THE BOSS TALKING

(A personal view by Oldham coach Eric Fitzsimons)



WELCOME to the Saints from Knowsley Road this afternoon. They have had a mixed start to the season, but their side contains some very special players and it will not surprise anyone to see them among the honours this season.

Alex Murphy made a positive move when he appointed Eric Hughes as successor to Clive Griffiths on his coaching staff. Eric is an old friend and I'm pleased to see his change in fortune. Last season he was struggling to find 15 players at Horneast on some weekends. This year he has influence with one of the game's premier clubs.

The progress on Charlie McAlister is encouraging. He could be back within the next couple of weeks. He has worked hard during his enforced lay-off. He prowls like a caged tiger and he has a burning desire to play again.

Unfortunately, Des Foy's injury has hampered us a lot and the absence of both centres has caused problems without doubt. It will be good to be able to pick two from three rather than moving other players around out of position to do a 'patch-up' job.

Charlie's return may also solve the goalkicking duties problem. I consider we have three genuine contenders for the job. No disrespect to Andy Ruane, who has filled in satisfactorily, but goalkicking needs the type of concentration that an 'active' pack member will struggle to provide. It is best suited to wing, centre or full back. It was possible to 'carry' a goalkicker once, but in the present-day First Division it is out of the question. He has to have other strengths and certainly cannot have any outstanding weaknesses, whether they be fitness, temperament, skill deficiencies or simply a lack of discipline.

Goalkicking is a closed skill and requires, in my mind, regular practice. Every player who is a potential kicker at this club is given an in-depth coaching back-up and encouraged to go out and practice. Suffice to say only one player practices regularly without prompting.

The player who argues he does not need practice is a fool. It is the basis for all improvement, whatever you are doing.

Talking of practice, Paul Round has worked extra hard in extra time to eradicate one or two minor problems, as has Mike Ford. One or two concentrated sessions on a particular skill can go a long way towards improved self-confidence. I make this point especially for every player on the ground for today's match, professional or amateur, young or old. It all hinges around skills competence.

We will reach the stage within the next five to ten years where skills competence will need to be at a very high level to compete at professional level. The junior coaching has improved leaps and bounds and I would like to congratulate the Oldham Coaching Scheme contingent for their efforts.

Steve Deakin has taken over as regional coach from Ray Hicks. Ray did a splendid job, turning out more than 50 new coaches in his period of office and Steve will get the same support from everyone in Oldham.

Thanks to all the coaches in the Oldham junior leagues. To Oldham RLFC the fruit of your work is the number of local lads signing professional forms at Watersheddings. To you yourselves, the success is the number of players involved with and enjoying the game of Rugby League at whatever level.

FIRSTLY, it is sad to report that the proposed under-19 pro-am colts competition has suffered a hiccup at Oldham, but given the goodwill that exists on both sides it should soon be all sations go.

Most of the lads who will represent the town are members of Steve Deakin's talented under-19 St Anne's side who last Sunday met Widnes Tigers, unbeaten for 22 games, in the semi-final of the Lancashire Cup.

No success for the schoolboy town teams in their first two fixtures. The under-13s lost 22-8 at Leigh with tries by Green and McAndrew, but were then trounced 48-0 at Wigan. Highlight of both games was the gutsy performance of St. Augustine's John Hough at scrum-half.

Built in the Ian Bates mould, his determination and commitment are first-class and as South Lancs. officials saw both games there are high hopes that he might gain county honours this year.

The under-16s also lost both games — 22-8 at Leigh and 12-0 at Wigan after a hard, fast and entertaining game. Hooker Daniel Wilkins of Radclyffe, who came on one of our Carnegie coaching weekends a couple of years ago, has developed superbly and gave magnificent displays in both games.

The number of schools' rugby fixtures is increasing slowly and by half-term,

Breeze Hill, Kaskenmoor, Counthill, St. Augustine's, Hathershaw, North Chadderton, Saddleworth and Radclyffe will all have played inter-school fixtures.

Over the last couple of weeks on Sunday mornings we have watched several fiercely competitive local derby games — Royton Tigers v St. Anne's under-13, Higginshaw v Waterhead under-17, Oldham Juniors v Saddleworth under-14 — and we have seen good quality rugby in all of them.

The Oldham Juniors v Saddleworth fixture was a real cracker with referee Alan Clarke having a magnificent game. There were so many good things to see.

Lee Bradbury's classic solo try, Chris Eckersley's fine running and Mick Martindale's copybook tackling, but man of the match for me was undoubtedly Martin Birch. He made two try-saving tackles in the first ten minutes and then scored a brilliant try from half-way to clinch a 22-16 victory for the Juniors.

These four players and several others on display are undoubtedly stars of the future. Most of these boys are working hard at all aspects of their game. Several go sprinting, others do weight lifting, while Lee Bradbury has speeded up his reactions by going to Ossie Rowe's karate lessons.

Keep up your commitment, boys, and you will go a long way in the game.

THE SAINTS COME MARCHING IN

THE Saints come marching into Water-sheddings today with all guns blazing following the signing of £78,000 scrum-half Darren Bloor from Salford, the capture of Neath and former Cardiff RU winger Carrington on a reported four-year contract worth £70,000, and the arrival from Australia of Kangaroo Test stars Paul Vautin and Michael O'Connor.

Saints have not had much luck in their team-strengthening plans over the past few months with disappointments over David Bishop, Jonathan Davies and Mal Meninga, who was due to return to Knowsley Road for a second spell until he broke his arm for the third time playing for Australia against a Rest of the World side in Sydney last July.

Welshman Bishop, now with Hull KR, looked certain to be Knowsley Road-bound at one time, and the Saints have never tried to hide their respect for Jonathan Davies, the Welsh fly-half who was offered a mouth-watering contract when Wales returned from a New Zealand tour in the summer.

Saints were willing to give the town hall clock for Davies, but after weeks of speculation he finally decided to say 'no', thus giving the demanding St. Helens public another disappointment as their club strive might and main to match, or even surpass, their old and close rivals Wigan, from the other side of the East Lancs Road.

It was when Meninga was injured that Saints looked to Vautin to fill the vacancy on their overseas quota and, who knows, Vautin might have been Oldham-bound had Saints not stepped in at the 11th hour.

The Test man from Queensland, now resident in Sydney and playing for Manly, has made many appearances for Australia and is noted for his hard and uncompromising defence.

O'Connor, also from Manly and a player who took part in Australia's World Cup final win over New Zealand in Auckland a fortnight ago, is generally regarded to be one of the finest outside backs in the world of Rugby League.

It is said that Saints have paid a fee in the region of £50,000 for less than six months work out of O'Connor, who can kick goals, create tries and score tries with pace, skill and craft.

He has represented Australia at both League and Union and he will be remembered as a star of the Kangaroos 1986 tour of Great Britain when he made a memorable impact on the game in this country.

Shane Cooper, the Kiwi stand-off, is another classy player, who makes Saints tick and although Welsh winger Carrington is something of an unknown quantity in League as yet, Saints are convinced that he can prove a winner in the professional code.

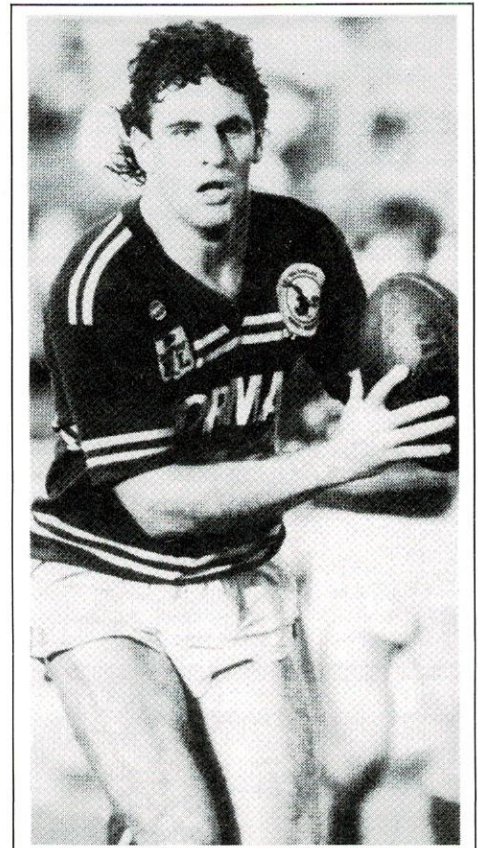
With Phil Veivers at full back and a back

division of Carrington, Loughlin, O'Connor and Quirk, Saints will be a potent force. At half-back, too, they have plenty of permutations available from Bloor, Cooper and Holding.

Burke, Groves, Evans and Forber will fight for front-row spots, and there is plenty of quality in a back-row that can be picked from Fieldhouse, Haggerty, Vautin, Dwyer and Harrison.

There were some red faces around Knowsley Road when Saints lost heavily at Leeds after being knocked out of the Grunhulle Lancashire Cup by Widnes in the first round.

But the signing of Bloor, the capture of Carrington, and the arrival from Down-Under of Vautin and O'Connor has put the Saints back on course and put a smile on the face of coach Alex Murphy, perhaps the most famous Saint of all, despite last week's shock home defeat by Hull.

TO celebrate the opening of the Whitbread Trophy Hall of Fame, Great Britain will entertain a Rest of the World select XIII in a Whitbread Trophy Challenge at Headingley, Leeds, on Saturday (kick-off 2.15 p.m.).

Great Britain, coached by Malcolm Reilly, will meet an invitation side featuring a host of international stars specially flown in from Australia, Papua New Guinea and France. The personality packed line-up will also include leading Test stars currently on short-term contracts in this country.

The celebration fixture is being afforded top billing with the cancellation of the Stones Bitter Championship programme for that weekend, and the gala afternoon will include a parade of the Hall of Fame entrants or their dependants.

Seat tickets can be ordered now, priced £8 from the Ticket Office, the Rugby Football League, 180 Chapeltown Road, Leeds LS7 4HT or from Leeds RLFC. Please enclose a stamped addressed envelope.

Australia's coach Don Furner is being flown in to take charge of the Rest of the World side — and invitations have gone out to many top stars including Wally Lewis, Allan Langer, John Ferguson and many others.

Furner, the Kangaroo supremo, has been coach of the national side since 1986 with an international track record of 11 victories from 13 Test encounters and he headed Australia's World Cup Final win against New Zealand in Auckland a fortnight ago. Sadly, Lewis broke his arm in that match so he cannot come.

The Rest of the World side will feature a host of international Test stars to be brought over from Australia, Papua New Guinea and France, with the remainder of the top-line players being recruited from the short-term contract players currently on duty in Britain, among them Michael O'Connor and Paul Vautin (St. Helens), Shane Cooper (St. Helens), Steve Roach, Les Davidson and Phil Blake (Warrington), Gavin Miller (Hull KR), Gary Belcher (Castleford), Sam Backo, Cliff Lyons, Andrew Ettingshausen (Leeds) and the clutch of Kiwis at Wigan.

Furner gained Test caps for Australia, including the 1956 Kangaroo Tour, in a playing career with Toowoomba, Brisbane and Queensland. A 13-year coaching stint with Queanbeyan Blues was followed with service for Sydney Suburbs, Monaro and Canberra, plus representative duties with New South Wales Country in 1969 and 1975-77.

One of the most respected coaches in international Rugby League, Furner will work with the Rest of the World squad during this week, leading up to the Whitbread Trophy Challenge match from their base at the Leeds Hilton Hotel.

1988 BRITISH COAL NINES

A REST of the World side, featuring a galaxy of overseas Test stars, is the showcase entry in the 1988 British Coal Nines to be staged at Central Park, Wigan on Wednesday, 2 November.

The World side, coached by Australian supremo Don Furner, will combine the band of international players flown round-the-world for the Whitbread Trophy Hall of Fame Challenge match at Leeds four days previously, and a selection of the overseas imports undertaking British club duty.

The top-six British clubs will also be joined by a new President's IX under the command of Rugby League President and Great Britain manager Les Bettinson. His selection will be from clubs not taking part in the 9-a-side tournament and candidates include former Welsh Rugby Union stars David Bishop, Adrian Hadley, Gary Pearce and Mike Carrington, plus ex-England RU star Peter Williams.

The half-dozen club sides taking part are the top-ranked from last season's Stones Bitter Championship . . . Widnes, St. Helens, Wigan, Bradford Northern, Leeds and Warrington.

The first-ever British Coal Nines was launched at Wigan last October with the home side beating Castleford 10-0 in the final in front of a crowd of 6,529.

The British Coal tournament carries prize money of £25,000, with £6,000 for the winners, £4,000 for the runners-up, £3,000 to the second-round losers and £2,000 each for the first-round losers.

The 9-a-side competition kicks-off at 7.00 p.m. with the final commencing at 9.20 p.m.

Last year's innovation of a ladies 9-a-side encounter between the second semi-final and the final will be repeated with Crosfields Ladies meeting Guiseley Angels.

Highlights of the British Coal Nines will be televised on BBC TV's Sportsnight later the same evening.

Rugby League Chairman Bob Ashby said: "The British Coal Nines made an impressive debut last season, the showcase event being further strengthened this year by the inclusion of the top-class Rest of the World sided and the introduction of the President's IX which will put on display a host of the new personalities gracing the 13-a-side code this season."

British Coal chairman Sir Robert Haslam said: "The Nines tournament was an instant success with players and supporters last year, and I'm sure we can look forward to another feast of enterprising rugby at Central Park, Wigan, on 2 November."

"The tournament has all the ingredients . . . there's the local-derby rivalry generated by the presence of four top clubs from Lancashire; the added spice provided by traditional arch-rivals from Yorkshire and the mystery and surprise element of two specially selected sides.

"British Coal are proud to be sponsoring the event, and there will be a large coal-industry contingent from both Lancashire and Yorkshire coalfields for what I hope will be a well-supported tournament."

WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

THE Des Foy decision. . . the forthcoming share issue. . . and the Mick Bloor speculation. These have been the major talking points among the club's supporters since our last home game against Hull KR on October 2.

Des has decided to accept the three-year contract offer from Australian club Newcastle Knights which means that he will be emigrating to Sydney with his wife Patricia and two small boys towards the end of January.

The Oldham club did everything possible to keep him in the Watersheddings frame, not only by offering him a three-year deal here but giving him permission to play Down Under during our off-season, and letting him know that, by the end of his three-year term, he would be lined up for a testimonial.

There is no doubt that Des would have had more earning power doing it our way than he will have by going to Newcastle, but in his own mind 'it's not all about money' and he and his wife have decided they want to build a new life in the country of sun, sand and surf, while Des is eagerly looking forward to playing in the Sydney League.

There is nothing else we can do. The International Board agreement is not exactly the most popular decision ever made so far as we are concerned, as you are no doubt aware of through comments made in the Press, but the Rugby League have endorsed it so we have to reluctantly accept that we will get for Des the statutory £18,000.

If and when he returns to play in this country there is legislation to compensate us if he goes to another English club, but in the meantime all we can do is wish Des all the best in his new life Down Under and trust that everything will go according to plan for the whole family.

On the share issue, it is now established that the Oldham club will float 750,000 ordinary shares at £1 each with a minimum holding of 25 shares and a maximum of approximately five-per-cent of the total issue.

The articles of association will prevent a 'one-man-band' and encourage the spread of shares over a wide field.

The launch, to be handled by Stockport-based public relations firm, John Fowler and Partners, is scheduled to take place soon and, initially, more than 25,000 copies of a 30-page glossy prospectus will be circulated.

Anyone purchasing at least £600-worth of shares in the first £500,000 will be entitled to tax relief under the Business Expansion Scheme. Relief will be based on the individual's rate of tax, 25% of 40%.

Anyone investing £5,000 and paying 40% tax will get obtainable relief of £2,000. The net cost of the investment would be £3,000 and the real cost per share would be only 60p.

Using the same figures for someone paying 25% tax, the real cost per share would be 75p.

Says director Greg Pache: "It is crucial to the success of the share issue for the majority of supporters and Oldham people to subscribe. We wish to encourage small investors to take up shares in the capital of the company.

"The directors also hope that Rugby League people in general will wish to take up shares and that RL followers throughout the United Kingdom will invest.

"We are also keen for local companies and businesses to become followers of the club and subscribe to the share issue, thus promoting their own company alongside that of the Rugby club."

Brokers dealing with the sale will be Bell, Houldsworth, Fairmount of Manchester and the auditors will be Ogden and Partington of Oldham. The nationally-known Peat, Marwick and McLintock firm of accountants will be heavily involved, as will Manchester-based solicitors Alsop, Wilkinson.

NatWest, Oldham, will handle the banking arrangements.

Mike Bloor, the Salford vice-chairman and a man who is well-known locally as head of Saffron Construction Co. Ltd., just across the road from here on Broadbent Road, has accepted an invitation to join the Oldham board and he is expected to move in with us as soon as he has 'tied up loose ends' down at the Willows. Mike is a well-known figure in the town and he has immense connections locally in the amateur game, through his love of Rugby League, and with Oldham Corporation through his business.

He was invited to join us after we met him for long talks in which he outlined many considerable plans concerned with the improvement of our Watersheddings ground.

There is a vast amount of work to be done on the upgrading of our famous old stadium and Mike has the connections to help us considerably and the knowledge, of course, that whatever we do to improve the surroundings or get the social club full every night there is no real substitute for putting a top-class side on the field.

Mike, alongside Salford chairman John Wilkinson, has done much to put Salford on the right road in the last couple of years and we are confident that his decision to throw his weight behind what we are doing here at Watersheddings will be a major tonic for the club and a big step in the right direction.

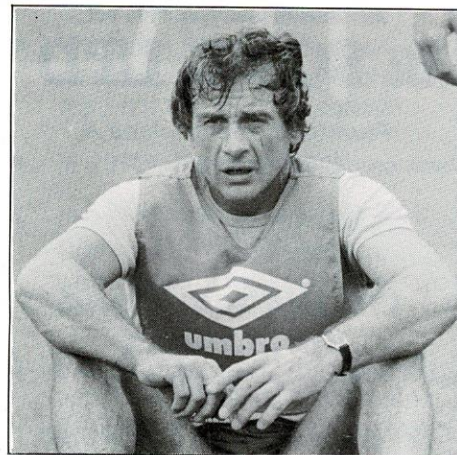

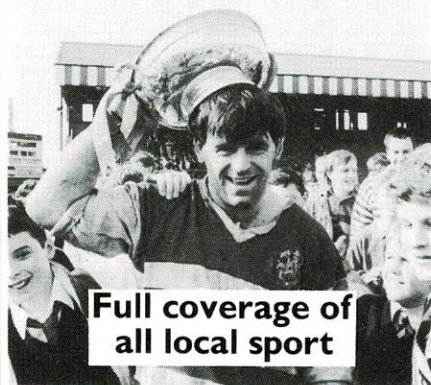

MATCH REPORTS

OLDHAM 30, HULL KR 16

A FOUR-TRY purple patch in the second half set things up for Oldham's first league win of the season against a depleted Hull KR. Oldham led 8-6 at half-time, Ashley Gilbert having scored a try with a great dummy and Mick Burke having landed two goals.

Rovers, who were brilliantly served by David Bishop, their former Welsh RU scrum-half, went 12-8 ahead early in the second half, but Oldham finally found top gear to run in tries by Gilbert, Colin Hawkyard, Leo Casey and Burke between the 48th and 65th minutes. Burke added two more goals and Andy Ruane one and although Bishop fashioned a late try for Mike Smith, Oldham came out top and deservedly so.

WAKEFIELD 12, OLDHAM 12

THIS was a tale of two distinct halves. It was all Trinity in the first half. All Oldham had to show was an early penalty goal by Mick Burke, but Trinity led 12-2 at half-time with tries by Nigel Bell and Richard Slater, both goaled by Steve Ella.

Quarter of an hour from the end it was still 12-2 but then John Fairbank crowned a great game for Oldham with a solo try. Burke goaled and with just three minutes left, Paul Round made a strong break up the right, the ball went back inside, and Mike Ford despatched a wide pass to the right where Steve Robinson went over in the corner to grab a point in a 12-12 draw.

Taken all round, it was not a good display by either side, but Fairbank's form was encouraging as was the display of Paul Round at full back.

SALFORD 38, OLDHAM 20

Oldham led 9-2 into the second half, following a great try by Richard Irving, two goals by Keith Atkinson and a Martin Hall drop goal. but it all seemed to go wrong when Ian Bates was pulled off for first-team duty and Wigan grabbed the initiative with two tries in three minutes.
