



OLDHAM'S FUTURE A message to all from director Greg Pache

IT is not very often that I speak publicly, or in the programme, but I wish to bring to the attention of supporters the importance of our forthcoming share issue.

As you are probably aware, we have been a members' club since 1876 and we have never been able to compete at top level consistently. Even the little success we have had was more than 30 years ago or as far back as the 1920s.

That in itself would guarantee the survival of the club. Make no bones about it. If you want to continue to see rugby played in Oldham **BUY SHARES.**

It is no use saying: 'It'll be reet. Somebody else can put it in. I'm giving nowt. They'll only waste it. The club'll still be ere'.



WRONG. Think again. Be patient. Success takes time. You may say £100 is a lot of money. I'm saying, 'Yes, it is.' However, providing we float in early December, as our professionals have advised, shares could be bought for Christmas presents.

Spread them around the family and relatives. Ask your bosses to help. Think of every conceivable way in which you could introduce a shareholder. Mention it at your pub or club. I'm sure that, with effort, each supporter could raise £100 at least.

Don't forget also the Business Expansion Scheme. Contributions over £500 entitle the individual to tax relief, effectively reducing net cost for shares by 25 or 40 per cent.

We know suppporters are not satisfied with results. Neither are we. We not only need money to reduce our deficit, but to be in a position to compete for the better class of players.

We have not become directors for the benefit of ourselves. On the contrary, we are here for the benefit of Oldham RLFC, a club which everyone should be proud of and which should be among the elite of the game.

Help us to save Oldham. Help us to make the club great. **BUY SHARES.** Yours sincerely.

HERE COME HALIFAX

A GLANCE at the lower reaches of the First Division table shows how important is today's fixture for both Oldham and Halifax, who are rooted firmly in the bottom two positions.

Both teams desperately need to win to avoid becoming stranded at the wrong end of the division, so we can expect a real relegation dog-fight.

Halifax hit the headlines pre-season with the appointment of Ross Strudwick, an Australian, as team manager. A Queenslander, Ross has coached both Valleys and Brothers, whom he led to the Brisbane Grand Final in 1987.

He was to link up at Thrum Hall with player-coach Graham Eadie, the former Australian Test full back, who had done so well at Thrum Hall during Chris Anderson's days. Within a matter of weeks, however, 'the wombat' — as Eadie is affectionately known — stepped down as coach to concentrate on his own performances as a player and to leave the way open for Strudwick to take sole charge of the team in his first spell in England.

This was the start of a series of events which ultimately led to Eadie's departure from the Thrum Hall scene when Halifax were forced to unload an overseas man to comply with the League's restrictions.

Eadie was exempt from the quota, as a British passport holder, and the three quota men were Bob Grogan, Tony Anderson and Dan Staines.

Halifax had hoped to win residential status for centre Anderson, now in his fifth season with the club, but when they failed to do that and Peter Coyne arrived on the scene somebody had to go and that 'somebody' was Eadie.

Coyne, also from Valleys, is a British passport holder, so he is eligible to become the fourth Aussie in the Halifax side, alongside Staines, Anderson and Grogan.

Staines is a second-row man from the Cronulla Club in Sydney, while Anderson and Grogan are both from Queensland and are well versed in Aussie methods to put Strudwick's theories into action on the pitch.

His plan is to work hard on defensive strategy and captialise on opponents' errors and the league table tends to indicate that the plan is working well in stopping opponents from scoring but not so well in terms of Halifax attack.

In stark contrast to Oldham's excellent 'points for' record and poor 'points against' record, Halifax have scored only 87 points in eight games — 100 fewer than Oldham — but conceded only 132, which is bettered only by Leeds, Widnes and Castleford.

Early on, Halifax made League fans sit up when they beat Widnes and Bradford, but they are now suffering from a run of five consecutive league defeats, including a narrow 5-4 reverse at Widnes in the infamous match when Colin Whitfield was sin-binned for alleged timewasting when taking a kick at goal.

Whitfield, in fact, is enjoying an excellent season in the full back position and another familiar name in the back division today could well be former Oldham winger Mike Taylor, who has kept the wing spot this season so far and has scored half a dozen tries.

Aussies Grogan and Anderson will probably be in the centre today if there are no injury problems, while Wilf George could be on the other wing, assuming he came successfully through his leg test last Sunday when he returned to action after a six-week lay-off with ankle trouble.

Coyne will be earmarked for stand-off and there could be a new face at scrum-half — that of former Sheffield, Yorkshire and England 'B' RU scrum-half David Holmes, who will be playing at Watersheddings for the first time.

There is a more familiar look about the Halifax pack which will be chosen from men like Dick Fairbank — elder brother of Oldham's John — the long-serving and loyal Seamus McCallion, Ben Beevers, Roy Dickinson, Paul Dixon, Aussie Staines, Neil James and John Pendlebury.

We can expect a large contingent of Halifax fans making the short trip from Thrum Hall for this extremely important fixture, so there should be plenty of atmosphere and, we hope, lots of good football in a fine advertisment for Rugby League.

MATCH REPORTS

OLDHAM 22, ST HELENS 26
