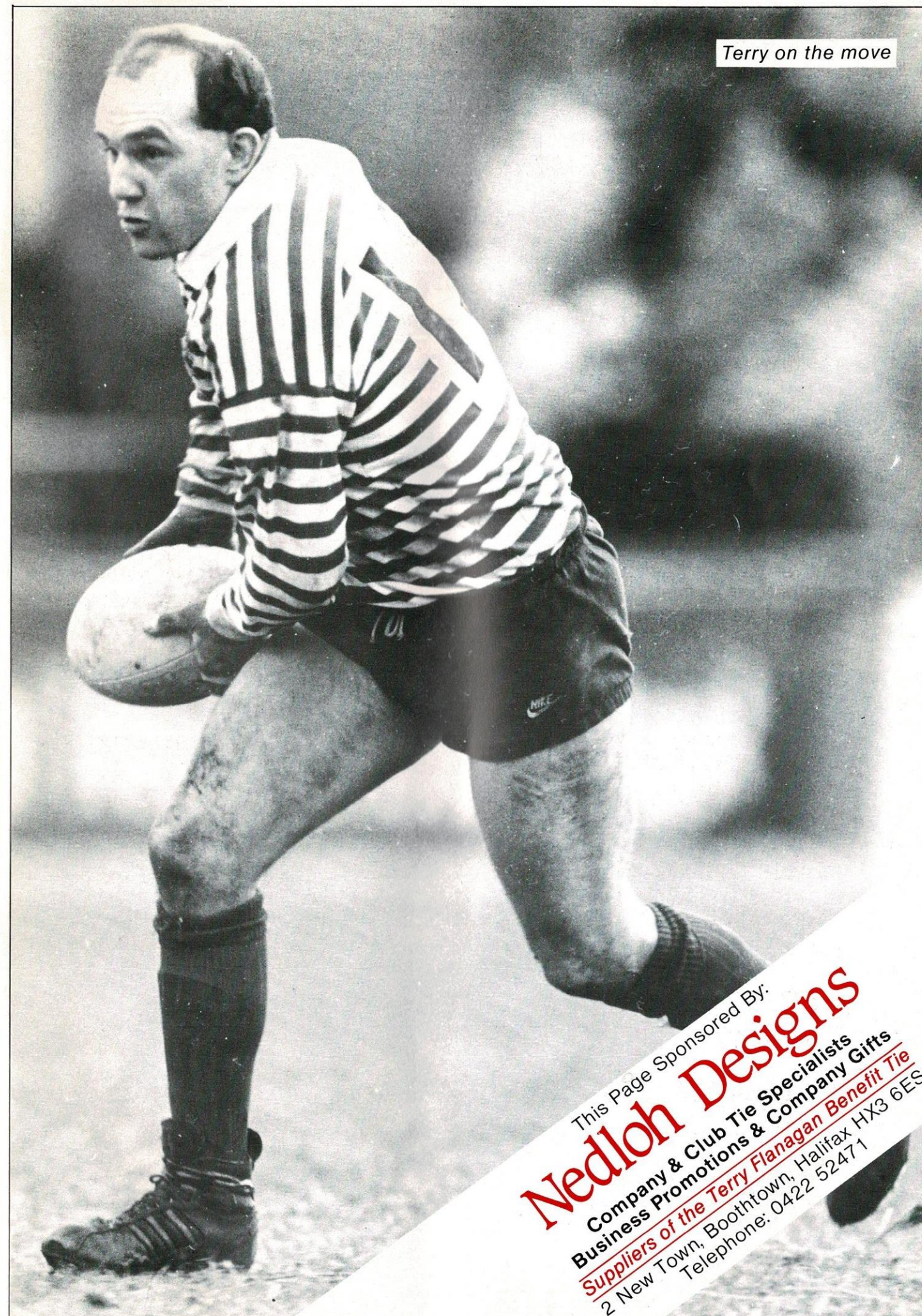

The Flanagan Family

Behind every good player is a good family . . . and Terry had everything going for him, in rugby terms, by entering the world as a member of the Flanagan clan on November 27th, 1960 on the maternity ward at Oldham and District General Hospital.

He was almost born with a rugby ball in his hands because Bill Flanagan, his proud father, was secretary of the Oldham Junior League (now known as the Oldham Amateur Rugby League) after enjoying a professional career as a hooker with Oldham, Belle Vue Rangers and Castleford.

Big brother Kevin was about to embark on a distinguished career that was to span three decades and take in Oldham, Rochdale Hornets and Salford.

Uncle Bernard, in whose memory a trophy is still up for annual competition in the local league, was chief organiser and general factotum of the now defunct St. Mary's amateur club in Oldham - the club that launched the footballing family Flanagan on its way to the top.

When the Oldham Standard Cup was introduced to the famous Rugby League Challenge Cup! Bill and Bernard Flanagan are behind the Challenge Cup on an Oldham Junior League day out to Wigan in the early 1960s. ▼

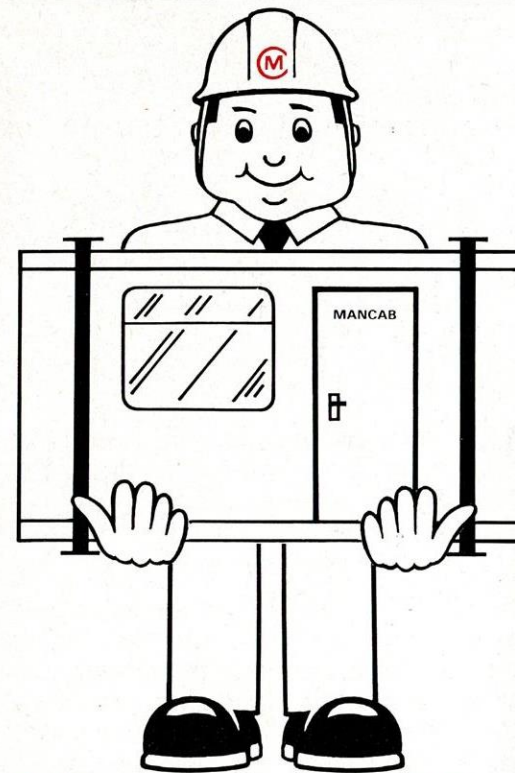

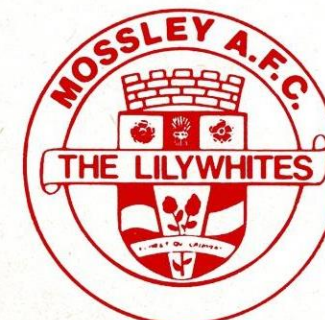

Early Days

Terry attended a soccer-playing junior school but on moving to St. Anselm's R.C. Secondary School in Oldham he immediately came under the wing of the Oldham Schools' Rugby League. Several teachers from the schools' RL played their part in encouraging the young Flanagan to take his first, faltering steps into a sport that was ultimately to take him across the world to represent his country.

Brian Whitworth and Larry Kearns were teachers who soon spotted 'something' in the way the young Flanagan played and Terry quickly became a prominent member of the pioneering Oldham Schools' squads that made exchange visits to France.

"They were great trips", recalls Terry, "and gave us the sort of memories that never fade. I remember travelling two full days by boat and train to the south of France only to be confronted by opponents with hairy legs and

beards, who were supposed to be under-13s! We didn't have much success in those early days but we learned how to socialise at an early age and I suppose we got a good grounding for later years".

Terry soon began to hit the headlines with his ball-handling skills and made his first schoolboy representative appearance in the Lancashire Schools' under-13 side - as a hooker. "I was quite short and stocky in those days", says Terry, "and I wasn't considered big enough for the back-row".

Nevertheless, he did well as a hooker, following in Dad's footsteps, and was, in fact, only one of several members of that county team later to turn professional. He was also developing his skills by training and playing tough rugby with the local amateur clubs.

"My brother Kevin used to take me training with Ferranti and St. Anne's, two local teams, during the summer months. Both clubs made me welcome and I used to play touch rugby for hours on end. In local amateur circles there were a lot of household names at both clubs. Players like Sorby, Sutcliffe, Haliwell, Navesey and Hilton at Ferranti and Walker, Heap, Leach and Taylor at St. Anne's used to let me boss

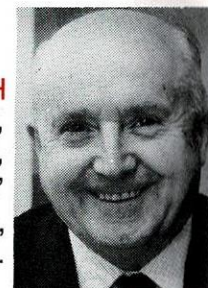
them around at training like an old stager - and I was only 14! Those days provided me with an apprenticeship and I would recommend any youngster to do the same if possible".

In those days, of course, the BARLA youth policy had not taken off and, disappointed with a lack of competitive Rugby League in his own age group, Terry turned to the Union game for a season and played in Lyn Morgan's mini-rugby set-up at the Oldham RU Club.

Says Terry: "I had a great time with the Union lads, but I couldn't get used to the game. It was totally different in the forwards. Sometimes I wouldn't even get a pass and as a lad who had been brought up to develop ball skills from an early age that was quite a culture shock".

Terry still recalls his Keb Lane days with fondness, however, and has remained firm friends of people who are still heavily involved with the club such as Lyn Morgan, Jack Hilderley and Glen McLintock.

Terry did not play Rugby League at junior school, but he joined Paddy Kirwan at St. Anselm's and the pair played together for Oldham Schools' and for the Saddleworth Rangers youth teams.

The young Flanagan was soon selected for the Oldham town team and he went on to gain caps for both Lancashire and England boys before joining the Oldham RL Colts side and, with Paddy, gaining international honours at under-19 professional level.

Always a hard-grafting, ball-playing loose-forward, Terry stamped his quality on every game he played. He is still a genial, but robust, player who never asks for favours, or gives any, but who never-ever plays dirty and never loses his temper under provocation. He knows the rules and plays within them.

A sterling character, Terry Flanagan must rank alongside the finest products ever produced by the Oldham Schools' Rugby League. He is a credit to himself and his tutors and he could have made his mark equally as well in Union where all players are classed as gentlemen.

Terry is still a relatively young man, after nine years in the professional game, and he has a number of seasons still left in him. We all wish him well in his benefit year and hope that one day he will bring to fruition his burning desire to play for Oldham at Wembley. He is, above all, an Oldham player with the Oldham club first and foremost in his sights.

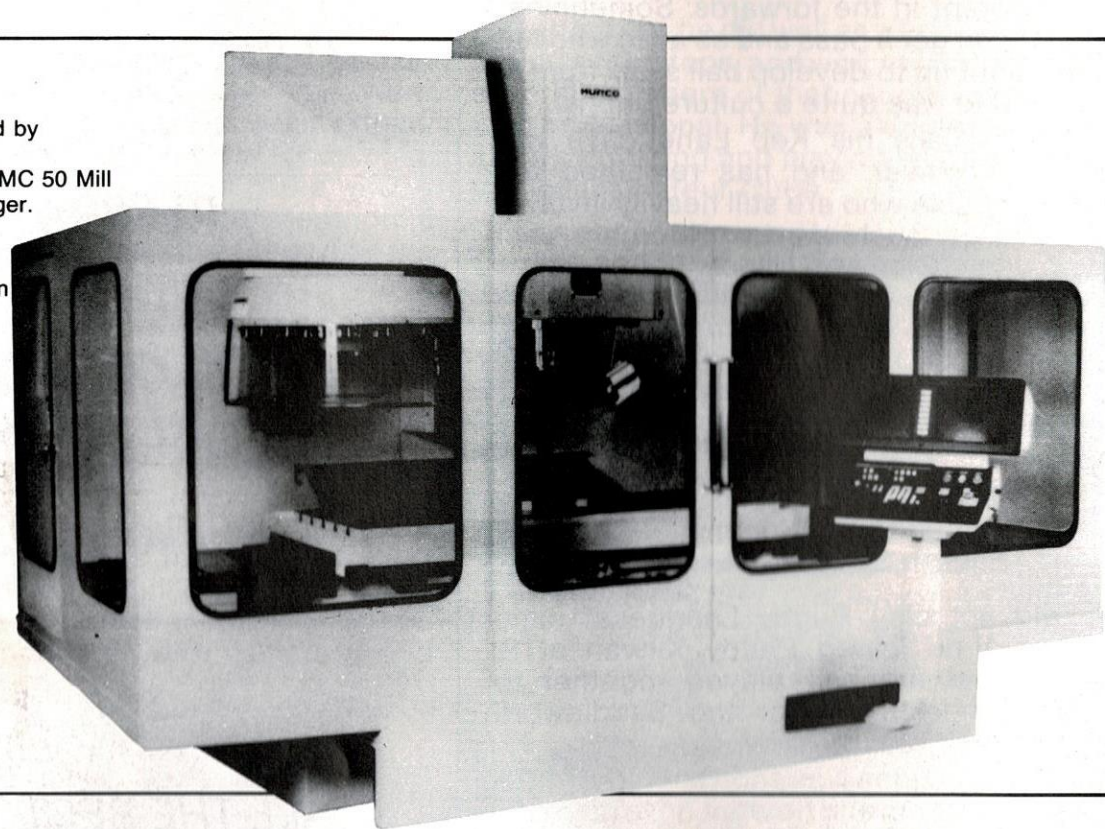

Terry heads for the hills!

With schoolboy representative honours behind him, playing for Lancashire and England with players such as Foy, Holding, Hanley and O'Neill, Terry moved his rapidly-developing talent to Saddleworth Rangers, a club nestling in the Pennine foothills. He spent two years in the under-16 side, under coach Frank Walsh and it was during this time that the cups started to appear in the trophy cabinet . . . and the scouts on the touch line!

“The Saddleworth club was a fantastic set-up”, says Terry, “and we had a lot of good players growing up together. The early years when we were beaten by bigger sides were now in the past. It was our turn to do the winning. Frank Walsh did a great job and helped to develop players like Kiss, Kirwan, Foy and yours truly”.

By now, the honours were coming Saddleworth's way thick and fast. In two years they won the Lancashire under-18s cup and played in the National under-18s final as well as picking up numerous league and cup trophies in Yorkshire.

The under-16s developed into the under-18s and came under the shrewd guidance of Brian Gartland. Brian coached the team intensely and crowds of more than 1,000 regularly watched the Rangers youngsters. Visiting



teams like Corpus Christi of Leeds, with Ellery Hanley, and Wigan St. Patrick's, with Andy Gregory, always received a rousing welcome up Greenfield way.

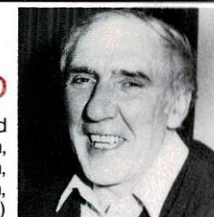
“We had a great following”, recalls Terry, “and it was no surprise when the scouts began to queue up for our signatures”.

Education had to come first in the Flanagan household, however. Father Bill would not allow the scouts and their flashing cheque books to interfere with his son's studies, and he explained: “Although Terry was hitting the headlines I explained to him that his education was more important than rugby and his priority had to be his 'A' level studies.

“All he did was delay turning professional for one year and it ensured that he got to university”.

When Terry asked me to say a few words about him I was as thrilled as the day I signed him as a professional footballer for Oldham in 1979. Every club in Lancashire was chasing Terry, whom I had coached from being 17 years of age, and he has now represented his county and country at every level, both amateur and professional.

Dedication, commitment, a good attitude and a hatred of defeat are part of Terry's psychological make-up and that's what makes him special. He is always striving for perfection and he expects the same from his team mates. This is why he is such a popular player.

The honours we won together, at both amateur and colts levels, are too numerous to mention,

but I know how proud Terry was, at 18 years of age, to lead out Great Britain against France from his favourite loose-forward position.

He then went to France in the colts international as vice-captain, scored the last of his side's six tries, and had a hand in the other five to win the man-of-the-match award. Terry then went on to captain the under-24s to two victories over the French, first in Carpentras and then at Watersheddings, culminating in a Great Britain tour of Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea in 1984. He also won a man-of-the-match award against the Kiwis in New Zealand.

I could write a book on Terry's achievements, but I hope I have covered some of the main highlights of a marvellous career.

To conclude I would like to ask the fans to show their appreciation by supporting his testimonial to the best of their ability. Terry has given his one professional club his talent, skill, sportsmanship and loyalty over almost a decade . . . and no player can do more than that.

"Oldham - start of an era!"

Amid strong competition from the top clubs in Lancashire and Yorkshire, Oldham secured the signature of Terry Flanagan on a warm Wednesday evening in June 1979. Other clubs had been waving the cheque books around for some time and the cagy Flanagan, with his mentor father Bill, negotiated a then record deal for an amateur.

Said Terry: "With a lot of money being offered it was vital Oldham came up with a good package deal. I desperately wanted to play for Oldham, my home-town club, as all lads do. With my brother Kevin playing there and my big pal Paddy having just signed, Oldham were going

to get my signature if they could match the contracts offered by their rivals.

"They did - and I celebrated in style that night with my Mum and Dad in the old Wine Lodge in Oldham town centre, with a large cheque in my back pocket".

Terry quickly established himself in the first team at Watersheddings, playing alongside experienced players like Bill Francis and Ken Gwilliam. His silky skills opened up defences time and again and he won the Oldham player-of-the-year award in his first season. It was also interesting to see Flanagan, still a teenager, helping Union converts Bob Mordell and Adrian Alexander to settle into a promotion-winning Second Division side.

As well as playing regularly in the senior side Terry was still eligible to help out with the colts and he was selected as vice-captain of the Great Britain colts team with his Watersheddings team mates Ray Ashton and Paddy Kirwan. It was a team that contained many players who were later to become household Rugby League names, such as Tony Myler, Mike O'Neill, Brian Noble and Colin Whitfield.

While developing nicely in the tough world of senior Rugby League, Terry was also working hard at his studies. He had, by now, won a place at Manchester University to study for an honours degree in electronics. He was heard to remark at the time that University life was a great escape from the pressures of rugby. Similarly, his rugby was an excellent outlet for the pressure that was building up for him as an undergraduate. Life on the campus was far removed from life at Watersheddings!

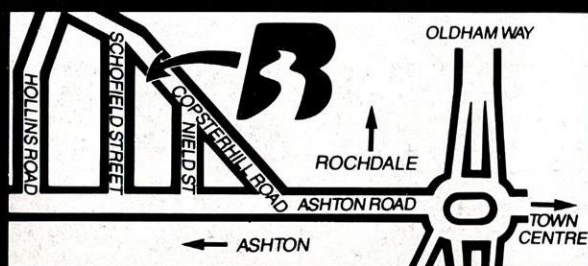

Terry gained his first Lancashire cap after only 29 first-team games and then played for Great Britain under-24s against the touring Kiwis at Fulham. He produced a storming display against the tourists and was duly selected for the full Great Britain squad for the Third Test.

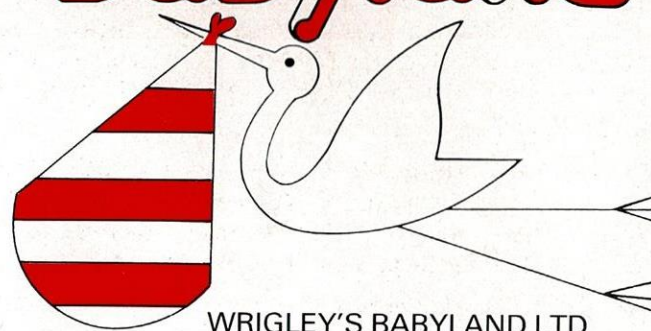
"The game at Craven Cottage was unbelievable" says Terry. "Though I say it myself, I had a great game in bitterly cold conditions and I was overwhelmed with the coachloads of Oldham players, officials, friends and supporters who travelled all day and didn't arrive home until the small hours.

"I was selected for the Third Test squad. Although I didn't get in the team it was a great experience just to be there and I learned a lot merely by watching how the stars prepared for a Test match. That experience was later to come in useful when I made my Test debut in 1983".

At club level, life was proving difficult. Oldham's experienced team was finding it hard to compete in the First Division. By Christmas all the experienced players had left the club, leaving a big gap in the playing squad.

The club's youngsters were then thrown in at the deep end and Terry became the youngest club captain in the game and in the history of the Oldham club. He was a mere 19.

ARRIVAL OF BIG FRANK

The Oldham club was relegated that season but with the accent on youth and Brian Gartland in charge of the youngsters there was still an air of optimism with players like Andy Goodway, Mick Worrall, Ray Ashton, Paddy Kirwan and Terry Flanagan gaining vital experience.

The summer came and Oldham pulled off a major coup by obtaining Frank Myler and Peter Smethurst as coaches. Gartland remained and was to work closely with the two new men.

"When Frank arrived at the club we all knew he was a winner", recalls Terry, "and his style brought out the best in players. He had a simplistic approach to the game and it worked wonders.

"Defence, which we had neglected, was soon tightened up and in Frank's first season we won the Second Division championship, losing only two matches".

Flanagan had captained Oldham to their first piece of silverware for many years and the future was bright. The end of season 1981-2 saw Terry return to the representative scene, playing for Lancashire in the end-of-season county championship.

This put a massive burden on him because he was taking his final exams at university at the same time. Needless to say, he coped with playing exceptionally well for Lancashire and gaining a second-class upper degree!

The influence of Frank Myler was amazing. Frank improved Terry's defensive game and encouraged his attacking flair and their association was later to flourish further.

My first recollection of Terry was as a ten-year-old at the Oldham Catholic schools' sports day which I was watching with his cousin Bernard. At first glance he looked a very unlikely prospect as a Great Britain tourist with his Joe Ninety glasses and Billy Bunter physique. However, even at that early age, Rugby League was in his blood, his brother Kevin playing at Watersheddings and his father Bill, an ex-professional player, running the St. Mary's amateur team.

A year later we met up at St. Anselm's School where Terry quickly showed that his lack of athletic physique was more than compensated by a sharp footballing brain and excellent ball skills. This applied equally to the soccer field as it did to the rugby pitch. His skill was soon recognised and during his first season he was selected for the town team and the following year he played for the Lancashire schoolboys' side. Since then Terry has developed his skills and worked with great determination on the fitness aspect of the game to go on and represent his country at every possible level.

Without doubt Terry's success has been based on a terrific attitude to training, both fitness work and ball skills, and if I had to choose an example of a professional player to any youngster just starting out in the game Terry would be top of the list. Much of his skill and attitude has been bred into him, from his father and especially his brother Kevin. Terry will be the first to acknowledge the influence of Kevin who rarely missed seeing Terry play as a schoolboy and took every opportunity to get him down to Westwood Park for training and ball work. Indeed, it was not unknown for a gang of us to meet Kevin in school dinner hours and have a game of tig-and-pass on the local playing fields.

Since I was 11 years old I have been lucky enough to play alongside Terry in every school and club side he has been associated with. From this position I have been able to appreciate more than anyone the tremendous contribution he has made at all levels. People invariably talk about Terry as a skilful attacking player but, in reality, he has often been the unsung hero on defence thanks to non-stop covering that has often made him leader of the tackle count.



During his career Terry has shown great leadership skills both on and off the field. At Oldham, in his capacity as club captain, he has been a great ambassador and in the dressing room he is always the first to greet new players be they young trialists or Australian stars.

He has always made himself readily available to help out at numerous charity and presentation functions. Some would say that, during the past year, he has enjoyed more success off the field, as an excellent after-dinner speaker, than on the field as a player. However, despite several low spots in the past season, Terry bounced back like a true professional to score the drop goal at Wakefield which clinched the Second Division championship. He followed this with a match-winning performance in the premiership final at Old Trafford.

As well as playing alongside Terry for the past 17 years, I have also enjoyed and appreciated his great friendship. Indeed, more than all the success and good times we have had in Rugby League, his friendship has meant the most to me.

I have no need to wish Terry good luck for his benefit year because, like everything else he does, it is bound to be an outstanding success.

TERRY BECOMES A BRITISH LION

In 1984 Terry reached the pinnacle of his rugby career when he toured Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea. He was initially overlooked by the selectors but when Chris Arkwright was withdrawn, Terry was called up only four days before departure.

He was bitterly disappointed when he was not named in the original party because he had been in the squad for two years and had played in five out of seven build-up games.

"It finally came good when I got the late call-up, but there was so much dashing about to do in the days before departure that I don't remember much about them".

There were few personal highspots for Terry in Australia due to a series of niggling injuries. But when he did play he produced some good performances, particularly at Newcastle and Wide Bay. His traditionally English style of ball play went well against the robust Aussies.

Restricted to a few games because of injury, Terry overcame his disappointment and persevered with daily treatment in a bid to get himself right for the New Zealand section of the tour.

Says Terry: "We had a great time in Australia and the whole squad did marvellously well to close the gap. In each of the three Tests, Great Britain scored the best try of the game and that was one of the proudest moments of my career.

"Although we lost the series we had closed the gap tremendously from the confrontations of 1982 to scores like 25-8. After their big effort, the Test lads were drained when they left Australia and it was asking too much to take on the awesome Kiwis in the New Zealand mud over three Tests.

"Unlike a lot of the lads, I was as fresh as a daisy as we crossed the Tasman Sea to New Zealand because of my lack of rugby. After two consecutive appearances in New Zealand I couldn't resist the temptation to ask Frank Myler if he was trying to burn me out!"

In fact, Terry played in five of the eight matches in New Zealand, culminating in a call-up for the third Test in which he managed to engineer a try for Ellery Hanley before the rampant Kiwis took control.

One of his main hobbies while on tour was to write his own weekly column for his home-town paper, the Oldham Evening Chronicle. Terry despatched interesting behind-the-scenes stories back to England for his regular series on the local paper and he had his own by-line! 'On Tour With Terry'.

It was a well-written, punchy chronicle of day-to-day events on tour, angled specifically on what the five Oldham players were up to, and it went some way to compensate for the paper's decision not to send its Rugby League reporter Roger Halstead.

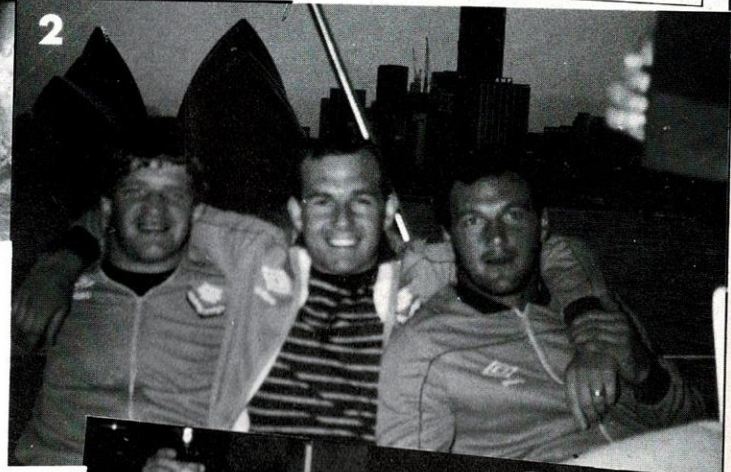

"The lads of '84 were great to get on with. An indication of our friendship is the fact that, even now, we can knock lumps off each other during matches before meeting up in the bar afterwards to swop tour yarns".



DESPITE the disappointment of our six Test defeats, the recent Great Britain tour to Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea can be described only as the trip of a lifetime.

The Test defeats in Australia and New Zealand were a blow but we must not let our heads drop because at the end of the Australian leg of the trip we had closed the gap considerably on the Kangaroos.

Britain must build on that, but must also look seriously into going on separate tours of Australia and New Zealand in the future.

Some wise words were spoken after the third Test in New Zealand when the Kiwi president stated that the time had come for Britain to scrap the two-in-one tours Down Under and visit each country separately.

Dead right! By the time we hit New Zealand we were beginning to feel jaded after playing two games a week, travelling thousands of miles in Australia, and taking on the world's best in the Tests.

In New Zealand we started all over again and played too many matches in too short a time.

County matches in years gone by, in both countries, were little more than training stunts but nowadays these matches are like mini-Tests — physical and competitive.

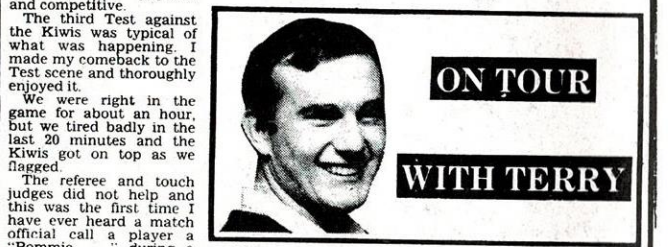
The third Test against the Kiwis was typical of what was happening. I made my comeback to the Test scene and thoroughly enjoyed it.

We were right in the game for about an hour, but we tired badly in the last 20 minutes and the Kiwis got on top as we fluffed.

The referee and touch judges did not help and this was the first time I have ever heard a match official call a player a "Pommie..." during a game!

Anyway, the English season now beckons and I hope to see thousands of you up at Watersheddings as Oldham bid to improve on their mid-table place in the First Division over the past two seasons.

buildings were closed, but there was no other traffic using the airstrips so we actually played a game of soccer on the runway.

On another flight, we passed desperately close to tree-covered mountains on our way to Mount Hagen which is in a large basin of tropical rain forest.

On arrival, hundreds of locals were waiting for us with their noses pressed flat against the airport windows.

The ground where the Test was due to be played had only limited accommodation so we were advised to change at the hotel and travel to the match in kit. It was strange travelling to a full Test match like that.

When we were about one mile from the ground, we turned down a winding dirt track which was jam-packed with the natives.

to touch us or just get a glimpse of us.

The police did not like it and they were violent in their use of whips to clear the people from the sides of the bus — a sad sight because we all felt the local people were merely being hospitable.

It was an unforgettable day and to cap it all I was proud to be named Britain's man of the match at the evening reception.

During the game the local winger hit one of our players, and we were all puzzled when the crowd gave their own man a lot of verbal abuse.

It was pointed out to us later that, to many natives, the white man is still master and to actually hit a white man would be regarded as a terrible crime.

So ended a marvellous trip and a fund of memories that will stay with us as long as we live.

PARADISE

But first I must tell you a bit about Rugby League in Papua New Guinea. What an experience that was!

We were apprehensive on the 51-hour flight from New Zealand and it did not help to ease our worries when, on the drive from the airport to our hotel, we saw the type of tin-hut houses used by the natives.

How lucky we are to live in the Western world with so many comforts which we all take for granted.

Mind you, there are compensations for living in Papua. We found one of them after a frightening journey by raft, through shark-infested seas, to a paradise island just out from Port Moresby harbour.

It was a raft used by local fishermen and it was so unsafe that two locals were bailing out all the way across the harbour.

When we arrived it was worth every hair-raising second of the trip — real Robinson Crusoe stuff with white sand, deep blue sea and a totally deserted island.

Papua New Guinea is the only country in the world where Rugby League is the national sport, and the interest among the natives is phenomenal.

Apart from the rugby, we found the country fascinating and on our interior flight we had to be diverted due to low cloud for an overnight stay in the jungle at a place called Madang.

On arrival at Madang airport, all the reception

VIOLENT

The nearer we got to the greater the crowd became and despite our police escort, it was a frightening experience as the hundreds of natives banged on the mini-bus and chanted songs.

When we arrived, we found there was as many people locked out as there was inside and it was an unbelievable sight to look on 15,000 black faces staring and chanting at us and doing tribal dances.

At half-time a large number of local fans climbed out of the trees surrounding the ground and on to the stand roof, much to the annoyance of a police man who marched over with his machine gun as the crowd rapidly broke up.

On our journey back to the hotel, thousands of natives thronged forward

Papua Memories...

The last section of the 1984 tour took the squad to Papua New Guinea. This was a marvellous experience by all accounts and Terry takes up the story.

"To play in equatorial conditions in a third world country, whose national sport is Rugby League, was a truly magnificent experience.

"We had a great week, despite all our apprehension, and we felt privileged to play in front of 10,000 people, many of whom had walked for days to attend the match!

"We finally won a Test match on tour and I managed to pick up the man-of-the-match award.

"One of the funniest moments of the tour happened in PNG when, during a day's boat trip to a deserted jungle island just off Port Moresby that accomplished athlete and swimmer, Joe Lydon, decided to go over the side of the boat on the homeward sail, diving in and out of the water. Upon arrival at our hotel the receptionist asked us, through an interpreter, if we had enjoyed our trip through the waters known as 'Shark alley'. The look on Joe's face will remain with me forever".

Terry enjoyed the tour immensely, but he paid tribute to his colleagues for making the trip such a success and added: "On tour you really get to know people. Having a friend in normal life is comparatively easy but having to live with someone so closely, as you do on a long tour to the other side of the world, really builds up camaraderie".

After Beaumont was carried off in the first five minutes with a broken leg Terry Flanagan inspired Great Britain to a superb 29-11 victory, being involved in just about every score and showing tactical knowledge, vision, leadership, skills and a maturity well beyond his 19 years of age. He repeated the performance in a 31-2 victory over France in the return fixture at Oldham and could have attracted a top transfer even at that early stage if he had been available. As business manager of the 1984 Lions squad to Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea I was delighted when Terry was selected and although injury restricted his appearances in Australia he proved a model tourist throughout the difficult 13-week trip. He came back strongly at the end of the tour to show fine form and force his way into the Test side for the third Test against New Zealand at Auckland and in the final game, the Test against Papua New Guinea at Mount Hagen.

His willingness and ability to play in every position of the pack at Oldham over the years has not only been of great value to his club but typifies his thoroughly professional attitude, loyalty and love of Rugby League.

As secretary of the British Rugby League Lions Association of former tourists I know how proud he is to be a member of this unique body and how thrilled he is to attend Lions reunions with his equally-proud father, Bill, and mingle with the game's all-time greats.

On behalf of all Lions members I wish Terry the successful benefit year his outstanding career merits and future success with Oldham in the top-flight.

One night I drove over to the pub then kept by the Flanagan family in Featherstall Road, Oldham, and I was most impressed by the talks I had with Terry and his father, Bill.

He signed for Oldham, of course, to the bitter disappointment of a few other clubs, and throughout all his years at Watersheddings he has been a credit to his club, his family and himself both on and off the field.

I think it says a lot of Terry's attitude and ability to record that he has represented his country at all levels, from colts to full Test appearances, while with a club that has never really been a top force in the game for the past 30 years.

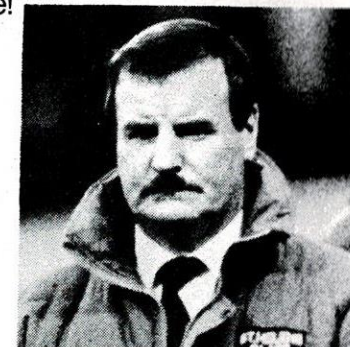
In other words, he has not had the opportunities to put his talents to the fore that many of his peers have enjoyed with more fashionable clubs. This is not being disrespectful to Oldham. It is, nevertheless, something that has to be considered when looking at Terry's career over the past 300 or so matches for club, county and country.

To pursue the same theme, I have always felt that he has not had the forwards around him at Oldham to bring out the best in his undoubted handling ability. He has often had to do things that other forwards should have been doing to allow him to concentrate on what he does best and I think that if he had been with one of the trophy-winning clubs over the past nine years he would have been around the international scene much longer than he was.

He toured Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea with Great Britain in 1984 – deservedly so – and I know that, even as he approaches his testimonial season, his attitude to the game and to the playing of it is just as keen now as it was when I talked to him as a fresh-faced kid in the Elevenways in the summer of 1979.

Well done, Terry. I hope you get the benefit you undoubtedly deserve!

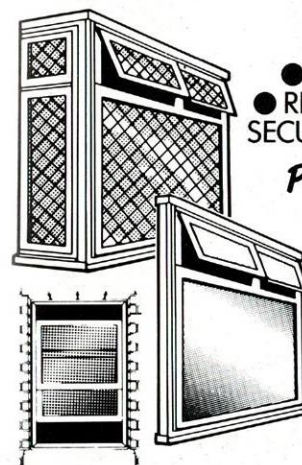

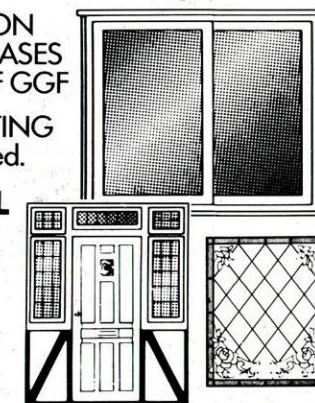

Semi-Final Heartbreak

On a spring day at Central Park, Wigan in 1986, the Oldham club found itself only 40 minutes from achieving the ultimate aim of all Oldhamers – to see the team playing at Wembley. Despite having some magnificent sides, particularly in the 1950s, Oldham is one of the few clubs never to have graced the hallowed turf.

In 1986 Oldham played Castleford in the semi-final at Wigan – the club's first appearance in the last four of the Challenge Cup since 1964 – and despite being in the lead at half-time, the ultimate goal again eluded them as Castleford came from behind to book their place in the final.

Terry recalls that season – and the Castleford game in particular.

“With the influx of the Liddiard brothers, Mal Graham and Gary Warnecke, and with Mick Morgan, Dave Topliss, myself, Ray Ashton, Wally Jones, David Hobbs, Mick Worrall and Paddy Kirwan etc. performing on top of our game, we shook the RL world that season.

“That was the best Oldham team I've played in and I have a lasting memory of David Liddiard catching the ball from the kick-off against Carlisle at Boundary Park, and running the full length of the field to score inside ten seconds without one Carlisle player laying a finger on him.

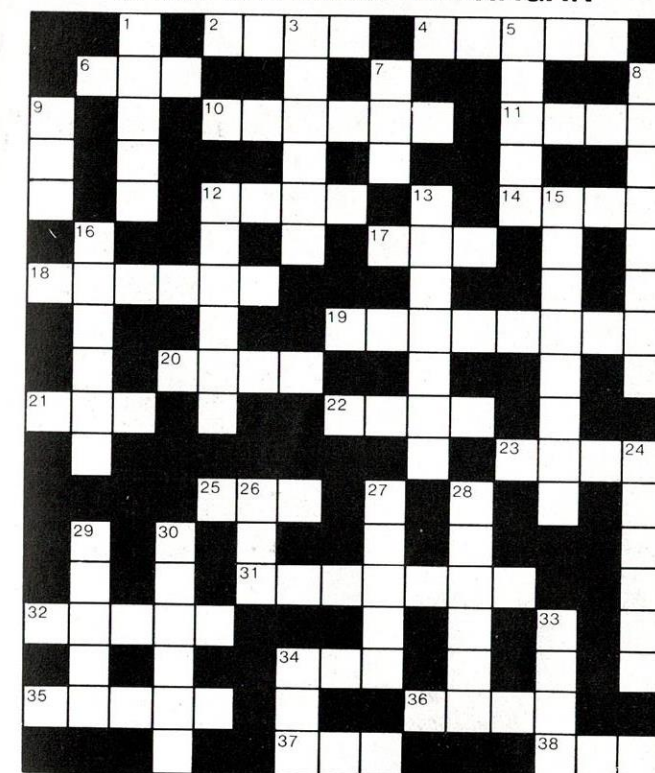
“We had a great cup run only to fall to Castleford in the semi-final. I have two memories of that game – being substituted at half-time when we had just regained the lead and Bob Beardmore's try which was allowed even though his legs were over the dead-ball line”.

People close to Terry know just how much it meant to him to be part of the first Oldham team to go to Wembley and he does not hide his emotions on this topic.

As he says: “Losing any semi-final is devastating, but with so much hanging on the Castleford game it was sheer hell to lose like that. I really felt for those marvellous Oldham fans and I firmly believe that once we break the hoodoo, and get to Wembley, the town will really get behind us again. The signs are there. One recalls the great scenes after we had won the Second Division Premiership final at Old Trafford this year. It is just a matter of time”.

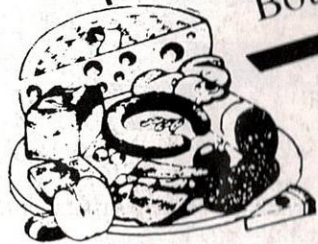

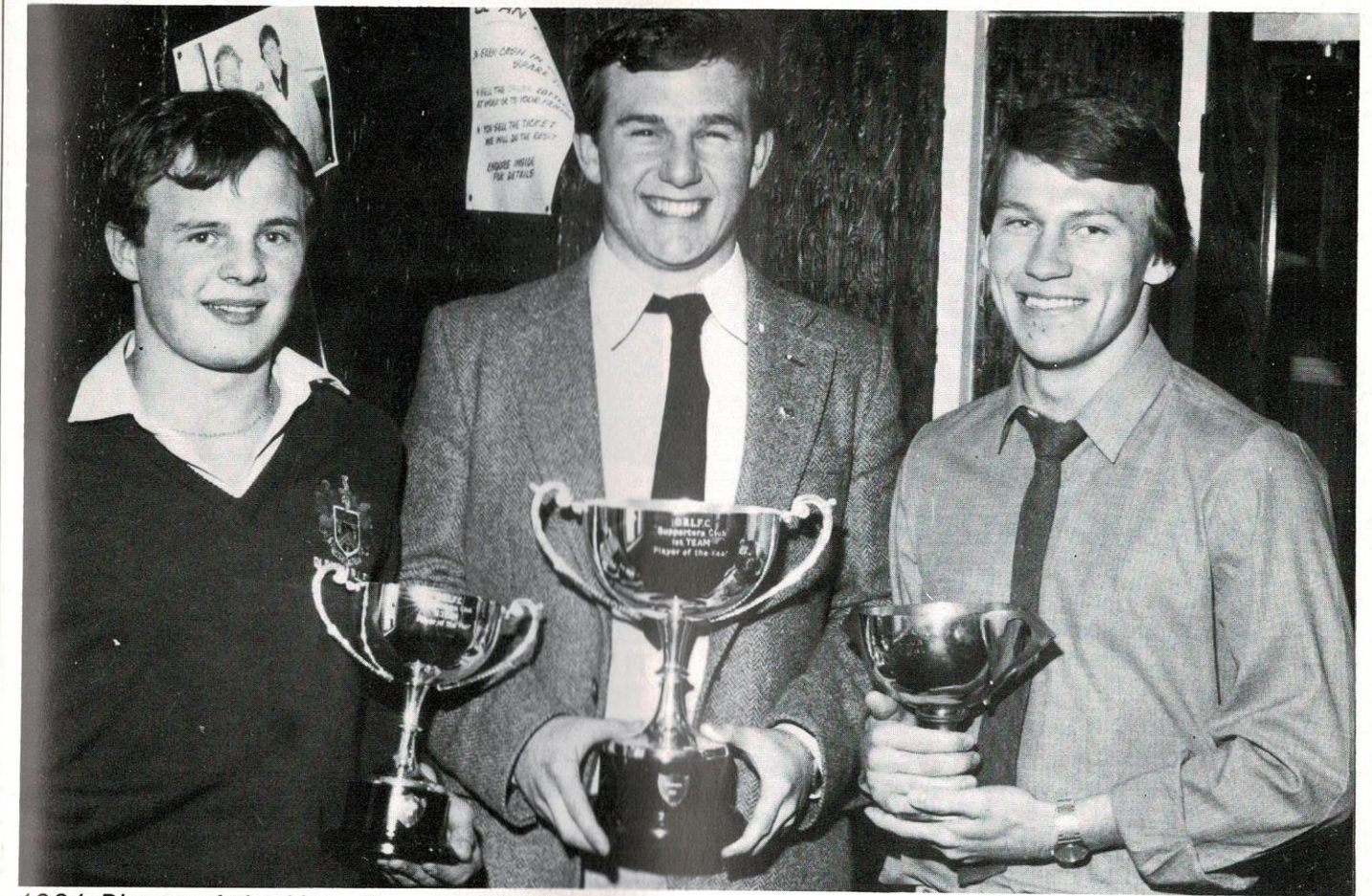

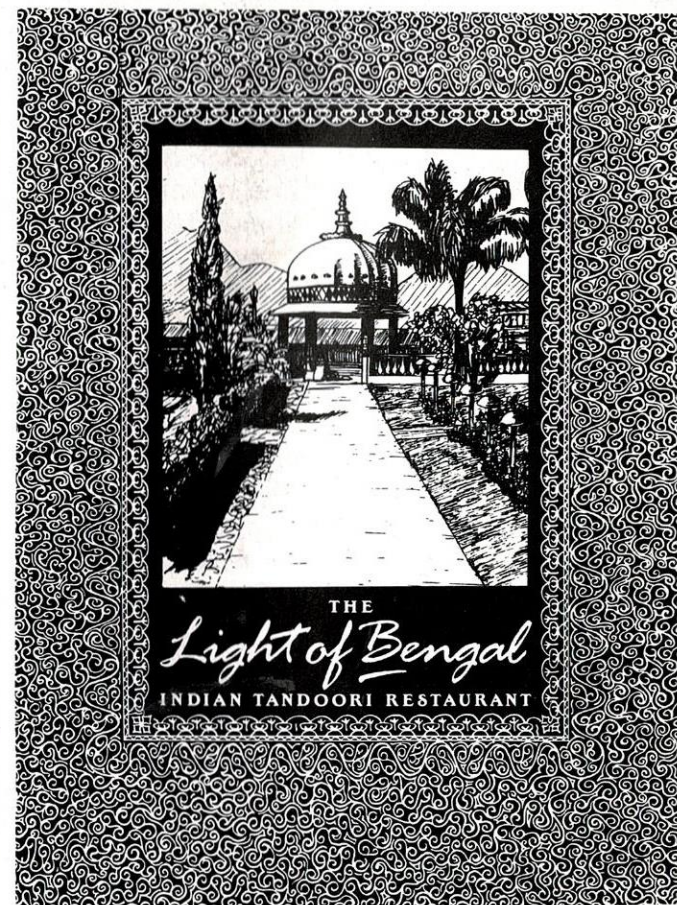

It gives me great pleasure to write a few words in tribute to Terry Flanagan. In two seasons at Oldham I got on very well with Terry. Like me, he is a deep thinker on the game although, with letters behind his name, his thinking is a little bit up-market compared with mine! Seriously, there isn't a better pro anywhere than 'Flash'.

He accepted responsibility, as club captain, at a very young age and soon showed that he was a born-leader. 'Flash' has never been gifted with what I consider to be the main attribute for a player - pace. That means he has had to work harder at his own game than most back-row forwards in order to get to the top, which he did when he went on the 1984 tour.

Over the last two seasons 'Flash' has been used as a hooker on many occasions. I was at Oldham when Frank Myler first suggested the switch to Terry. He wasn't pleased, to say the least, but like the true pro that he is he rolled up his sleeves and got on with the job.

This season he has certainly played a major part in Oldham's Second Division title success. It was clinched against my own Wakefield Trinity side in a 23-22 thriller at Belle Vue and 'Flash', from the No. 9 position, tore us to bits in the first 20 minutes of the game.

Enough of this because his head is big enough. Seriously though, I hope the Oldham fans and the rest of the Rugby League make it a benefit for Terry and his family to remember all their lives. There certainly isn't a more diehard Roughyed than Terry. All the best, Tel.

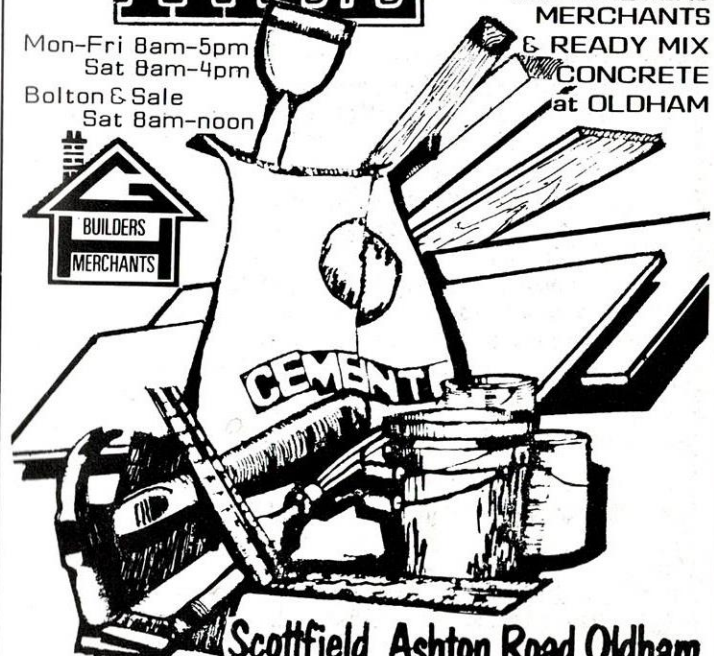

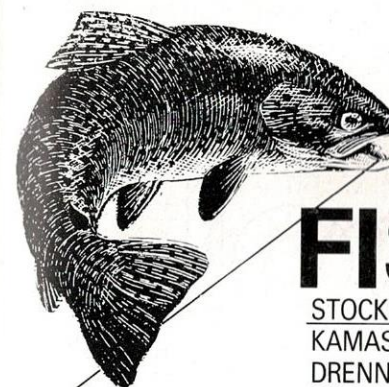

Terry Flanagan - a man of many parts...

Terry Flanagan is a man of many parts – Rugby League forward, after-dinner speaker, Bachelor of Science, young business executive, husband and father. You can see him in a smart suit, brief case in hand, or dishevelled, covered in mud, battered and bruised in the red and white of his only professional club and sporting the widest of toothless grins!

He is also a young man in a hurry. He always has been. It is no surprise, therefore, to record the fact that Terry is one of the youngest, if not the youngest, beneficiaries of an Oldham testimonial.

He signed once he had completed his 'A' levels at school and after only a handful of colts matches and a short time in the 'A' team he made the Oldham No. 13 jersey his own. At the age of 19 – and now studying for his degree in electronics at U.M.I.S.T. (Manchester University) – he was made the youngest skipper in Oldham's history by the coach of the time, Graham Starkey.

His exploits as a ball-handling loose-forward, a clever tactician and a thinker are no doubt well chronicled elsewhere in this brochure. Rather than delve into the record books I prefer to reflect on Terry's career by recalling one or two incidents which stand out in my memory and say as much about the style of the man as about his prowess with a rugby ball in his educated hands.

The record books will show that, in his first season, he kicked a goal in a Lancashire Cup-

tie against Salford. The atmosphere that night at Watersheddings was electric. Oldham drew level with a last-minute try under the posts. In the absence of a regular and recognised marksman, a young Ray Ashton had previously taken over the kicking role. Ray clearly did not relish the idea of taking such a pressure kick and while vastly more experienced professionals debated who was to have the responsibility, teenager Terry demanded the ball, placed it on the 25-yard line and calmly kicked Oldham into the next round. We all knew then that here we had a captain in the making.

The intelligence that, in that same year, was taking him to academic success concluded that this was the easiest of kicks. Only the importance of the goal set it aside from the rest. While the others hesitated, Terry quickly applied the principles of mind-over-matter and got on with the job. Successfully, of course.

Allied to natural ability as a ball player was a razor-sharp brain that he often used to out-wit the opposition. Cute and cunning, he would size up opponents to out-think them and thus compensate for any advantage he might concede in terms of speed and sheer physical power.

He was often said to have an old head on young shoulders. Many were the times, in his early days, when his maturity of mind and speed of thought were decisive in plotting victories for his club, county or country.

In more recent times, the mind has retained its sharpness even if the hair has receded and the legs have slowed down somewhat! Incredibly, the years have flown and Terry is now one of the elder statesmen at Watersheddings. But he's as cute as ever and he can still enjoy a boyish chuckle when he pulls a stroke on the field that helps Oldham to success.

Typical of Terry's attention to detail was the way he transformed a tough game at Workington when Oldham were heading for defeat at half-time during the club's Second Division championship and premiership winning season of 1987-88.

It was the coldest day of the winter. Icy sleet swept in off the Irish Sea, the Town forwards were fired up, Charlie McAlister and Bryan McCarthy had to be treated for hypothermia, and the French referee couldn't understand a word of English – or west Cumbrian!

Penalties and scrums went heavily in Town's favour. The Cumbrians led at half-time and had the advantage of the fierce wind to come. Enter Flanagan, from the bench, to totally change the whole mood of the match. Suddenly, Oldham were in control as Flanagan adopted tactics to suit the conditions, constantly bemused the Town forwards with his outrageous dummy, and ensured that Oldham played out their six tackles.

It was only afterwards, however, that we learned why penalties and scrums suddenly began to go Oldham's way. The story has it that Flanagan, realising the Frenchman's language difficulty, turned back the clock to his 'O' level days and began to help him in his own inimitable style!

"Tete rouge, monsieur", called Terry as each scrum was formed – and the referee duly obliged as Oldham went on to victory thanks to more ball from the scrums.

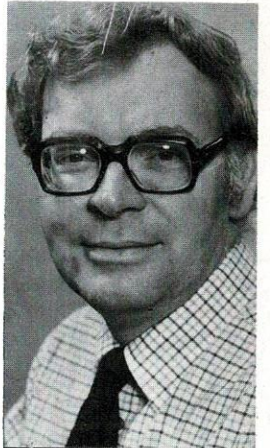
I feel that neither Oldham nor Great Britain made the best use of the combined talents of Flanagan and Ray Ashton to move the ball from one side of the field to the other as they did when totally destroying the French in an under-24 international at Watersheddings.

Nevertheless, Terry can look back with pride and pleasure on a distinguished career – and forward, I feel sure, to many more years in the game as coach, manager or administrator.

He has been a credit to the Oldham club and he has given thousands of Oldham people much pleasure and joy with what he has achieved on the field of play.

I am sure he will get a bumper benefit and I know he will try and ensure that as many Oldham supporters as possible can share with him, many happy hours over the next 12 months.
