LANCASHIRE ATTENDANCES UP

The total attendance for the Lancashire County Cup competition is set to crash through the 100,000 barrier for the first time since 1969.

Already a total of 88,596 has seen 14 cup-ties and with another big crowd expected at St. Helens on Sunday for the final between Oldham and Wigan the six-figure mark should be reached.

The aggregate attendance will easily break last year's total of 91,007 to continue the massive increase of support for the Lancashire Cup. In three years the crowds will have more than doubled since a total of 49,200 saw the 1983 competition.

This will be the fifth meeting of Oldham and Wigan in the Final with each having won twice as follows:



Oldham Viewpoint

WIN or lose in today's Grünhalle Lancashire Cup Final, Oldham can perhaps claim with confidence that they are at last getting their act together in knock-out competitions.

During the first three seasons of First Division football, following promotion as Second Division champions in 1981, the emphasis was on survival and then consolidation in the higher division

Almost by accident, it seemed on reflection, Frank Myler's men reached the semi-final of the John Player Trophy during their Second Division championship

season.

The target that season was promotion. When the First Division finally beckoned, everyone at Watersheddings knew that survival was imperative if the club was to have a future.

Trophy hunting was all very well, but in terms of the club's main objective every match was

a cup-tie.

Oldham had been yo-yo men too often in the past. This time, they were up to stay. They had to be.

Inevitably, perhaps, the cup competitions were considered to be of lesser importance than the league in the plotting and planning of the club's long-term future.

Five years on, Oldham is well established now in the higher echelon and thoughts are turning naturally to enjoying success in one of the lucrative knock-out tournaments.

Only last March, Oldham reached the semi-finals of the Challenge Cup for the first time since 1964.

Today, they are appearing in their first Lancashire Cup Final since 1968, and they last won the trophy ten years before that in the golden days of Ganley, Davies, Pitchford, Little, Winslade, Stirrup, Turner and many others whose names jump from the pages of scrapbooks and old newspapers in type reserved for champions.

That team took the Lancashire Cup back up the hill out of Oldham in 1956, 1957 and 1958. It also won the league championship by beating Hull in a thriller at Odsal in the spring of

'57

By comparison, today's team

still wears its 'L' plates.

There is the vast experience of skipper David Topliss, of course, but most members of the side will be playing today in their first major final.

It will be a rare experience for Aussies Bruce Clark, Gary Bridge and Stuart Raper, who only arrived in this country for the first

time a few weeks ago.


It will be no less important for two overseas men who played in last season's Challenge Cup Semi-Final—Hussein M'Barki and Gary Warnecke—and for home-produced players such as Terry Flanagan, Paddy Kirwan, Ray Ashton and Mick Worrall.

The disappointment of defeat by Castleford to end yet another Wembley dream will have toughened the players mentally and strengthened their resolve to

make amends today.

Oldham go into the final as outsiders, but they have the talent, strength and fitness to stretch Wigan all the way and contribute considerably to the success of the 1986 Lancashire Cup Final.

David Topliss Needs little introduction, previously starring with Wakefield Trinity and then Hull, and appearing at Wembley for both clubs. One of the games all time greats, his experience is proving invaluable to the young Oldham side.





Paddy Kirwan Local lad, who signed from the Oldham colts side—he is a great hearted player with tremendous strength complimented by a good football brain. Turned the semi final tie against Widnes in Oldham's favour with a tremendous second half performance.

Ray Ashton Born in Widnes and was a member of the successful Oldham Colts side before progressing via the 'A' team into the senior side. Toured Australia in 1984 and often tussles for the No. 7 jersey with Paddy Kirwan.





Stuart Raper Son of the famous Australian tourist John, who tormented Gt. Britain on many occasions in the mid 60's. His father would no doubt be proud of him if he saw the way he has settled into the loose forward role at Watersheddings, as he shows football sense far beyond his young age. Plays his Australian football for Cronulla and under coach Jack Gibson has matured tremendously.

Tom Naidole His father played for Rochdale at the time when Hornets signed a number of Fijians in the early 1960's. Tom signed from Wigan 3 years ago and has been in and out of the side since his arrival, but this year has claimed his own spot. He is very strong and fast for a forward and is proving to be a real tackle breaker.

David Hobbs Has every chance of making the Test side to play the Australians, he is strong in attack and solid in defence. Has a strong kicking game and is one of the leagues better goal-kickers.





Mick Worrall Toured Australia in1984, and was doing well until he collected a knee injury in the 2nd test. Alongside David Hobbs, makes a more than formidable second row pair.

Wally Jones Great clubman who takes the ball up whenever needed. One of the games under-rated players, and proved to be a real 'bargain buy' when he was snapped up from Rochdale two seasons ago.





Terry Flanagan Played nearly all his career at loose forward, and is the pack leader of the Oldham side, but this season has successfully reverted to the hooking role—a position forced on him because of an injury crisis in the Oldham camp. He too toured Australia with the Gt. Britain party in 1984.

Hussein M'Barki Born in Morroco, and must be the only North African playing Rugby League today. Began his professional career with Fulham in 1981 and then moved on to Warrington, before joining Oldham last season. Originally played all his rugby on the wing, but has took over the full back role with flair and style this season.





Paul Sherman Product of the junior leagues in Widnes and is proving to be a good cover defender, who scores tries when least expected, like the one he bagged in the semi final win over Widnes. Definitely a player who one would expect to improve with experience.

Des Foy Though Oldham born, he began his professional career with Widnes before being signed when still only 17 years old by Oldham. Played for Gt Britain in Australia in 1984, and is a fast attacking centre, who has not yet achieved his full potential.



Steve Hampson Full Back, 25. Signed in October 1983 from Vulcan R.U.F.C., after impressing for Wigan 'A' as a trialist. Missed out on a place in the 1984 and 1985 Challenge Cup Final teams due to injury but has forced his way back into the first team.

Dean Bell Winger or Centre, 24. Current Kiwi test star. Rated the best centre in the world by coach Graham Lowe. This is his second spell in England, having represented Carlisle and Leeds during the 1982-83 and 1983-84 seasons. Played for Eastern Suburbs in Australia.





Ray Mordt Winger, 28. Top rate Springbok Rugby Union star who joined Wigan in December of last year, along with fellow countryman Rob Louw. Made a promising debut at home to Swinton but a leg injury limited his first team appearances at the end of the season.

David Stephenson Centre, 27,. This ex-Fylde and England R.U. Under 19 star joined Salford in December 1978 and it soon became obvious that he was a player of great talent. Not surprisingly several teams showed interest when Salford agreed to let him leave but it was Wigan who acquired his services. For a then club record £60,000 in February 1982. Representative appearances: G.B. (2), G.B. Under 25 (5), Lancashire (6). Wigan player of the year last season.





Joe Lydon Utility Back, 22. A cup deadline signing from Widnes in January in a world record £100,000 cash deal, Joe began his R.L. career with Wigan St. Patricks A.R.L.F.C. Joined Widnes in August 1982 and 2 years later picked up the Lance Todd Trophy as his team defeated Wigan at Wembley. The same season he was named 'Man of Steel', Division One Player of the Year and Young Player of the Year. Representative appearances: G.B. (10) (plus sub once), G.B. Under 24 (3), Lancashire (2). Toured Australia and New Zealand in 1984.

Henderson Gill Winger, 25. Began his career with Bradford Northern Colts and turned professional for Bradford in 1978. Soon afterwards though he moved on to Rochdale for £9,000 and he remained at the Athletic Ground until Wigan signed him for £30,000 in October 1981. Scored 3 tries on his G.B. debut versus France and also scored on his England debut versus Wales. Representative appearances: G.B. (5), G.B. Under 24 (1), G.B. Colts (2), England (1), Yorkshire (1). Was the club's top try scorer from 1981-82 to 1984-85 and played in Australia in 1985.





Ellery Hanley Stand off, 25. This £150,000 rated G.B. Star joined Wigan in September last year in a deal that saw Phil Ford and Steve Donlan (plus £85,000) go to Bradford Northern, Representative appearances: G.B. (14) (plus sub once), G.B. Under 24 (2), England (1), Yorkshire (2). Scored no less than 55 tries in the 1984-85 season and is currently rated the best centre in the world by 'Open Rugby' magazine. Toured Australia and New Zealand in 1984 and was Wigan's top try scorer last season.

Shaun Edwards Scrum Half, 20. A former England School's Captain at both codes, he joined Wigan on his 17th birthday in October 1983. In his first season he became the youngest player to appear in a Wembley Challenge Cup Final, the following season he became the youngest player to represent G.B. and last season he was named young player of the year. Representative appearances: G.B. (2) (plus sub once), G.B. Under 21 (2), G.B. Colts (2), Lancashire (1), (plus sub once), Lancashire Colts (1). Also toured Australia with the B.U.S.C.A.R.L.A. squad in 1984. His father, Jackie played for Warrington.

Mike Ford Scrum Half, 20. Signed on professional terms for Wigan in August 1983 after touring New Zealand with B.A.R.L.A. Under 19 squad. Previously he had played for the club as an amateur. He also represented Oldham St. Annes A.R.L.F.C. and was on the books of Oldham Athletic soccer club. Representative appearances: G.B. Under 21 (2), G.B. Colts (2), Lancashire Colts (1). Played in Australia in 1985 and was the Halbro super shooting star of 1985.





Graeme West Prop or 2nd Row, 31. Captain. This 6'5", 15 stone plus giant joined Wigan on a 5 year contract worth around £60,000 in November 1982. Played for Taranaki in New Zealand and made his test debut v Australia in 1975. Captained his country to victory over Australia in 1983 and scored a crucial try. 18 test appearances and Wigan Player of the Year for 1983-84 and 1984-85.

Martin Dermott Hooker, 18. This hard-working youngster was signed from Wigan St. Patricks A.R.L.F.C. in November 1984. Has represented both G.B. and Lancashire Colts team and looks set for a big future in the game.





Brian Case Prop, 28. Signed from Warrington just one week before the 1983 John Player Trophy Final and played an important part in Wigan's win. Joined Warrington from amateur club Blackbrook during the 1974-75 season. Representative appearances: G.B. (4), G.B. Under 24 (3) (plus sub once), England (1), Lancashire (2). Toured Australia and New Zealand in 1984.

lan Roberts Prop, 21. Tough-tackling London born "Aussie' from South Sydney. Made his Wigan debut as substitute in the Lancashire Cup Semi-Final against St. Helens and took a share of the Man of the Match Award, topping the tackle count.





Rob Louw 2nd row, 31. Wigan's other big name Springbok Rugby Union signing in December of last year. Has taken to the League game very quickly. Good ball handler and hard tackler.

PAUL WILSON OF WIGAN EVENING POST The BBC made a big mistake in scratching the Lancashire Cup Final from their outside broadcast list in 1984, for after a succession of humdrum or poorly attended games the competition was just about to burst into life again.

It often used to be said that Wigan and the Lancashire Cup Final were synonymous with each other, but through the lean years of the 'seventies and early 'eighties the only connection was that Central Parl; was the most popular choice of venue!

Now all that has changed, and Wigan are in their third consecutive county final. There's still some way to go to emulate the post-war team's marvellous achievement of reaching seven successive finals between 1945 and 1951 (and winning the last six!) but there's no doubt that now, as before Wigan are lighting up the Lancashire Cup.

When the BBC abandoned that 1984 final against St. Helens (they showed the highlights about a month later), they turned their back on a crowd of 26,074, the biggest since Saints beat Swinton in 1961.

They also failed to do full justice to some of the modern game's most popular favourites, missing some of Mal Meninga's most memorable moments and passing up an early look at John Ferguson.

Last year's Lancashire Cup final was another glittering occasion, watched by 19,202 on a warm October afternoon at Knowsley Road.

The Central park side taken apart by St. Helens in 1984 had gone on, with the addition of Brett Kenny, to triumph at Wembley in that memorable victory over Hull, but little of it survived to meet Warrington in the 1985 county cup final.

In the short space of a year, Wigan had undergone a remarkable transformation. Kenny and Ferguson were replaced by Steve Ella and Greg Dowling, two more top drawer Australians, and in Ellery Hanley and Andy Goodway Wigan had got their hands on two of the biggest names in British rugby. The side was further stiffened by the presence in the pack of South African forward Nick du Toit, who showed he meant business by dumping Les Boyd on his backside in the first minute.

Two-try Steve Ella won the man of the match award in Wigan's 34 – 8 victory, and David Stephenson scored seven goals.

Wigan played some of the most sparkling football seen all season in the second half, and if they can produce more of the same today, Oldham will have their work cut out.

Wigan have once again been team strengthening in the last 12 months, players likely to be on show today who weren't around last time include Kiwi Dean Bell, Springboks Rob Louw and Ray Mordt, London born Australian lan Roberts and Wigan born Englishman Joe Lydon. Skipper Graeme West and Henderson Gill are also up for their first county winner's medals, having missed out last year through injury.

ALL SQUARE. ON TWO

THE St. Helens club have the honour once again, and for the second consecutive season, of staging the County Cup Final. The fifth occasion at Knowsley Road, todays final is the second major cup event of the new season, the trophy renamed. The Grünhalle Lager Lancashire Cup is the prize the two contestants in todays final will do battle for, and certainly will be worthy of the occasion. The Lancashire County Committee express their thanks to the new sponsors for the financial support and are sure it will be a worthwhile and rewarding association for all parties concerned.

Last seasons winners of the trophy Wigan, will be making their 32nd appearance in a county final (a R.L. record) winning the cup a record 17 times. In this seasons run up to the final Wigan brushed aside second division Rochdale Hornets 52-0, scoring ten tries and six goals to go through to the second round and another tie at Central

Park. Second division Whitehaven were next to feel the Wigan blast with a 74 points to 6 hammering, made up of 14 tries and nine goals. With their luck still holding out the draw produced a breathtaking home semi-final against todays host, Alex Murphy's Saints, who before a 28,000 Central Park crowd made them pull out all the stops to claim the right to contest this afternoons final, beating Saints 22-16.

Opponents Oldham appear in the final for the first time since 1968-69, St. Helens recording a county record beating them 30 points to two and Oldham coach Frank Myler was in the Saints line up on that occasion. Oldham started this cup campaign beating Leigh 29-22 at Watersheddings, the result went their way 46-13 against second division Workington again on their home ground in the second round. Completing the hat-trick of home ties, they beat Widnes in the semi-final after a close game 16-14.

Their first county final was three years after Wigan's first success in the final in 1905-06, beating Leigh in the replay 8-0, after a nil-nil drawn game. Oldham beat Broughton Rangers 16-9 to win the 1907-08 final. The following season, they met Wigan for the first time in a county final, going down by the odd point 10-9, before a record 20,000 gate. They won the trophy for the second time in 1910-11, pipping Swinton 4-3, to clinch success. Their fourth final appearance attracted another 20,000 crowd to Broughton in 1911-12, but it turned out to be a disappointing affair for them, Rochdale winning the trophy 12-5. Oldham met Wigan again in the final in 1913-14 and avenged that first defeat beating the cherry and white 5-0. Another defeat by Rochdale followed in 1918-19 by 22 points to nil, but they pulled it back the following season 1919-20 in the final beating Rochdale 7-0 to win the trophy for the fourth time. They lost the final against Warrington in 1921-22, after a close game 7-5, success for them in 1924-25 when they

beat St. Helens Recs at Salford 10-0, they then had to wait until 1933-34 before they appeared in a County Final again, but it was worth it for they again beat St. Helens Recs 12-0 to take the trophy. Another long wait followed before they reached the final in 1954-55 only to go down to Barrow 12-2, but a hat trick of successive triumphs came. First they beat Saints in the 1956-57 final 10-3, then Wigan went the same way in 1957-58 (13-8) and 12-2.

Wigan and Oldham contested the 1966-67 final, Wigan winning 16-13, both clubs have met in four previous finals with the record standing at two wins each. So we can look forward to a great contest this afternoon from two of the in form sides in the game.

Widnes were the first side to win the trophy after the war, before Wigan had that remarkable run of six victories in the county final from 1946/47 to 1951/52. Both sides in todays final are all square with two victories each from previous finals in which they have met. Who will go in front after this afternoon's match?
