





Our Visitors

For the John Player Trophy Second Round tie we extend a welcome to the fast-rising Oldham club. After an inconspicuous start to the season, with several defeats in the opening games, they have now strung a series of wins together to sweep up the table into second place, being unbeaten in their last seven away games.

There have been important changes in the make-up of the Oldham side. A big close season sale was that of **Andy Goodway** to Wigan, the fee in excess of £60,000 making him the World's most costly forward. Experienced winger Green Vigo was released from the register and 31 year old hooker Alan McCurrie, three and a half seasons at the

Watersheddings, was listed at £8,000.

Frank Myler:- Coach. A great British middle back of the post-war era making 24 appearances for Britain, being the only man to appear in both the 1960 and 1970 World Cups, he toured in 1966 and in 1970. As tour captain he became the last British skipper to bring home the Ashes. He won the Harry Sunderland Trophy with St. Helens in the 1970 Championship Final joining Saints from home town Widnes with whom he starred for 11 seasons. His 34 tries for the Chemics in 1958/59 still stands as a club record. He was coach of Widnes when they won their solitary championship in 1977/78, an achievement that won him the Trumann's Coach of the Year award. He has also coached Rochdale and Swinton before joining Oldham, and was Great Britain Tour coach in 1984.

Brian Gartland:- Coach. St. Helens born coach who has spent most of his career in the Oldham area coaching the Oldham colts and 'A' team in recent seasons before stepping up to first team duties in the middle of 1983/84, doing an excellent job for the Club in a crisis period which saw the resignations in quick succession of former coaches Dave Cox and

David Liddiard: Full back. 24. Signed from Sydney Club Paramatta he has emerged as a major force in Oldham's drive to the top. An elusive runner he has had to live under the shadow of Paul Taylor, Eric Grothe and Neil Hunt at home but has now become a star in his

own right. When he returns to Australia it will be to join Penrith.

Hussein M'Barki:- Wing. 29. The only Moroccan playing Rugby League in Britain. He signed professional for Fulham in 1981 and moved to Oldham early this season after an

unsuccessful spell with Warrington.

Des Foy:- Centre. 22. This Oldham born Test player was a big-money junior signing for Widnes in July 1980 but after failing to settle at Naughton Park, joined his home town club. Went on the 1984 Tour.

Gary Warnecke: Centre. Another successful Australian signing. He left Sydney Club Western Suburbs to take up his British career at Oldham. Equally at home in the forwards

or backs he is a very determined runner and tackler.

Mick Parrish: Centre. 27. Big tackling centre whose goal kicking talent has ensured that his name went into the record books as the only player to score in every match in a season for two different clubs. Signed from Hunslet for £20,000 in September, 1980, originally for

Mike Taylor: Wing. Recruited from Huddersfield Amateur Club, St. Joseph's, Taylor has

just started to emerge as a powerful winger who is difficult to stop near the line.

Dave Topliss: Off half (Captain). 35: 5ft. 8in. 11st 2lbs. Former Normanton Junior who served Wakefield Trinity for 13 seasons, winning the Lance Todd Trophy in the 1979 Wembley defeat. Played for Penrith Panthers in the mid 70's and joined Hull F.C. in 1981, captaining the Airlie Birds to six major finals, his finest hour being the 1982 Challenge Cup Replay with Widnes at Elland Road, scoring two tries. His brilliance gained him only four caps making his debut versus the 1973 Australians at Wembley and his last as captain in the Final Test at Headingley in 1982. Was a replacement tourist in 1979 and has scored over 200 tries in a great career. Joined Oldham this summer.

Paddy Kirwan:- Scrum half. Always had to live with the shadow of Ray Ashton over his career. Recognised as a clever footballer, Kirwan returned to Oldham after a loan spell with Leigh and is a valuable squad member.

Ray Ashton: Scrum Half. 25. A 1984 Tourist whose career has been dogged by a succession of back injuries. Widnes born, a tricky runner who can punch holes in the best

defences.

Wally Jones: Prop. Oldham revived Jones' career several years ago. He had previously played with Rochdale Hornets and was out of the game when Oldham recalled him. A strong scrummager and tackler who was the club's Player of the Year in 1983/84.

lan Sanderson:- Hooker. Only 20 the Leigh born player made a big impact when he took over at No. 9 early in the season following the suspension of Alan McCurrie, and gained a first Lancashire cap against New Zealand in mid November.

Paul Lowndes: Hooker. A young forward from the Warrington area whose career was

badly interrupted by a broken ankle but he is now on his way back to full form.

Mick Worrall:- Prop. 23. Warrington born former Colt, this 1984 Test forward has been dogged by injuries and subsequently his appearances for Oldham have been limited over the last two seasons. Had experience with Brisbane Norths during the summer.

Dave Finch: Second row. 27. The club's newest signing from Castleford a couple of weeks ago. Has had a lot of experience on the wing and a few seasons ago was on the

fringe of International selection.

David Hobbs: Second row. Signed from Featherstone Rovers last season for a Club record £40,000 fee, he has Test experience and is also a reliable goal kicker. Lance Todd Trophy winner in 1983, he went on tour in 1984.

Terry Flanagan: Second row. 24. A home produced star forward equally at home in either back three positions. An engineering graduate he is recognised as one of the game's most

gifted footballers. Played for Great Britain in 1983 and went on Tour in 1984.

Mal Graham: Loose forward. An Australian who impressed coach Frank Myler playing for relegated Hunslet last season. A Newcastle, New South Wales player he combines good football style with effective tackling.

OLDHAM—STAR PROFILE

Mick Morgan:- Prop. At a time of life when most prop forwards are sitting comfortably by the bar on Sunday afternoons, Mick Morgan is still making his mark in top class British Rugby League. This popular long-serving Yorkshireman has shown that given the right degree of professional dedication it is possible to stay in touch with the youngsters, aided by his superb ball skills.

Is Mick considering retirement? Most certainly he is not. He said "I'll keep playing until I stop enjoying myself and until I feel that I cannot offer anything more to this fabulous

game of ours"

At the end of last season it looked as though the end of Morgie's career had come. He was no longer making the Oldham team but, after a less than pleasing start to this season

by the men from Watersheddings, he has found a new lease of life.

Added Mick "The team spirit is fantastic at the moment and that's helped us recover well from that terrible start. Our Australian signings have fitted in with the British players splendidly and, working together, we have produced some great football for the fans. I am enjoying myself enormously. We've got some great young players in the side and if I'm able to help them learn something about the professional game, so much the better".

Morgan, who is currently enjoying a second Benefit marking his 20 years as a professional, is just as popular off the field as he is with his boots on. He has emerged as a top fund raising auctioneer with the record-breaking Sunday Mirror Roadshow and is in

major demand at any sportsman's dinner.

Mick said modestly, "It's always been a pleasure to lend a hand to my fellow professionals. I've had a tremendous time as a professional Rugby League player and I didn't do it on my own. I have faced some grand blokes and I want to show my appreciation of their skill, friendship and loyalty".

Oldham may well be the last stop in a trail that has taken him from Wakefield Trinity, Featherstone Rovers, York and Carlisle but Mick Morgan has found his permanent place in

Rugby League's heart.

BACK TO WINNING WAYS

After our recent trio of defeats, divided only by our Yorkshire Cup Final success, it was more pleasing to get back to winning ways in the First Division Championship competition. Our defeat at Bradford Northern was decisive, but not wholly convincing however.

Without the dependable Mumby and recent signing top scorer Woods. Bradford looked a poor side. It could have been an occasion for us to run up a big winning margin, but although the score mounted steadily we often lacked the fluency of which we are capable. The strong wind and some lack of confidence from previous defeats may have contributed in some degree to the errors which littered the game, especially in the first half.

After the interval we did show more of the skills our side is noted for, especially when John Dorahy moved up from full back, but the match was really notable only for a sparkling second half hat-trick by Garry Clark and the customary energetic display from man-of-the-match Gavin Miller. We suffered some physical punishment though. Miller sustained a cut over the eye needing five stitches, in addition to a pulled thigh muscle, Peter Johnston a nose injury, Phil Hogan a broken bone in his hand, and Gordon Smith a knee injury which has since necessitated a cartilage operation. Added to George Fairbairn's depressed cheekbone from the Yorkshire Cup Final, plus the stitches Dave Watkinson had inserted into a head wound during the preceding day's Third Test to add to those he collected in the Second Test, it meant that selection was restricted for the side visiting Leeds. We were also without the 'flu-hit Roger Millward.

At Headingley we started badly, again gaps appeared in our defence, and we were soon 12-4 down and looking well beaten. Then Garry Clark snatched a spectacular interception and seventy yard sprint which ended under the home posts and was worth six points.

At 12-10 things looked better at the break, and we looked a different side in the second half. The defence was tightened considerably, we moved with much more confidence and style in attack, to gain a well earned win which an hour earlier had looked so unlikely.

It set us up for the visit to Thrum Hall and the first contest in defence of our John Player Trophy, against the side we ousted at the semi-final stage last year. We were fortunate in being able to turn out a more representative team against a side who have been getting some good results during a run of seven successive games without defeat.

Halifax never looked like adding to it however, despite the wealth of possession granted to them by a heavy penalty count against us. With our pack generally in command, our defence looked as tight as we have come to expect of it in recent seasons, capably dealing with the block-busting barges of the home pack on a pitch made heavy by continuous rain.

Gary Prohm was in devastating form at centre, a look to the left and quick step to the right carving him an opening for his try, whilst he played a notable role in setting up our second try. But this was a team effort achieved by a side looking as though we've rediscovered our true form.
