





ON THE BARROW BEAT

(A regular feature with Oldham coach Tony Barrow)



ONE of the things that struck me forcibly when I took over at Watersheddings was the absence of young players. By that, I don't mean 20 and 21-year-olds, but talented lads of 17, 18 or 19, who are doing well in the Slalom Lager Alliance side and with a real chance of graduating successfully to senior

Trevor Croston, Tom Foley, Martin Hall and Tony Miller are among the younger players on the club's books, but they are all around the 20-mark and there is a marked absence

of teenagers.

What a far cry from the days of 1979 and 1980 when the Oldham club signed up some of the best kids in Lancashire and Yorkshire (remember Goodway?) and had their very successful colts team! What a far cry, too, from what I have been used to over the last seven or eight years at Warrington!

The colts set-up these days, of course, has been replaced by the British Coal-backed under-19 pro-am league and, here again, it is noticeable that the Oldham area's team is currrenty a lot more 'am' than 'pro' — a fact touched upon in the last programme.

I would like to see a big change in this respect because I firmly believe that a successful youth policy is vital for any club that intends to get to the top, and stay there.

These things take time, of course, and one cannot wave a magic wand. But I have signed a long-term contract at Oldham and you can rest assured that it is my intention during that time to re-create a policy based heavily on signing the top-quality kids that are bursting

to prove themselves at top level.

Believe me, they are certainly around. I have a lot of time for modern-day Rugby League lads. They are dedicated — and they are keen. You can see them pounding the streets of St. Helens, where I live, every night of the week and I daresay that applies in Oldham, too, and several other Lancashire towns.

I had a cracking set-up at Wilderspool and a load of lads worked their way through the system until they were regular members of the first team. I think of Ronnie Duane, Billy McGinty, Gary Sanderson, Mark Roberts, Paul Cullen, Tony Thorniley, Martin Crompton, Paul Bishop, Tony Humphries, John Fieldhouse (later to join Widnes and then St. Helens), and Mike Gregory.

There were others, too, and last season there was a Warrington reserve side that included more than half a side of Great Britain under-21 or former BARLA under-19 interna-

tional players.

I love an 'A' team that is packed full of young lads, who are falling over themselves to get into the first team, and one of my aims at Oldham is to provide an Alliance side — in the first division — with an average age of 19 or 20.

It is no good, however, signing second-rate youngsters and hoping that two or three, out of a load, will come good. You have to buy the best — like Oldham did when they snapped up Terry Flanagan, Ray Ashton, Mick Worrall, Andy Goodway and the rest all those

years ago.

Oldham had a terrific set-up here in those days but somewhere along the way it has all gone wrong. I feel it is my job to put things right in that respect. There is no doubt that one of the major reasons why Oldham have found it difficult to compete this season at toplevel is that the youth policy was allowed to deteriorate.

Talking of youth brings me round to the success currently being enjoyed by our 'A' team in the second division of the Slalom Lager

Alliance

Under lan Taylor, they are doing superbly, but it is crucial they win promotion this time, so that next season they will be one step higher up the ladder towards what must be the ultimate goal of all young players in this club — achieving a level of ability that can cope with First Division rugby week in and week out.

IT is not very often that I speak publicly, or in the programme, but I wish to bring to the attention of supporters the importance of our forthcoming share issue.

WE welcome Salford to Wateresheddings today for our regular Boxing Day clash and if previous holiday games are anything to go by it should be a real Christmas cracker!



So to the pack and the likelihood of two former Oldham players turning out on familiar territory today — Steve Herbert and Mick Worrall.





Hull agreed to come here, but as a result of Wigan winning the semi, only Featherstone was left available to us and they declined to bring forward their match from March.






FLASHBACK — Paul Round held in a 2-man tackle when today's teams last met at the Willows on October 16, Salford winning 38-20 in a high-scoring game.






