

Another addition to R.L. history

Thursday 27th August 1987 will go down in Rugby League history books as the first occasion on which the Rugby League Tribunal sat to determine the value of a

Ged Byrne, the Salford centre three quarter had rejected the terms offered to him by his club under the new contract system. In accordance with the new procedure Bryne was entitled to enter into an agreement with another club. The club, on this occasion Wigan, agreed terms for a contract with the player, registered him as their player and in accordance with the procedure within seven days offered compensation of £20,000 to Salford. Salford's valuation of the player was considerably higher, at £80,000. The matter was therefore referred to the Tribunal — a committee of individuals without club ties or commitments whose decision is binding - without right of appeal. In this case the compensation was assessed at £40,000 and Byrne thus became the first R.L. player so assessed.

Warrington's interest in the Tribunal arrived on Tuesday 1st September when the player concerned, David Lyon, the former



Widnes full back was assessed at £12,500. Wire had offered £10,000 against Widnes' evaluation of £20,000.

Prior to the start of the current season all clubs were required to enter into contracts with the players they desired to retain. The contracts are for a specified period of time in excess of one month but if no time is stated the contract terminates at the end of the season.

Procedures are laid down for players not able to accept the terms offered, the effect of which is that their names are circulated to all clubs. Any club is entitled to negotiate an agreement with the player and register him as theirs. The compensation procedure then follows and if no agreement the referral to the Tribunal whose decision as previously stated is binding on both clubs.

Matters taken into account by the Tribunal include the player's age, experience, reputation, potential, emoluments received at previous club, the offer made to him, esteem in which held at previous club, Division status, previous transfer fees paid, signing on fees paid, Divisional status of signing club.

It follows that clubs cannot take a referral to the Tribunal lightly and are well advised to try to determine the likely outcome before becoming committed. A club seriously undervaluing a player could well

burn its fingures.

The Contract system should give the player a better deal. Hitherto he was often signed as young and inexperienced from the amateur game on terms which at that time might well have been attractive. He was committed to that agreement although his status, ability and valuation might well have soared. Inflation could have seriously devalued his original terms.

The club is entitled to more loyalty from the player and can include reasonable requirements to the new contract. The old ploy of 'staying away' should, hopefully,

disappear.





Ken Kelly



Continuing a series of articles in recognition of Ken Kelly's ten years and over three hundred games for Warrington. An informal chat with BEE GFF

Have you any special memories from your time at Wilderspool?

Coming to Wilderspool was special, particularly after being out of the game for twelve months.

The first Lancashire Cup success when I was in my first season as captain. I didn't have a great game but the thrill of lifting that trophy will long be remembered.

Every success in cup ties is special. Being made Club Captain by Bill Benyon to replace Parry when his marvellous playing career was running down, that was a terrific thrill.

My 'Man of Steel' Season when everything was

going right until we lost in the Semi Final of the Challenge Cup. That was the third most successful season in the Club's history. I went to Wembley with Saints in '72 but never as a Wire player, obviously that is a disappointment.

Player, obviously that is a disappointment.
You had something going on the field with Bob Eccles in season 1982/83?

Yes, that was Kevin Ashcroft's idea. When a player was tackled near to the opponents line, I was the acting halfback to the man playing the ball. Eccles stood behind me. I put my hand on the ball and rolled it back through my legs to Bob, I went left, Bob went right and usually scored. The acting halfback should be five yards away from the ball. Some Referees warned us before the game that the move would not be allowed. Bob got a few tries from it. Kevin has tried it on since at Salford but it was quickly rumbled and is now history.

Your have also had some 'lows' in the game?

Yes, my trial at Wilderspool. In the fourth game I broke my arm. That was a real sickener. I didn't tell anyone about the arm but went home. Later I phoned Alex Murphy up and said I would have to wait until it's mended then have another trial. Alex said 'Don't worry, we'll sign you anyway." The next season I broke my arm again but I was happy to be back in the game.

You've had your differences with Referees?

Yes, mostly for arguing. To the spectators it is silly but it's the way you are made. I have always had great determination to win. Just playing is not enough. Last season in an 'A' team match we were winning 52 nil and I found I was still telling the Referee when he made a mistake. I can understand McEnroe, we get fired up by striving for perfection and these things rankle.

There are also players who deliberately set you up. I was told before one match at Saints that I would get sent off. The player was right — he succeeded and I fell for the nine card trick.


Once Kevin Allatt sent me off at St. Helens after a running discussion between us throughout the game. The game was tight, I was fully wound up and eventually Mr. Allat had had enough. I had to go. I was starting to walk when I saw Pinner taking advantage of the situation and fly towards our line from a quick tap. Not thinking I dashed over and tackled him. Mr. Allatt came over and said, "I've sent you off." I said "Sorry ref, I thought you were pointing for me to get back ten yards. I left the field but Wire went on to win the game.
