



## TALK OF THE TOWN

They say that luck runs in threes. If that's true fortune should change today!

If one's first reaction to the result at Keighley was one of disappointment, then by a strange paradox one can look back on the first half of the season with a fair amount af satisfaction. The form we established during the first three months of the campaign compares favourably with that of any other team in the R.L., and was based on solid defence, allied to at times, pacey skillful attacking rugby.

So what's gone wrong? Loss of form in certain areas has no doubt been a contributing factor. Injuries too, have not lent themselves to selection continuity. Whatever the combination of reasons, the trend is alarming and its essential that the

problems are rectified with haste.

All is not gloom and doom however, and a result today would help to aleviate a few of the painful memories of the past three weeks. Despite our shortcomings we do have a squad of players with the potential to clinch home advantage in the play-offs. The main objective a t present would appear to be restoring pride and confidence, so a good performance now would certainly lift the physchological pressure.

It could be said that the season really begins this afternoon. With eleven matches outstanding (six at home, five away) and with the possible exception of Whitehaven, all are against sides with a realistic chance of making the play-offs. At the moment only 2 points seperate Barrow, currently eighth and mansfield occupying 12th place. So every game will take on cup-tie proportions, Featherstone, Wakefield and Oldham look safe bets, leaving a minimum of nine lubs to fight for the remaining five premiership positions. We have shown what can be achieved through professional aptitude, we must now repeat those performances every sweek from now until the end of the season. It won't be easy but it's a challenge we must rise to meet.

Everyone's favourites for promotion, Oldham, look certain to make a quick return "upstairs" despite the hic-cup against promotion challengers Wakefield Trinity at the Watersheddings a fortnight ago.

On view today will be former Widnes and Great Britain Test Full-Back MICK BURKE who has won every major honour the game can bestow.

On the wings should be ex-St Helens and Town Loanee Kevin Meadows who once ran in four tries for Lancashire at Derwent Park; and recent acquisition CHARLIE McALISTER - a Maori in enational and "All Blacks" trialist secured from Bradford and Bingley R.U. Club.

The middle-backs could well be Aussie GARY WARNECKE, signed from the Wests Club in September 1985, and DES FOY, a local lad who scaled the heights with Wigan and Widnes before returning home to gai Test recognition.

At half-back the 'Roughyeds' will have the ubiquitous Aussie PETER WALSH, signed in July from the N.S.W. Country Club Lakes United: an able goal-kicker who has added vital experience to the key stand-off role. His partner, the equally experlenced, if youthful, MICHAEL FORD returned to his native Oldham after representing both Wigan and Leigh.

Packing down at open-side-prop will be giant forward NEIL CLAWSON. picked-up last May for a give-away £6,000 from Featherstone Rovers. The

industrious IAN SANDERSON, a junior capture from Firsways A.R.L.C. in September 1983, is the likely occupant of the number nine shirt, while enterprising Gt Britain Test newcomer. HUGH WADDLE . signed from Blackpool Borough - completes the front threee.

The suspension of Steve Paters should see the re-introduction of TERRY 'Flash' FLANAGAN at looseforward. The former Saddleworth Rangers junior still possesses the ball playing skills that gained him his Test ticket in 1984. His father, Bill, and brother, Keyin, have both worn Oldham's colours.

Looking for inclusion this afternoon also will be Canterbury-Bankstown back BRIAN McCARTHY who arrived in England as part of a European holiday ... and stayed! Ex-Tameside amateur MIKE BARDSLEY, signed in October 1985, COLIN HAWKYARD. who settled at the Watersheddings in December 1978 from Huddersfield A.R.L.C. Bradley and former Stanley Rangers winger PAUL LORD will also stand amongst the hopefuls.

Workington Town's objective for the rest of the season is crystal-clear now. Sunday's disappointing Challenge Cup exit made certain of that.

But once he's gone through the reasons -- Town's inability to hold Keighly at the start of the game, and the increasing influence of the two Keighly halfbacks -- he started to mellow.

His thoughts turned to today's game with Oldham and Town's priority of making the Premiership finals

That was the objective at the start of the season before a game had been played. They are still well on course, but after two successive League defeats at Rochdale and against Springfield, the decline has to be stopped quickly.




