





They have "stepped into the breach" following the calling off of our St. Helen's match – due to the latter's involvement in the John Player Trophy.

Under their new Coach, Tony Barrow, they will be all the more determined to avenge their narrow defeat two weeks ago, but, you can be absolutely certain Halifax supporters, the blue and whites will be equally committed to gaining our first Double of the Season.

Despite last week's near thing, things have taken a decided turn for the better during November – and that is not really surprising. Both Coach and Team have, in the past four weeks, been allowed to concentrate only on matters relating to performance on the field thank goodness.

Another Try for Halifax, when it was already 14–10 to us, – and that was the period of those free kicks – would probably have been the "nail in the Wigan coffin".

Enough of that, however. It was still a vastly improved performance by 'FAX and continual repetition of that form – with the commitment and dedication now being given – makes us look much more of a Top than bottom 4 side.

No "resting on laurels" or complacency, though. If we can improve the playing strength of the Side – if Ross Strudwick asks me – then the search will be continued. We shall continue to pursue our Youth Policy because that's the way to go to ensure not just a good 1988/9 Season but a successful Halifax for years to come.

What I am saying is that the act is coming together and – whatever has been said or written – we are all trying our best and hardest to Win, Win, Win.

Please support us in the resolve and spirit and, together, Ladies and Gentlemen, we shall come through.





# BRITISH COAL IN THREE-YEAR RUGBY SPONSORSHIP DEAL Promoting the game at the grass-roots

British Coal are investing £120,000 in the three-year promotion of Rugby League's new pre-am joint development programme.

The grass roots investment by British Coal – backers of the first-ever and highly successful professional, nine-a-side tournament last year – is the biggest Rugby League cash support outside competition sponsorship.

The recruitment of British Coal is a major coup for the recently-formed Rugby League Foundation, a 10-man pro-am body with Charitable Trust status formed to encourage and finance the development of the game, particularly at school and youth level.

During its first year of operation, the Foundation has injected £100,000 into the development of the amateur game, with plans to double that investment in the next 12 months.

A corner-stone of the joint development scheme will be the introduction of an elite under-19 midweek league involving representative sides based on district advanced training centres, to be titled "The British Coal National Youth League".

The British Coal financial support will be directed towards travel grants for this new youth set-up; the costs of the establishment of centres of excellence and advanced training centres; and financing a general development programme.

Announcing the £120,000 three-year promotion, British Coal Chairman Sir Robert Haslam said in Leeds:

"We're convinced this joint venture between the Rugby Football League, BARLA and the Sports Council has exciting prospects for the growth and development of the sport, and British Coal are delighted to be associated with that progress. The amateur game, with more than 600 clubs, is the lifeblood of the sport, nurturing and grooming the stars of tomorrow without whom no sport can survive.

"Mining's links with Rugby League are legendary. Many of the great names of yesteryear and the present are mining men, and miners generally are among the most ardent supporters of the game. It's a hard, exciting, robust sport with a healthy future, and that mirrors the prospects for the British coal industry. It's very much part of the "New Face of British Coal" – the slogan of the industry's major advertising campaign and sales drive – and we hope our continued involvement with the Rugby League will prove a successful and lasting partnership,"


The Trustees of the Rugby League Foundation are Bob Ashby, Les Bettinson, Harry Jepson, David Oxley, Joe Seddon, Roy Waudby and David Wigham from the Rugby Football League; Bob Beal and Maurice Oldroyd from BARLA; and Bill Watt representing English Schools. Sports Council official Robin Barron has also been invited in an advisory capacity.

Rugby League Chairman Bob Ashby said: "We have the expertise within the game to mastermind a progressive development programme. It is outside funding such as British Coal's investment which will help speed along those vital plans."

BARLA Chairman Alan Gibb commented: "Our stated policy is national expansion by the code's centenary in 1995 and such significant financial input from a body of the calibre of British Coal is a major boost."

# THE STORY OF THE HALIFAX FOOTBALL CLUB PART IV

We have now reached the POST-WAR PERIOD

when serious competitive football was resumed, and, as most of the incidents will still be fresh in the minds of the majority of Halifax supporters, a brief summary will suffice to meet the requirements of the present generation. The honour of being elected to the captaincy in 1919-20 fell worthily to Asa Robinson, and the chief recruits to the team this season were B. Whitaker from Wigan, W. Grundy from St. Helens, and R. Turnbull, the son of a local schoolmaster, who gave up the game this season on the death of his father. It was a happy coincidence that each of these players should score on his first appearance with the team. The Christmas Day match against Huddersfield at Thrum Hall will live long in the memories of those present. A great game resulted in a Halifax victory by the bare margin of two points, on a ground that was covered with snow. There was tremendous enthusiasm displayed after the game, and a demonstration in front of the pavilion, calling for the home players. In the first round of the N.U. Cup we were drawn to journey into cumberland to play Brookland Rovers, but managed to persuade our opponents to play the game at Thrum Hall, where they were soundly beaten to the tune of 55 points to nil. In the second round the boys put up a great fight at Widnes, and were undeniably unlucky to sustain defeat by two penalty goals. On May 1st, we had the honour of being selected to play Hull at the Third Port for the Spring Bank Orphanage Cup, our opponents

winning by 13 points to 8. At the end of this season our present secretary, Mr. Sidney Foster, was selected for the honour of managing the representative N.U. team which toured Australia, and three of the Blue and Whites' players were included, viz: Milnes, Lloyd, and Stacey.

One of the most successful seasons for many years was encountered in 1920–21, when Clem Garforth held the captaincy.

#### THE YORKSHIRE LEAGUE CUP

was brought to Halifax, and the team reached the final of the N.U. Cup, when Leigh beat us (13-0). Previously we had overcome Batley, Bramley, Widnes, and Huddersfield. Owing to missed opportunities, we lost to Dewsbury (2-3) in the second round of the Yorkshire Challenge Cup. This season was inaugurated at Thrum Hall by the first tussle for

a trophy presented by the Friendly Societies of Halifax, to be played for annually by Halifax and a team selected by them as opponents, the gross proceeds to go to the Royal Halifax Infirmary. The first contest was on August 21st, 1920, Hull providing the opposition, and Halifax proved to be the first winners by scoring 31 points to Hull's 5. The receipts on this occasion were £760. An outstanding feature of the season was Halifax's victory over Hull Kingston Rovers at Thrum Hall on December 6th. The Rovers were then at the head of the League table, and had just won the Yorkshire Challenge Cup. In this game Turnbull scored.





#### LAWS & RULES OF RUGBY LEAGUE

#### SECTION 2 - GLOSSARY (cont)

PUNT

Is a kick whereby the ball is dropped from the hand or hands and is kicked before it touches the ground.

**PUT IN (also known as Feeding the Scrum)**Is the rolling of the ball into the scrum.

#### **SCRUM**

Or Scrummage or Scrimmage (see Section 12). Where a team loses the advantages of the "Loose-Head" and "Put-In" the scrum is said to be awarded against that team.

#### STRIKE

As applied to the foot means to attempt to secure possession of the ball, usually by heeling it, in a scrum or at a play-the-ball.

#### TACKLE

See Section 11.

#### **TOUCH DOWN**

Is the grounding of the ball by a defending player in his own in goal.

#### TOUCH IN GOAL

See Section 9.

#### TRY

See Section 9.

#### TRY

See Section 6.

#### **UPRIGHT TACKLE**

Is where the player in possession is effectively tackled without being brought to the ground (see Section 11).

#### **VOLUNTARY TACKLE**

Is where the player in possession voluntarily stops play when not effectively tackled. (See Section 11).

#### SECTION 3 - THE BALL

#### SHAPE AND CONSTRUCTION

1. The game shall be played with an oval airinflated ball the outer casing of which shall be of leather or other material approved by the International Board and nothing shall be used in its construction which might prove dangerous to the players.

#### **Ball deflated**

3. The Referee shall blow his whistle immediately he notices that the size and shape of the ball no longer comply with the Laws of the Game.

#### NOTES

Colour of the Ball

 In Senior competitions the ball shall be light in colour so that it can be more easily seen by spectators. The Referee should report any club which fails to provide a suitable ball but should not cancel the game.

#### Ball bursts

3. If the ball bursts as a player is taking a place-kick at goal he should be allowed another kick. If a player grounds the ball for a try and then it is noticed that the ball has burst the try should be allowed. Otherwise, if the ball bursts, play is stopped, the ball is replaced and a scrum is formed to restart play at the point where the ball bursts. The team in possession or last in possession shall have the loose head and the put in.
