



Our ideas alone are not enough and we should be more than interested to hear your views and suggestions as to what you would like to see in the programme.



SEVEN-A-SIDE COMPETITION - RULES OF THE TOURNAMENT

- 1. Games will be played under the Laws of the Rugby Football League, except
 - (a) at a kick-off following a score, the ball need not travel ten yards forward.

(b) the three tackle rule shall apply.

- 2. Each side will consist of seven players, the usual formation being three forwards and four backs.
- 3. Selection may be made from eight players, but one substitute will be allowed during any part of the game.
- 4. The duration of each game before the Final game will be sixteen minutes, i.e.

seven and a half minutes each way, with one minute interval at half-time. If at the end of the sixteen minutes the game is drawn, the teams shall change over and continue playing until one side scores, such side being the winner, ends being changed every seven and a half minutes if necessary. In extra time there will be no interval. The final tie will be played for ten minutes each way with an interval of one minute at half-time.

Time is checked by an Independent Time Keeper who allows for injury time. A klaxon indicates the end of each session of play, except that if a try has been scored, the scoring side shall be allowed to attempt the conversion.



COUNTDOWN TO THE KIWIS

The 1985 Kiwl Tour opens at Central Park on Sunday October 6, and a big crowd is expected for the game which will be . Wigan's first against the New Zealanders since 1971.

Starting today and continuing until the Wigan-Kiwi clash a series of articles will appear in the Wigan programme recalling the visits of earlier NZ Touring teams with some notes on the many great New Zealanders who have played for the Wigan Club over the years.

In 1888, before the breakaway movement which led to the formation of the Northern Union, a New Zealand Maoris team came to Britain for a tour which lasted six months and on December 17 the tourists visited Wigan to play the local RU club_before 7,000 spectators at the Prescott Street ground. The score was 8 pts-one to the Maoris - a try at that time counted as one point, a goal (or converted try) counted as three.

The Northern Union was formed in 1895 and soon the new

code was ready to expand overseas — but how?

The answer was provided when New Zealand Rugby
Union team toured the British Isles in 1905. Returning home after the tour, one of the New Zealand players reported on the new 'northern' game he had seen in England. This man was George W. Smith, a famous wing threequarter and Olympic athlete and he found an interested listener in Albert Baskerville, a 24 year old post office official from Wellington. The two of them recruited a team of Rugby Union players to tour the Northern Union clubs in 1907, thus

becoming the predecessors of the modern day Kiwis.

When the side left New Zealand they were called the 'All
Golds' because unlike the amateur RU All Blacks, its

members were to be paid for playing football.

The New Zealanders played their first ever game under Northern Union rules with 13 a side at Bramley and on November 9 the New Zealanders, unbeaten after their first

nine matches, met Wigan at Central Park. The teams were: WIGAN - J. Sharrock, J. Leytham, B. Jenkins, T. Thomas, J. Miller, J. Thomas, W. Battersby, R. Ramsdale, W. Willcock, B. Brooks, W. A crowd of 30,000, still the largest for a club against New Zealand game saw a superb match which Wigan won 12 pts-8 to end the tourists unbeaten run. The star of the day was the Wigan captain Jimmy Leytham who scored a hat-trick of tries with the brilliant Welsh centre Bert Jenkins getting a fourth.

Baskerville's All Golds made a second appearance at Central Park on 11 January 1908 in an international against England. The great Jimmy Leytham was the only Wigan player in the England team and he scored one of the 4 tries which sent New Zealand to an 18 pts-16 defeat.

Three Test matches against the Northern Union were played at Leeds, Chelsea and Cheltenham and the New

Zealanders set the seal on a successful tour by winning the series with victories in the second and third games.

At the end of the tour a number of the New Zealanders joined English clubs with Wigan signing the former inter-national RU forward Williams 'Massa' Johnstone and the one and only Lance Todd.

The next New Zealand RL touring team came to this

country in 1926 and played three games in Wigan.

The first of them was a Test match which England won 28pts-20. Jim Sullivan, Johnny Ring and Jack Bennett were Wigan's 'Test' representatives while the New Zealand team included Lou Brown, Benny Davidson and Len Mason who all signed for Wigan in the following year.

On 17 November 1926 the tourists played Wigan Highfield at Tunstall Lane, Pemberton. New Zealand won by 14pts-2 and the Highfield team was: Osbaldestin, Blinkhorn, Cowley, Haworth, Maloney, Oster, Whelan, Bentham, Gee, Mann, Fairhurst, Thompson, Gore.

When Wigan entertained the New Zealanders at Central Park on December 11, the tourists suffered their heaviest defeat of the tour, Wigan winning by 36pts-15.

Wigan's ten tries were scored by Ring (2), Parker (2),
Sullivan (2), Price (2), Abram and Owens, Sullivan kicking
three goals. Webb, Avery, Davison, Herring and Brown
scored tries for the New Zealanders.

The third New Zealand touring team in 1939 was the first to be known as the Kiwis but owing to the outbreak of the Second World War they only managed to play two games before they were forced to return home.

The second part of COUNTDOWN TO THE KIWIS will appear in the Wigan v Castleford programme on September 1st.

INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT WIGAN, 1984-85
WIGAN have had ten different captains since the beginning of the 1982-83 season — Gary Stephens, Colin Whitfield, Graeme West, Jimmy Fairhurst, Glyn Shaw, Howie Tamati, Mark

Cannon, Brett Kenny, Shaun Edwards and Steve Donlan. Nicky Kiss also skippered the team against France during the 1982-83 season but that match does not count in the official records.

Ten players appeared for Wigan for the first time last season (excluding the trialist Prop Forward). The ten being John Ferguson, Paul O'Neill, Nick du Toit, Brett Kenny, Steve Donlan, Phil Ford, John Mayo, Martin Dermott, Cliff Berry and Stewart Williams.

Eight players scored their first tries for the Club last season, the eight being Neil Courtney, Steve Donlan, Nick du Toit, John Ferguson, Mike Ford, Phil Ford, Brett Kenny and Paul O'Neill.

The 1984 Lancashire Cup Final was the first peace-time final to be played on the ground of one of the competing teams.

Wigan have now appeared in a record thirty Lancashire Cup finals.

Henderson Gill, David Stephenson and Mick Scott all made their 100th appearances for the Club last season.

David Stephenson has now dropped four goals for the Club — and all four have been scored against St. Helens.

Brett Kenny, John Ferguson and Phil Ford all scored four tries in a match last season and they were the first players to achieve this feat for the Club since Kieron O'Loughlin who crossed four times against Huddersfield on September 10th, 1978.

John Ferguson (24) and Henderson Gill (33) became the first Wigan players since Kieron O'Loughlin (1978-9) to score twenty tries in a season.

The last time two Wigan players scored twenty or more tries in a season was 1968-9 (Bill Francis (40) and Colin Tyrer(21)).

The last Wigan player to score 30 tries in a season was Stuart Wright in 1970-1 (32).

A number of records were set up by Wigan in last season's Challenge Cup Final: Most-R.L. Cup final appearances (17), most Wembley appearances (13) and most Wembley wins (7) (shared with Widnes). The attendance was the highest ever at the Empire Stadium (99,801) and not surprisingly it produced the highest ever receipts (£760,000) while the aggregate score (52 points) and the number of points scored by the losing team (24) were also new highs for the final. Furthermore ten tries were scored for the first time at Wembley and Henderson Gill's meant that he had touched down in every round of the competition. Finally, Brett Kenny became the first Australian to win the Lance Todd Trophy and he was one of a record ten overseas players to take part in the final.



WIGAN R.L.F.C. GREATS

ERNIE ASHCROFT

TODAY as a tribute to the great Ernie Ashcroft, who sadly passed away during the close season, we reprint the 'Wigan R.L.F.C. Greats' article that first appeared in the Bradford Northern programme last season.

The Wigan Club was extremely successful

in the period 1945 to 1952 and when one looks at a list of the players who represented the Club during that time it is not hard to understand why. Stars such as Ken Gee, Joe Egan, Les White and Billy Blan graced the pack while the backs contained the likes of Ces Mountford, Brian Nordgren, Tommy Bradshaw and Centre Ernie Ashcroft.

Ashcroft, who was born in 1925, was registered by Wigan on January 20th, 1943, and following the end of the Second World War he quickly slotted into the first team. In fact, in the 1945-6 season he made 40 appearances and scored 27 tries. One of these appearances came against Wakefield Trinity in the Rugby League Challenge Cup final at Wembley. Unfortunately Wigan went down by 13 points to 12 but Ashcroft did have the consolation of laying on a try for 'Kiwi' Wingman Brian Nordgren.

Later in 1946 Ashcroft represented England and the following year he made his Great Britain debut in the Second Test against New Zealand. This was the first of his eleven Great Britain appearances in a test career which

lasted from 1947 to 1954 and incorporated the 1950 and 1954 tours of Australia and New Zealand.

On the 1950 tour Ashcroft played in eleven games, including all three Tests against Australia and the first test against New Zealand, and scored five tries while on the 1954 tour he played in fifteen games, including all three tests against Australia and the first and third tests against New Zealand, and scored eleven tries.

Incidentally, a record eight Wigan players went on the 1950 Tour and seven of them — Martin Ryan, Gordon Ratcliffe, Jack Hilton, Tommy Bradshaw, Ken Gee, Joe Egan and Ashcroft — played in the first Test against Australia. Jack Cunliffe was the unlucky man who missed out.

In total Ashcroft played 477 times for Wigan following the return to normal rugby after the end of the Second World War and he scored 222 tries. His last appearance came against Whitehaven at Central Park on October 18th, 1958, and to mark the occasion he scored two tries as Wigan ran out winners by 39 points to 16

Ashcroft ended his playing career at Huddersfield and then took up the coaching position at Warrington but he will always be remembered as a Wigan centre and a very fine one too.
