



defensively to stop the opposition scoring. At the end of the day, points difference could be


a vital factor.

OLDHAM'S FUTURE A message to all from director Greg Pache

IT is not very often that I speak publicly, or in the programme, but I wish to bring to the attention of supporters the importance of our share issue which has now been extended until March 31.

A WELSH Rugby League Players' Association has been launched with ex-British Lions Rugby Union star David Watkins as secretary.

The Welsh team was axed five years ago after running out of players, but Watkins said: "The increased number of Welshmen turning to League gives us hope for the future."

Watkins added: "We could have a membership of more than 200 players who have left the Valleys to turn to League from Union."



ANDY WILSON (Centre/Winger) — A Leeds lad whom Trinity snapped up as a free agent this year having had experience with Sheffield Eagles. Strong and elusive.

LINDSAY ROTHERFORTH (Winger) — Signed from Redhill Club (Castleford) in 1981, he was Northern Counties 200 metres sprint champion. Has been dogged by injury problems but is one of the League's quickest wingers.

JAMES LEULUAI (Centre) — Kiwi international brought back from New Zealand by Trinity. Many successful seasons in Britain with Hull — including Wembley appearances — and latterly with Leigh.

PHIL EDEN (Centre/Winger) — A product of Trinity Colts, he gained GB U/19 honours and has now developed into a powerful, straight runner equally at home, at centre or wing.

ANDY MASON (Centre) — Has represented Yorkshire in both R.U. and R.L. codes. Came to Belle Vue after spells with Bramley and Leeds. One of the fastest centres in the game.

PHIL FOX (Winger) — Experience with Leigh and Leeds has made him one of the deadliest finishers

in the game, as his regular try-scoring feats testify. STEVE ELLA (Stand-off) — The 'Zip-Zip Man' from Sydney's Parramatta Club, he has represented Australia and the Rest of the World side which played Great Britain in October 1988. Had a

played Great Britain in October 1988. Had a spectacular season with Wigan in 85/86 and is proving to be a great asset to Trinity. A more-than-useful goalkicker and tactical kicker.

MARK CONWAY (Scrum-half) — A local product who was snapped up by Leeds but who has now returned to his home town team. Trinity's Player of the Year last season thanks to his pace off the mark and eye for an opening. Colts U/21's international.

BRENT TODD (Prop) — New Zealand international with a huge appetite for work. Trinity brought him over from Canberra Raiders Club whom he represented in the 1987 Grand Final in Australia.

BILLY CONWAY (Hooker) — Ex-boxer and another product of Trinity Colts, Billy is one of the smallest but fastest No. 9's in Rugby League.

KEITH PAYNE (Prop) — International who returned to Wakefield from Leeds to add power and stability to the pack. Tougn as teak.

PAUL MALLINDER (Prop) — All-action player, whom Trinity bought from Bradford Northern early in 1987. Can also play second row.

MARK GRAHAM (Second Row) — Captain of Trinity, New Zealand and the Rest of the World teams: one of the finest and fairest forwards in Rugby League. Played many seasons for North Sydney before joining Wakefield. 6'5" and 16 stones make him a difficult man to stop — or beat.

ANDY KELLY (Second Row) — Another product of our Colts, he was a great success with Trinity before his £60,000 transfer to Hull K.R. Now in his second spell at Belle Vue, he is playing as well as ever

NIGEL BELL (Loose Forward) — Wakefield's "Mr. Consistency" he rarely fails to make ground or a tackle. Signed from local club Eastmoor 6 years ago, he is equally effective at scrum-half.

IAN SHELDON (Loose Forward) — Signed from Bradford Northern 2 years ago, he can also play hooker.

STEVE NORTON (Loose Forward) — Has a wealth of club and international experience when with Castleford and Hull but has now teamed up again with Dave Topliss. Brilliant play-maker.

GARY PRICE (Loose Forward) — A local teenager whom Trinity signed for a club record fee for a junior player. Has since represented GB at U/19 and U/21 levels. A big future is predicted for this skilful ball-handler.







WATERSHEDDINGS SURVEY

SHARES: ANOTHER BIG PUSH

OVER the course of the next fortnight we are planning another big push on the sale of shares and, to that end, we are appealing for help from as many people as possible. If you have not bought shares yet, please give serious consideration to it because the very future of the club is at stake. If you have bought, perhaps you might be able to spare a few hours in a labour of love to help the club to conduct a concentrated marketing exercise across the town and the metropolitan borough.

At the time of writing, the share-issue figure was approaching £150,000 excluding the £50,000 contribution of the directors. That was the result of a marvellous public response once we had revealed that there was a very real threat to the club's existence if we did not hit the £100,000 minimum with which to launch the PLC.

To everyone who has contributed a very big THANK-YOU. We must not, however, believe that the club is now ready to compete on equal terms financially with clubs like Wigan and Leeds, which is our ultimate aim.

The money that has come in so far — £200,000 all told — does not even cover the club's outstanding debts of £350,000, and that's before we even start to think about strengthening the playing squad and developing the stadium and our 12 acres of land.

Tony Barrow told the public meeting that he wanted to buy four more players to strengthen the squad and that he anticipated that he would need about £350,000 to get the players he wanted and required.

What we have pulled in so far from the sale of shares soon begins to be viewed in its proper perspective and, in real terms, it has merely given us a chance to proceed with the public company.

We have on offer a total of 750,000 £1 shares, but the period of sale cannot go on indefinitely. At present it closes on March 31 and before that date we have a lot of work to do to get around the town to as many people as possible.

The four directors have their own businesses to run and they need HELP on this project — as much HELP as possible. Commercial manager Ray Hill and his helper, John Watkins, have been getting around the pubs and clubs in the past fortnight, but to cover the town properly we need volunteer helpers from among the supporters.

YOU can help in a variety of ways. If you could not get along to the public meeting in the social club on Thursday, at which we asked for volunteers to come along, call in at the office today and leave your name and address or ring the project manager, Brian Kirkham, tomorrow on 624 4865, to offer your services.

We are looking for people to help in the distribution of the prospectus, possibly on a house-to-house basis, to go into the factories and workshops of the town, or to offer their services merely as prospectus distributors before the Widnes match on Wednesday night, the Standard Cup final next Friday, and the Wigan game on Easter Monday.

Above all, we are open for ideas. Quite a lot of people have pointed out, in letters to the press, and at the public meeting, that volunteer help is always available, either for work on the popular side or for assistance in other matters as and when required.

Well, now is your chance to get involved in the marketing of the share issue. It's a oneoff exercise and we don't have all the time in the world. Remember this: for every single £25 that comes in, the club moves a step nearer the sort of success we all yearn for.

We need YOUR help to spread the gospel, either indirectly as an individual in your own way or as part of the organised volunteer work force that we hoped to set up as a result of Thursday's meeting. If you want to help, please contact Ray Hill or Brian Kirkham or just ring the office on 624 4865.


ALL-TICKET CLASH



MATCH REPORTS

ST. HELENS 58, OLDHAM 12

AFTER the great performance against Wigan in the Cup, everything seemed to go wrong on the following Wednesday night. To start with. there was a dispute between St. Helens and Oldham over the new date of this match and the League backed Saints in their demand to play so soon after the cup-ties.

It meant that we were without Chris O'Sullivan, who had left for home, but they could play Paul Vautin, who was making his last home appearance of the season.

As luck would have it, Keith Newton cried off with flu and sickness on the day of the match and with the game still in its infancy Kevin Meadows dislocated his collar bone and somehow managed to complete the match.

Andy Ruane had another good game and John Cogger, captaining the side from stand-off, quickly exposed the home defence around play-the-ball.

It was Cogger who broke superbly to set up the first Oldham try for Leo Casey, while Ruane's little chip on the last tackle created the second try for Meadows, Duncan Platt adding both goals.

OLDHAM 40. FEATHERSTONE 18

WHAT a difference four days can make! Nobody would have believed this was the same Oldham side as we raced into a 16-0 lead inside the first quarter of an hour to shake Rovers rigid.

We were already 10-0 up when Chris Burton was sent off for a high tackle on John Cogger and within a minute Cogger went under the posts for Duncan Platt to goal and give us a 16-0 advantage.

Rovers came back hard considering they were a man short and they pulled back to 16-8 before we stretched the lead again with Cogger's second try on the stroke of half-time.

The Aussie went on to complete his hat-trick as we nosed into a 26-8 lead before Featherstone scored twice to cut our lead to 26-18.

It took a Paul Round try to get us back on course and we finished at a canter with Keith Newton scoring his second try of the match and Steve Robinson going over in the corner.

Newton and Ruane set up the Robinson try and that was appropriate because both the ex-Widnes lads had impressive games, particularly

Cogger won the man of the match award, but he must have been run close by Ruane, whose tactical touch-finding and clever play in the loose was a major factor in our second consecutive home victory.




