occasions in 7 final appearances; like that other great club, Hull, they have never done so at Wembley, nor have they appeared there. Ironically the 'Roughyeds' appeared in four consecutive cup finals immediately prior to the Wembley era and have been unlucky in 3 semi-finals since this time. Perhaps their most unfortunate cup year was 1964, after drawing 5-5 with Hull K.R., they led 17-14 in extra time of the replay when bad light stopped play. They lost the 3rd game 12-2.

Oldham were however involved in one of the most dramatic of cup finals. That is to say dramatic as much for scenes off the field as much as on it. A massive crowd of 40,000 plus crowded into Rochdale to see Oldham take on old rivals Wigan and before the game started the pitch was invaded several times. Mounted police, officials and the famous disciplinarian referee, Rev. Frank Chambers, with herculian efforts ensured the game took place, touchlines having to be cleared throughout the game. Wigan proved the better side on the day on the field and scored a superb try through Springbok International Van Heerden (reputed to be paid extremely generous fees by the club) who handed off several defenders after kicking from his own half and rounded a mounted policeman before touching down between the posts.

The following season in the final staged at Headingley, Oldham put on a display of real class to sweep away Hull K.R.'s challenge by 16 points to 3, thus giving themselves consolation for the previous years disappointment v Wigan.



DID YOU KNOW?

Oldham, with four, had the worst record for players "sent to the sin bin" last season. For the record the culprits were Parrish, Goodway, Sinclair and McCurrie.





Off the record...

RUGBY LEAGUE is currently enjoying a welcome rise in crowds in certain areas of the game while some sections - mainly in the Second Division suffer a slump. It is great that the game is picking up at the turnstiles in places like St. Helens and Wigan on one side of the Pennines and Halifax and Leeds on the other. We cannot continue to rely on the Humberside clubs to pull in the bulk of fans

throughout the seasons.

But wherever the game is played from Workington to Southend - the importance of the spectator to his club is vital and it is nice to know that this is now being officially recognised. It is with sound timing that the Rugby League and sponsors Traveleads are promoting a first ever official award scheme to select the Supporter of the Year. The BBCs commentator Ray French heads a five-man judging panel, who will select the finalists from whom the 1985 Top Fan will be named at a special presentation at Headingley on March 28. The winner will receive a £1,000 voucher towards the holiday of his or her choice, plus a framed citation. League spokesman David Howes says: "Rugby League is justly proud of its image as the man's game for all the family.

In an era when the spotlight is continually focused on crowd behaviour in all sports we feel that this new award scheme will recognise the true sporting character of the people on the terraces". There is no doubt that the fans in our sport have earned the game an enviable reputation for behaviour and knowledge.

This message is, of course, rammed home to us when we watch televised soccer names and see the disgraceful incidents which can tarnish a sport. It is unthinkable that Rugby League should suffer from the sort of problems that have hit Glasgow Celtic with their fans hitting a new low in that infamous Cup clash with Rapide Vienna at Old Trafford recently.

Down memory lane...

1908-09

Chairman—George Johnson; Secretary — Mr. Brown; Ground — Athletic Grounds (Post Office Road); Headquarters—Railway Hotel.

After two seasons in the wilderness, that is to say without a team, the Rovers returned to Featherstone and reformed as a club in December 1908. They had previously ceased to operate during the summer of 1906. Several theories have been put forward regarding the disbandment, the one favoured by myself and Rugby League statistician Irvin Saxton, is that Rovers suf-fered such depletion in playing personnel after bigger clubs 'creamed off' the best of their players that they had no alternative. It is certain that the club's 'head and front' Geo. Johnson had moved on to new pastures by taking charge of Pontefract club 'Grove Town'.

However the fresh start was made on Boxing Day of 1908 with a friendly at home to **Hunslet Albion**. Rovers ran out winners by 14-8.

The club were formed too late to join a league, but said they would apply to join the **Dewsbury**, **Wakefield and District League** and so were admitted to the Cup Competition. Rovers drew a bye in the first round and in the 2nd round beat **Normanton** 8-0. However Normanton objected to three players fielded by Rovers, the objection was upheld when it was found one of the players, namely **Pawson**, was ineligible to play. A replay was staged at **Streethouse** and this time Rovers went down 3-21.

Rovers debutantes this season included Sam Goodwin, John Willie Higson, Bill Clay, Tommy Dixon, Dick Harris, Ron Johnson, Sam Southall, Walt Walker, Jack Roberts and Belph Ward.


