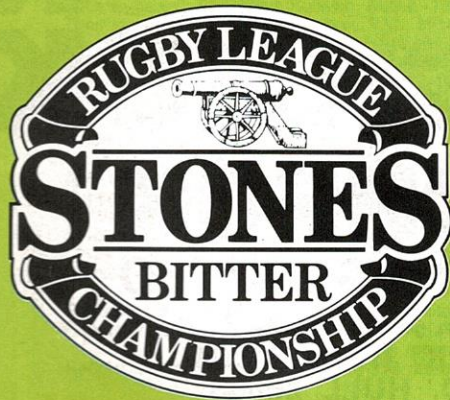
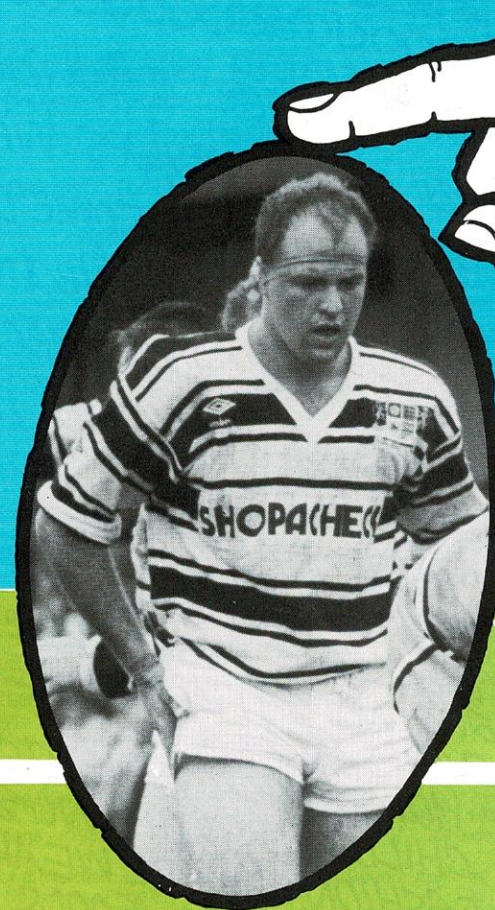

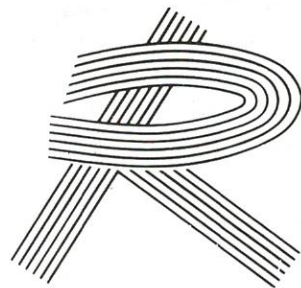

Hull F.C.'s most important match of the season — that's how I see today's fixture with Oldham who we welcome to the Boulevard.

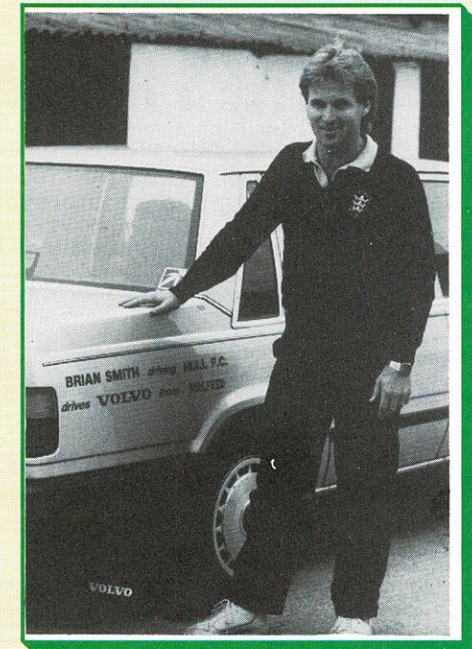

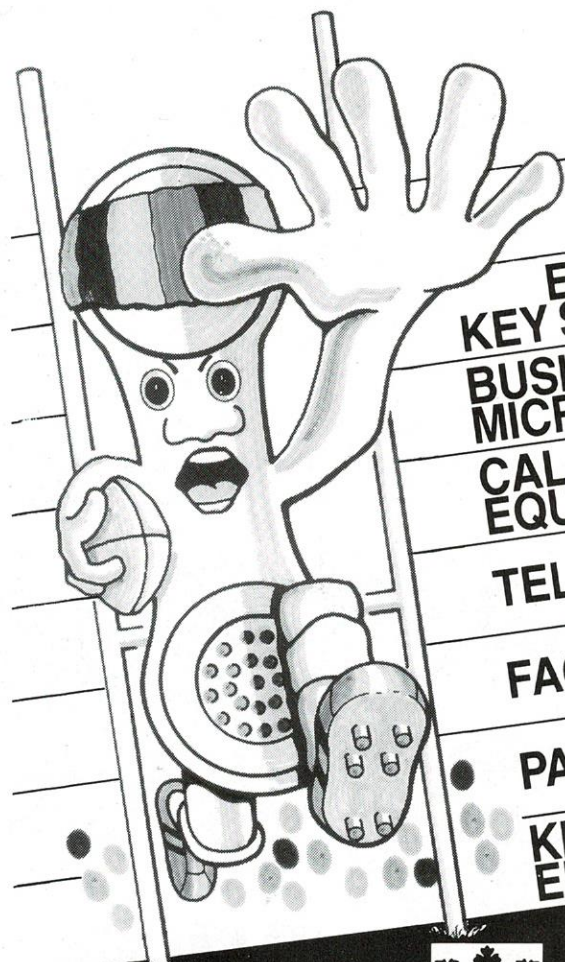

Focus on the Roughyeds

There can not have been two more contented individuals in Rugby league after last Sunday then Oldham's Tony Barrow and Duncan Platt. Barrow quit as coach of Warrington a month ago and almost immediately was offered the Oldham manager's vacancy made available by the dismissal of Eric Fitzsimmons. Last Sunday he saw his new club lift themselves off the foot of the league table with an outstanding defeat of the Wires, and it was Barrow's first major signing full-back Platt who was the star of the show. The £35,000 capture from Widnes took the man-of-the-match award on his home debut, slicing open the Wire defence for an early try and then adding four goals. Just four days before the game Barrow had made another shrewd acquisition to their ranks with the £15,000 signing of Castleford's Gary Hyde who ended an 11 year spell at Wheldon Road.

Oldham came back into the First Division this season having become the first club to complete a Second Division double. They carried off the title in style, finishing three points ahead of Featherstone Rovers with only four defeats in 28 fixtures. The Roughyeds were the division's top points scorers, an average of nearly 28 points a game with the second best defensive record behind third placed Wakefield Trinity. The climax of the programme came on the penultimate weekend of a thrilling title chase. Oldham travelled to Trinity where defeat for the Lancastrians would set up their joint leadership with one match each left to play. The Roughyeds secured a 23-22 success to clinch the title and £10,000 Stones Bitter prize money. The Premiership Final meeting with Featherstone at Old Trafford was just as memorable as Oldham built up a seemingly unassailable lead, saw the Colliers come back in dramatic style before Des Foy secured the double with a late touchdown.

Oldham have experienced plenty of ups-and-downs during the two division era. They were in the First Division on re-formation in 1973, being relegated in that first campaign from 13th position. They came up again 12 months later from third spot, only to go down again two years later in bottom position. They spent three seasons in the lower grade until promotion in 1980, relegation following a year later. Up they came again in 1982, this time as champions, enjoying five campaigns in higher grade company until relegation two seasons ago from 13th position, four clubs being downgraded to create the new look 14 strong Stones Bitter Championship.

Last season Oldham made an early season impact with a superb run in the John Player Special trophy, reaching the semi-finals having taken Bradford Northern and Warrington en route. In the Central Park semi-final, Oldham matched St Helens until the later stages. This famous club have received silverware on 18 occasions including the Challenge Cup three times and the Lancashire Cup nine times. Their last appearance in a final excepting the Premiership affair last May, was in the County Cup in 1986, going down to Wigan.

Last summer the Roughyeds provided two Great Britain tourists in scrum half Mike Ford and prop forward Hugh Waddell. Ford, formerly with Wigan and Leigh, moved to hometown Oldham last season in a £45,000 deal, having received four Great Britain U21 caps. The popular Waddell has since moved onto pastures new joining the wealthy Headingley ranks where he has formed a powerful prop partnership with our own former favourite Lee Crooks.

The Australian influence at the Watersheddings was evident last season with the recruitment of skipper Mal Graham for a second stint, Gary Warnecke and Peter Walsh. This time around Chris O'Sullivan and Paul Taylor have arrived from Down Under to supplement a squad built from shrewd moves into the transfer market. One of the most popular signings last season was Maorie centre Charlie McAlister from Bingley Rugby Union Club where he was guesting. Another effective investment was full-back Mick Burke, capped 15 times for Great Britain and once for England, being a tourist in 1984. The former Widnes star is one of only four men to be awarded both the Lance Todd Trophy and the Harry Sutherland Trophy. Another experienced campaigner who enjoyed a benefit last season is Terry Flanagan, a clever ball-handling forward and a 1984 Great Britain Tourist. Other new arrivals this season include John Henderson, a prolific scoring threequarter who for many seasons at Leigh formed a deadly partnership with John Woods. John Fairbank came to the Watersheddings as part of the Waddell deal and has settled into the blind side prop position. Last season Oldham paid a club record £70,000 fee for St. Helens talented second row forward Paul Round and later in the campaign Kevin Meadows, a speedy wingman made the same move. Andy Ruane spent several seasons contesting for a first team place at Naughton Park before deciding to take up Oldham's offer. So Tony Barrow has a useful squad at his disposal and having guided his side to successive wins over Halifax and Warrington will be seeking to complete a hat-trick this afternoon.

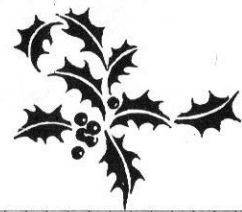

SAD HULL SLUMP TO SHOCK DEFEAT

HULL F.C. 2 OLDHAM 8

Hull ended a miserable week, one of their worst for a long time, when they suffered a shock defeat at home to Oldham.

Beaten in midweek by Bradford in the John Player Trophy, Hull needed to win not only to restore confidence but to take over the leadership of the First Division.

On both counts Hull failed miserably and they also were unable to provide team manager Arthur Bunting with the silver wedding present he wanted.

In atrocious conditions, Hull floundered badly, failing to adapt to the conditions and providing very little excitement for the 5,385 crowd—the lowest for several years—who had braved the elements.

Hull squandered far too much possession, which proved their undoing as Oldham took full advantage.

Despite keen displays by Crane and Proctor, Hull's only reward was a 45th minute penalty by Prendiville.

Hull fell behind in the 11th minute, when McEwan and Caffery linked for Vigo to crash in at the corner.

The killer punch was inflicted five minutes from time by McCurrie, who supported Hogan to score near the posts and leave Worrall with an easy goal.

Oldham's Parrish saw his record run of scoring in his last 57 games disappointingly ended when injury ruled him out of the match.

AUSTRALIA'S Top referee Greg Hartley joined in the salute to Steve Norton as he masterminded Hull's march to their second John Player final.

Loose-forward Norton predictably collected the man-of-the-match award, inspiring the 22-6 semi-final defeat of Second Division Oldham at Headingley.

"Norton was superb. He is the type of player who comes along only once in 20 years or so," said Hartley, who handles next Sunday's Britain-France Test.

"It was an entertaining tie, Hull had the greater power but Oldham impressed me for a side from the lower division."

Oldham's determined contribution was not reflected in the score. Hull skipper Charlie Stone admitted: "They had us scared when they cut our lead to 7-6."

"But Steve was fantastic once again and when James Leuluai warmed up he showed his class.

He is a slow starter like the team at the moment but give Oldham credit for defending strongly."

When Mick Parrish crashed in for Oldham's second try he just failed with a touchline goalkick that would have put his side ahead. But Hull then made the most of their opponents' handling lapses.

Stand-off Terry Day hurled his way over from a slick Norton break and then Leuluai exposed some suspect tackling to score before latching on to a Day pass to claim a glorious 50 yard second try.

Scrum-half Tony Dean had darted in for the first Hull try but loose forward Terry Flanagan kept Oldham ticking over and Bob Mordell and Parrish worked a neat try for Ashley McEwan.

"I was happy enough with our display, although the result does not do us justice," said Oldham coach Frank Myler. "Our priority now is promotion and this tie will benefit our Players."

Hull clinched victory in a two-minute spell in the first half when they scored ten points and it was teenagers Divorty and Schofield who provided the killer punches.

Divorty, who worked hard and caused countless problems, nipped onto a kick through by Ah Kuoi, who was making his first appearance since November.

Minutes later, Schofield showed why he is the League's top try-scorer when he shot over for his 20th touchdown after stand-off Evans had superbly dummied past Oldham's half-back partnership of Bishop and Birkby.

Hull never looked back after that and their forwards did an excellent job with prop Edmonds continuing his fine run of form.

Alongside, Patrick worked hard in the loose while another teenager, second row forward Dannatt, a surprise inclusion in the Great Britain training squad, produced telling runs.

Hull's defence, in which Kemble was a king-pin, frustrated Oldham's attack to such an extent that in the second half both Sinclair and Goodway — the man Hull bid £50,000 for earlier in the season — were sent to the sin-bin.

Sinclair, along with Bishop, tried hard to lift Oldham, who were desperate to end a bad run and pull themselves together after losing coach Peter Smethurst in midweek.

Bishop's efforts were rewarded in the last minute with a try, but that was the only time they threatened to break Hull's defence and it was left to marksman Parrish to score their other points.

He was the one man who consistently penetrated the Oldham defence and it was his new-found understanding with scrum-half Clive Pickerill which turned the tide.

But prop Phil Edmonds, who reappeared at half time after being led off with a head cut after five minutes, carried three men over the line with him to set up a purple patch for Hull.

The international rescue was complete when French winger Patrick Solal passed the ball round the back of his head to put Harkin in.

Ten minutes later Lee Crooks charged through and his sixth goal made it 24-11.

Hull roared on by a 13,000 crowd, looked able to run riot, but Frank Myler's men mounted a dramatic fightback.

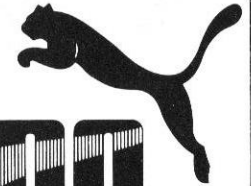

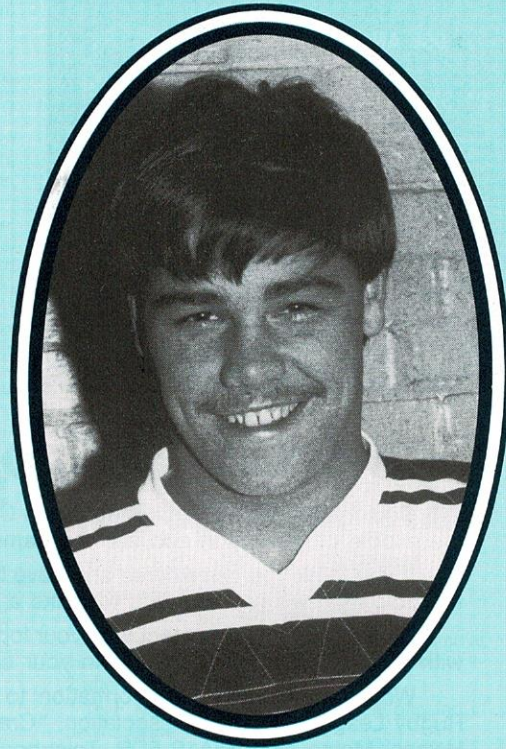

Player Profile *Interview by Tony Groizard*

When Paul runs out to play for Hull F.C., he knows that quite a number of supporters in the crowd are his family and friends as he is a local boy.

His ambition is to go to Wembley with the black and whites—and win the Cup there. He remembers the disappointment of that one point cup semi final replay defeat last season. He's looking to use his strength in the opposition 25, where he is such a dangerous attacker, and his goal kicking responsibilities, to realize that ambition.

Until the age of 17 Paul did not play rugby, although he was a keen home and away supporter of the Airlie Birds. Active in many sports he played soccer for Wolfraton School and was a schoolboy county cricket player. He was persuaded to play rugby union, at off half, when he entered the sixth form.

His first game for Hull F.C., was at Oldham away, another winning debut, and Paul recalls so many of the team at that time being top class international players. He was brought along and helped by greats such as Fred Ah Kuoi and Steve Norton, and his next game was also a "big" one — Wigan, at the Boulevard — another victory.

SHOOTING STARS . . .

Whitestar have it right

During the past ten seasons Hull Colts have enjoyed a remarkable run of success, winning more silverware than any other colts side, and more importantly producing a steady flow of talent for the club.

The value of this talent being highlighted last weekend when no fewer than seventeen ex-colts represented the club at either 'A' team or first team level, and this number could have been increased if Alan Tomlinson, Richard Kerman and Shaun Patrick were not injured.

At the end of last season Hull Colts had completed the hat trick as they won the League Championship, the Premiership and the Challenge Cup, whilst the players were rewarded as twelve turned professional, all this being tempered by the news that the colts league would be disbanded, to be replaced by BARLA county leagues.

The present chairman of the club encouraged the colts staff to continue, and form a nursery side to enter the new league, agreeing to call the side Hull Whitestar, and what a wise decision this has proved to be.

Already at the club were six professionals who were still eligible for under 19 rugby, as well as Jason Eastwood, Nicky Mann, Lance Cator, Mark Hazell, Richard Branton and Mike Shields who were left over from last seasons squad, so hopes were high of another very successful season, with the remainder of the current squad being made up of seventeen year olds who would gain experience in preparation for next season.

Before a league game had been played the plans for this season were blown sky high, as the experienced Mike Shields picked up a serious knee injury, and it became obvious that the professionals would be needed for 'A' team and first team football, thus putting pressure on the youngsters, and restricting the selection options open to the Whitestar staff.

At first everyone thought the youngsters would struggle against older, more experienced players, but the reverse has happened as they have risen to the challenge, reaching the Yorkshire Cup semi-final, and moving to joint league leaders, losing only one league game to date.

The side failed to reach the cup final when they were defeated by an older East Park Juniors side in the semi's, who scored two late tries after being held up to three quarter time, as East Parks two professionals finally put paid to the gallant youngsters. In the league they have only lost one game against Wheldale (ex. Castleford Colts), who kicked a late penalty to win by the narrowest of margins. The players were not to blame for this defeat, as the Whitestar staff take full responsibility, because they made too many changes to a winning side as they tried to give a number of players their debut's together.

The club captain Lance Cator has led his side with pride, inspiring the youngsters around him, and after captaining Yorkshire and scoring two tries against Lancashire its hard to understand why he has not been included in the Great Britain training squad.

Its now becoming obvious that Whitestar are growing in confidence, and the youngsters will mature this season, staying together to form a side for next season, capable of winning the National Cup, as well as keeping Hull F.C., happy as another crop of talented players will be pressing for their chance in 'A' team rugby.

At full back Chris Margerison has made the position his own by putting together a string of impressive performances, whilst wingers Richard Gotts and Rob Barrett are very fast elusive runners with a big future.

In Darfen Oglesby Whitestar have possibly the best goalkicking centre in the Yorkshire League, whilst co-centre Tony Watson shows plenty of promise with his strong aggressive style.

One of the most pleasing points is the return to form of Craig Mathews who can form an excellent half back partnership with Paul Hunter.

At prop ex. schoolboy international John Thorpe and Mark Youngs are taking the league by storm and look stars of the future, but Dale West keeps them on their toes, as any loss in form will result in him coming into the side.

In the second row Rob D'arcy, Richard Kirk, Paul Walker and new signing Steve Hall are fighting for the two spots, with the latter also looking as if he has a big future in the game.

The play maker in the side is Mark Laws who has the potential to become a professional player, providing he continues his improved form of late.

As they continue to build for next season the Whitestar staff have persuaded talented half back Ricky Gladstone to return to the club, and another ex-schoolboy international Garry Pullen has been tempted back into the game.

To complete the plans for the future Carl Wiles and Garry Neilson are training with Whitestar and could be possible signings in the near future.

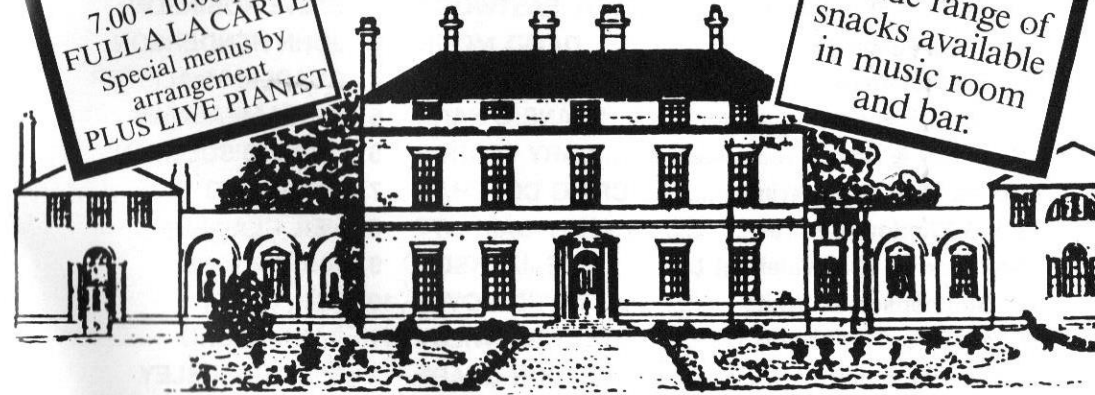
