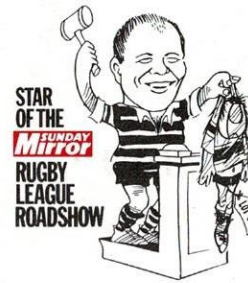

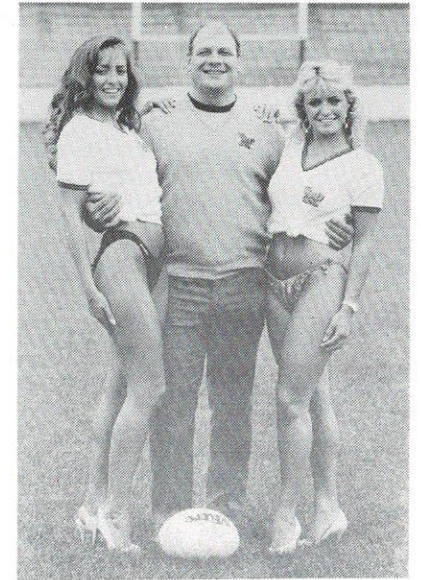

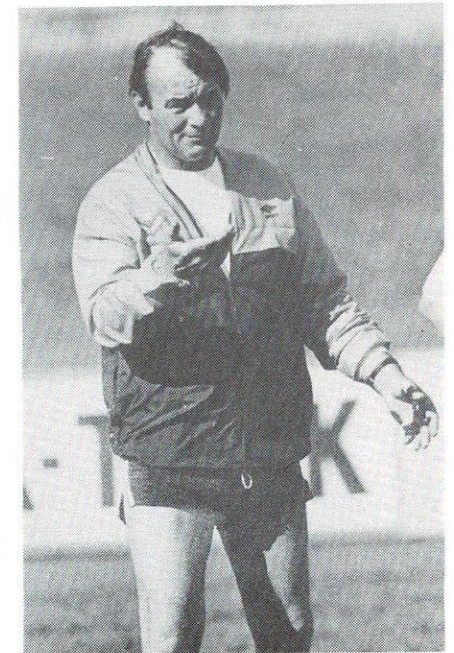

TRIBUTE....

Off the field, Mick Morgan is to subtlety what King Herod was to baby sitting!

On the pitch, it has been the subtle touches of ball-handling which have been the hallmark of Morgy's 20-year playing career. These match-winning skills have made him a marked man, which goes a long way to explaining his facial appearance. Mick is not as old as he looks he was, in fact, 12 when he was born! Morgy has been - and forever will be - "one of the lads". Always a player's player, his love of the game has spilled over to off-the-field activities.

His ready wit and effervescent personality made him a natural for his famous - or infamous - auctions, particularly in the highly-successful series of 56 Sunday Mirror Rugby League Roadshows.

I first met Mick in 1975 when he was celebrating his ten-year stay at Wakefield Trinity. It was the year in which he visited Australia and New Zealand with the England World Championship squad. Since then, Mick has served York, hometown Featherstone Rovers, helped launch Carlisle with a spell as player-coach, before moving here to Watersheddings.

In a playing jersey, Morgy has continued to be a key performer as he approaches retirement age. In 1982, he received the highest individual award Man of Steel as the personality judged to have made the most impact in a season in which he scored a record 25 tries for a prop and finished fifth in the League's try-scoring chart.

Last season, it looked as though his days in top-flight football were numbered. At one stage, Oldham were considering putting a price on him for transfer but their plans were dashed when Arthur Negas died! In typical Morgan style, he tackled the situation by being sorely missed in Oldham's Challenge Cup exit at Boundry Park and then turned on five-star shows for the television cameras against St. Helens and Castleford.

Morgy is destined to contribute to the 13-a-side code long past his playing days. It is reckoned that he has raised around £75,000 to date for benefits and charities.

For the next three months, it is his turn to be in the fund-raising spotlight. Mick is a part of the basic fabric of this great game of Rugby League, a talented player with personality and character on and off the field. His heart is as big - and probably the same shape - as a rugby ball.

As one wag said when he skippered a side: "He's a rum one, this Captain Morgan"!

At the end he looked down and said: "What's next, John?" Innocently, I replied: "A boot". That was a major error of judgement! "A boot!" said Mick. "Whose boot?" And when I was lost for words Mick continued to make me the butt of his humour for the rest of the night, much to the amusement of the packed audience.

I forgave him. Doesn't everybody! I hope people in Rugby League support Mick in the same way that he supports them. Most of all I'll be looking for a special response from the professional players who have all benefited from his off-the-field generosity of spirit and time.

When somebody thought of second benefits it must have been with men like Mick Morgan in mind. He is worthy of your support and respect as a great professional sportsman.

The Morgan locks have seen better days. But packing down in thousands of scrums and something about brushed-nylon nighties have helped thin them out.

After all, the last bloke who regularly trimmed hair in Mick's home "town" of Featherstone was Geronimo. Young Master Morgan was very nearly scalped when he ignored the Rovers and signed professional forms for the city slickers down the road at Wakefield Trinity.

Since then the widest grin in Rugby League has been in evidence at several clubs as Mick has added humour and professionalism to their cause.

His playing record speaks for itself. He moved up from being a young winger, who had a nightmare debut with Trinity. He dropped a steam of try-making passes and it was rumoured he also dropped his wage packet the following week - the first and only time!

He has been centre, hooker, second-row and loose forward and finally prop, where his now-stately figure can still cause havoc among opposing defences.

Mick has also earned the deep gratitude of fellow professionals for his work off the field as an autioneer at testimonial functions.

In Rugby League territory, Christies and Sothebys have been overtaken by Morgans. His unique style has persuaded audiences at the popular Sunday Mirror Roadshows to pay out tens of thousands of pounds towards the benefits of loyal players. That can't be bad when you consider that some of them might have thumped him on the nose at some time!

At a time when the code is said to be short of characters, Mick is one in his own right. In fairness he can claim that even the hairstyle has caught on - among babies!

If Mick Morgan had not chosen the sporting fields of Yorkshire to make his mark in life he would surely have gone on the stage.

He's that sort of bloke - full of fun, a natural wit, and a comedian who is just as much at home behind the mike as he is in the front-row of the scrum.

He is also one of Rugby League's nice guys who has raised thousands of pounds for his fellow professionals, largely thanks to his now famous auction and to his other efforts on behalf of the Sunday Mirror Rugby League Roadshow.

It goes without saying that Mick, a grand old man of the game at the age of 36, deserves the best possible support not only at this evening's match against the Great Britain squad, but also throughout the remainder of his testimonial on completion of 20 years in the game as a player.

If one man can be relied upon to support others it is Mick Morgan....and now it is his turn for a bit of propping up and I know the generous people of Oldham will rally round in their own inimitable style.

Mick signed for Wakefield Trinity as a 16-year-old in 1965 and he served Trinity for 12 years before his travels took him to York, to hometown Featherstone, to Carlisle, and then on to Oldham, where he has become, in the twilight of his career, one of the most popular players ever to wear the red-and-white jersey.

He played a major role in the successful establishment of Rugby League at Carlisle where, in the new Cumbrian club's first season, he established a try-scoring record for a prop with 25 and carried off the prestigious Man of Steel award.

He toured Australia in 1975 with the England World Cup squad and played in every game. The following year he captained Yorkshire to a County Championship triumph over Lancashire and Cumberland - two of ten appearances for the White Rose County.

Sadly, though, Mick does not have a lot to show in terms of medals and trophies for a player of such undoubted skill and talent. He has never played at Wembley, for instance, and in three finals for Wakefield.... in the John Player Trophy and twice in the Yorkshire Cup.... he has had to settle for a loser's medal.

A Second Division Championship medal with Featherstone Rovers and two County Championship-winning medals take pride of place in the Morgan household in Featherstone, but such is Mick's infectious enthusiasm for the game that it would take a gambling man to bet against him adding to his medal haul even at this late stage of his career.

You can safely bet on one thing, though.... Mick will crack a funny and look on the bright side no matter what the future holds in store for him and his family.

He is truly an adopted son of Oldham now and his popularity is reflected in his success locally as a full-time member of the club's Development Association team and as an after-dinner speaker of some repute! He has also given the town's Rugby League fraternity considerable enjoyment with his prowess on the field of play.

Local fans now have their chance to say "thanks" over the next few months.... and I know they will do it to some tune.
