TODAY we make an early start to the Cup season with the first round of the Grünhülle Lager Lancashire Cup. On paper it is the easiest of the Trophies to win but in fact, the fierce competition between the Lancashire and Cumbrian based clubs makes the draw vitally important.

Our opponents, Oldham, were unlucky to be relegated last season following a dramatic end of season surge by Leigh and Salford who at one time looked certain for the drop. Oldham are not a second division outfit and will be smarting to prove quickly to their fans that they belong in the top ranks. The addition of Paul Round and Mal Graham to the pack adds both pace and scoring potential and as cup fighters we have only to look at last season's Challenge Cup shocker when in the dying moments of the game a Paddy Kirwan try ended Wigan's Wembley dream of a quick return trip. That was the only cup tie Wigan lost all season so it was no mean achievement. Oldham put in a terrific tackling stint that day and we can anticipate no less effort today.

We'll be satisfied with our opening performance in a highly competitive Locker Cup game. I was able to field practically the same side in our opening league fixture against Hunslet. I thought we countered well the visitors early tactics before going on to the offensive and running in some tries. We played as a team and the score is more important than the scorer. It was a luxury and great comfort to see both Bob Jackson and Les Boyd straining at the leash on the Substitutes bench. Subs are very much part of today's game both of necessity to cover for injuries and tactically to change the pattern of play.

The return of current Great Britain International No. 13 Mike Gregory from his summer in top Aussie football can only serve to increase the competition up front. Carl Webb who missed most of last season with a broken arm is now happily back in action and will be looking for first team opportunities along with last season's forward debutants Neil Harmon, Phil Capewell and Andy Mossop.

We have a proud record at Wilderspool of enhancing the performances of signings from the amateur ranks and continued progress in this field has not been ignored. Today's 'A' team stars can be tomorrow's internationals if they work at their game. It is no coincidence that so many of our young signings have reached top grade. It is sheer graft and hard work both by the individuals and the coaching staff. The Aussie/Kiwi influence has been a great bonus in recent seasons but the strength of British R.L. must come from the amateurs which means more coaching and advice in schools. We still have a lot to do.

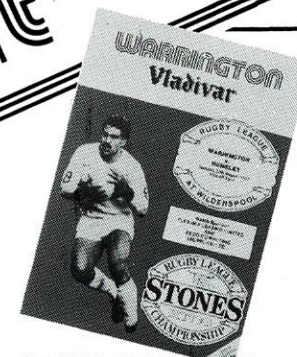

For the first quarter Hunslet took on the Wire defence, employing spoiling tactics and pushing the offside rules to and beyond the limits. Wire did not panic and well led by Kevin Tamati gradually took over the game. Roberts, Tamati and Humphries worked the ball upfield and Roskell cleverly switched the ball to **ROBERTS** with McGinty drawing the cover. This lad knows the try line: **JOHN WOODS** converted. On 20 minutes Woods put up a kick from which **HUMPHRIES** gained possession and by sheer guts and determination took three defenders over the line. Crosfields would have been proud of him. **WOODS** again on target. Another three minutes and Wire were back again with Holden feeding **PETERS** for the centre to weave his way through a bemused defence to give **WOODS** another easy shot. Four minutes later it was **ROBERTS** again this time playing the ball forward and forcing his way through the cover, **WOODS** likes kicking goals at Wilderspool. On 34 minutes Holden, McGinty, Roskell, Peters and Ropati handled as Wire surged up the field. Woods found a gap for the persevering **HUMPHRIES** who completed the move under the posts, **WOODS** said thanks. 30 nil. Five minutes from the interval Wire were taken by surprise as Mr. Whitfield was explaining why he had given a penalty when the quick thinking **PLATT** tapped the ball and dived over. 30-4 was a fine achievement in a half constantly halted by the whistle and an 11-10 penalty count in favour of Wire.

Boyd replaced Tamati who had enjoyed a fine half and once again Hunslet dictated proceedings for a while as the run of the ball went in their favour. The No. 6 Coates looked like scoring when

Drummond appeared from nowhere to ground him with a brilliant cover tackle. This had the effect of putting Wire back on course. On 55 minutes Holden slipped the ball to **McGINTY** who scored cleverly. **WOODS** kept up the pressure. Three minutes later Woods with a brilliant burst of acceleration found space to send **ROBERTS** away for this third. **WOODS** added the goal. 42-4 and on fifty nine minutes Bob Jackson replaced Sanderson who had grafted throughout the game. Roskell sent McGinty away and the loose forward swerved around the defence to make **JACKSON'S** day for him with a two minute try. **WOODS** made it 48-4. With fifteen to go Tamati resumed as Roskell suffered a wrist injury. Uncharacteristically Woods missed a penalty which would have raised the half century but with a couple of minutes left the brilliant Holden cut through to send **TAMATI** in for a well earned try. **WOODS** booted home his ninth of the day and the Wire fans must have enjoyed their evening meal after this feast of fine attacking rugby. **Humphries** took the sponsors M.O.M. for a gutsy effort, he was pushed hard by **Holden**, always in the action and proving another Barrow bargain buy. Sheer poetry from Johnson at full back more promise from Peters at centre and another cultured display from John Woods, my Mr. Unflappable... Batemen and Platt served the visitors well but they had no answer to the pace and skills of a Barrow outfit benefitting from the gruelling pre-season training.

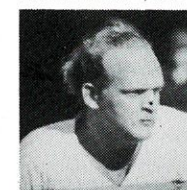

We were not disappointed as the rain bucketted down on a good covering of grass making play treacherous. Bad news for Wire as after kicking off up t'hill Billy McGinty was substituted with only five minutes on the t'clock. Looking concussed Billy sadly walked off to allow Bob Jackson into the arena.

On 14 minutes Mark Roberts was stopped on the home line. Wire moved the ball to the left and **ROPATI** flew in at the corner. Whitfield missed two penalty shots before on 26 minutes Keith Holden dummied brilliantly to make space for fast backing up **MARK ROBERTS** who tore in under the posts making **WOODS** conversion a formality. Ten nil but Halifax came back on the half hour as Wilson kicked through for **WHITFIELD** (was he offside?) to gather and touch down. The same player converted. On 35 minutes, after Wire pressure, **HOLDEN** coolly dropped a goal to make the score 6-11. On 37 minutes Dixon who had twice been spoken to previously was lucky to escape with ten in the Bin for a rabbit punch on John Woods neck quickly followed by a punch on Mark Roberts. **WOODS** made the penalty kick tell and the half time score, 6-13.

A good start and not many sides will win at Thrum Hall. Well done, lads.

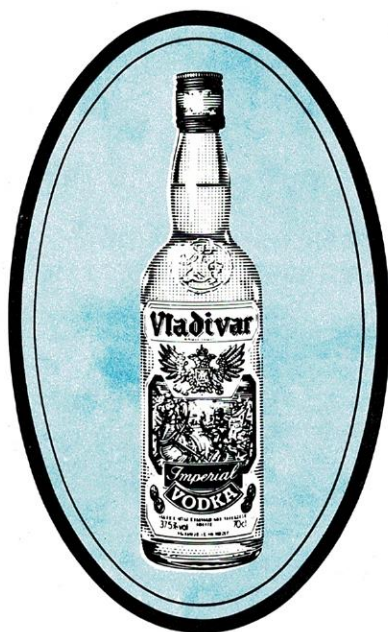

GRÜNHALLE LAGER LANCASHIRE CUP ROUND ONE

THE draw for this season's competition was made during the Summer Sevens at Central Park, Wigan. The competition is in its second year of sponsorship by the Greenall Whitley Brewery.

Holders and clear favourites for this year's Lancashire Cup are **WIGAN** who are required to travel to **BARROW** in their first defence of the trophy. Barrow already look a decent bet for promotion having lowered Featherstone's colours in the opening league fixture. Undoubtedly plenty of effort from the Cumbrians who will benefit from the experience of top Aussie Rod Reddy who has been encouraged back into action after a spell of coaching in Queensland. They would need a team of Reddy's to hold back the fast moving Wigan side.

Top tie of the round is the **LEIGH** versus **ST. HELENS** encounter at Hilton Park. Leigh coach Bill Benyon will be wanting to win this one and will have his side fired up for the occasion. Murphy will be no less competitive and whilst admiring Leigh's miraculous survival last season and a double against Wire, Saints have the edge in class and pace.

RUNCORN could hardly find a closer derby game than to meet **WIDNES** who could jog across the Transporter as a warm up to the match. Ex-Wires Tommy Rawlinson scored Runcorn's winning try in a fine opening day victory at Rochdale but Widnes will be looking to a wide margin of victory and further progress in the competition.

SALFORD have once again drawn **FULHAM** at the Willows, no doubt with a sigh of relief at avoiding a loss making London trip. Unlike previous tussles I would expect Salford to run up a high score.

Newly promoted **SWINTON** entertain **ROCHDALE HORNETS** and once again this is a

clash I can see going one way only. The Lions of Swinton will have smiled rather than snarled at this accommodating draw and will welcome the temporary respite from First Division pace and power.

There always seems to be a Cumbrian clash in the first round and this year is no exception with **WHITEHAVEN** taking on **CARLISLE**. Both sides began this season with a defeat against last season's first division opposition — showing once again the gulf between the leagues (Whitehaven lost at home to Oldham and Carlisle took a drubbing away to Wakefield). Last season Carlisle were massacred by St. Helens in round one but Roy Lester did an excellent job in restoring their shattered confidence and ensuring a respectable finishing spot in division two. Whitehaven probably felt unlucky to miss promotion and should make home advantage pay to take this one.

Struggling **WORKINGTON** have the newly named **SPRINGFIELD BOROUGH** as their visitors. The ex Blackpool outfit will be hoping to include Bob Eccles and Tony Hodson in their line-up. Both made good debuts on 30th August, Hodson scoring a try and Bob paving the way for the match winner. Enthusiasm should carry them through even though it would be great to see a Workington revival.

Finally at Wilderspool **WARRINGTON** entertain last season's runners-up **OLDHAM** who were desperately unlucky to be relegated on points difference and will hope to put the record straight by returning to the top ranks at the first attempt. They cannot be under estimated, having had the technology to put Wigan out of the Challenge Cup last season. Wire reached two finals last season and will be looking to make the Lancashire Cup their first honour of the new season...

Bert's View

Another addition to R.L. history

Thursday 27th August 1987 will go down in Rugby League history books as the first occasion on which the Rugby League Tribunal sat to determine the value of a player.

Ged Byrne, the Salford centre three quarter had rejected the terms offered to him by his club under the new contract system. In accordance with the new procedure Byrne was entitled to enter into an agreement with another club. The club, on this occasion Wigan, agreed terms for a contract with the player, registered him as their player and in accordance with the procedure within seven days offered compensation of £20,000 to Salford. Salford's valuation of the player was considerably higher, at £80,000. The matter was therefore referred to the Tribunal — a committee of individuals without club ties or commitments whose decision is binding — without right of appeal. In this case the compensation was assessed at £40,000 and Byrne thus became the first R.L. player so assessed.

Warrington's interest in the Tribunal arrived on Tuesday 1st September when the player concerned, David Lyon, the former

Widnes full back was assessed at £12,500. Wire had offered £10,000 against Widnes' evaluation of £20,000.

Prior to the start of the current season all clubs were required to enter into contracts with the players they desired to retain. The contracts are for a specified period of time in excess of one month but if no time is stated the contract terminates at the end of the season.

Procedures are laid down for players not able to accept the terms offered, the effect of which is that their names are circulated to all clubs. Any club is entitled to negotiate an agreement with the player and register him as theirs. The compensation procedure then follows and if no agreement the referral to the Tribunal whose decision as previously stated is binding on both clubs.

Matters taken into account by the Tribunal include the player's age, experience, reputation, potential, emoluments received at previous club, the offer made to him, esteem in which held at previous club, Division status, previous transfer fees paid, signing on fees paid, Divisional status of signing club.

It follows that clubs cannot take a referral to the Tribunal lightly and are well advised to try to determine the likely outcome before becoming committed. A club seriously undervaluing a player could well burn its fingers.

The Contract system should give the player a better deal. Hitherto he was often signed as young and inexperienced from the amateur game on terms which at that time might well have been attractive. He was committed to that agreement although his status, ability and valuation might well have soared. Inflation could have seriously devalued his original terms.

The club is entitled to more loyalty from the player and can include reasonable requirements to the new contract. The old ploy of 'staying away' should, hopefully, disappear.

Kirwan reached the ball first to touch down with Parrish's touchline conversion leaving Wire to sweat out the dying seconds. New signing Tony Cooke took the Man of the Match award.

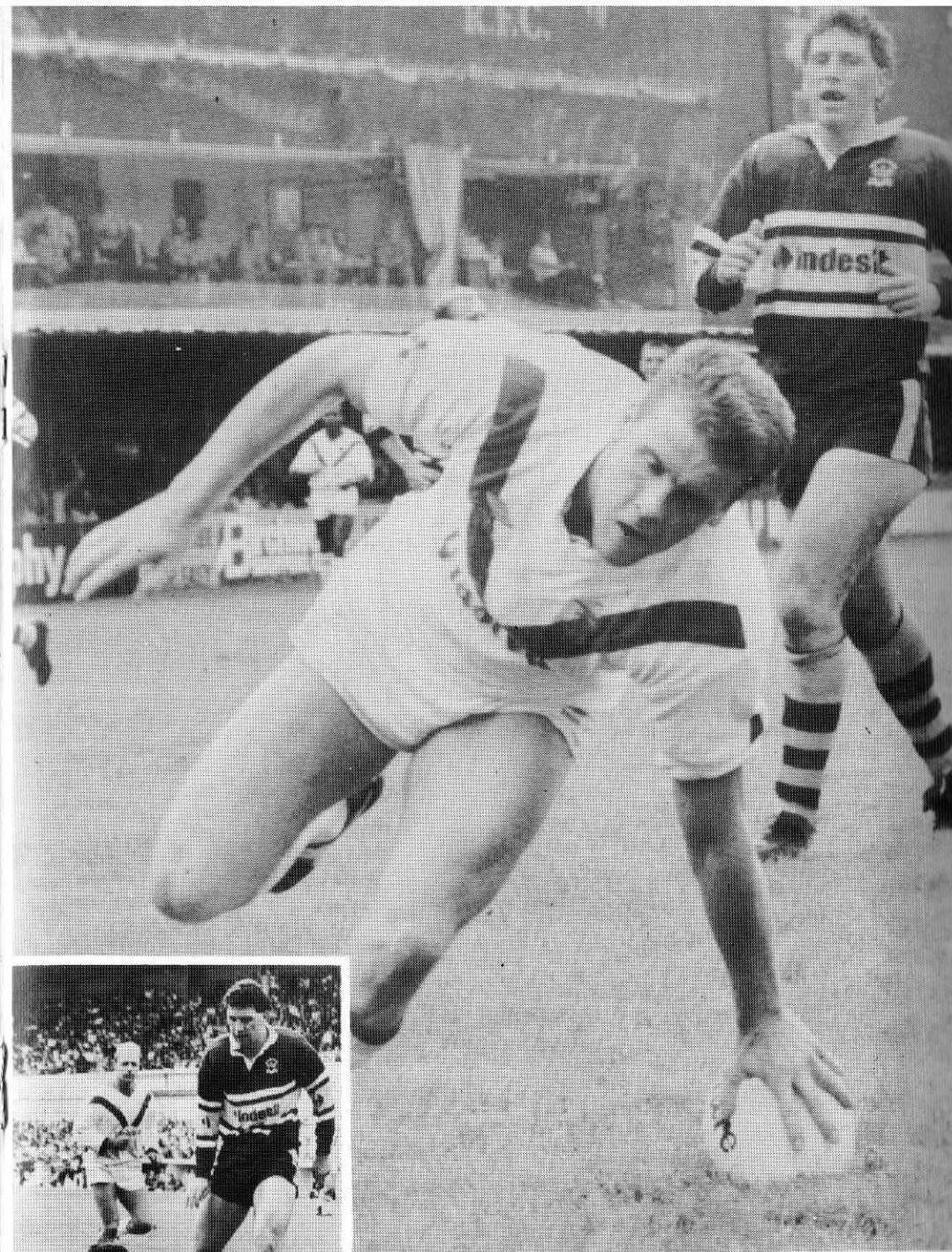

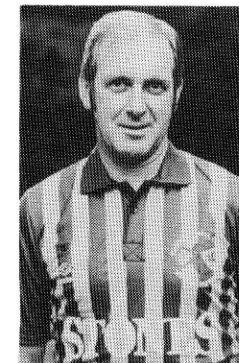

Ken Kelly



Continuing a series of articles in recognition of Ken Kelly's ten years and over three hundred games for Warrington. An informal chat with BEE GEE.

Have you any special memories from your time at Wilderspool?

Coming to Wilderspool was special, particularly after being out of the game for twelve months.

The first Lancashire Cup success when I was in my first season as captain. I didn't have a great game but the thrill of lifting that trophy will long be remembered.

Every success in cup ties is special. Being made Club Captain by Bill Benyon to replace Parry when his marvellous playing career was running down, that was a terrific thrill.

My 'Man of Steel' Season when everything was going right until we lost in the Semi Final of the Challenge Cup. That was the third most successful season in the Club's history. I went to Wembley with Saints in '72 but never as a Wire player, obviously that is a disappointment.

You had something going on the field with Bob Eccles in season 1982/83?

Yes, that was Kevin Ashcroft's idea. When a player was tackled near to the opponents line, I was the acting halfback to the man playing the ball. Eccles stood behind me. I put my hand on the ball and rolled it back through my legs to Bob. I went left, Bob went right and usually scored. The acting halfback should be five yards away from the ball. Some Referees warned us before the game that the move would not be allowed. Bob got a few tries from it. Kevin has tried it on since at Salford but it was quickly rumbled and is now history.

Your have also had some 'lows' in the game?

Yes, my trial at Wilderspool. In the fourth game I broke my arm. That was a real sickener. I didn't tell anyone about the arm but went home. Later I phoned Alex Murphy up and said I would have to wait until it's mended then have another trial. Alex said 'Don't worry, we'll sign you anyway.' The next season I broke my arm again but I was happy to be back in the game.

You've had your differences with Referees?

Yes, mostly for arguing. To the spectators it is silly but it's the way you are made. I have always had great determination to win. Just playing is not enough. Last season in an 'A' team match we were winning 52 nil and I found I was still telling the Referee when he made a mistake. I can understand McEnroe, we get fired up by striving for perfection and these things rankle.

There are also players who deliberately set you up. I was told before one match at Saints that I would get sent off. The player was right — he succeeded and I fell for the nine card trick.

Once Kevin Allatt sent me off at St. Helens after a running discussion between us throughout the game. The game was tight, I was fully wound up and eventually Mr. Allatt had had enough. I had to go. I was starting to walk when I saw Pinner taking advantage of the situation and fly towards our line from a quick tap. Not thinking I dashed over and tackled him. Mr. Allatt came over and said, "I've sent you off." I said "Sorry ref, I thought you were pointing for me to get back ten yards. I left the field but Wire went on to win the game."

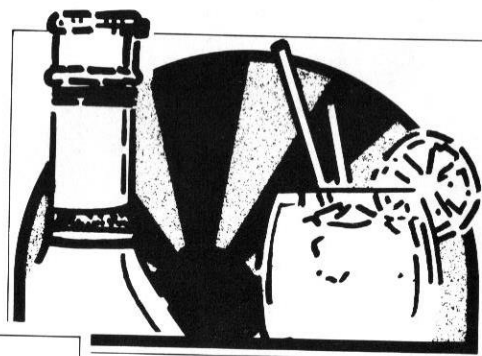
