





Pen Pictures...

This afternoon we welcome our opponents on the next two Sundays, the men from Watersheddings. We fully expect today's match to be one of the hardest of the season here at Odsal.

Although holding a mid-table position, Oldham have given some tremendous performances this season, including, like ourselves, two tremendous wins over Widnes. They have lost their last three matches, but in each case have given a great account of themselves. they put up a fantastic show against the Australians and really had them at panic stations well into the second half before going down 22 - 16.

They then went to Hull K.R., losing by only 6 - 4 and last Sunday gave the mighty St. Helens the fright of their lives, losing by one point, 18 - 17, after being ahead 17 - 6 at the interval.

Today's match is a preview of next week's John Player Trophy 1st Round tie, but with their league positions being so important, it is hardly likely anything will be held back.

Last season we met three times. In the league games each won on the other's ground, Oldham 24 - 6 at Odsal and Northern 16 - 6 at Watersheddings. The third meeting was a tremendous 3rd Round Cup tie at Oldham where the home side went on to the semi-final with a 6 - 1 victory.

Their team will be chosen from the following squad:

MICK TAYLOR — Most improved player at Watersheddings — very strong and direct in attack and a fine tackler in defence. He is a product of the Huddersfield A.R.L.

HUSSEIN M'BARKI — Born in Morroco and must be the only North African playing rugby league today. Began his professional career with Fulham in 1981 and then moved on to Warrington before joining Oldham last season. Originally played all his rugby on the wing, but has taken over the full back role with flair and style this season.

GARY WARNECKE — Affectionately known as "The Gypsy", he played for Oldham last season and, unlike so many of his overseas colleagues never missed a game. Though centre is his natural

position, he can fill in more than adequately in any of the back positions. He is a resolute defender and ever dangerous in attack.

GARY BRIDGE — Australian. Played last season for Balmain and on his return will join Eastern Suburbs. Equally at home in the centre at stand off, he is a strong runner with a good kicking game.

DES FOY — Though Oldham born, he began his professional career with Widnes before being signed when still only 17 years old by Oldham. Played for Great Britain in Australia in 1984 and is a fast attacking centre who has not yet achieved his full potential.

COLIN HAWKYARD — Native of Huddersfield, plays equally well in the centre or in the second row. Always guarantees

100% effort and a great team player with a tremendous heart for the game.

DAVID TOPLISS — Needs little introduction, previously starring with Wakefield Trinity and then Hull, and appearing at Wembley for both clubs. One of the games all time greats, his experience is proving invaluable to the young Oldham side.

RAY ASHTON — Born in Widnes and was a member of the successful Oldham Colts side before progressing via the 'A' team into the senior side. Toured Australia in 1984 and often tussles for the No. 7 jersey with Paddy Kirwan.

PADDY KIRWAN — Local lad who signed from the Oldham Colts side — he is a great hearted player with tremendous strength com-plemented by a good football brain. Turned the semi final tie against Widnes in Oldham's favour with a tremendous second half performance.

BRUCE CLARKE — Another Australian import who plays with Western Suburbs back home. A strong running prop forward with ball skills to match, he has been known to quickly turn a game into Oldham's advantage.

TERRY FLANAGAN — Played nearly all his career at loose forward and is the pack leader of the Oldham side, but this season has successfully reverted to the hooking role — a position forced on him because of an injury crisis in the Oldham camp. He too toured Australia with the Great Britain party in 1984.

DAVID HOBBS — Is strong in attack and solid in defence. Has a strong kicking game and is one of the league's better goal-kickers.

MICK WORRALL — Toured Australia in 1984 and was doing well until he collected a knee injury in the 2nd Test. Alongside David Hobbs, makes a more than formidable second row pair.


WALLY JONES — Great clubman who takes the ball up whenever needed. One of the game's under-rated players and proved to be a real "bargain buy" when he was snapped up from Rochdale two seasons ago.

TOM NAIDOLE — His father played for Rochdale at the time when Hornets signed a number of Fijians in the early 1960s. Tom signed from Wigan three years ago and has been in and out of the side since his arrival, but this year has claimed his own spot. He is very strong and fast for a forward and is proving to be a real tackle breaker.

STUART RAPER — Son of the famous Australian tourist John, who tormented Great Britain on many occasions in the mid 60s. His father would no doubt be proud of him if he saw the way he has settled into the loose forward role at Watersheddings, as he shows football sense far beyond his young age. Plays his Australian football for Cronulla and under coach Jack Gibson has matured tremendously.

PAUL SHERMAN — Product of the junior leagues in Widnes and is proving to be a good cover defender who scores tries when least expected, like the one he bagged in the semi final win over Widnes. Definitely a player who one would expect to improve with experience.

Rugby League News from South West by Simon Foster "DEVELOPMENT EXPRESS" — Part 1

It is enough to have some officionados of rugby union spluttering into their post-match pints and muttering about invasions from the dark satanic mills.

A band of expatriate Northerners are busy preparing to tackle a second season running amateur rugby league in the South West.

Rugby league has made a fascinating and quite spectacular entrance in the west country. Twelve teams from as far apart as Plymouth and Cheltenham have been co-ordinated to provide a nucleus of sides that completed a busy season of fixtures in the first season of the Midlands and South West Amateur Rugby League Association. Development has been so rapid that the Management Committee are planning a split into two divisions for the 1986-87 campaign. There is likely to be a "southern" section which will include clubs from Bath, Bristol, Cheltenham, Plymouth, Aberavon, Cardiff, Sunningdale (ex Wokingham) and Hemel Hempstead and a "northern" section with sides from Redditch, Birmingham, Wolverhampton, Worcester and Gloucester. The two sections will join up for the MASWARLA Cup and for the league play offs in April and May.

The first MASWARLA season ended with Cheltenham as the cup winners and Bath became the league champions. So many individuals were prominent in the organisation and administration of the successful season and worked hard to



create a platform for progress. But it was the players, with so many sampling rugby league for the first time, complemented by so many experienced Northern exiles (there are many more down there than was ever imagined possible) and the enthusiastic match officials, volunteer referees, who often travelled 250 mile round trips to take charge of a game, as well as to educate so many rookies about the laws. They were the real heroes.

The rugby union world in the west country looked on at events with both curiosity and amazement as league advanced in the very heart of their game. There has been no particular conflict between the codes, in most cases clubs have been quite happy to allow the movement of players to enjoy both games.

The main difficulties were experienced in the provision for playing and training facilities. Too many of the embryo league clubs have been turned away from pitches and playing fields as a result of the misconception that all rugby league is "professional". Local soccer clubs and the education authorities have been most helpful; the use of Municipal facilities has been a necessity.

It is interesting to see there is little reaction to players wanting to give American football a go. Perhaps the greatest threat to the recruitment of 'floaters' in the S.W. area is the development of his ''well packaged'' contact sport. There are viable teams operating out of Bath and Swindon already.


Ian Macorquodale

Match Facts BRADFORD NORTHERN v OLDHAM

Full playing record between the sides at all levels up to and including the end of the 1985/86 season:

Played 79, Northern won 39, lost 37, drawn 3, for = 827 points, against = 811

A quick glance at the above chart shows that matches between the two sides appear to have been very close over the years, with only 2 wins and a sum of 16 points separating the sides from 79 matches played at all levels including friendlies and wartime fixtures.

The first meeting on the field of play took place during the very first season of 1895/96 when, on October 19th 1895, the sides met in a league game at Oldham, and Bradford (as they were simply known then) gained a narrow victory by 5 - 3.

A more detailed look at the 79 matches played so far shows three definite phases of results between them. From 1895 up to the start of the first war in 1914, honours were quite even result wise, having played 24 from which Northern won 10, lost 13 and drew 1, Bradford's highest win during this period being 21 - 9 at home in a league match on December 18th 1906, whilst for Oldham it was a 23 - 3 win at Park Avenue (then Bradford's home ground) in the third round of the Challenge Cup on 1st April 1899.

The second portion of 1915 - 1941 clearly shows that Oldham had the better of things with 10 wins, 1 draw and 5 defeats from 16 games played from which Northern suffered defeats of 28 - 3, then 41 - 5 before, on 8th November 1930, they lost 49 - 16 at Oldham in a league fixture, a result that still stands today as Northern's highest ever defeat to the Lancashire side. Northern on their part did record a new highest win for themselves when they beat Oldham 27 - 10 in a 'home' league game played at Valley Parade on 6th March 1937 because of the very muddy state of the Odsal playing area.

From 1941 to present day the pendulum of success has moved back and forth with Northern just having the edge at 24 wins and 1 draw to 14 wins by Oldham, Northern increasing their highest win over them from 27 - 10 up to 34 - 5, then 36 - 0 before finally, on 11th April 1976, they beat them 39 - 16 at Oldham in the league to record their highest ever win over them in all matches played to date. This same period also brought about the club's highest ever drawn encounter when, on 24th February 1968,

they drew 7 - 7 at Odsal in the second round of the Challenge Cup, this also being the last time the two sides have been involved in a drawn match.

In recent years Oldham have taken a definite lion's share of the success with 8 wins and only 2 defeats from their last 10 league and cup matches played. These include setting up two new highest ever league wins away from home against Bradford Northern. For 71 years their highest league win on Bradford soil stood at 22 - 12 which they recorded on 12th September 1911, this being beaten on 29th August 1982 when they won in the league at Odsal by a scoreline of 23 - 10. They equalled this score of 23 points when they again won at Odsal in the league by 23 - 14 on 4th November 1984 before going one point better almost a year later when, on 3rd November 1985, they won 24 - 6 to set up their highest ever away league win over Bradford Northern.

Last season the league encounters were shared with Northern winning at Oldham 16 - 6 after suffering that 24 - 6 defeat at Odsal as mentioned above. They also met in the third round of the Challenge Cup at the Watersheddings with Northern losing, but setting a piece of club history. On the day they lost 6 - 1, this being the first time the club had ever scored just one point in a Challenge Cup match and only the second time it has ever happened in the history of the competition itself.

From a scoring point of view, Northern have a tremendous record to try and protect today. The last time they actually failed to score against Oldham was 79 years ago when they lost 19 - 0 at Oldham in a league fixture on 2nd March 1907. Since then Oldham have failed to score six times but their last failure was also some time back when, on 13th March 1948, (481/2 years ago) they lost 30 - 0 at Odsal in the third round of the Challenge Cup.

Today's match is a dress rehearsal for their first round John Player Trophy meeting next week at Oldham, with both sides looking to gain a psychological advantage over the other with a win today in their league encounter. If the past results between the sides are any indication to go by, plus their good record of scoring against each other, then both games should be very interesting to watch with little to separate the sides.






BRADFORD AMATEUR SCENE


