

NEW-LOOK TOWN LED BY MAURICE



CUMBRIANS Workington caused more than a few ripples around the Rugby League in the summer when they announced the capture as coach of former Leeds and Great Britain supremo Maurice Bamford.

Maurice, who succeeds Norman Turley as the Derwent Park boss, did'nt take long to recruit one of the game's longest-serving and best-known forwards as skipper — the former Leeds captain and Test hooker David Ward.

Ward was player-coach at Hunslet last season, but he has now renewed his old partnership with Maurice up in Cumbria and the Town board's ambition and enterprise looks like paying off because they won three of their first four games this season and will be keen to give Oldham a severe test in the first round of the Grunhalle Lancashire Cup.

"I'm enjoying it very much," says Maurice. "The pressure isn't quite as intense as that in the First Division, although it is still there if you want to do well — and we certainly want to do that at Derwent Park."

Most of the Town team is made up of Cumbrians with plenty of recruitment having taken place all around the county, from such well-known amateur strongholds as Maryport, Millom and Ellenborough.

One thing is for sure, Town should not fear anyone in the scrums, judging by the presence in the front-row of Ray Tabern, David Ward and Colin Falcon — a solid, experienced and wordly-wise trio of scrummagers who should at least ensure today's visitors of an equal share of possession.

Tabern, the former Leigh and Lancashire hooker, now in his third season with the Cumbrians, can play No. 9 or No. 8 with equal distinction and it was his ball-playing skills that caused Oldham desperate problems in a Second Division match at Derwent Park last season.

In the end, Oldham won through, but in needed a grand fightback on a day when it was so cold that Charlie McAlister and Bryan McCarthy suffered from hypothermia.

Town could well line up today something like this: Lowden; Gorge, Penrice, Mawson, Beck;

Smith, Rea; Tabern, Ward, Falcon, Sullivan, Vannett, Higgins.





WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

IT should be D for debut day at Watersheddings today with the distinct possiblity of Aussie Paul Taylor and Yorkshire lad John Fairbank making their first home appearances and Aussie pair Ashley Gilbert and Chris O'Sullivan wearing Oldham jerseys for the first time.

We warmly welcome all the new boys and trust they will have a successful and happy association with the club, starting with today's game against Workington Town in the first round of the Grunhalle Lancashire Cup.

Paul, from Parramatta, was here four years ago when he helped an Oldham team that also included Terry Flanagan, Paddy Kirwan, Des Foy and Colin Hawkyard to finish fifth in the First Division — our highest rating in the two-division set-up.

John, originally from Elland, was signed from Leeds last weekend as part of the Hugh Waddell deal and went in as substitute at Featherstone. With Andy Ruane playing only his second game and Taylor in at loose-forward for the first time, it was felt there would be too many new boys in at once if Fairbank was also in the starting line-up.

Aged 21, Fairbank is the youngest of the famous Fairbank farmers and younger brother of Mark, who was here until he joined Keighley in an £8,000 deal last season. A BARLA international, John was chased by a host of First Division clubs before signing for Leeds last season to leave a lot of clubs bitterly disappointed.

Maurice Bamford, Leeds boss at the time and now in charge of today's visitors Workington, is convinced that John has a big future in the game. Says Maurice: "John is a cracking prospect. He is, without doubt, the best field-side prop in the game for his age."

Gilbert and O'Sullivan — what a great duo for the headline writers! — were due to have arrived last Thursday and should, by now, be settling down at the club and in the town with their wives and families. Incidentally, Paul Taylor's wife Debbie is keen to find work in a bar or restaurant locally so if anyone has any ideas or openings they could leave a message for Paul at the club and it will be passed on to him.

Ashley Gilbert, like O'Sullivan; comes from the Canberra Raiders club in Queenbeyan, a town in New South Wales that is just outside the capital territory of Canberra. He is a strongrunning second-row forward who has a liking for scoring tries — and he has a record to prove it.

He is also a good defender, but it is his tryscoring feats that have caught the eye in the Sydney League's Winfield Cup competition. He was one of the leading forward try-scorers in 1987 and, in the Aussie season that finished last weekend with the Grand Final, he was again well up in the try-scoring charts for forwards, actually leading the list at one stage.

O'Sullivan also comes with a big reputation. He is the Canberra Raiders' regular outside-half in a side that reached last year's Grand Final and also got to the semi-finals of this year's competition. Well-known colleagues of O'Sullivan and Gilbert, in a Raiders team that has been one of Sydney's strongest forces in the past two years, include Mal Meninga, Ivan Henjak (also linked with us at one stage), big Sam Backo, who is going to Leeds, Gary Belcher, who is at Castleford, Peter Jackson, the centre who starred in the recent Test series with Great Britain, and winger John Ferguson, the former Wigan star who was the top winger in Sydney last season.

You can see, therefore, that all our Aussies are used to playing with and against the best, Taylor having spent many years with a Parramatta club that has boasted stars such as Mick Cronin, Ray Price, Peter Sterling, Brett Kenny and many more of Australia's leading players.

These, then, are the boys who are coming into the club for the season that stretches ahead. Going out, and no doubt many will be sorry to see him go, is Hugh Waddell. As a club we do not make a practice of revealing the details of transfer market activity, but if you consider the value of John Fairbank as part of the deal it was certainly a record transfer for the club.

Hugh, of course, has not been happy and settled at Oldham for some time. There has been a long-running disagreement over the terms of his contract and for many weeks now there has been rumour of Leeds coming in for him, as well as talk of Hugh eventually returning to Australia, either as player-coach of a country team or as a target for Parramatta, who were impressed with his displays Down Under last summer.

The offer from Leeds was regarded as too good to refuse, when considering all the facts and all the implications. We have sold a forward of 30, bought a forward of 21 on a three-year contract, and received a fee of nearly four times the amount we paid to Blackpool for Hugh's services only 18 months ago.

The board feels that it has done a good stroke of business and it feels time will prove the wisdom of the deal.

EXPERT PANEL CHOOSE NINE GREATS FOR WHITBREAD TROPHY HALL OF FAME

Nine Rugby League legends have been selected to enter the first-ever Whitbread Trophy Hall of Fame, to be opened in October.

The highest individual honour in the history of the 13-a-side code has been bestowed on:

Billy Batten, Alex Murphy, Albert Rosenfield, Brian Bevan, Jonty Parkin, Jim Sullivan, Billy Boston, Gus Risman and Harold Wagstaff.

Entry has been restricted to players who graced the British scene for the majority of their career. Only players who have been retired for at least 10 years were considered.

The Whitbread Trophy Hall of Fame is being developed at the Bentley Arms, Oulton, Leeds to be officially opened on Monday, 24th October. It will feature extensive displays of Rugby League memorabilia.

Rugby League chairman Bob Ashby said, "These nine players are the all-time best and the cream of the game in Britain. It was not easy to limit our selection but inclusion in the Whitbread Trophy Hall of Fame is intended as the highest honour a Rugby League player can be given."

The official panel who made the selections were: Bob Ashby (Rugby League Chairman), David Oxley (Secretary-General), David Howes (Public Relations Officer), Robert Gate (Official Rugby League historian) and Ray Fletcher (Yorkshire Post).

BILLY BATTEN

Began his career with Hunslet in 1907. One of the game's finest centres, renowned for spectacularly hurdling tacklers. Transferred to Hull for a record £600 in 1913. Joined Wakefield Trinity in 1926 and finished his career with Castleford in 1927.

BRIAN BEVAN

Came to England from Australia in 1945 as an unknown trialist. Warrington right wing from 1945-64. Scored a world record 769 tries in 688 first-class fixtures. Scored 50 or more tries in nine separate seasons.

BILLY BOSTON

A great winger who scored 571 tries in 564 games. Signed by Wigan in 1953. Test career yielded 24 tries in 31 matches. Played for Wigan until 1968 and ended his career in 1970 at Blackpool Borough.

ALEX MURPHY

One of Britains greatest scrum-halves. Debut for native St. Helens age 16 in 1956 and left 10 years, 319 games and 175 tries later. Then spent four years at Leigh and five with Warrington. Test career ran to 27 matches (1958-71).

JONTY PARKIN

Scrum-half. Began his career, age 18, at Wakefield Trinity in 1913 and played the last of his 349 games for Trinity in 1930. Paid his own transfer fee to Hull KR in 1930. Retired in 1932.

GUS RISMAN

Signed for Salford in 1929. Played in the centre, at stand-off or full-back, a phenomenal goal kicker. In 427 games for Salford scored 2,007 points. Joined Workington Town as player coach in 1946 (1,533 points in 301 games). Joined Batley for 1954 season.

ALBERT ROSENFELD


Diminutive Australian winger. Came to England as a five-eighth with the first Australian touring team in 1908. Joined Huddersfield until 1921 when he transferred to Wakefield. Played his last game as a Bradford Northern player in 1924 having scored 396 tries in 378 games.

JIM SULLIVAN

Played League from 1921-46 and established himself as the greatest full-back and most prolific goal-kicker of all time. Signed by Wigan from Cardiff RU in 1921 and stayed for 928 games.

HAROLD WAGSTAFF

Aged 15 on his debut in 1906. A great centre and successful captain. Led Huddersfield's Team of All the Talents'. Played 21 Tests. Retired in 1925 having played 494 games and scored over 200 tries.

OLDHAM 22 — LEEDS 28

TWO interception tries by Garry Schofield, Leeds's world record buy from Hull, was the big difference between the teams in Oldham's first home game in front of a crowd of 6,599 — the best Watersheddings attendance on the first day of the season for many years.

Oldham led 16-14 at half-time before slipping behind 16-24 early in the second half. But a try by Mike Ford, goaled by Charlie McAlister, cut the deficit to two points and it needed a controversial try by Leeds centre Carl Gibson, who appeared to be offside when he picked up to score, to make the game safe for the Yorkshiremen. THE Oldham reserves disappointed at Dewsbury when they lost 24-22 after looking fully capable of winning. From 16-4 down, they pulled back to 16-16 and were attacking strongly when Keith Atkinson failed to put a penalty into touch. Dewsbury went straight to the other end and scored after a trialist winger had been forced into touch on the first tackle — crucial errors in a tight game. Oldham scored four tries through man-of-the-match Mick Bardsley, Martin Hall, Keith Atkinson and Steve Robinson with Atkinson landing three goals.



FEATHERSTONE 18 — OLDHAM 14

TWO breakaway tries by Graham Steadman - haven't we heard that before somewhere? — were crucial factors in Oldham's 18-14 defeat at Post Office Road last Sunday. The Rovers stand-off went 75 yards for his first try and then dealt Oldham the killer blow midway through the second half when he intercepted a wide pass in his own 22-metre zone to go threequarters of the length of the field once again. The game was marred by what was thought to be a serious jaw injury sustained by Charlie McAlister in the first half. McAlister kicked one goal for Oldham and Keith Atkinson two, whilst tries were scored by Leo Casey and Paul Taylor, who had a splendid game on his debut.

Keith Atkinson scored two Oldham goals, while lan Sherratt and Richard Irving scored the tries.

COUNTY CUP COMMENTS

HOLDERS Wigan have been drawn at Barrow in today's first round of the Grunhalle Lager Lancashire Cup. They hope it is a lucky omen as they go in search of an astonishing 20th county cup triumph.

They were also drawn at Barrow in the first round of last season's competition. They won at a canter and went on to win the trophy for the third time in four years.

Wigan chairman Maurice Lindsay said: "We always enjoy our trips to Cumbria and I'm sure we'll take about 2,000 fans with us. Murphy was even pipped to the coachof-the-year award by Widnes boss Doug Laughton.

"We could settle a few scores in this first round," declared Murphy. "It will be tough, but we don't fear any side and will be going into the tie with confidence."

Widnes v St. Helens is the only all-First Division encounter.

Swinton and Leigh, both relegated last season, could provide a feast of entertainment in their first-round clash at Station Road.

Swinton reached the semis last season before crashing to Warrington, who this year are paired with minnows Runcorn Highfield. New club Chorley Borough must travel to Carlisle in the opening round, which means four of their first five games this season are away.

Chorley director Mike Marsland said: "I would have preferred us to have a few games at home to start the season and keep the interest in the new club going. But we face a tough start now in the league cup."


