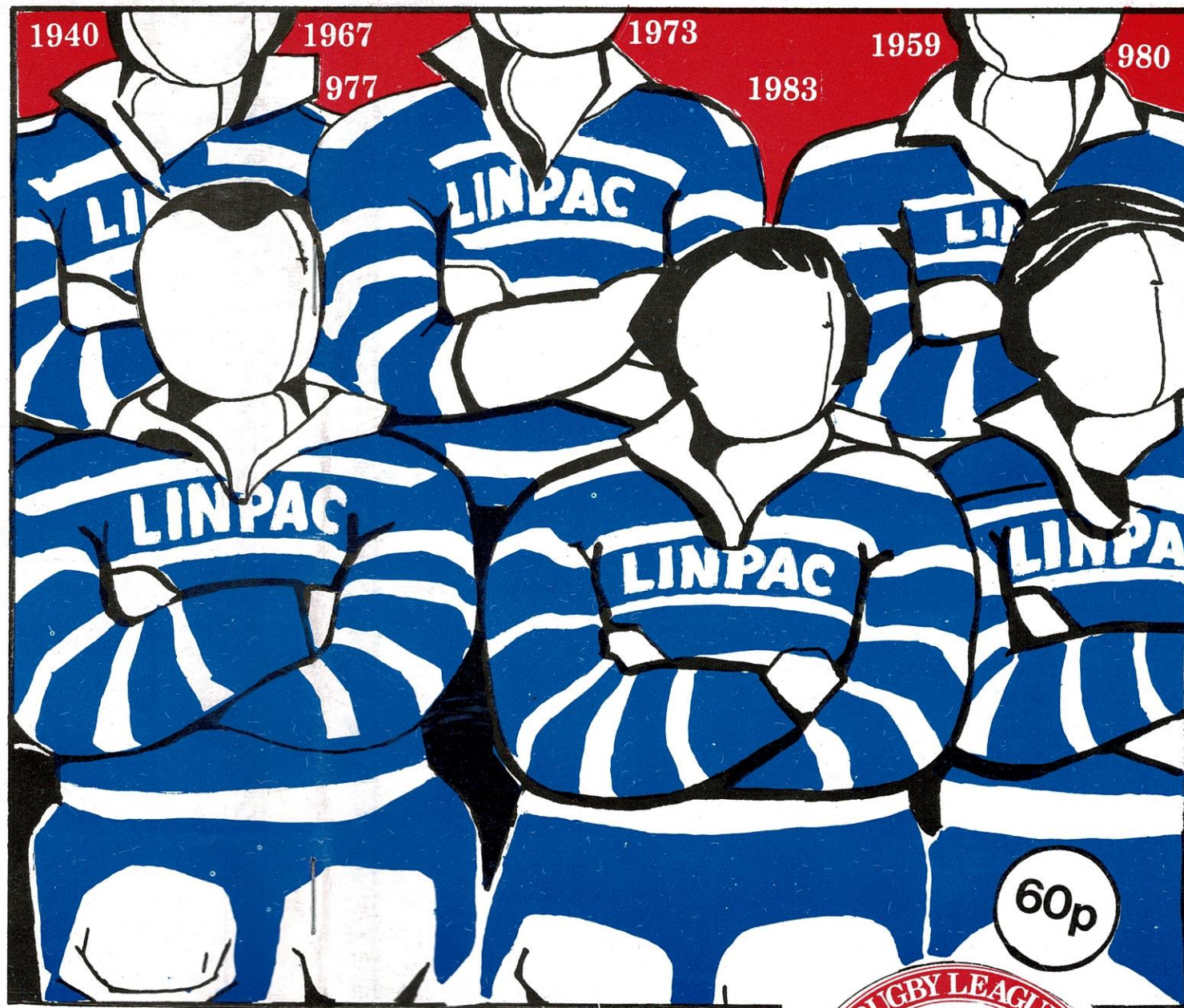

Featherstone Rovers are two short of equalling the club record of 11 successive League victories.

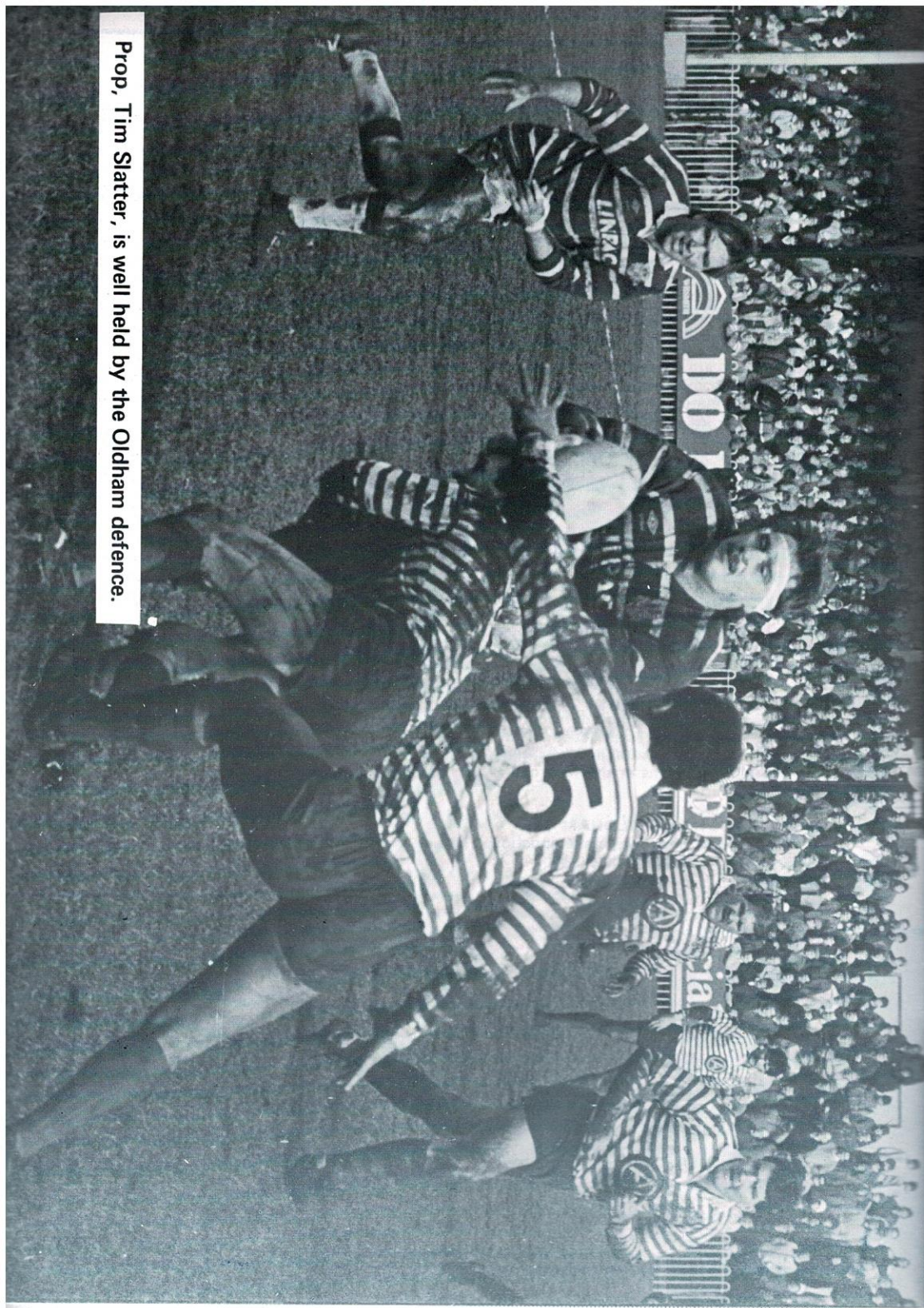
The record was set in Featherstone's previous Division Two spell in 1979-80 when they won 11 successive League matches before being held to an 8-8 draw at home by Oldham.

Oldham visit Rovers on Sunday and again threaten the winning run of nine which began after Rovers drew 10-10 at Sheffield Eagles on 22 November.

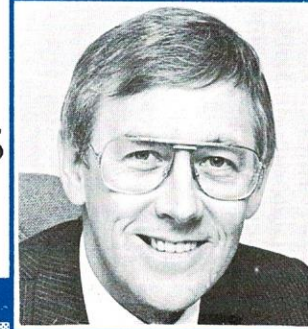
Rovers won their previous match and have not lost in the League since going down 29-22 at home to Carlisle on 25 October — an unbeaten run of 11 matches.

# WELCOME TO OUR VISITORS

**OLDHAM** have taken over as League leaders after last week's victory over Carlisle, and today's encounter promises to be a real thriller.

Oldham's coach is school-master **ERIC FITZSIMONS**, who played for the Club and also with Hunslet and Rochdale Hornets. With the latter club he had his first coaching experience at professional level. He took over at Oldham at the beginning of this season from Frank Myler, and already his new ideas of the game have played dividends. Oldham were most unlucky to go down at the end of last season due in no small part to the extraordinary results from Widnes in their last few games.

**MICK BURKE**, Ex Great Britain full back star. Australian Tourist 1984. Won every award at Widnes except League Champions including Lance Todd Trophy at Wembley and the Harry Sunderland Memorial Award for outstanding performance in the Championship final. Joined Oldham just before the cup deadline in January. Likely to be out for first three weeks with a knee injury.

**HUGH WADDELL**, Signed for Oldham despite competition from 3 other Lancashire clubs, just before the cup deadline in a £15,000 move from Blackpool Borough. Ex Rugby Union player, a trialist with Leicester City Soccer. Waddell's strong displays with Blackpool Boro' earned him an England cap in 1985 and he won man-of-the-match with a display in pre-season friendly with Leigh. Current GB No. 10, looks certain to tour Australia this summer.

**COLIN HAWKYARD**, native of Huddersfield, plays equally well in the centre or in the second row. Always guarantees 100% effort and a great team player with a tremendous heart for the game. 8 years with Oldham he scored a magnificent try against the Australian Tourists last season.

**TERRY FLANAGAN**, a brilliant loose-forward. From a rugby playing family, he toured Australia with GB in 1984. A clever player and one of the youngest most sought after After-Dinner speakers in the North with his quick wit and great insight into the game.

**KEVIN MEADOWS**, ex-Warrington and Saints flier who scored 5 tries in an Oldham match v Salford when on loan 3 years ago. Played 22 consecutive matches for Warrington last season and has increased his all-round involvement with advice from highly-rated coach Les Boyd.

**PAUL ROUND**, GB under 24 star signed in a recent record deal with Saints. A natural athlete with blistering pace who scored for Saints at Wembley last year. Expect a lot of friendly competition between him and Mal Graham for top forward try scorer in the 2nd Division. At present leading try scorer with 16.

**MAL GRAHAM**, one of the games great players. A former winger who played in the Grand Final in Sydney. In 5 years he has made the transition to forward with ease. He has been the leading forward try-scorer with all his previous English clubs. Hunslet 84/85, Oldham 85/86 and Bradford Northern 86/87. A devastating tackler, now settled in Oldham with his English wife.

**PADDY KIRWAN**, local lad, who signed from the Oldham colts side — he is a great hearted player with tremendous strength complimented

by a good football brain. Affectionately known as Cast-Iron his super try put Wigan out of the Challenge Cup last season and cost the league winners over £200,000 in lost revenue.

**JEFF EDWARDS**, 'Mr. Happy' Jeff has played in most three-quarter positions for Oldham and done so with great skill. An aggressive tackler his intelligent cover defence has often helped Oldham out of difficult situations.

**IAN SANDERSON**, Hooker. A fierce competitor. His schoolboy charm and good looks are no clue to his commitment on the field and his Lancashire cap of 2 years ago is not likely to be his last honour. His darting runs from acting half gain much valuable ground for the side.

**MICK WORRALL**, toured Australia in 1974 and was starring until he collected a knee injury in the 2nd test. Talented kicker and aggressive defender now settled in Oldham and determined to be in this years Aussie touring party. No reason why he should not achieve this ambition.

**IAN SHERRAT**, local lad who joined Oldham from Bradford Northern in a player cash deal that saw David Hobbs move to Odsal. Sherrat learnt his rugby at Fitton Hill school, Oldham before signing for Bradford as a 17 yr. old, now aged 21. Spent last two summers in Brisbane and has attracted the interest of 2 Sydney clubs for next season.

**PAUL SHERMAN**, product of the junior leagues in Widnes and developing into a good all-round player with resolute defence and the ability to score tries when least expected. A player to watch out for.

**STEVE PETERS**, former GB tourist also ex-Saints and Warrington. One of the most talented and versatile players in the game. A players player who regularly tops the tackle count with 40 plus tackles and who will be a key man in bringing on Oldham's youngsters.

**KEITH ATKINSON**, another local boy, former GB colt, a tremendous goal kicker who has kicked 9 from 10 attempts in pre-season friendlies. With a fine turn of speed and the ability to turn defence into attack with a well-timed run. Only 21 he seems destined for great honours in the game.

**RICHARD IRVINE**, an under 19 International recently signed from Mold Green Club in Huddersfield despite competition from 4 first division clubs. Scored two solo tries from the half-way line in the pre-season friendlies and is likely to prove one of the finds of the season with his powerful runs. Already a firm favourite with the crowd.

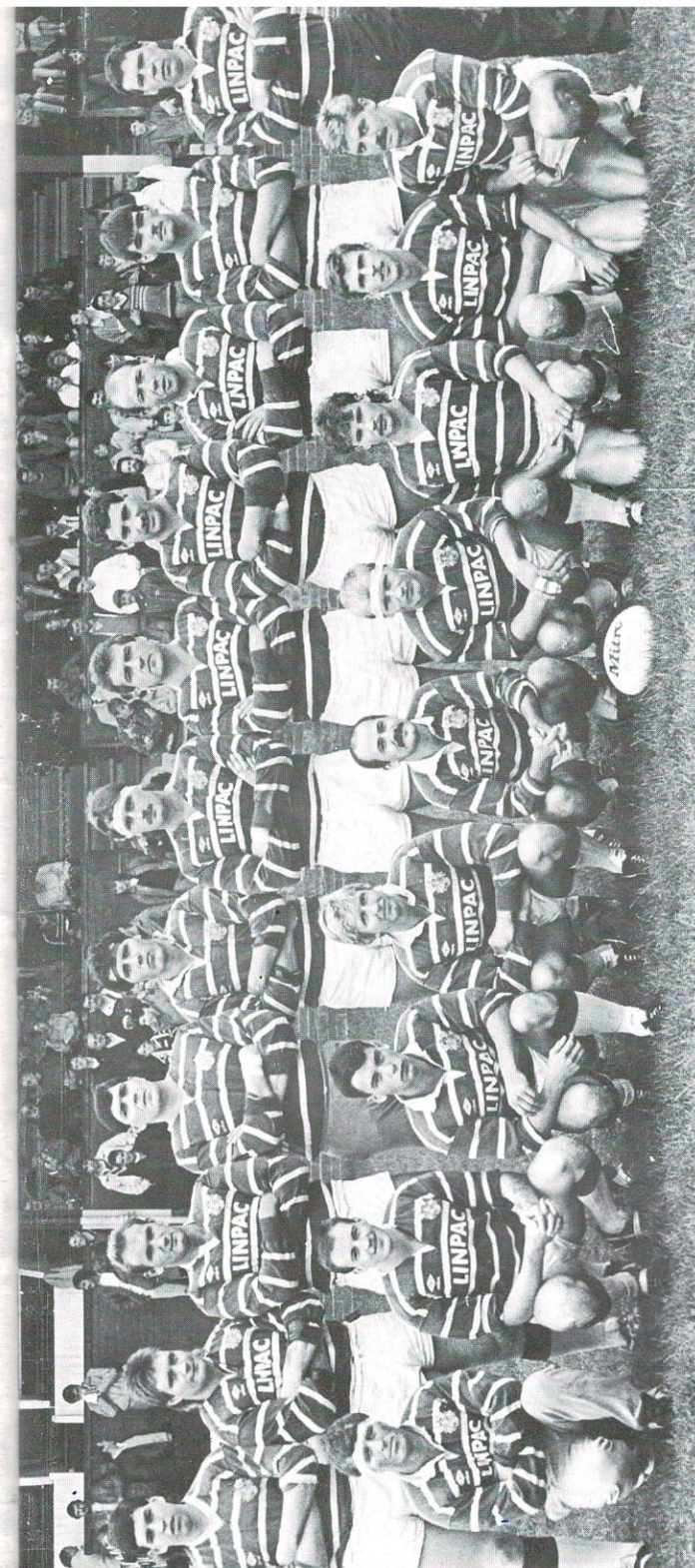

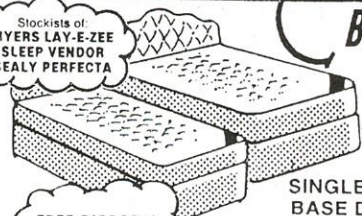

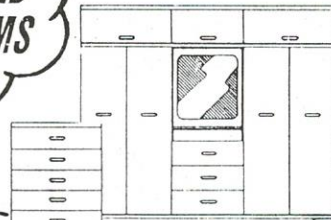

I hope Rovers make it back to the First Division. If they fail this time it will become a bigger mountain to climb next season and I don't think that they will be able to sustain such a high level of endeavour over several attempts.

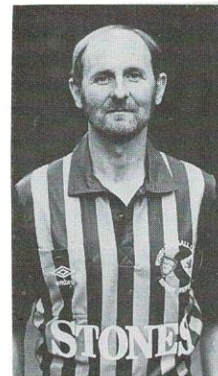

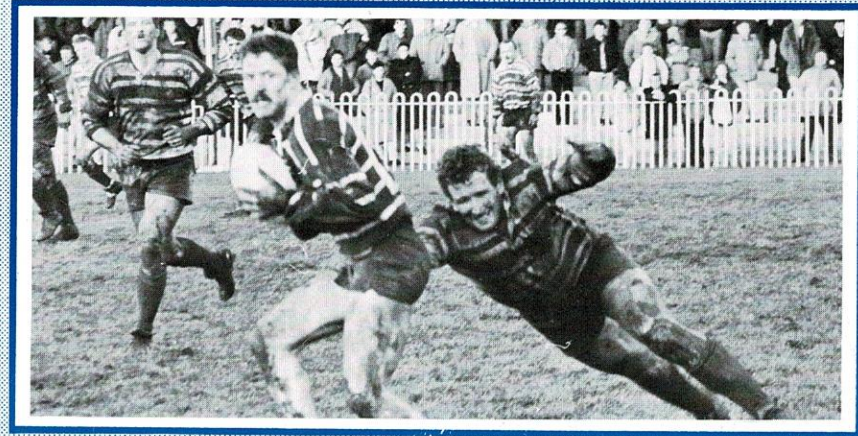

## Previous Encounters

Edited by Ian Clayton

Clashes between OLDHAM and FEATHERSTONE ROVERS in the Championship go back almost 70 years. On February 18 1922, Oldham entertained Rovers to the Watersheddings and won by 28 to 5. Bert Wooley, try and Jim Denton goal scored consolation points for the Rovers. A few weeks later a return fixture was played at Post Office Road and in a much closer contest, Oldham were 3-0 winners.

Of the next seven fixtures between the two clubs, Oldham dominated winning six and drawing one. Featherstone gained their first league win in 1942, scoring 18 to Oldham's 10, in a game attended by 500 spectators paying just £10 (obviously crowds were severely affected by the War). Rovers scorers on this occasion were Sherwood, Chapman, Major, Street (tries) and Sherwood (3 goals).

The most recent encounter between "the Colliers" and "the Roughyeds" took place less than one year ago on March 8th 1987 when both clubs were still in the First Division. On this occasion Rovers pulled off a good victory by 24-6. Try scorers for Rovers were Nigel Barker, Jones, Steadman and Slatter (who also won man-of-the-match) and Steve Quinn kicked 4 goals.

# Who's the Greatest

by John Hill

## AUSTRALIA - V - GREAT BRITAIN SERIES 11 & 12 - SECOND ROW FORWARDS

Over the last few weeks I have gone through all the second rowers who have played for Australia & GB and after a lot of thought and a lot of research I finally came up with these four - Norm Provan, Arthur Clues (Aus) & Martin Hodgson & Dick Huddart (GB). Starting with Australia first here is Arthur Clues record. Teams: Western Suburbs, Sydney, Leeds, Hunslet and Australia Tests 3 1946. Although he only played 3 test matches for his country Arthur was and still is for that matter one of the most respected men the game as ever known. He would have played more times for his country but he chose instead to come over and play for the English club Leeds. A product of Parramatta Rugby Union Club, Clues joined Western Suburbs and quickly established himself as a second row forward, in 1946 he played in all 3 tests against the GB tourists and also for NSW twice against the tourists. He signed for Leeds in 1947 when he played for them until 1954 when he then joined Hunslet. He retired at the early age of 33 while he was still a useful forward and he became a Director of the Leeds Club. Clues also played for the other nationalities side against England, France and Wales and he once captained a combined International side against an Australian touring team in 1955-57. In all he played 236 games for Leeds scoring 74 tries (222 points). His biggest disappointment was in 1947 when having reached Wembley with wins against Barrow home and away (2 legs) Hunslet home, Wigan away, and Wakefield in the semi-final they became the first team to win through to Wembley without conceding a point 12-0 & 6-0 v Barrow, 5-0 v Hunslet, 5-0 v Wigan & 21-0 v Wakefield, only to be beaten by Bradford Northern 8-4 in the final. On now to Norman Provan once again classed as one of Australia's greatest forwards. Played for the St George Club in Sydney. Provan played in 14 test matches GB (3) 1954, France (3) 1955, GB (3) 1958, NZ (3) 1959, F (2) 1960. 7 tries (21 points). He toured GB in 1956 but a series of bad injuries meant he had to miss playing in all 3 test matches. On tour he just played in 9 matches. He played for the Dragons (St. George) a record 283 times for a forward only W. Smith with 297 has played more and from 1956 till 1966 they won the biggest prize of them all the Premiership a total of 11 consecutive seasons. A record which will surely never be beaten and Provan played in them all. Captain on several occasions. (The Premiership in Australia is just like a club side in England winning the cup at Wembley 11 years running). A truly remarkable achievement. He played in 1954 World Cup also in 1957 World Cup won by Australia. He played his last season in 1966 after winning every honour in the game.

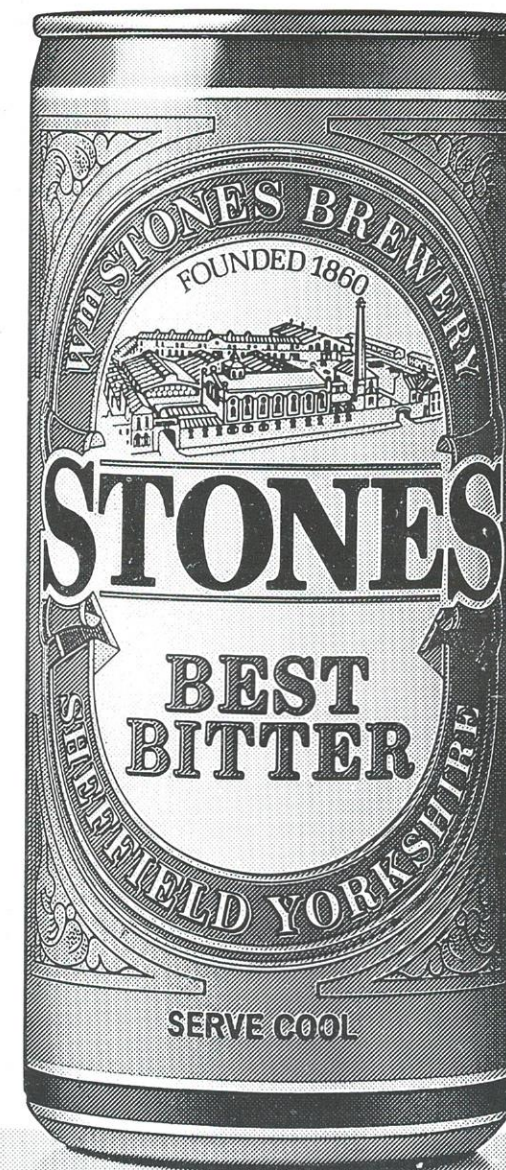
On now to GB duo - first Martin Hodgson, started his 1st season with Swinton in 1926-27 season when Swinton were the champions but he played in just 1 match but he won a championship medal the season after 1927-28 when Swinton beat F. Rovers 11-0 at Oldham to win the Championship. Playing in 31 matches scoring 3 tries + 5 goals. Swinton also won the Challenge Cup, the Lancashire Cup and the Lancashire League, the last club side to win all 4 cups also won Championship in 1930-31 playing 33 matches, scoring 1 try + 42 goals (97 points) and again in 1934-35 season. Played 34, 7 tries, 57 goals (135 pts). He played in 16 test matches - 1929 A2; 1932 A3, NZ3; 1933 A3; 1936 A3; NZ1; 1932 A1. He toured on both the 1932 & 1936 tours playing in all 6 tests against Australia & NZ on 1932 tour. In all he helped in 19 matches scoring 2 tries + 13 goals (32 pts). On 1936 tour he played in 4 out of 6 test matches missing the last one in NZ through injury. He played in most matches on tour 18 also was top points scorer with 3 tries + 65 goals (139 pts). Martin Hodgson is reputed to have kicked the longest goal in the history of RL. 78 yards. But a lot of people dispute this. But what a forward. Now for Dick Huddart. Teams - Whitehaven, St Helens, St George (Sydney), Cumberland, England & GB. Tests 16 (7vAus, 2vF, 7vNZ, tries 2). Internationals 1 (vFrance 1962). Tours 1958 & 1962. Club record Whitehaven 71 matches, 12 tries; St Helens 210 matches, 76 tries. Huddart a 6 foot 14½ stone second row forward was as fast as any centre toured Australia in 1958 whilst he was playing with Whitehaven. Played in 24 matches scoring 17 tries on his return St Helens signed him on for £7,000 (a big fee in those days). Toured again in 1962 playing in 23 matches scoring 13 tries, won Lance Todd in 1961. Won a championship medal in 1958-59 season playing in 27 matches scoring 14 tries. Also won Lancashire cup winners medals 1960-61, 1961-62, 1962-63. In 1964 he became restless to emigrate to Australia and St. Helens sold him for £10,000 to the crack Sydney club St. George but largely owing to a chest complaint and lack of form he could never reproduce his great English form in Australia.

So who was the greatest - for my money A. CLUES & D. HUDDART what a second row partnership - An Aussie and an Englishman.

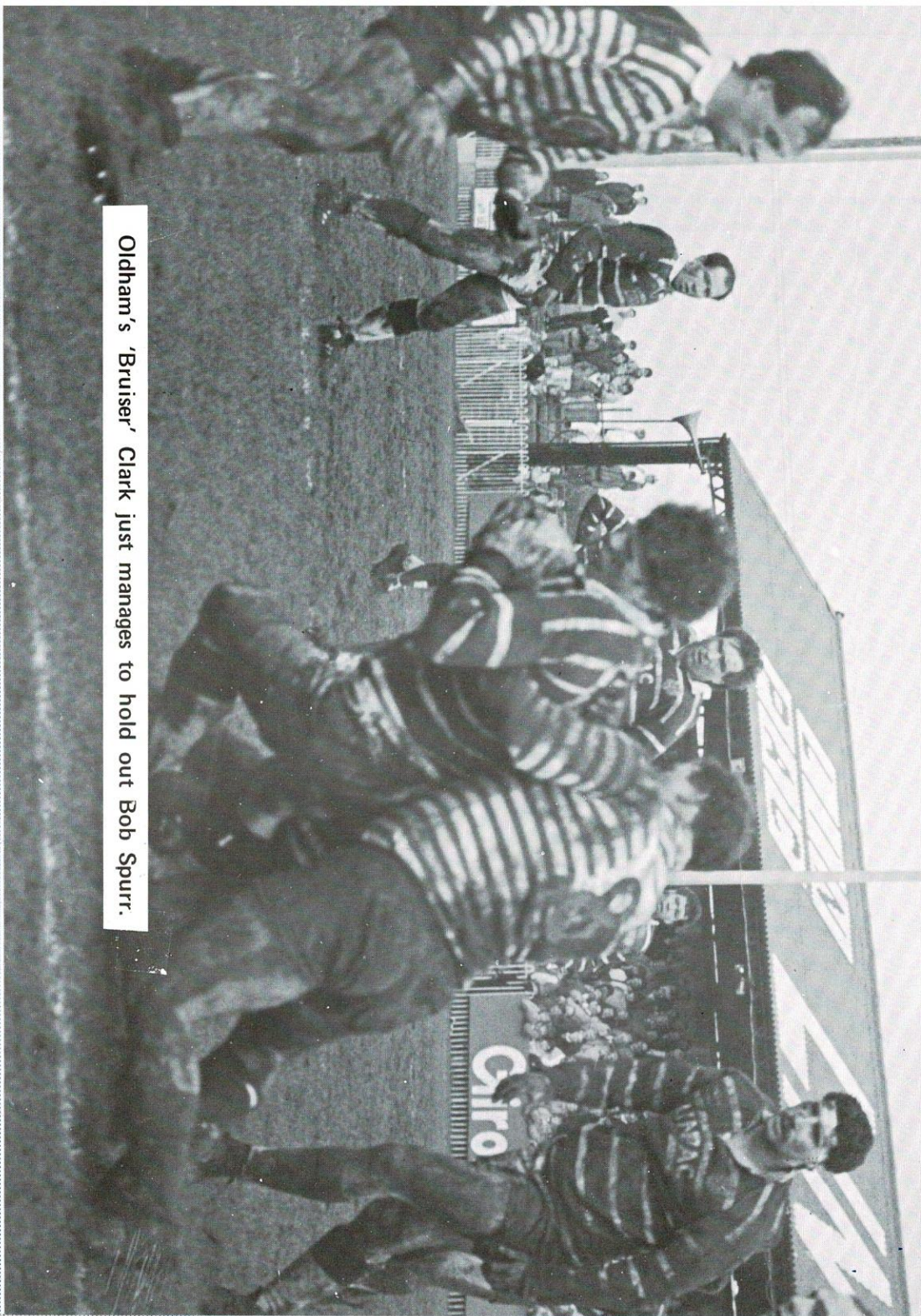

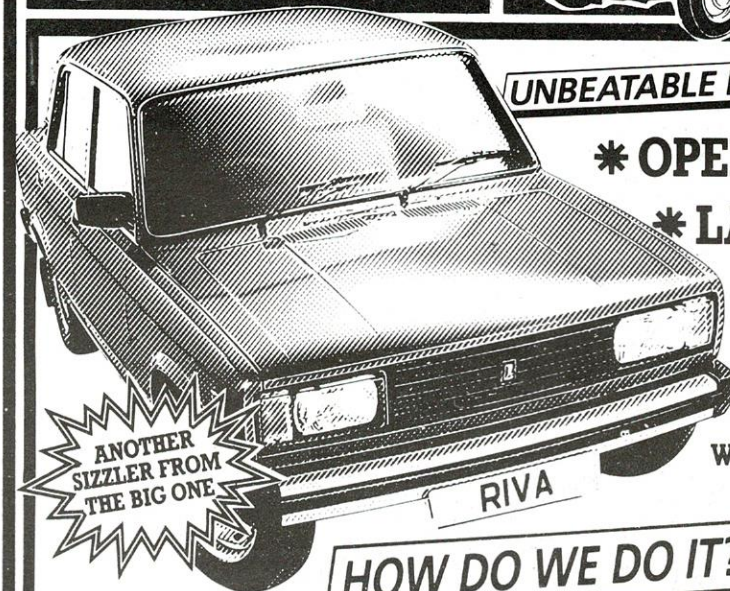
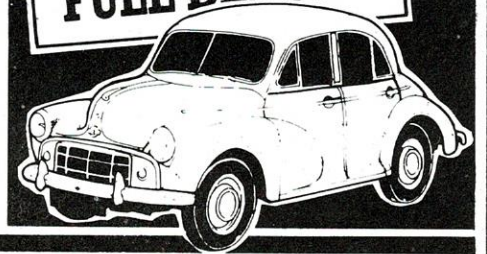

Laurie Gant could carry the title of "Mr. Rugby League" for he has done everything in the game that can be done.

He came back from the war and was demobilized from the Royal Navy in 1946, having served with distinction in the North African campaign, in convoys and D-Day landings. His war time experiences had whetted his appetite for more excitement so he signed professional forms with Wakefield Trinity in 1947. After 2 years he transferred to Featherstone Rovers and was a key member in the second row in the Cup exploits that led up to Rovers first appearance at Wembley in 1952 against Workington Town.

Two extracts from the account of that famous final are worth quoting: "Town got a magnificent start when Risman hoisted over a penalty in the first minute and they needed that encouragement for Rovers hit back with a great break by forward Laurie Gant, who had recovered from 'flu in time to play, and had a narrow squeak when Millar rammied a penalty against an upright". The report ends with this paragraph: "Town's 18-10 win valued by many League enthusiasts as one of the best seen at Wembley, but Rovers still had their glory to come, particularly the courageous Gant, who was to return with Featherstone as winning coach in 1967.

He made 112 appearances for Rovers, scored 15 tries and kicked 1 goal, making a total of 47 points.

Laurie Gant was transferred to Hunslet in 1953 and then took up coaching. His amateur successes are too numerous to mention, but suffice to say, as one would expect from Laurie, schools and amateur rugby benefitted enormously from his enthusiasm, expertise and knowledge. Being a man of tremendous energy and "joie de vivre" coaching was not enough for him and he took up refereeing. He was promoted to grade 2 in 1959 and grade 1 in 1960. Did not take Laurie long to reach the top again, did it? Typical of this ambitious man he did not stop there, but went on to referee County and International matches.

In 1956 he was invited to manage Doncaster RLFC which he did for two years. In the season 1966/67 he became coach at Post Office Road. As always with this man he had his sights set for the top and this is a

brief synopsis of his successes whilst in charge of the Rovers. To start with he held the post at Rovers for five years, no mean feat when you think of the Featherstone fan who said that there had been more coaches at Post Office Road than there were coaches in Wallace Arnold's garage!! His successes include 1966/67 Yorkshire Cup final. Challenge Cup win in 1967, and Yorks Cup finalists in 1968 and 1969. Afterwards he became Manager at York RLFC.

How he managed to fit so much into his life it is hard to know when you consider these facts. In the last 25 years he has encouraged the foundation of many A.R.L. clubs, coached Italian coaches in this country in 1957, toured Italy to coach R.L. in 1958, toured South Africa in 1962. Took two tours of teenagers to France, and last but not least he spent two seasons coaching and spreading A.R.L. at Butlin's Holiday Camps!

He has helped and encouraged A.R.L. in the Barnsley and Sheffield areas, and has also helped to introduce the game to Universities in Swansea, Oxford, Loughboro and Reading. Also he has pioneered the game in such areas as London, Milton Keynes, Glasgow, Edinburgh, Gainsbro not forgetting many visits to the more traditional areas of Rugby League.

For 26 years he was chief coach at the National Sports centres at Bisham Abbey, Lilleshall and Crystal Palace teaching R.L. coaches and awarding coaching certificates. He retired as National Coach three years ago.

As a player he was known as the "Original T.V. Hard Man" and as the "Human Dynamo" during the Cup exploits of 1952.

In 1981 this wonderful man was awarded the M.B.E. in the New Years Honours list for his service to Rugby League.

There is not room to list all the wonderful work Laurie has done for our game, and I have only picked the high-lights. To know this man is an honour in itself, and to put everything in perspective he still keeps the Rovers players boots in tip top order!

Laurie Gant, M.B.E. a gentleman of the highest order, congratulations and thanks for what you have done for Rugby League and thank goodness you have spent so much time with Featherstone Rovers.

# The History of RUGBY LEAGUE by Ian Clayton

*A series continued from last season which recalls the games chequered past.*

## 1931-32 - The North-South Divide

A message was received from the Southern Hemisphere in which the New South Wales and New Zealand Rugby Leagues stated that the "poaching of their players by rich English clubs would no longer be tolerated". Agreement was later reached after the English Rugby League suggested that a £200 tax would be paid by club's wishing to import players.

The economic depression began to bite on the poorer clubs. Players at LEIGH were owed money from the previous season, this was later paid by their Chairman, Councillor Heginbottom and the club continued. The KEIGHLEY club were also in serious debt, but local tradesmen gathered round to ensure the club's future. FEATHERSTONE ROVERS announced a "policy of desperation" this meant selling their best players in order to continue.

It was announced that no agreement could be reached to play the Challenge Cup Final at Wembley. The Football Association had a longer standing agreement with the Wembley authorities and refused to change their date. It was also stated that the economic depression had severely affected crowd potential, but this

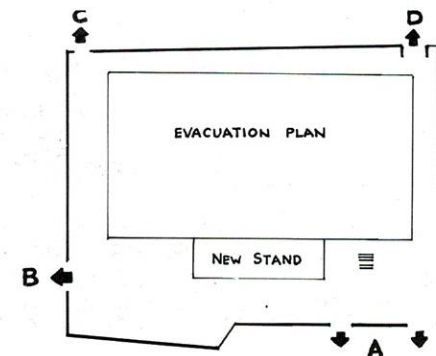
was regarded as a minor setback and the Rugby League would continue with their attempts to establish the fixtures as a national attraction.

The Cup Final was eventually played at Central Park, Wigan between LEEDS and SWINTON, the Loiners winning 11-8. The attendance was disappointing. 40,000 had been expected and less than 30,000 turned up. Again the depression was blamed.

ST HELENS won the Championship Final played at BELLE VUE Wakefield, beating the fancied HUDDERSFIELD 9-5. The Fartowners were also runners-up in the Yorkshire League, pipped by HUNSLET. The mighty SAINTS however were easily champions of the Lancashire League, finishing five clear points above SALFORD. The County Cups were won by HUDDERSFIELD who beat HUNSLET 4-2 at Headingley and SALFORDS RED DEVILS who beat SWINTON 10-8 at The Cliffe, Broughton.

Each member Club may nominate a player from its own club, the principal qualification being that the player must have been at the Club for at least the last four consecutive seasons. Judging is done by a panel of senior referees.

1988 represents the 30th anniversary of the award, the first winner, in 1958, being Eric Cooper of Wakefield Trinity. The winner in 1987 was David Noble of Doncaster, and other famous names to have won the award in the last 30 years include Garfield Owen of Halifax, Lewis Jones of Leeds, Arthur Keegan of Hull, David Topliss of Wakefield Trinity, Peter Smith of Featherstone Rovers and John Joyner of Castleford.
