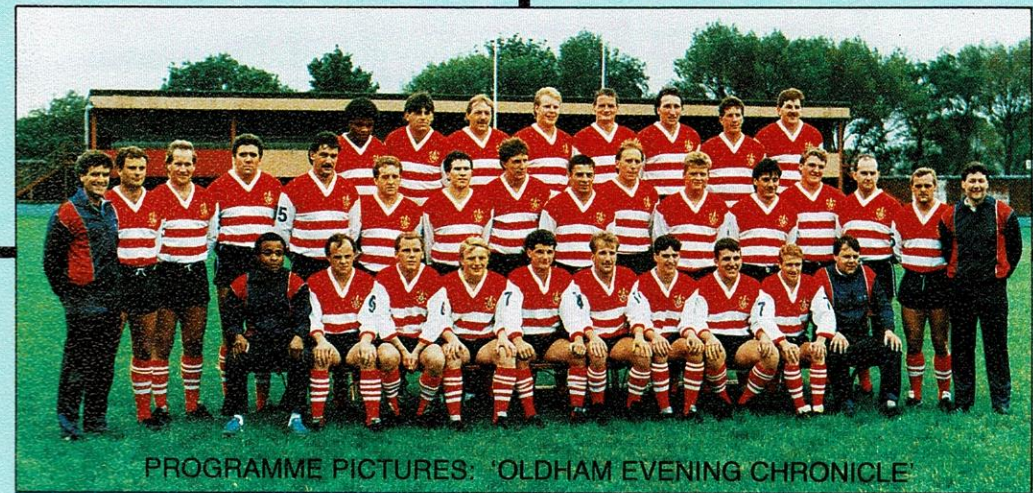

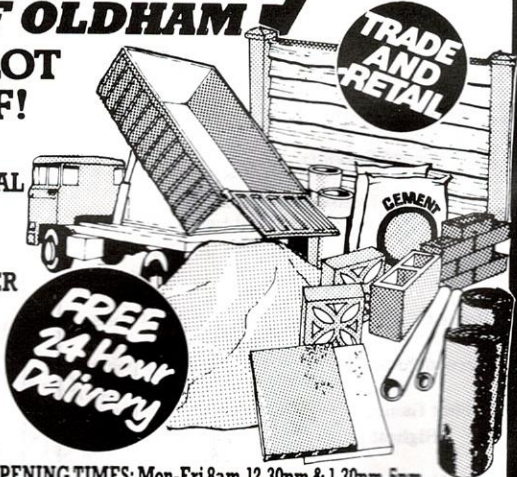

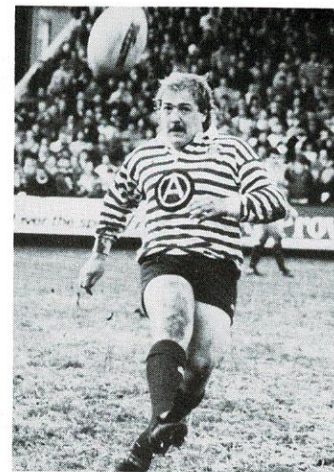

FOLLOW THE 'A' TEAM

THE young Oldham reserve side extended its winning run to eight consecutive victories with a 28-6 victory at Featherstone last Friday night - a victory which should have put the side in good heart for yesterday's trip to Barrow in the quarter-final of the Slalom Lager Alliance Cup.

Iain MacCorquodale's lads qualified for the last eight with a terrific victory against First Division leaders Widnes at Naughton Park and no praise can be too high for the way in which the team shocked the Chemics and produced their first home defeat of the season.

Despite losing Ian Bates with ankle ligament trouble in the first half and conceding first-half penalties 10-1, the Oldham whiz-kids blitzed Widnes with 14 points in the first ten minutes of the second-half to set up a thrilling finish which ended with the visitors just hanging on to achieve a memorable triumph.

Every man played his part, but special mention was probably merited by Keith Atkinson, Paul Lord, Chris Myler, Richard Irving, Ian Sherratt, Martin Hall, Leo Casey, Mick Bardsley and Tony Morrison.

The power of props Sherratt and Casey, plus the strong running of Bardsley, Morrison and, in the later stages, Bob Marsden, more than matched the Widnes forwards and the fast backs did the rest with Atkinson enjoying an outstanding game at full back and Lord and Myler each scoring long-range tries in the first half.

Another super run by Myler put Irving over in the second-half and then a set-piece move enabled Hall to handle cleverly to unleash Casey on a 30-yard run to the line. Four goals by Atkinson completed the scoring for Oldham as the side stretches out for both league and cup honours.

Six consecutive league wins have lifted the side from mid-table to a position from which it can make a genuine challenge for promotion if the form is maintained. That was underlined only three days after the Widnes epic when, with a side missing Sherratt and Lord, the 'A' team stunned Featherstone at Post Office Road to score five tries to one in a 28-6 victory.

In-form Atkinson raced away for two tries in the first half one from literally on his own line - and there were more to follow from Paul Sherman, Richard Irving and Steve Patterson as Rovers fell apart and conceded 14 points in the last ten minutes.

The side is not only winning but playing top-quality, crowd-pleasing rugby. The wingers at Widnes got 20 passes and in the last five games practically every member of the team has scored - a tribute to the coaching of 'Corky'.

Barrow wanted to make yesterday's quarter-final tie a midweek match, but we stuck out for weekend to give our boys the best possible chance of victory, with more time to travel up and prepare properly.

We were hoping for victory - naturally - and confident of success in view of the team's form over the past couple of months.

The tackling is quick and decisive, the running is strong and forthright - Trevor Croston was particularly good in this respect at Featherstone - and the quality of the football is credit to everyone associated with the side.

Keep up the goodwork lads, and irrespective of what happened up in Barrow yesterday, let's have a real crack at promotion over the next few weeks. The players, incidentally, are keen to point out that they were delighted with their support at Huddersfield, Widnes and Featherstone, and from them a big thank you to the fans.

WITH THE SUPPORTERS CLUB

BARRING one of the biggest surprises of recent years, we will see Oldham, Featherstone and Wakefield back in the First Division next season, though not necessarily in that order. The three clubs are currently involved in one of the tightest, neck-and-neck Second Division title battles for years, but we think it says much for the spirit of Rugby League that there is still a lot of goodwill among the three clubs - and a lot of friendships made - as the championship battle heightens in what should be a thrilling finale.

At Featherstone two weeks ago, our supporters were well looked after and there was a lot of friendly banter and happy rivalry despite the closeness of the score and the importance of the game.

When Wakefield came here, you will recall, their coach David Topliss later wrote a letter to the Oldham RLFC Supporters' Club in which he said how touched he was to find the Oldham fans so gracious in defeat and so warm and friendly towards his team. David included four stand tickets for the return game at Belle Vue next month and these are to be raffled off to raise money for our club, details of which you will be hearing about soon. With praise, of course, goes responsibility and we feel we must mention that as we have now set standards throughout the game - don't forget that the Runcorn club also praised Oldham fans after the game at Canal Street - it is absolutely imperative that we keep up the good work and prove to everyone, home and away, that Oldham fans are true supporters of the GAME as well as our own CLUB.

In reply to "Toppo's" letter from Wakefield, we sent him a video recording of the Oldham-Wakefield match and, in return, the Trinity club sent us a copy of their video for the match against Featherstone - a tape that no doubt came in handy as our coaches prepared for our two recent matches against Rovers.

A lot of goodwill has been built up by Oldham fans this season and in our remaining games, especially those on away grounds at Bramley, Sheffield, Rochdale, Wakefield and Carlisle, we must all make sure that not only is our reputation untarnished, but indeed enhanced.

We have never been to Sheffield before so there is a lot of good pioneer work to undertake when we go to the Owlerton Stadium and our next trip, to Rochdale, will be a particularly poignant one as it will form the last match to be played at the Athletic Grounds. We want our side to win, and win well, but we must also make sure that, as supporters, we must help to make it a glorious finale for rugby at the Athletic Grounds whatever the result.

A big welcome today to all our fellow fans from Workington. We hope for a good, clean game and, at the end of it, we trust you will have a safe and happy journey home to Cumbria. Our canteens around the ground are open for refreshments and the souvenir hut is open for the sale of sweaters, scarves, badges etc.

In my view he has grasped an opportunity this season and benefited by having an extended run of first-team rugby. This has resulted in an improvement in nearly all aspects of his play.

Having said that, Neil is conscious that improved training methods have helped him to develop a level of consistency which has not let anyone down. Now that he has agreed terms on his new contract, it will hopefully enable him to continue his improvement.

Another plus for the club was Leo Casey's introduction to senior rugby at Featherstone - another young lad, when called into action, 'did not let the side down' and who will, without doubt, have not only enjoyed the experience, but will have benefited from it.

CONGRATULATIONS to our 'A' team. Under Iain's guidance we have progressed past Widnes into the quarter-finals of the Alliance Cup. On a night when brave hearts were needed, the team endured» great pressure from opponents and some extremely 'iffy' refereeing to triumph against all odds against a reserve side previously unbeaten at Naughton Park this season.

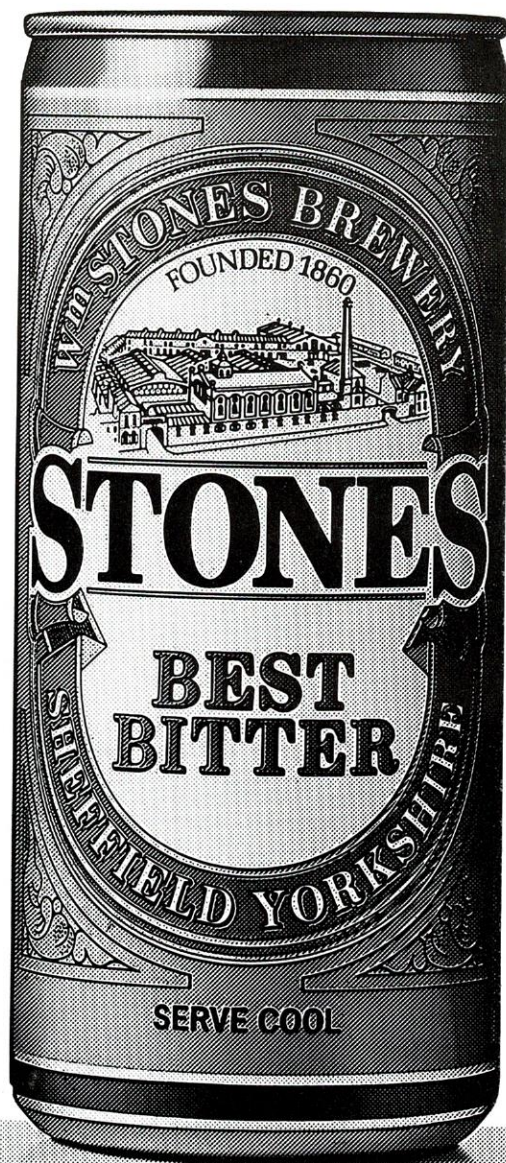

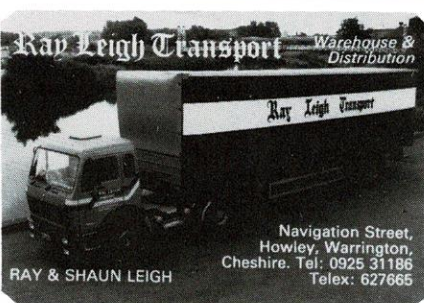

Japan and California will host major international Rugby League events in the next 14 months if plans are approved by the June meeting of the International Board in Australia.

The success of the Wigan-Manly game at the start of this season has led to serious talking on a world club championship play-off in Japan in May next year, while Palm Beach is set to house the World Cup final in September featuring Australia against Great Britain or New Zealand.

These big plans have emerged from a top-level meeting in Hawaii recently between our own David Oxley, secretary of the Rugby League, and Australia's Ken Arthurson, president of the Australian League and a Major power in the International Board.

Japan are always keen to stage major sports events - as Liverpool and Notts Forest will testify! - while the choice of California for the World Cup final is based on the success of the State of Origin game between New South Wales and Queensland which was played in the States towards the end of last year.

The Aussies have been promoting League in Californian universities and high schools and the game's top-brass at international level think there is a chance that our great game will really take off Stateside in the not-too-distant future.
