Percentage wise Oldham have the best record against Hull F.C. of any of the clubs in the Rugby League today. Since the reintroduction of two divisions the side have met seven times in Division One with Hull winning four and Oldham three in what have generally been close low scoring affairs. Oldham will be intent on stopping the Airlie Birds from completing a hat trick of wins over them this season for Hull have already returned with the spoils from the Watersheddings and knocked our visitors out of the John Player Special Trophy. 

Saturday, 9th March, 1985 Silk Cut Challenge Cup Quarter Final Tie HULL F.C. 6 WIDNES 6



This battle of the cup giants certainly matched expectations as both sides lived to fight another day after a tense, heart-stopping tussle. The final outcome perhaps satisfied the Chemics more than ourselves because not only had they now gained home advantage but also for long periods their hold on the game's premier trophy hung on a knife edge.

After dominating proceedings for much of the game and enjoying a far superior share of territorial possession it was obviously disappointing that we could not make that tell but credit has to be given to Widnes' magnificent defence. On reflection the loss of Peter Sterling through a hamstring injury sustained in training was decisive because the Aussie ace may well have provided the key to open the Widnes reaguard and the rhythm so well established in our recent performances was again disturbed by enforced positional changes. After due consideration Team Manager Arthur Bunting plumped for the experience of **Fred Ah Kuoi** at scrum half rather than give an exacting debut to the club's only other fit number seven — Jimmy Portz. The switch of Ah Kuoi meant a return for skipper David Topliss with Steve Evans reverting to centre, thereby opposing Wembley hero of last season Joe Lydon. The opening quarter set the pattern for ensuing events as both sides opted for safety first before adventure and concentrated on yielding nothing in their own half. The defensive prowess which has carried Widnes to such glory in the past decade was again to the fore as we made the most of a 6-2 first half scrum advantage to impose relentless pressure on the opposing line. Steve Evans looked certain to continue his scoring sequence when breaking clear but was stopped inches short by the combined efforts of Mick Burke and David Hulme and the cover again closed to stop Gary Divorty. Lee Crooks tried to break the deadlock with a drop goal but was well wide and both Crooks and Garry Schofield had been unsuccessful with penalty attempts. By the interval it was clear that one score could settle the issue and as the pattern continued into the second period and our frustration mounted desperation became apparent in our play. Hull fans began to visualise the worst as Widnes are always at their most dangerous with their backs against the wall but on the hour to our obvious relief the barrier was finally succumbed. From a scrum in the Chemics' twenty-five Steve Norton and David Topliss produced a flash of their vintage days to send in Gary Divorty near the posts and Lee Crooks' conversion produced sights of a passage into the semi final. Sadly our joy was shortlived as within four minutes the Cup holders had produced the perfect answer. In a rare venture into our half Joe Lydon managed to shake off Steve Evans and race clear down the touchline to give Andy Currier a scoring opportunity. The young winger finished clinically leaving a trail of defenders in his wake to touch down near enough to the posts for Mick Burke to level matters at 6-6. As a last resort Arthur Bunting introduced Paul Prendiville to allow Steve Evans to move to stand-off for the replaced David Topliss but the Chemics were in no mood to relinquish a replay opportunity. Gary Divorty and Lee Crooks tried to win the day with a one pointer but Widnes closed in rapidly to alleviate the danger. In fact the Chemics could have stole the game themselves in the dying seconds but the brave Fred Ah Kuoi (sporting a fractured jaw injury) spotted drop goal expert Mick Burke lining up for an effort and managed to smother the rising ball. So to Naughton Park the following Wednesday and as has become a regular occurrence Arthur Bunting's team selection was based more on developments in the treatment room. With Paul Prendiville (hamstring injury) and the particularly unfortunate Fred Ah Kuoi already ruled out and Peter Sterling making desperate efforts to overcome his hamstring trouble, further attention was directed to Maurice Bamford's Great Britain side for the Second Test against France for selected players are no longer allowed to represent their clubs in the week of an international fixture. When news filtered through that Gary Divorty had retained his place that meant further adjustments though Andy Dannatt was available to play at Naughton Park having been selected as one of the travelling reserves.






### Silk Cut Challenge Cup Quarter Final Replay

After almost three hours of gripping cup football we finally managed to suppress the Cup holders and by ending the Chemics' stubborn restistance we ensured our fourth Challenge Cup semi-final engagement in six years and our third consecutive meeting with Malcolm Reilly's Castleford. With the massive travelling Hull contingent relieved to hear of Peter Sterling's successful fitness test Arthur Bunting also plumped for experience in the pack with Paul Rose returning after a three week absence and Steve Norton taking over the loose-forward role from the unavailable Gary Divorty. A further unexpected bonus was the return of James Leuluai in the centre and that enabled Steve Evans to revert to the offhalf role. Naughton Park has never been one of our happy hunting grounds and we hardly set off on the right foot to improving that record when the Chemics struck a devastating blow with their first touch of the ball. After we had forced our way into the Widnes twentyfive in search of an early score, Kurt Sorenson and Kevin Tamati combined to break our first line of defence and set Joe Lydon in the clear and the youngster showed blistering pace to leave even the speedy Kevin James in his tracks on a sixty yard race to the line. Mick Burke converted to leave us in no doubt as to the size of our task. Thereafter the game adopted a similar pattern to the first with Shaun Patrick monopolising the scrums and yet the Chemics still showing little sign of yielding under constant pressure. Our tackling also lacked punch and on several occasions the holders were able to clear their lines with comfort but fortunately Widnes were unable to alleviate their scrummaging problems. With the ubiquitous Peter Sterling leading the charge the ace Australian paved the way for our equalising score sending **Steve Evans** crashing over near the posts for **Garry Schofield** to level matters at 6-6. There the deadlock remained until just before the interval when Man of the Match **John Myler** illustrated Widnes' match winning qualities. With all avenues seemingly closed Myler spotted half an opening and that was all he needed to make the break to send Keiron O'Loughlin diving over in spectacular style. Mick Burke's conversion brought a disappointing conclusion to a breathless first half and there was a general feeling in the home crowd that we had sacrificed our opportunity for Widnes just had to gain a better share of possession in the second period. Their worst fears materialised as we encamped in the opposing half with our defensive play showing marked improvement and allowing the Chemics little room to manoeuvre. Long distance field kicks via Mick Burke in the main became Widnes' saving grace but with Gary Kemble impeccable in his handling the reprieve was only temporary. Still we had to find a chink in the Chemics' armour with the relentless driving of Trevor Skerrett and Lee Crooks and artistry of Steve Norton and Sterling apparently making no headway. As the minutes ticked by our Wembley dreams seemed to be fading. A glimmer of hope was provided on the hour when a crossfield move gave Dane O'Hara enough leeway to squeeze over near the corner flag but Garry Schofield's touchline kick floated agonisingly past the posts. Back we came in search of what would obviously be the decisive score and when Widnes were penalised in possession for an incorrect play-the-ball Garry Schofield was given a timely opportunity to level the scores from some forty yards out. To the relief of the Hull contingent his kick was perfect and that merely set the stage for our prolific youngster's grand finale. With the scores again locked at 12-12 and a successful drop-goal being the clear route to the semi-final for either side, Kevin James brilliantly fielded a touch seeking kick and left John Basnett leaden footed with a swift side-step and turn of speed which took him into familiar territory for us. There he found Garry Schofield in support and the international illustrated why he has caught the attention of the Australians with a swerving run to the corner. A memorable touchline conversion sealed a famous victory and brought the deserved reward for our patience and perseverence. Although Widnes made a last desperate effort to save the tie we had no intention of relinquishing that 18-12 lead and there was still time for Steve Norton to produce a rare drop goal. So the Wembley ambition remains intact and now only Castleford and Wigan stand in the way of an event which one thought would never be repeated this century - an all Humberside Challenge Cup Final. The devoted efforts of the players last Wednesday evening clearly illustrated that no stone will remain unturned in this quest.


