

WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

IT all seems to have been happening on the Watersheddings scene in the past week or two, with transfer-listings and signing making it a very eventful end of season spell.

We have transfer-listed Terry Flanagan and Ray Ashton, each at their own request, at £45,000, and then we followed up last weekend by putting Andy Goodway on offer at £100,000.

Though this is certainly a club record fee, and one of the largest ever asked, we all know that Andy is one of the world's top forwards. He was one of the few British tourists to earn a contract with a Sydney League club — Manly — and he was one of only two players from England to be named in the Adidas World Rugby League XIII in the April edition of "Open Rugby".

We believe that some sort of sanity must return to transfer fees and, on current valuations, we believe the six-figure fee is about right, just as we believe the £45,000 valuations on Ray Ashton and Terry Flanagan are also realistic.

It has been decided that the club policy must be that if players do not want to play for Oldham they can seek pastures new so long as the club gets what it believes to be a fair and realistic deal for the loss of their services.

At the time of writing Ray Ashton was about to speak to Halifax officials, the clubs having previously agreed terms for his transfer.

As the signing deadline was fixed at 5pm last Tuesday evening anything might have happened in the 24 hours leading up to it.

Goodway is due to leave soon to play in Sydney, and Mick Worrall will be bound for Brisbane where he has agreed to play for Brisbane Norths during our off-season before returning to Watersheddings next August or September.

On the incoming side, we must welcome four new arrivals at Watersheddings — two permanent signings and two on-loan men.

We caught the headlines on Sunday of last week when we bought Featherstone's Great Britain forward David Hobbs for an undisclosed fee, and David did extremely well for us on his debut against Workington Town.

He is one of the game's top running forwards, having played several times for Great Britain, having toured Down Under last summer, and having scored the two tries that gave Featherstone that shock Challenge Cup final win over Hull two years ago - a performance that earned him the Lance Todd Trophy.

We trust David will have a long and happy stay at Watersheddings, and we express similar sentiments for young Tony Morrison, who has joined us from the St Helens amateur club, Blackbrook.

Tony was one of the hottest properties in the county. He has earned Lancashire under-17 and under-19 honours and he capped his amateur career at Craven Park, Barrow on Sunday of last week when he played for Great Britain youth against France.

Several clubs were chasing Tony and we regard his signing as a big feather in the cap of the Oldham club.

We have also snapped up, on loan, strong-running forward Paul Dixon from the Huddersfield club and winger Pat Mitchell from Leeds. A hearty welcome is also expressed for these two players, also.

Paul, who is listed at £12,000 by Huddersfield, came on as substitute in the second half against Workington and caught the eye with some powerful running.

Pat, who has had a spell on loan at Sheffield Eagles, scored two tries in the "A" team at Workington on the Saturday and followed up with another three on his senior debut at Watersheddings the following day.

The big win emphasised that we still have a chance of finishing in the top four, but much will depend on what happened at Halifax on Friday evening and what happens in today's classic clash with our old rivals Wigan.

If we don't make the top-four, of course, this will be our final home game of the season at first-team level.

The time is right, therefore, to thank you all for your support throughout the season. Look forward to seeing you in the Premiership — home or away!

Historical Notes on Wigan

DIPPING into my Wigan scrap book I looked at 1957. On February 23rd the Pools Competition was commenced. Within seven weeks the takings had risen to £290 which represented 5,800 members at one shilling (old money) per week. Such tangible support allowed the club to pay a record fee of £9,500 to Huddersfield for the services of Mick Sullivan. The club programme remarked that although only 23 years old he had not missed an international appearance since he made such a wonderful debut in the World Cup in France in 1954.

About that time Tom Brown was the club chairman who some years earlier had been chairman of the Rugby League Council. His vice-chairman was William C. ('Bill') Gore. The board consisted of Ken Broome, Frank Fairhurst the former referee who served a term as Lancashire County president, Tom Hesketh, J. Stephens, Joe Taylor, S. Wild, W. Wilkinson and W. Wood.

Going back to early days just before the club obtained Central Park as headquarters, the club had played at Prescott Street where 7,000 was the maximum capacity and then all could not properly see the play. Two turnstiles only were used and £100 was really something to talk about. Joe Leach the celebrated Wigan journalist recorded that in 1896-97 the total receipts for the whole campaign were only £556. Before 1960 crowds of something like 50,000 could draw in £5,000 for a single match.

While the work of preparation at Greenough Street (where Central Park was developed) was going on, the club shared the ground of Wigan United soccer club at Springfield Park for a season. There were three soccer clubs before the present Wigan Athletic, Wigan County, Wigan United and Wigan Borough who all hit the dust owing to the tremendous competition of the Rugby club.

The pavilion at Wigan was not built until 1909, seven years after the club moved to Central Park. Players dressed at the Princess of Wales Hotel about 150 yards from the ground.

In 1910 wrestling was one of the attractions at the ground. Bob Berry wrestled Irstlinger who gained one fall for the middleweight championship. The gate was about £75. A couple of days later Bob Berry gained the victory.

There is always controversy about the foundation of the Wigan club. It was recorded that the Wigan Hare and Hounds Club decided to establish a football team to be known as the Wigan Wasps. When the Rugby Union club connected with the Wigan Cricket Club disbanded, the Wasps took the title of Wigan Football Club. The chief movers in the formation of Wigan Wasps were J. Slevin, J. Underwood, J. Warde and W.L. Baldwin. The president was R.A. Farrington the Mayor of Wigan.

J. Williams was the first captain. J. Slevin was vice-captain, A.J. Hodgkinson treasurer and the secretary was J. Underwood. The last named was still secretary when active as a first class referee some years later.

The Wasps had fixtures in their first season with the newly formed Aspull club, Chorley, St. Lawrence's, Lowton, Southport Grasshoppers, Bolton Wesleys, Platt Bridge, Westhoughton and Highfield. The ground was at Dicconson Street and the club played in navy blue jerseys and white knickers.

The team that first represented Wigan Wasps was J. Underwood; J. Slevin, W. Baldwin and J. Horrocks threequarters, J. Williams and A. Wardle half-backs, J. Baines, J. Berry, A. Atkinson, J. Almond, W. Marsden, W. Fleming and W.L. Baldwin forwards. The second season saw a large accession of new players and the "Wigan Examiner" some years later reviewing the club history said that "a powerful team resulted."

WELCOME TO WIGAN

IT is always a pleasure to welcome to Watersheddings our great friends from Central Park, and that is especially so this season as Wigan are already booked for a Wembley appearance on May 4 and a chance to avenge that disappointing Empire Stadium defeat by Widnes a year ago.

Wigan also fancy their chances of lifting the Slalom Lager championship, although the effects of the end-of-season fixture pile-up perhaps began to tell on them last week when they lost at Hull and at Leeds in successive matches.

The Central Park men are in the middle of a cruel and intensive spell of fixtures and they come here today after playing Hull a week last Friday night, Leeds on the Sunday, Bradford on the Tuesday and St Helens last Friday — a programme to test the best.

They do have, of course, a strong squad and it is a squad that will be tested to the full during their late run-in.

Wigan have been adopting a policy of resting players in turn over the past fortnight or so but, even so, they have had a difficult mountain to climb and the simple fact is that anything can happen yet in the race for the Slalom Lager title and the top-four positions.

The Riversiders have had a fabulous season, reaching the final of the Lancashire Cup, in which they were beaten by St Helens, and now looking forward to their second successive Wembley appearance after wins over Batley, Warrington, Bradford and Hull KR — the latter after a fabulous semi-final at Elland Road which could have gone either way until Wigan skipper Graeme West took a hand in the second half.

He fashioned brilliant tries for centre David Stephenson and wing Henderson Gill as Wigan roared to victory.

Strangely, the man who has done so much to put Wigan on the map this season, Aussie star Brett Kenny, chose the semi-final to have a quiet day by his own high standards.

Kenny, though, was the last piece of the jigsaw and the Parramatta star, who first came to England with the 1982 Kangaroos, has proved himself one of the best outside-halves in the world today.

Earlier in the season he formed a terrific Aussie duo with his fellow countryman, wing John Ferguson, whose feats reminded many Central Park fans of the great Billy Boston.

Sadly for Wigan, Ferguson had to return home to Sydney after the second-round win at Warrington, but Wigan moved quickly to replace him by paying out £40,000 for Welsh wing Phil Ford from Warrington.

In recent games, while Shaun Edwards has been recovering at fullback, with Brian Juliffe keeping his place on the wing after scoring Wigan's first try in the semi-final, Ford being cup-tied and unable to play in the Challenge competition.

There is talk of Wigan bringing back Ferguson from the other side of the world, but so far that has still to be confirmed.

Gill, on the other wing, needs no introduction while three centres battle for the places in the middle — Stephenson, Steve Donlan, signed earlier this season from Leigh and Colin Whitfield.

Kenny is an automatic choice at stand-off while young Mike Ford, reared in Saddleworth and still living locally, has emerged superbly this season to make the No. 7 shirt his own.

Wigan have a lot of experienced forwards from whom to choose, and it is impossible to guess what their pack formation might be.

However, Neil Courtney, Nicky Kiss (two more local lads), and Brian Case are probably the first-choice front-row with West and Shaun Wane forming the second-row and lan Potter at loose-forward.

Others to choose from are Danny Campbell, the strong-running Kiwi, former Halifax man Mick Scott, a semi-final substitute, former Great-Britain under-24 man Brian Dunn and South African Du Toit, a very strong runner indeed.

All in all Wigan have a splendid blend of strength and pace, youth and experience, skill and power and they have been blended into a formidable and attractive outfit by joint coaches Colin Clarke and Alan McInnes.


