JOHN PLAYER SPECIAL TROPHY FIRST ROUND, 12/13 November 1988

Hull have the current longest run of first round successes in the John Player Special Trophy, not having been knocked out at this stage since they lost 25-18 at Wakefield Trinity in 1979-80. They are at home to Batley, who ended a run of 11 pre-second round knockouts last season.

The longest run without reaching the second round is held by Fulham who were beaten in the preliminary round at Bramley on Sunday. Fulham have not reached the second round since their first season of 1980-81 when they won 8-3 at home to Leeds.

Since the competition began in 1971-72 Wigan have piled up the biggest total of prize money with £45,225. It includes three times picking up the top amount as Trophy winners, a record shared by Warrington.

Widnes have made most final appearances with six.

Previously, amateur clubs began in the first round and Cawoods (Hull) are the only other amateur side to beat professional opposition in the competition, winning 9-8 at Halifax in 1977-78, then losing 31-7 at Wakefield Trinity.

Millom (Cumbria) suffered the biggest defeat when they crashed 88-5 at Castleford in 1973-74. The only other 50 plus defeat was when Mayfield (Rochdale) lost 57-3 at Salford in 1975-76.
