



ON THE BARROW BEAT

(A regular feature with Oldham coach Tony Barrow)

THERE'S nothing like the Silk Cut Challenge Cup to get the adrenalin flowing. . . and one of the main reasons for that lies in the fact that the final is at Wembley.

The very name conjurs up memories of great occasions, high drama, brilliant rugby, and matches that will never be forgotten so long as this great game of ours is played.

As a player I was lucky enough to go to Wembley twice — first in 1966 as the St. Helens substitute and again five years later as stand-off to Alex Murphy in the Leigh side that beat Leeds to produce one of the biggest Wembley upsets of all time.

I've been telling my Oldham players now that there is nothing in the game that can compare with a visit to the Empire Stadium, and I'm sure the Wigan players, who were there last year, will vouch for that.

Some of the Aussie coaches who come here cannot understand what all the fuss is about when the Challenge Cup matches come around. If ever they go to Wembley they'll know.

Today's match, therefore, is bound to be something special with Wigan trying to make a return trip and Oldham out to repeat their magnificent victory, in similar circumstances, two years ago when Paddy Kirwan grabbed the winning try almost on full time.

For us in the Oldham camp, we are now down


to the 'nitty-gritty' after wins on the grounds of Second Division teams in the first two rounds, at Dewsbury in round one and at Sheffield in round two.

First Division teams going to places like that are really on a hiding to nothing. I'm sure Wigan will endorse that view after playing at Doncaster in the first round.

On both occasions we scored early points to grab the initiative from the start. After that there wasn't much doubt who would win, but Dewsbury raised their game in the second half and Sheffield, to their credit, kept coming back at us.

Today, the boot is on the other foot. Wigan are the bookies' favourites to win the cup and, as such, all the pressure will be on them.

OLDHAM'S FUTURE A message to all from director Greg Pache

IT is not very often that I speak publicly, or in the programme, but I wish to bring to the attention of supporters the importance of our share issue which remains open until Monday at 3p.m.

As you are probably aware, we have been a members' club since 1876 and we have never been able to compete at top level consistently. Even the little success we have had was more than 30 years ago or as far back as the 1920s.

Being a members club has always hindered progress and limited financial support. For the first time, we can now convert to a limited company but when this was set in motion by the previous committee only £15.000 was raised by members. As it was for a closed company we could never have gained enough funds to keep Oldham Rugby afloat.

The alternative, therefore, was to look at other ideas to create a strong financial basis for success, hence the creation of the PUBLIC LIMITED COMPANY.

This gives an opportunity for everyone, not just members, to become a share holder of the club. i.e. companies, individuals. institutions, amateur club etc, both in the Oldham area and throughout Great Britain.

Putting figures into perspective, the market we are now entitled to pursue is enormous. As an example, our average home support totals about 4,000 and if each one of those 4,000 contributes, say, £100, we would be nearly half way to our target. That in itself would guarantee the survival of the club. Make no bones about it. If you want to continue to see rugby played in Oldham **BUY SHARES.**

It is no use saying: 'It'll be reet. Somebody else can put it in. I'm giving nowt. They'll only waste it. The club'll still be ere!



WRONG. Think again. Be patient. Success takes time. You may say £100 is a lot of money. I'm saying, 'Yes, it is.' However, spread shares around the family and relatives. Ask your bosses to help. Think of every conceivable way in which you could introduce a shareholder. Mention it at your pub or club. I'm sure that, with effort, each supporter could raise £100 at least.

Don't forget also the Business Expansion Scheme. Contributions over £500 entitle the individual to tax relief, effectively reducing net cost for shares by 25 or 40 per cent.

We know suppporters are not satisfied with results. Neither are we. We not only need money to reduce our deficit, but to be in a position to compete for the better class of players.

We have not become directors for the benefit of ourselves. On the contrary, we are here for the benefit of Oldham RLFC. a club which everyone should be proud of and which should be among the elite of the game.

Help us to save Oldham. Help us to make the club great. BUY SHARES, and now is the time to do it.

Don't delay because the offer closes on Monday.

RUN-DOWN ON WIGAN

STEVE HAMPSON (full back) — Signed from Vulcan R.U. Club. Voted the 1st Division player-of-the-year in 1988, following a seson in which he won his first caps for Lancashire and Great Britain, but sadly missed out on the Lions tour down under due to a broken arm and also missed a Wembley appearance. An immaculate fielder of the ball, rated the best full back in Britain, if not the World. TONY IRO (winger) — Giant 21-year-old winger from New Zealand. Only arrived to keep brother Kevin company, but has proved to be very successful. Played in the Wembley Challenge Cup final and was later called into the Kiwi world cup final team.

JOE LYDON (utility back) - Brilliant big-match performer with 17 Test caps for GB plus all individual awards such as Lance Todd Trophy, Harry Sunderland Trophy, 1st Division young player and Man of Steel awards. A cup deadline signing from Widnes in 1986 in then a worldrecord £100,000 cash deal. Began his career with St. Patricks ARLFC. Missed out on GB tour last summer. DEAN BELL (centre) — Current Skipper of World Cup finalists New Zealand and regarded as the best centre in

the world by coach Graham Lowe. First arrived in England to play for Carlisle, joining Leeds in 1983 where he won John Player honours. Did well last season despite missing much football due to a hernia operation.

KEVIN IRO (centre or wing) - Joined Wigan in November 1987 and had a marvellous Wembley display alongside brother Tony. An international discovery of the past two years, playing a big part in New Zealand's defeat of Australia and Great Britain. From Mount Albert club in Auckland. Junior Kiwi in 1986, now sought by many top Sydney clubs.

HENDERSON GILL (winger) - Joined Wigan in October, '81 from Rochdale, having begun with Bradford Northern. Gave a breathtaking display in Britain's glorious 26-12 Test defeat of Australia last summer. Made his England and GB debut within a month of his acclaimed arrival at Central Park. Wigan's top try scorer three times between 1982 and

MARK PRESTON (winger) — Outstanding wing flier signed from Fylde RUFC. Played his 1st major match in the Charity Shield. Scored 8 tries last season including a joint 1st division record of five in Wigan's 62-10 home defeat of Hunslet last April. Fast and a great prospect. GED BYRNE (stand-off or centre) - Ex Salford utility back signed for £40,000. Wigan-born and a product of St. Patricks Club. Scored 84 tries in his six seasons at Salford. SHAUN EDWARDS (half-back) - Brilliant 21-year-old skipper of Wigan, tragically injured in the 1st game of the 1988 Lions Tour, in his tenth appearance, against Papua New Guinea. Britain's youngest international and the youngest player ever to skipper in the Wembley history. Named Young Player of the Year for the third successive season last may. Son of former Warrington favourite Jackie

ANDY GREGORY (scrum-half) - Britain's inspiration of the Lions Tour, saving his finest hour for the epic Third Test defeat of Australia. Another Wigan-born player who began at Widnes. An ill-fated move to Warrington did not work out and Andy was overjoyed to join hometown Wigan for £130,000: Played all five Tests on tour to take his tally to 18 caps. Signed by Illawara for the next Sydney season. BRIAN CASE (prop) - Took the club's player-of-the-year award for a marvellous season in the championship season of 1987. Signed from Warrington 1 week before JPS Final. St. Helens born, winning under 24's and domestic honours, before signing for Wigan in 1983. Three Wembley finals in five seasons.

NICKY KISS (hooker) — Current beneficiary at Central Park after more than a decade of loyalty to Wigan. From Oldham Amateurs Saddleworth. A tigerish player on the pitch, who has a great reputation for stealing the ball.

ADRIAN SHELFORD (prop) — Outstanding in New
Zealand's World Cup defeat of Britain in July. Made his

Wigan debut against Hunslet in 1987 after a High Court ruled him a Wigan player in a contract wrangle involving St. Helens. A tower of strength in the Wigan pack during

the Cup run at Wembley.

SHAUN WANE (prop) — Signed for the club in September,
81 from St. Patricks ARLFC. Man-of-the-match when Wigan overturned Manly in the World Club Championship in October '87. A series of injuries prevented him adding to the GB caps gained in '85 and 86. A strong player who has played in every pack role for the club

IAN POTTER (second-row) — International forward signed three times in his career by Alex Murphy. One of the unsung heroes, but much appreciated by his colleagues. A tackling machine who has helped to win a series of

ANDY GOODWAY (second-row) — Signed from Oldham for a fee of £65,000. Ever present in Wigan's 1987 championship side and a member of the Wembleywinning side. Has the strength of a forward, the pace of a back. Chosen for the Great Britain 1988 tour but had to decline due to business ventures.

ELLERY HANLEY (loose-forward) - Top class looseforward who last summer completed a marvellous spell for the Balmain club. A natural athlete, who has also captained the Lions Tour. Rated by some, the most exciting player and very strong at going forward. Joined Wigan in a £150,000 rated transfer from Bradford Northern. The game's top personality who has a phenominal scoring

IAN LUCAS (prop) — A youngster with a big future. Has come up through the ranks of Central Park to win Colts and International honours. A good strong player.

MARTIN DERMOTT (hooker) - Hooker and Skipper of the Great Britain under-21's side last season. Had an outstanding schools football career. Signed from St. Patricks and destined for stardom.

ANDY PLATT (second-row) — Wigan lad signed from St. Helens in a record cash signing of £140,000. A recent member of the 1988 British Tour. Made his debut for Wigan against Hull K.R.

IAN GILDART (second-row) - A 19-year-old second-row forward with a promising future ahead. Signed from local amateur club Leigh Rangers. Recently played in both under-21 international games against France.







SILK CUT CHALLENGE CUP.

RECORD SILK CUT SPONSORSHIP ANNOUNCED

Silk Cut have announce that they are to continue their sponsorship of the Rugby League's Challenge Cup for a further three years in a record-breaking deal for a 13-a-side code.

Silk Cut are providing £900,000, broken down into annual payments of £275,000 in 1989/90, £300,000 in 1990/91 and £325,000 in 1991/92. Sixty-per-cent of the sponsorship fee will be allocated to prize money, as before, the remainder going into the Rugby League's Capital Development Fund.

Silk Cut have sponsored world Rugby League's premier knock-out event since 1985, the current five-year support totalling £750,000.

Rugby League chairman, Bob Ashby, said: "The record for sponsorship investment in Rugby League has now been broken for the third time inless than four months. Silk Cut's input of £900,000 is destined to set the highest level for several years as the Challenge Cup deal completes our portfolio of major competition sponsorship."

Len Owen, Special Events Director of Silk Cut, said: "We value our association with Rugby League and are pleased to be able to announce its continuation for a further three years. The financial support we have been able to put into the game's most prestigious competition has, we hope, given the game a boost, right down to the grass roots level. In turn, Rugby League has been good to us, it has a good image, and growing popularity as well as the reputation for good sportsmanship."

Jonathan Davies, meanwhile, has earned the praise of Rugby League chief executive David Oxley for giving the sport the impetus it needs to become a national sport in time for the 1995 centenary, by when officials hope the game has spread to London and Birmingham.

The former Welsh Rugby Union captain was an expensive capture for Widnes but Oxley and fellow members of the six-man board believe he has kicked the game into a prosperous new era.

Davies took a detour on his house move from Wales to Cheshire to help officials launch the record-breaking £900,000 Silk Cut Challenge Cup sponsorship deal — the best of three

successive deals that have netted £2.5 million.

"Jonathan's is a face we have seen a lot of in the last two or three weeks. It has been inevitable and it is something that Jonathan, bless him, has borne with great forebearance, courage and co-operation," said Oxley.

"We are absolutely delighted to have Jonathan Davies in our game. We are totally convinced that he has got everything in his skills to make an outstanding professional in the very best sense of the word.

"We are impressed that he took the trouble to help us launch the Silk Cut sponsorship even though he was in the midst of moving house from Wales to Cheshire.

"His head is still firmly on his shoulders and his feet are still firmly on the ground. He is going through a learning process that we know will end with Jonathan being an outstanding Rugby League player."

Davies has boosted the board's belief that London and Birmingham are realistic targets in their bid to make Rugby League a nationwide sport by 1995.

Student competition has achieved that target and the board believe this grass roots success story could pave the way to having four professional clubs in London by the year 2000.

Marketing director and Wigan chairman Maurice Lindsay said: "It is our intention to attack the cities. We plan to move to Birmingham and we intend to make a serious effort to promote the game in the capital.


"There are getting on for nine million people in London and we have never, in our 100-year history, made an impact on this city. It is our determined intention to do so."

London Highfield became the first RL side to play regularly under floodlights after their 1933 launch and Fulham have settled in to a downtable Division Two role after an initial burst of success following their 1980 revival.

Birmingham, which staged Great Britian internationals against Australia in 1909 and 1912, has a number of amateur sides, but the directors believe mediocre Midlands soccer makes the area ripe for development.

Lindsay, who believes sides in either city would command regular gates of 15,000 adds: "We think Rugby League has a tremendous amount to offer. It did have an image as a regional downmarket sport perhaps played by athletes who were not as fit as they should have been.

"The likes of Jonathan Davies prove that is no longer the case and massive efforts are being made to take Rugby League to the pinnacle of world class. "We need the folk of Birmingham and London behind us and I hope by the end of the century we will have four teams in London."

Secondly, we could offer our creditors the option of taking some or all of their credit in shares, thus reducing the debt in a most practical manner.

We are sure no one will need any more reminding of the seriousness of the situation as outlined in the open letter from the chairman Harvey Ashworth to all our fans last week.

All that remains now is for us to point out that Monday (3p.m.) is the deadline and appeal to anyone who is still undecided at this late hour to get on board and cement an allegiance with the club like so many others.




