

Comment



Last season, Oldham enjoyed much success in the League Championship finishing in a creditable fifth position with a record Pld. 30. W. 18. Drn. 1. Lost 11. For 563. Against 439 for 37 points. In the cup competitions they had little success leaving the Lancs Cup at the first stage at home to Blackpool by 26-32. The John Player in Round 2 to Hull 14-26 and The Challenge Cup in Round 1 at home to Castleford 8-14. Again in the Premiership they failed to survive the first stage going down to Leeds 18-36 at Headingley. This season after a shaky start Oldham hit a good run in the Championship and prior to last weekend were in 4th spot. P.18 W.9 D.4 L.4 373-302. Two points ahead of Wire who had two games in hand. The Cups so far have again brought little joy with a 12-40 defeat at Leigh in the Lancs Cup Round 1 and a narrow 7-8 loss to H.K.R. in the John Player Round 2. Oldham meet the winners of the Carlisle/Mansfield clash in Round 1 of the Challenge Cup which should provide a launch for better things.

After being twelve nil down in their home league fixture against wire, Oldham pulled back to a good 26-20 win to give them their first league win of the season. A Welsh Rugby Union International who turned professional with St. Helens in 1967, Bobby came on as substitute in Saints Championship final victory of 1971. He signed for Wire in the following season as a versatile front or second row forward, making his debut at Wilderspool on 12th September against Salford. In 1972/3 Bobby had become a regular in the Wire pack and his twelve tries helped Wire to the League Leaders Trophy. He went on to win four medals in season 1973/4. Playing in the Captain Morgan Trophy final, Players No. 6 final, Challenge Cup final and the Club Championship. At Wembley, Bobby came on the field as forward sub to replace the injured Brian Brady. Despite suffering through injuries in season 1974/5 Bobby managed to play in the replayed Flooddit Final v. Salford and returned to Wembley to play at prop in the Wire side which lost a grip on the Challenge Cup by going down to Widnes. Disappointment at picking up a losers medal was no doubt tempered by selection for the Welsh World Cup Squad to tour Australia. In 1975/6 in the final game of the season, Bobby probably turned in his finest performance for Wire in scoring three a marvellous hat trick of tries against Swinton.

Bobby began to ease off in the next two seasons and made his final bow on 1st February 1978 at Castleford. During his career at Wilderspool he had delighted the Wire fans with his forceful style of charging through the opposition with defenders desperately clinging on to his back. Happily settled in Warrington, Bob is currently mine host at the Old Ball public house in Winwick Road. In that World Cup tour of Australia Bobby earned Welsh caps against England, Australia and New Zealand.
