

THE Whitbread Trophy Hall of Fame Challenge match gave Rugby League fans the opportunity of seeing the skills of many of the World's top R.L. players in action and with full television coverage that can be no bad thing for our game. The skills were there in abundance for lesser mortals. The Rest of The World side had not much time for preparation but individual ability and fine backing up can produce match winning tries without talk of 'Game Plans' and all the other modern jargon. Despite the excellence of play I thought the game lacked the rawness, needle and edge which, I belayers together will help the side to improve further.

Control of the ball is vital to winning tight games and it does not need me to tell our supporters that this season losing the ball at crucial moments has been our biggest failing, perhaps never more evident than in our poor showing against the French side. I was a little happier after the Castleford game when there were indications that things can come right again. Castleford have enjoyed a good injury free run with their top players in sparkling form. 

ELLERY HANLEY

Ellery Hanley of Wigan needs one try to become the joint top Division One scorer of league tries with a career total of 165.

Keith Fielding set the record with 165 Division One tries for Salford from 1973-74 to 1980-81. Salford were then relegated and the remainder of Fielding's career was in Division Two.

The career record will complete Hanley's remarkable collection of Division One tryscoring feats. He holds the record for most Division One tries in a season with 44 for Wigan in 1986-87, having set the record with 40 for Bradford Northern in

He equalled the record of five in a match for Wigan against Bradford Northern on 1 March 1987. Although that was beaten by Shane Cooper's six for St. Helens last season, Hanley's five is still the best by a forward.

He is the only player to have scored 20 or more Division One tries in each of the last four seasons. having headed the charts three times.

Hanley turned professional with Bradford Northern as a 17-year-old on 2 June 1978 from Corpus Christi amateurs, Leeds. He made a tryscoring debut as a substitute in a 30-18 Division One home defeat of Rochdale Hornets on 26 November 1978.

He was then absent for a period and did not make his full debut until 16 August 1981 when he scored a try in a Yorkshire Cup tie at Halifax. His full Division One debut followed on 30 August when he scored a try at stand-off in an 11-12 home defeat against Widnes.

Wigan signed him in a then world record £150.-000 deal on 16 September 1985, making his debut in the centre in a 32-10 Division One home win over Widnes on 22 September 1985.

Hanley has scored 18 Division One hat-tricks including four four-try feats and five once.

BRAMLEY RECORD

Bramley ran up a club record score when they won 62-14 in a Division Two match at home to Dewsbury on Sunday.

They scored 12 tries compared with the 10 when they set the previous record of 52-17 in a Yorkshire Cup first-round tie at home to Doncaster on 1 September 1974.

LEADING TRY SCORERS

Leigh winger Barry Ledger has joined Martin

Offiah (Widnes) and Garry Schofield (Leeds) at the top of the try chart with 15.

Others in double figures are: Derek Bate (Swinton) and Peter Lister (Bramley) 12; Keith Bentley (Salford) and Phil Blake (Warrington) 11; Dean Bell (Wigan) and Paul Geary (Batley) 10.

100 POINTS

Steve Carroll of Bramley is the first player to reach a century of points for the season. The scrum-half's 18 points in Bramley's record 62-14 Division Two home defeat of Dewsbury on Sunday takes his total to 102 made up of 39 goals and six tries in 10 matches.

WINNING RUN

Bramley's club record 62-14 home defeat of Dewsbury extended the current longest winning run to seven matches - all in Division Two.

Doncaster are on a club record winning run of eight successive League victories. Their last League defeat was 30-14 at Sheffield Eagles in the final match of last season.

LOSING RUN

Chorley Borough's losing run now covers seven matches, including one Grunhalle Lager Lancashire Cup tie.






