

It was a sad day for all Oldham people at Watersheddings last Saturday when we lost 24-14 to St Helens in the part-televised second-round Silk Cut Challenge Cup-tie.

A crowd of 7,698 provided another terrific atmosphere, but the dismissal of hooker Ian Sanderson after half an hour for an alleged late challenge on Neil Holding meant that the 12 remaining on the pitch were always up against it.

Our initial target must be a place in the top eight so that we qualify for the Premiership play-off.


If we can string a good run of League successes together we might even reach the top four for the first time since we earned our place in the First Division five seasons ago.





HULL HERE IN FOUR-POINTER

With four clubs relegated at the end of the season, and Salford having hit a winning run, the importance of today's Stones Bitter Championship clash between Oldham and Hull cannot be over estimated for both clubs.

Only Salford currently split Hull and Oldham from the relegation zone and although neither of today's teams is likely to go down — indeed, both could reach the top eight if they can string together a run of victories — the fact remains that whichever club wins today will rest more easily having picked up the spoils from a "four-pointer".

Hull have a poor away record in the league, having lost eight and won only one match on their travels — in stark contrast to their home form which has seen them win seven games at the Boulevard and lose only one.

One of those victories was a 20-16 triumph over Oldham on January 4th, so Frank Myler's men will be keen to avenge that reverse today and also make up for the bitter disappointment of last Saturday's cup defeat by St Helens.

While Oldham were slipping out of the Wembley trail, Hull were enjoying a comfortable win over lowly Mansfield at Alfreton, and have been rewarded with a home tie against Leigh in the third round next weekend.

Oddly enough, in view of their modest league placing, Hull have done well in the knock-out cups this season.

They reached the final of the Yorkshire Cup before losing 31-24 to Castleford and then got to the semi-final of the John Player Special Trophy where they gave Wigan a tremendous fright before narrowly going down 12-11.

They are now looking forward to the quarter-final of the finals of the Challenge Cup and with the road to Wembley now wide open following a competition of upsets, they will be fancying their chances of a London trip in May.

One might reasonably say that, at present, Hull are passing through a transitional stage under new boss Len Casey. Several of the big names of the recent past have gone and although some remain — such as Gary Kemble, Garry Schofield, Dane O'Hara, Ah Kuoi, Lee Crooks, Mick Crane and Steve Norton, there is a breed of new, young players coming to the fore at the Boulevard and making their mark.

Winger Phil Eastwood, reared locally in the colts, is regarded highly and has scored 13 senior tries this season during a spell in which he has sufficiently impressed boss Carey that he is being pushed for under-21 honours as well as

being tipped as a future Test flanker.

The scrum-half job may go to former Leeds man Kevin Dick, who moved to the Boulevard as part of the deal that took prop Trevor Skerrett to Headingley, but it is a toss up between Kevin and young Phil Windley, who has done a splendid job this season while his chief rival for the No. 7 shirt has been sidelined.

Dick was cup-tied for the county competition and Windley held his place up to and including the final and also took his chance when Dick was first suspended for six games and then received another four-match ban.

A big, powerful and young front-row could feature Alan Tomlinson, Shaun Patrick and Andy Dannatt, though Dannatt has recently been suffering the after-affects of concussion after being hurt at Bramley in the first round of the cup.

If Dannatt is out of the reckoning, the classy Test star Lee Crooks could move up to the front-row, and there will be no shortage of back-row men eager and willing to fill his second-row spot.

Tracey Lazenby, Wayne Proctor, Mick Crane, Steve Norton and young unknown Jon Sharp, a youngster from the Featherstone area, will all be staking claims for the back-three positions in the pack.

Gary Divorty, sadly, has played only one 'A' team in three months because of a knee injury, while another long-standing injury victim is Welsh wing Kevin James, who is battling against a severe achilles tendon injury and is not likely to play again this season.

Hull, neverthe less, still have a string of potentially explosive backs, starting with Kiwi Test ace Kemble at full-back — without doubt one of the finest, if not the finest exponent of ball fielding in Rugby League today.

The creative skill and try-poaching technique of centre Schofield is universally known and he should have a splendid individual battle today with Oldham's Gary Bridge, with whom he played as a member of hte Balmain back division in Sydney last year.

Alongside Schofield in the centre will probably be an expensive recruit from the valleys of Wales — former Welsh record points scorer Gary Pearce, the Llanelli star who signed as a stand-off but is learning his new code from the centre spot.

Dane O'Hara, outside him, is still one of the most lethal finishers in the code, while his fellow Kiwi international Fred Ah Kuoi puts the finishing touches to a classy and potentially explosive set of backs.

Saints must now be favourites to reach Wembley for the first time in nine years, while Hull, who are here today for a League game, will be looking forward to their home tie against Leigh and expecting to make another appearance in the last four. There is the distinct possibility that only St. Helens, of clubs this side of the Pennines will figure in the semi finals, although it is difficult to be too sure because these notes had to be written before Wednesday night's scheduled second round replay between Widnes and Bradford at Naughton Park. The winners of that replay must play Leeds at Headingley, and that should be a real cracker, as should the Halifax-Hull KR tie at Thrum Hall, one to pack Thrum hall to the seems next weekend. Several top English stars are going to be targets for Aussie clubs again this summer, but they could also find a market for their talents in this country, playing American Football. Manchester All Stars open the season in the Budweiser League in April and are hoping to attract gates of about 40,000 for their home game at Boundary Park. They have offered former Great Britain winger Des Drummond £100 a match, and are reported to be interested in Oldham's Des Foy.

Centre Steve Halliwell looks set for a move from St Helens. The Wigan-born Aussie, who scored nearly 50 tries in the Second Division wil Leigh last season and has also been a prolific scorer with Saints this season, has lost his place in the centre to Steve Bayliss. To provide even more competition for places in the Knowsley Road back Division, Kiwi Test man Mark Elia flew in from Auckland this week, and boss Alex Murphy announced that Halliwell could go if a club was willing to take over his contract which expires at the end of this season. Barrow, battling against relegation, and Wakefield, already doomed but trying to build a squad ready to bounce back first time, quickly made inquries.

DES FOY, currently in splendid form for Oldham, is catching the eye of new Great Britain boss Mal Reilly — and now it's official. With Alex Murphy in the Saints dug-out last Saturday, it fell to Reilly to partner Ray French in the BBC commentary box and viewers heard Reilly refer to Foy's blistering pace and confirm that he is in the running for a return to Test football. Incidentally, Foy is the only Oldham player figuring in the Greenhalls - Sunday People Supreme Awards in which there will be a \$250 cash prize at the end of the season for the top player in each position. Form will be reviewed periodically and the centres currently in the ratings (in alphabetical order) are Dean Bell (Wigan), Des Foy (Oldham), Tony Kemp (Doncaster), Garry Schofield (Hull) David Stephenson (Wigan) and Colin Whitfield (Hallifax)

ROUND AND ABOUT

DAVID STEPHENSON of Wigan needs one try for a career total of 100 touchdowns. His total is made up of 57 tries for Wigan, 36 for Salford, and six in representative matches.

A former England Schools' R.U. International, Stephenson joined Salford from Fylde Rugby Union in December 1978 for a reported £10,000 when he was twenty. The centre made his First Team professional debut in a 13-4 Division One home defeat against Rochdale Hornets on 23rd January, 1979.

Stephenson moved to Wigan for &60,000 in February 1982 and made a two-try debut in a 20-12 1st Rnd. Rugby League Challenge Cup tie win at St Helens on 13th February, 1982.

The Test centre has scored two tries for Great Britain Under-24's and four for Lancashire. Despite nearing his century, he has yet to score more than to tries in a match. Last season was his best with 18.

WINNING RUN — Hunslet's winning run ended at eight matches when they lost 29-10 at Halifax in the Second Round of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup tie on Sunday.

The current longest winning run now belongs to WHITEHAVEN who have won seven successive matches, five in Division Two and two Silk Cut Challenge Cup ties.

Warrington have the longest winning run of League matches with 15 successive victories which have taken them to the top of the Stones Bitter Championship. They have not lost a League match since losing their first two matches, the last defeat being 22-17 at Leigh on 4th September, 1986.

LONGEST LOSING RUN – Featherstone Rovers have the current longest losing run of six matches made up of five Stones Bitter Championship matches and one Silk Cut Challenge Cup tie.

SHEFFIELD EAGLES RECORD — Steve Lidbury needs two tries to equal the Sheffield Eagles record of 16 in a season set by loose-forward Paul McDermott in their inaugural campaign of 1984-85.

This is the wingers first season as a professional, having been signed from Lock Lane (Castleford) amateurs. He scored two tries on his debut in the opening match of the season, a 40-5 Division Two home defeat of Mansfield Marksman on 31st August, 1986. Sheffield Eagles have nominated him for the Great Britain Under-21 squad.

A NOBLE EFFORT — Record breaker David Noble is celebrating after achieving one of the most difficult feats in Rugby League.

The 30-year-old Doncaster goal-kicking ace has just gone a year playing and scoring in every first team game for the club.

His run started with three goals in a shock Cup victory over Salford last February and now spans 39 matches. During that time, he has kicked 124 goals, three drop goals, and scored three tries.

Noble said: "Scoring is no problem – the hardest part is staying injury-free and keeping my place in the team."

Only a handful of players have scored in every match for their club during a season and Noble, who holds three other club records, is keen to join that exclusive group.

His ultimate target is David Wilkins' all-time record of 92 successive scoring games for Salford, and Noble said: "I'm not sure that's really on. But I didn't think I'd get this far, so you never know."



THE EDITOR TALKING

... on that Oldham Jinx

There are many Oldham supporters — especially among the older end — who believe the club will never go to Wembley because of a mysterious and all-powerful force that has decided otherwise.

So many things have gone wrong over the years in the Challenge Cup that it's little wonder a lot of people think that way, especially those who have been waiting for more than 50 years for that first and elusive Wembley trip.

Of the teams currently in the First Division, only Oldham have never walked up Wembley Way, and I know a lot of people who say they never will! Each year I tell them they are talking a lot of nonsense \dots and each year they are able to reply: 'I told you so'.

A lot of fans recall the desperate disappointment on the Wembley road of our great team of the 1950's.

If ever a team had the speed, skill, football and sheer attacking brilliance to burn up Wembley on a spring day in May it was the Oldham side of Ganley, Pitchford, Davies, Little, Turner, Winslade and company. They won the Lancashire Cup in 1956, 1957 and 1958, but they could never get to Wembley.

In the 1956-57 season they won four cups — the Law Cup, the Lancashire Cup, the Lancashire League trophy, and the Rugby League championship trophy. But even that side didn't even reach the semi-final, let alone make it to Wembley.

Oldtimers still talk of that shock defeat at Leigh in the snow, of that 1960 semi-final defeat by Hull when Bernard Ganley, of all people, was sent off, and most of all of that memorable 1964 series of semi-finals against Hull KR when we were winning in extra time of the first replay at Swinton, and the game was stopped for bad light!

You can go on, and on. Do you recall that second-round defeat at Wakefield a season or two back when Alan Taylor was sent off in controversial circumstances for the one and only time in his career?

Last year, in the semi-final against Castleford, the crucial try scored by Bob Beardmore followed the most amazing bounce over the Oldham line and even then film showed quite clearly that the Castleford player was over the dead-ball line when he touched down.

I also recall a third-round clash against Widnes 12 years ago when the game was finely balanced until Widnes tried a drop goal shot which hit the post, rebounded out, and led directly to the killer try.

Perhaps, then, it was not all that surprising when Oldham fans suffered the same old story against St Helens last Saturday — the 30th minute dismissal of hooker Ian Sanderson for an alleged late tackle.

I do not intend to discuss the rights and wrongs here, but merely to point out that here was another case of the best laid plans of mice and men . . . and it really is one of Rugby League's greatest mysteries why Oldham always come unstuck, year in year out, when it comes to Challenge Cup time.

I am not totally convinced that the old men who shake their heads whenever Wembley is mentioned have got it right. But some of them have been shaking those heads through youth and middle age and now on into old age . . . and are convinced they will go on shaking for a few more years yet.

I don't believe in fate to such an extent, but you have to admit they can put up a pretty strong argument.
