

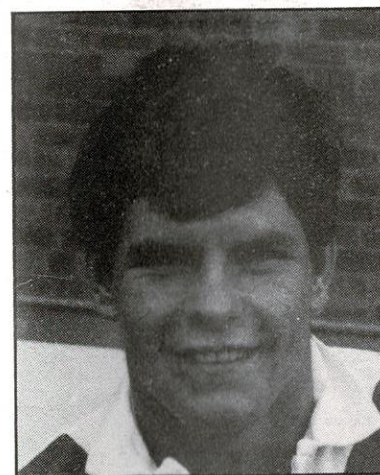

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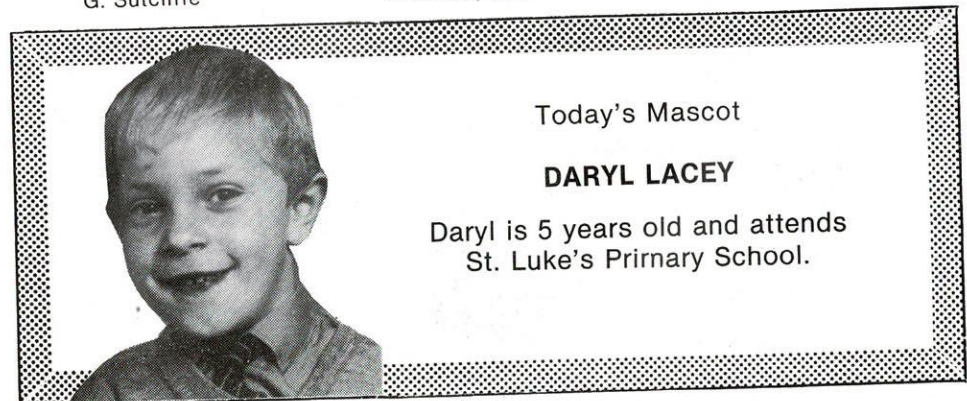

I've heard it whispered that Philately (stamp collecting) is the next sport to make it big on the small screen. If that ever takes off, it will take some licking.

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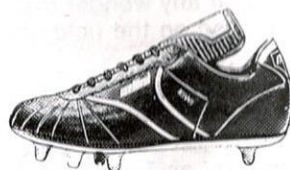


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To put it all into perspective however, the loudest applause on the review programme was for a greyhound that had apparently fouled the studio floor during rehearsals. Says it all, doesn't it.

SILK CUT CHALLENGE CUP

A Wembley-era record 38 clubs enter the 1987 Silk Cut Challenge Cup draw this month.

The 34 professional clubs, plus four top amateur sides, pursue a May 2nd appearance in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup final at Wembley and a competition record top prize of £16,000.

The draw for this prestigious tournament—a six-tie Preliminary Round and 16-match First Round—took place at Headingley, Leeds, on Thursday, 18th December, at 10.30 a.m., broadcast live on the northern BBC local radio stations.

The quartet of amateur clubs entering the draw for the Preliminary Round will be the 1986 winners of the Cumbria, Lancashire and Yorkshire Cups and the leaders of the new Slalom Lager National League on a percentage basis as at 1st December.

The Silk Cut sponsorship for 1986-87 is worth £150,000. The annual increase of £10,000 has been allocated mainly to the increase of prize money up to and including the third round, the investment into ground safety improvement schemes rising to £58,200.

FAVOURITES WIGAN TRAVEL TO YORKSHIRE FOR S-FINAL

Hot favourites and holders, Wigan, have to travel into Yorkshire to overcome the last hurdle in their attempt to reach the final of the John Player Special Trophy for a second successive year.

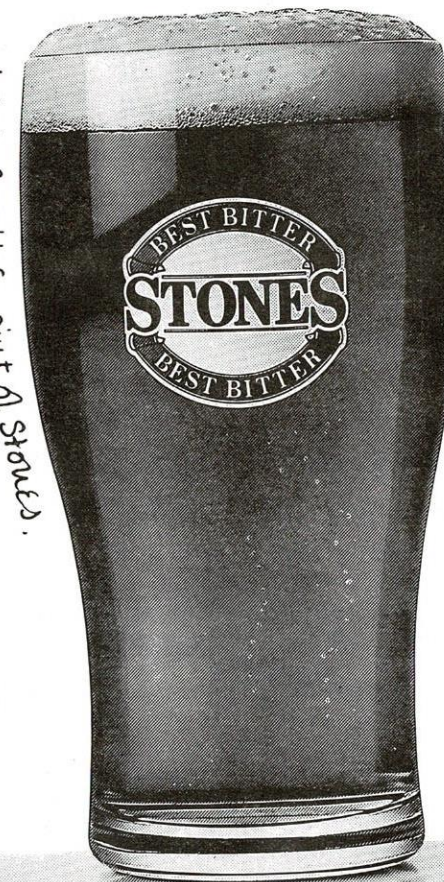
In the draw for the semi-finals made on the Breakfast Time television programme on (Monday, 15 December, 1986), Wigan will meet Hull at Headingley, Leeds, Saturday, 20th December (kick-off 2.15 p.m.). The second semi-final to be played at Central Park, Wigan, on Saturday, 27th December will provide an intriguing local derby clash between the two cup giants, Widnes and Warrington.

All four semi-finalists have won the Trophy before, Warrington a record three times, Widnes and Wigan twice and Hull once. Widnes have now reached the semi-final on nine occasions in the competition's 16-year history making them by far the most successful club with over £40,000 (including progress to the current stage) in prize money already to their credit. Warrington will be making their sixth semi-final appearance, Hull its fourth and Wigan its third.

The semi-final losers will each receive £3,000 and the winners go forward to the final which will provide the Rugby League with its first major cup event of the New Year at a neutral venue on Saturday, January 10, when the winner will receive a record £12,000 and the runner-up £6,000.

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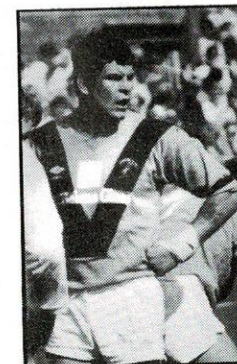
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"THE MARCH OF THE SAINTS 1945-85" By Alex Service

The 1985/86 season was undoubtedly a mixed one for the Saints. Although no trophy ended up on the Knowsley Road sideboard, the team embarked upon an exciting run of 14 wins from early February to the end of April, punctuated only by defeat at the hands of Wigan in the second round of the Challenge Cup. A tremendous influence during this remarkable sequence was Roy Haggerty, a likeable Thatto Heath lad who has virtually become a cult figure with the 'popular side' fans. He even went on to finish top of the try-scoring chart with 21 tries—a fine feat indeed for a second row forward in competition with such flying threequarters as Barry Ledger and Brett French.

Roy began his career at Thatto Heath Council School—that fine rugby breeding ground—as a soccer player and represented the Town at junior school level. He soon came to his senses, however, and during his first year at Grange Park High School, the tough-as-teak youngster was considered good enough to turn out for the second year team.

Haggerty signed for the Saints in November 1978 and made his debut in the first team almost twelve months later on October 30th 1979 against Widnes in a John Player Cup second round tie at Naughton Park. Looking back at the defeated St. Helens team that day, only Graham Liptrot and Neil Holding still remain with Roy on the playing staff at Knowsley Road.

It was in 1981/82 that Roy established himself as a first teamer and his forceful runs in the centre brought him a respectable tally of 12 tries. There was no doubt at all that the youngster had a heart as big as the stand. Yet the critics argued that he came inside far too often, the passes to his winger were sometimes erratic—especially the one-handed ones—and that his tackling was suspect on occasions.

Perhaps the biggest challenge to Roy's first-team place came not from the critics but from the signing of Australian centre superstar Mal Meninga in 1984/85. Coach Billy Benyon had the answer, by switching him permanently to the second row. The change in Haggerty's form was immediate and Roy has continued to silence the doubters with many fine displays ever since. He relishes the increased involvement as a second rower and a typical example of the new Roy Haggerty could be seen at Watersheddings, Oldham last season, when he gave a magnificent display of passing, running and tackling.

Needless to say, Coach Alex Murphy is delighted with his progress, but is quick to point out any flaws in his game. While watching the video of the return match against Oldham at Knowsley Road, Murphy noticed one of Roy's one-handed passes go to ground. "Who do you think you are, Mark Saber?" chided Alex, a reference to the famous television detective of the fifties, who only had one arm.

Joking apart, we all hope that Roy will add to his Lancashire Cup and Premiership Winner's medals with a Challenge Cup Winners medal at the end of the season!

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THE LION GOES FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

FRANK MYLER. Coach. One of the best British backs of the post war era. Making 24 Great Britain Test appearances during a career that saw him play for Widnes, St. Helens and Rochdale. Twice played in the World Cup in 1960 and 1970, and toured Australia, being the last British captain to bring home the ashes. Won the Harry Sunderland Trophy whilst with St. Helens in 1970. Has had spells as Coach with Widnes, Rochdale and Swinton before joining Oldham. Was also Great Britain tour Coach in 1984.

HUSSEIN M'BARKI. Full Back. A Moroccan born player who started off his professional career in Britain in 1981 with Fulham. Won a Division Two Championship medal in 1983. Joined Warrington in November 1984, before moving to Oldham in September, 1985. Played mainly as a winger but has this season been successfully converted to full back.

PAUL SHERMAN. Winger. A convert from Birchfield Rugby Union club in September 1983, but has had to wait till this season to establish himself in the 1st team, improving with experience. Is a good cover defender who can score tries when they are least expected.

DES FOY. Centre. A former Lancashire and England schoolboy who turned professional for Widnes as a 17 year old from Saddleworth Rangers in 1980 for a record fee from an amateur side of £25,000. Moved to Oldham after making only 17 1st team appearances in January 1983 in part exchange for Brian Hogan. Made his Great Britain debut v France in January 1984, and also went on that years tour of Australasia. His brother Martin plays for Salford.

GARY WARNECKE. Centre. Joined Oldham from Australian Rugby League at the start of the 1985/86 season, and made 32 appearances and scored 14 tries for them in his debut season. Known as the gypsy he can play in almost any position, being a resolute defender and aggressive runner.

MICK TAYLOR. Wing. Has been with Oldham since turning professional from Britannia Works Huddersfield in March 1983, and has been a regular ever since, proving to be a very good all round player.

DAVID TOPLISS. Stand Off. Started his professional career with Wakefield in 1968 from Normanton. During his Wakefield days he won the Lance Todd Trophy, and became a Great Britain International, and also guested with Australian club Penrith. Joined Hull in 1981, captaining them to Challenge Cup, Premiership and Yorkshire Cup successes. Joined Oldham in May 1985, but a serious injury has restricted his opportunities.

RAY ASHTON. Scrum Half. Joined Oldham from Amateur rugby in Widnes in 1978. A tourist to Australia in 1984, he has been in and out of the 1st team due to injury. Has in the past vied with Paddy Kirwan for the scrum half berth.

GARRY BRIDGE. Utility Back. One of Sydneys most accomplished and versatile inside backs, who can play full back, centre or half back. Garry joined Oldham at the start of the season from Balmain. A strong runner who is an excellent tactical kicker. Will join Eastern Suburbs for the next Australian season.

PADDY KIRWAN. Scrum Half. A former Saddleworth and Oldham Colts player, he turned professional in 1979. A good hearted player with a good footballing brain. Has had to fight for a regular 1st team place with Ray Ashton and more recently Garry Bridge.

BRUCE CLARKE. Prop. A 17 stone Australian from the Western Suburbs club in Sydney. Nicknamed the 'Bruiser' he is a strong running, ball handling forward whose tackling prowess has earned him his nickname.

TERRY FLANAGAN. Hooker. Another former Oldham Colts and Saddleworth player who turned professional in 1979. Was captain of the club when he was only 19 and led them to the 2nd Division Championship in 1982. Made the first of his two international appearances v France in February 1983 and went on the 1984 tour of Australasia. Prior to the start of the 1986/87 season he played at loose forward, but has been converted to hooker with considerable success.

NEIL CLAWSON. Prop. Son of the much travelled Test prop Terry Clawson. Signed by Frank Myler from Featherstone in May 1986. Certainly a star of the future, having made a good impression during the current season, recently gaining a regular 1st team spot.

WALLY JONES. Prop. A bargain buy from Rochdale after being out of the game for some time. A very underrated player. Is a former Oldham Player of the Year. Very dependable and solid player who has suffered from injury of late.

MICK WORRALL. Second Row. A former Great Britain Colts player, who progressed through the ranks playing for Great Britain Under 24's in January 1983, making his full Great Britain debut a year later, and going on the 1984 tour of Australasia. Has

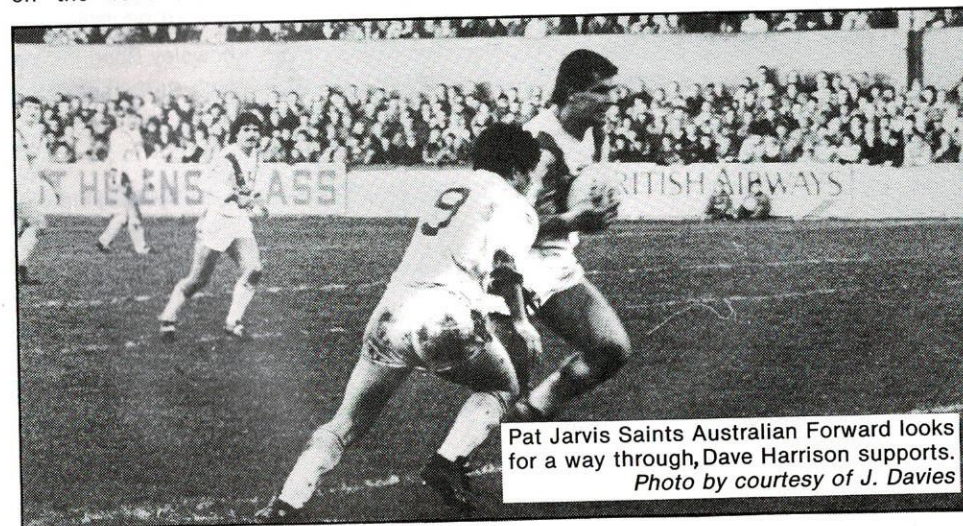
recently come off the transfer list. Brother Tony plays for Warrington.

TOM NADIOLE. Second Row. A former Wigan player, he joined Oldham from Wigan in August 1983. A strong fast running prop, injuries have restricted his 1st team opportunities. His father, a Fijian played for Rochdale in the 60's.

DAVID HOBBS. Prop/Second Row. A former Featherstone junior. He was a Barla tourist to Australia in 1975. A former winner of the Lance Todd Trophy, winning it in 1983 when Featherstone won the Challenge Cup. Made his Great Britain debut in January 1984, and also went on that years Australasia tour. Joined Oldham in March 1985 for £40,000. Strong in all aspects of the game, he is also a prolific goalkicker.

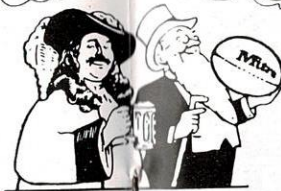
STUART RAPER. Loose Forward. Son of the Australian great Johnny Raper, and like his father is a loose forward. Plays for the Cronulla club down under, joining Oldham at the beginning of the season. Has settled in well at Watersheddings and is a great crowd favourite.

COLIN HAWKYARD. Utility. A great club player throughout the years, always gives 100%. A utility player in the truest sense of the word having played for the club at centre, wing and more recently in the 2nd row.

OLDHAM FACT FILE

Oldham have appeared in 15 Challenge Cup Semi Finals, but have yet to appear at Wembley.

Oldham have had 38 players capped by Great Britain. Their most capped player being Alan Davies who gained 20 caps between 1955 and 1960.

Oldham's record score both for and against are identical both being 67 points. 67-6 v Liverpool City in 1959 and 11-67 v Hull K.R. in 1978.

Bernard Ganley kicked 219 goals in the 1957-58 season the first player to kick 200 in a season. In that season he kicked his first 100 in only 18 matches, a record which still stands today, although it has since been equalled by both David Watkins and Steve Quinn. He is also one of only eight players to score 400 points in a season, scoring 453 in the 1957-58 season. In a career lasting between 1951 and 1961 he kicked 1398 goals and scored 2844 points.

Current Oldham Coach Frank Myler won the Harry Sunderland Trophy in 1970 whilst playing for St. Helens. His nephew Tony won the same trophy in 1983 for Widnes, a unique achievement.

Kevin Meadows whilst playing for Oldham on loan from St. Helens in 1984 equalled the Division One record by scoring five tries in a match.

David Topliss is one of a rare breed of players to have appeared in a Lancashire Cup Final and a Yorkshire Cup Final.

PREVIOUS ENCOUNTERS

This season Oldham met St. Helens in a very close encounter at Watersheddings, with the Saints just snatching victory 18-17.

Scorers: Oldham: Colin Hawkyard, Paul Sherman, Des Foy. Tries: Mick Worrall 2 and Ray Ashton drop kicking goals.

St. Helens: Arkwright 2, Platt. Tries: Ledger 2 and Loughlin kicked goals.

Last season at Watersheddings St. Helens won 38-12 on the 2nd April 1986 Ledger 2, McCormack 2, Holding and Platt scored tries for St. Helens, Loughlin kicking 7 goals. For Oldham Ashton and Graham scored tries with Parrish kicking 2 goals.

In the return on the 20th April St. Helens were triumphant by 44-12 Round 2; Platt 2; Holding; Loughlin; Haggerty; Ledger and Allen tries and Loughlin with 4 goals were the Saints scorers. Whilst Graham scored 2 tries for Oldham with Worrall and Atkinson kicking goals.

Worth noting is the fact that on the last six occasions the teams have met, Barry Ledger has scored at least one try.

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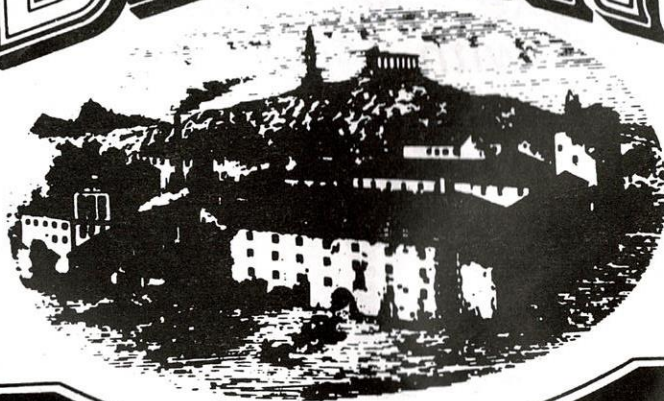

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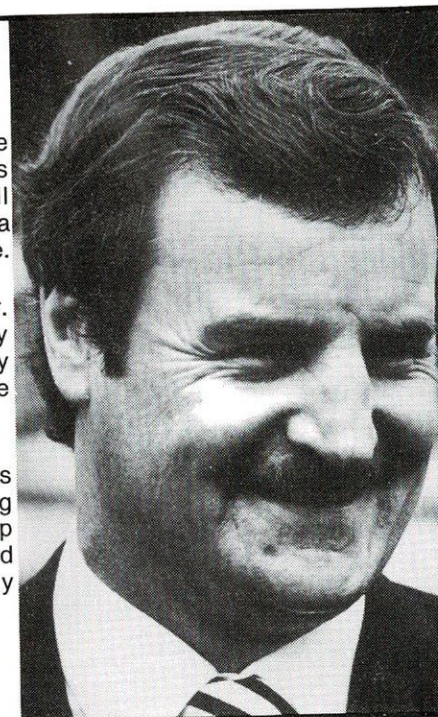
