THE BOSS TALKING

(A personal view by Oldham coach Eric Fitzsimons)



WE displayed a much-improved level of professionalism in the cup-tie against Workington. Despite the fact that they were Second Division opposition (N.B. we did lose four times last year to Second Division opposition) the players never treated Workington as such.

Their respect was shown by the way we controlled the ball, reduced our mistakes and supported the ball-runners on every occasion. It is vital that we achieve the same principles match by match in our campaign for success this season.

The atmosphere in the dressing room is positive. Players are confident in themselves and in what the team can achieve. The overseas signings are obviously going to have a part to play and it is important that we pitch our personal standards upwards towards them, rather than them slowly tumbling into bad habits and poorer standards than those which they are used to.

I have every confidence in them. They are already contributing at training, in the dressing room, and off the pitch. Paul Taylor and Chris O'Sullivan may turn out to be two of the most valuable overseas signings Oldham have had for many years, and although Ashley Gilbert is taking more time to settle in I am confident he will contribute much when he finds his feet in English football.

Leo Casey has proved himself at this level and continues to improve. They used to call Len Casey 'cast-iron Casey'. Comparisons will inevitably be made, but I think Leo has a quiet strength and a good attitude that enables him to 'express' himself in the right way. Once he gets his stamina to 100-per-cent, he will be well on his way to recognition.

For the first time in 12 months I have had the luxury of genuine options for positions. Against Castleford last week five back-row forwards were available for three places. Terry Flanagan and Colin Hawkyard were selected for the bench jobs eventually . . . two players who have both made their presence felt in every game to date. Terry's form is first-class. His basketball pass to Paul Round for his try against Workington was a peach. Most players slow down a bit in their benefit season, but Terry has stepped up a gear. He has impressed me with his all-round game.

Colin's attacking game is much improved this season and his defence never alters. He is a tireless 'team man' and a thorough professional in every sense. I sincerely hope that the public of Oldham will get behind Colin in his testimonial year, in the same way you are doing with Terry.

Finally, a big welcome to John Henderson. I wish him the best of luck at Oldham. He has come home to fulfill his ambition to play as a Roughyed.

WELCOME TO ROVERS

HULL KR, the Red Robins of East Hull, have hit the headlines in recent times, not only with the sale of their Craven Park ground, on which they are probably playing their final season, but for the capture of Welsh RU star David Bishop and the re-signing of their great servant from Aussie club Cronulla, Gavin Miller.

The ball-playing second-row man from Down Under may not be in action today because he has finally won Test recognition and he will be playing for the green-and-golds against New Zealand in Auckland next weekend in the World Cup final.

Oldham certainly won't lose any sleep if Miller is already on the plane to link up with his Kangaroos team mates. He actually made his debut in the English game here at Watersheddings and had a blinder in a Rovers victory. And who will forget his terrific play when the Robins, apparently down and out, staged that remarkable fightback at Boundary Park in March, 1986? Oldham led 16-0 at the interval, but lost 20-16 as Miller inspired the Robins to a big revival.

Miller has come a long way since those days, of course. He has recently finished a magnificent season for Cronulla in Sydney, winning an Australian Test jumper, the Dally Messenger Gold award, the Winfield Cup players' player award and, finally, the New South Wales Rugby League Writers' award.

In 1985-6 he won the English player-of-theyear and players' player-of-the-year awards and, winning the Aussie version of these awards, now makes him unique in the world of Rugby League.

Over the years there have been a lot of downs, as well as ups, for Gavin, but there is no doubt that Miller is now respected and accepted as one of the world's finest Rugby League players.

Rovers also have big hopes for their recruit from the Valleys, David Bishop. The former Welsh RU firebrand is currently learning the rudiments of League half-back play in the standoff position and, by all accounts, is coming along very nicely indeed. Potentially, he is a big star in his new code... and one man who is convinced that Bishop will go right to the top is none other than David Watkins, the man who skippered his country at League and Union, and is now a respected radio commentator on Rugby League.


Watkins is convinced that Bishop will become one of the finest players ever to leave the Valleys to seek fame and fortune in 'the North', and when you consider some of the fabulous players who have come out of South Wales that is one of the finest compliments one could ever make.

Rovers also possess a host of big-name players who, even though they have grown older together in recent years, certainly lack nothing in experience or charisma. One thinks of former Great Britain stars George Fairbairn at fullback, Garry Clarke on the wing, Chris Burton in the second-row, and the versatile Mike Smith, who could be equally at home today at centre, standoff or loose-forward.

Two other Aussies are also here with Miller: Chris Close, who can also play in the backs or forwards with equal effect, and Cronulla hooker or prop Michael Porter, who has been playing at No. 8 in the early matches for the Robins this season.

Rovers have not had the happiest starts to a new campaign and as points are vital to both teams, today's encounter should be quite a classic.

The Rovers boss, one of the longest-serving in the game, is the famous Roger Millward and he will be out for two points from Watersheddings, as will his opposite number Eric Fitzsimons, who knows the importance of a First Division side winning its home games — all the more important for Oldham today following the Garry Schofield-inspired Leeds victory here in the first home match of the season.





WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

WE are delighted to confirm today what you probably read in the Oldham Chronicle on Tuesday . . . figures for the first four months of the current financial year show a profit of between £13,000 and £14,000.

The directors received a mid-term financial report at the board meeting on Monday night and we were pleased to learn that the financial side of the club is improving, a trend that is due in no small measure to the wonderful backing we are receiving from all our loyal and trusted supporters.

The period under review covered April, May, June and July. It was indeed encouraging to learn that we were heading in the right direction at a time when we had a lot of expense involved in our double triumphs in the Second Division championship race and, of course, the Premiership battle.

It would be fair to say that one of the major areas we have tackled in our determined attempts to improve the financial situation lies in off-the-field fund-raising and no praise can be too high for the way in which the Commercial Department has built up the Lifeline membership and for the way in which so many of you, our valued fans, have taken the decision to have a £2-a-week flutter on our Lifeline scheme.

During the period covered by the figures with which we were presented on Monday night, the average weekly Lifeline membership was 1,585 and that provided us with income that was almost as much as came in during the previous 12 months.

That in itself shows a remarkable transformation, but when you consider that Lifeline membership is increasing all the time and that last week's figure was 2,414 you really begin to appreciate how much hard work has gone into this bold venture to push the Lifeline 'take-off' in a really big way.

The details have not yet been released, but suffice to say that it will be the biggest ever pay-out in the club's history.



RECORD TOP PRIZE FOR JOHN PLAYER SPECIAL TROPHY WINNER

TOURNAMENT MARKS 22 YEARS OF SPONSORSHIP

The John Player Special Trophy competition will be worth a record £170,000 to the Rugby League in the 1988-89 season, the 22nd year of Imperial Tobacco's association with the sport.

For the winner there will be the highest-ever first prize of £18,000 — 12.5 per cent more than last season — and prize money will be increased by a similar amount at every stage of the tournament.





FOR YOUR BOOKSHELF

AUSTRALIA's Premiership Grand Final and State of Origin inter-state series are put under the international spotlight in the 1988-89 Rothmans Rugby League Yearbook (£10.95).

The first-ever 20-year dossier of the French National side, plus reviews of the 1987 Tours of Britain by Papua New Guinea and Auckland and New Zealand's visit to Australia, are other round-the-world features.

The Sydney Grand Final analysis details 11 British players who have starred in the Down-Under showpiece, starting with Dick Huddart in the victorious St. George side in 1966. Only one of the 11 — Mervyn Hicks — did not also play in the Rugby League Challenge Cup Final, the Yearbook also listing the seven Australians who have completed the Sydney-Wembley Final double.

Launched in July 1980, the celebrated State of Origin meetings between New South Wales and Queensland are chronicled with results, records, teams and players' registers.

The opening of British Rugby League's new Whitbread Trophy Hall of Fame is marked by special profiles of the nine legendary entrants.

The most comprehensive and accurate compilation of statistics from the past domestic campaign includes an update of the club scene, the major competitions, records, gates, transfers and awards, plus the Alliance and Colts set-ups. Fixtures for the 1988-89 season cover the Stones Bitter Championship and Second Division.

Illustrated with nearly 150 photographs, the Rothmans Rugby League Yearbook is again compiled by Raymond Fletcher of the Yorkshire Post and Rugby League Public Relations Officer, David Howes. It is available from all good bookshops or by post, (plus £1.25 postage and packing) from the Public Relations Department, Rugby Football League, 180 Chapeltown Road, Leeds LS7 4HT.

Rugby League's first official yearbook, packed with over 50 illustrations and articles penned by the game's big-name critics, is now on sale (£5.95, Heinemann Kingswood).

The 160-page, 50,000 word Yearbook, sponsored by British Coal, is a superbly written and well-illustrated record of the code's domestic and international season, spiced with a flavour of conjecture as Yorkshire Evening

Post RL correspondent Trevor Watson names his five star players of last season.

Containing an action-packed selection of colour photographs from many of the epic international, cup and league battles, the yearbook was published on Monday, September 26th and is now available, like the Rothmans publication, in good time for Christmas.

At the launch of the new British Coal-backed Yearbook in Leeds, Rugby League President Les Bettinson said: "Topicality is a main highlight of this new publication with the first chronicle of Great Britain's summer tour Down Under, plus an in-depth preview to the current British campaign.

"The frank and informed comment, which feature throughout the annual, provides a welcome addition to Rugby League's growing library, already blessed with a wealth of statistical information.

"British Coal's backing of the annual reflects their ever-growing support of the 13-a-side game, having already invested in the promotion of the British Coal Nines and the Foundation development programme."

Yearbook editor, Tony Pocock, of publishers Heinemann Kingswood says: "The British Coalsponsored Yearbook is a volume of articles well written and illustrated by people who know the game inside out. It's not a statistical review, but a critical analysis of a season climaxed by Great Britain's brilliant victory over the Australians."

Added British Coal Chairman Sir Robert Haslam: "This is a book for the supporter who savours all that's best in the game. It's for the connoisseur. Well written, well illustrated and well produced, it's a testimony to a memorable season"

In his foreword, Sir Robert says: "Of all contemporary spectator sports, Rugby League is the one with the most appeal for miners and mining folk. Its gritty, uncompromising image has much in common with the miner's character. It is invariably played hard with speed and skills that are a revelation, and a sporting discipline that is the envy of the followers and administrators of our national sports."

In addition to the Yearbook, British Coal also sponsor the Rugby League foundation development programme, which will herald the introduction of a British Coal National Youth League, and an elite under-19 midweek league, and the Rugby League Nines' competition, to be staged at Central Park, Wigan on November 2nd and televised on BBC Sportsnight.
