





## ON THE BARROW BEAT

#### (A regular feature with Oldham coach Tony Barrow)

A HOT topic in Rugby League right now concerns Australian players, their contracts, and the demands of the Aussie clubs and League when it comes to problems associated with the overlapping of the season.

We had to bid farewell to Chris O'Sullivan at the very time when we needed him most for the battle to stay in the First Division, but compared with many clubs we got off lightly. The return home, with injury, of Paul Taylor in early January and the fact that Ashley Gilbert did not make a first-team place his own meant that we only really suffered from the loss of one player at such a crucial time.

Some clubs had had to cope with the departure of two or three. Look at Warrington. They were weakened for Saturday's Challenge Cup semi-final and in the final few weeks of the season they have to battle for League points without Steve Roach, Paul Bishop, Les Davidson and Phil Blake. That would tear a hole in any side!

Hull have been involved with a contract wrangle with South Sydney concerning Craig Coleman and there is enough evidence flying around to suggest that, this summer. English clubs will certainly be thinking twice when it comes down to 'talking turkey' with Aussie players or their clubs.

Wigan, our opponents today, seem to have it right. Not for them the loss of players back overseas at a crucial time of the campaign. Most of their overseas boys are New Zealanders and they are here on long-term contracts.

Wigan have had short-term Aussie signings, in the past, but not now.

Widnes have taken a different tack (opting for long-term contracts to Union stars) but, in each case, they have sidestepped the problem that is




now badly hitting so many clubs in the English game. As far as I am concerned, here at Oldham, there will be no short-term overseas signings from now on. We have

John Cogger on a three-year contract and that's the sort of long-term deal I will be looking for in the future. I am not saying we will only sign players from overseas who are willing to come for two or three years, but I am certainly saying that we will not go for players who have to up and

leave us in late February of early March.

Moreover, I will only allow Oldham players to play Down Under in our close season on the understanding that they are back here by August 7 at the latest. Our contracts now are the equal of those offered in Sydney and there is no reason why the Aussies should dictate all the terms and conditions. They will certainly not be dictating to me. My feelings on this are stronger than on any single Rugby League issue.

## 1948-49 KANGAROOS REVISITED (WITH CAPTAIN COLIN MAXWELL) . . . by ROBERT MACKENZIE

THE seventh Kangaroos sailed on "Maloja" on August 5th, 1948, due Southampton on September 5th. The team was announced on the evening of June 19th after a four-hour meeting of selectors. It provided two major shocks: the omission of Len Smith and the appointment of Colin Maxwell as captain.

Smith was captain-coach of Australia in the two previous Tests against the touring Kiwis and was generally expected to retain this captaincy of the Kangaroos, Maxwell had not been selected for either and had not played in a representative game since May 15th, 1948, against Queensland, Maxwell said the following day that he thought his captaincy of City against Country helped the selectors in choosing him as captain. "That was a rugged match which almost developed into a donnybrook. It was a case in which control of the team was essential."

The 1948 Kangaroo tour was the first for ten years because of World War II. As a result, it was the first tour for all players. Maxwell was the oldest player at thirty. The youngest was eighteen-year-old Bob Dimond. New South Wales provided twenty of the twenty-eight members.

Smith's omission caused consternation particularly at Newtown where he played.

Maxwell realised he was in an awkward position and sensed early resentment. He knew that this situation had to be resolved immediately otherwise the tour would be a disaster, he conferred with tour management, a team meeting was held, grievances were aired and full co-operation pledged.

Tour managers Buckley and Simmonds were determined to get team harmony. Management left players in no doubt should sectarian and political discussion be vented offenders would be sent home.

The voyage had pleasant memories for Maxwell and here are some of his recollections:

"The 'Maloja' was referred to as a submarine. This was because when negotiating twenty-feet waves in The Great Australian Bight it sailed under. not over them," he said.

"Trainer 'Chloe' Furness suffered from seasickness and two members of the party convinced him the ship was sinking when they tossed a bucket of water under his cabin door. He spent the rest of the voyage in the stateroom," he said.

"Keeping fit on the month-long voyage consisted of physical training between 6 a.m. and 7 a.m., being calisthenics on RAAF ABC Fitness Programme routine. Ship's Captain informed us that we were the entertainers," he said.

"From this very successful venture Bruce Hopkins, Wally O'Connell and Keith Froome developed a popular night club act on return to Sydney. Jack Horrigan was the comedian of the

tour. These routines proved so popular that we were invited to perform in First Class area," he said.

A re-scheduled tour itinerary meant instead of completing the voyage as planned, a flight from Marseilles was necessary. The Board of Control suggested that part of the team fly to London to meet the commitment to play Huddersfield on September the 22nd. The rest of the party would complete the voyage as scheduled.

"A team meeting vetoed this because it meant that the party would be split into two groups," Maxwell said. "It was agreed that the entire team would travel by air from Marseilles to London. On arrival we transferred by coach to Leeds and then

to Troutbeck Hotel on Ilkley Moor.

"After four weeks on board ship, the team had two training sessions before the opening match against the then leading side, Huddersfield. It was defeated by twenty-two to three."

Maxwell remembered that the grounds were generally heavy: "A sticky, clay mud which clung to boots. When churned it froze and caused a barbed wire effect," he recalled.

Maxwell sustained an injury against Wakefield Trinity which prevented him from playing in all but nine matches of the tour.

He returned to captain Australia in the Third Test. Great Britain won the three Tests played. Maxwell's injury at first was thought to be a pulled muscle but examinations in later years showed a hairline fracture of the right thigh had occurred.

"Food rationing still applied in the United Kingdom and the Kangaroos were given no preferential treatment. We received one ration of meat per week." he said.

The Kangaroos received harsh criticism from the British press because of their "physical" but fair tackling. Experience in previous tours indicated that English players made the ball do the work. The Kangaroo strategy was to upset their momentum, to move up quickly and knock them over. British press and crowds resented this physical approach although the tackling was legitimate.

The team returned after a pleasant four-week voyage on "Canberra".

These days Colin Maxwell divides his time between his home at Nelson Bay and his property in South Western Queensland.

He is active in Rotary, a very fit seventy and is happy that all the controversy surrounding the selection of the seventh Kangaroos is past.

At Kangaroo reunions the 1948-49 team has the largest attendance. Testimony to team spirit forged forty years ago which has endured the test of time.

#### **RUN-DOWN ON WIGAN**

STEVE HAMPSON (full back) — Signed from Vulcan RU Club. Voted the 1st Division player-of-the-year in 1988, following a season in which he won his first caps for Lancashire and Great Britain, but sadly missed out on the Lions tour Down Under to a broken arm and also missed a Wembley appearance. An immaculate fielder of the ball, rated the best full back in Britain, if not the world.

TONY IRO (winger) — Giant 21-year-old winger from New Zealand. Only arrived to keep brother Kevin company, but has proved to be very successful. Played in the Wembley Challenge Cup Final and was later called into the Kiwi world cup final team.

JOE LYDON (utility back) — Brilliant big-match performer with 17 Test caps for GB plus all individual awards such as Lance Todd Trophy, Harry Sunderland Trophy, 1st Division young player and Man of Steel awards. A cup deadline signing from Widnes in 1986 in then a world record £100,000 cash deal. Began his career with St. Patrick's ARLFC. Missed out on GB tour last summer.

**DEAN BELL** (centre) — Current skipper of World Cup finalists New Zealand and regarded as the best centre in the world by coach Graham Lowe. First arrived in England to play for Carlisle, joining Leeds in 1983 where he won John Player honours. Did well last season despite missing much football due to a hernia operation.

**KEVIN IRO** (centre or wing) — Joined Wigan in November 1987 and had a marvellous Wembley display alongside brother Tony. An international discovery of the past two years, playing a big part in New Zealand's defeat of Australia and Great Britain. From Mount Albert club in Auckland. Junior Kiwi in 1986, now sought by many top Sydney clubs.

HENDERSON GILL (winger) — Joined Wigan in October, '81, from Rochdale, having begun with Bradford Northern. Gave a breathtaking display in Britain's glorious 26—12 Test defeat of Australia last summer. Made his England and GB debut within a month of his acclaimed arrival at Central Park. Wigan's top try-scorer three times between 1982 and 1985.

MARK PRESTON (winger) — Outstanding wing flier signed from Fylde RUFC. Played his 1st major match in the Charity Shield. Scored 8 tries last season including a joint 1st division record of five in Wigan's 62—10 home defeat of Hunslet last April. Fast and a great prospect.

**GED BYRNE** (stand-off or centre) — Ex-Salford utility back, signed for £40,000. Wigan-born and a product of St. Patrick's Club. Scored 84 tries in his six seasons as Salford.

SHAUN EDWARDS (half-back) — Brilliant 21-year-old skipper of Wigan, tragically injured in the 1st game of the 1988 Lions Tour, in his tenth appearance, against Papua New Guinea. Britain's youngest player ever to skipper in the Wembley history. Named Young Player of the Year for the third successive season last May. Son of former Warrington favourite Jackie Edwards.

ANDY GREGORY (scrum-half) — Britain's inspiration of the Lions Tour, saving his finest hour for the epic Third Test defeat of Australia. Another Wigan-born player who began at Widnes An ill-fated move to Warrington did not work out and Andy was overjoyed to join hometown Wigan for £130,000. Played all five Tests on tour to take his tally to 18 caps. Signed by Illawara for the next Sydney season.

BRIAN CASE (prop-forward) — Took the club's player-of-the-year award for a marvellous season in the championship season of 1987. Signed from Warrington 1 week before JPS Final. St. Helens born, winning under-24s and domestic honours, before signing for Wigan in 1983. Three Wembley finals in five seasons.

NICKY KISS (hooker) — Current beneficiary at Central Park after more than a decade of loyalty to Wigan. From Oldham amateurs Saddleworth. A tigerish player on the pitch, who has a great reputation for stealing the ball.

ADRIAN SHELFORD (prop) — Outstanding in New Zealand's World Cup defeat of Britain in July. Made his Wigan debut against Hunslet in 1987 after a High Court ruled him a Wigan player in a contract wrangle involving St. Helens. A tower of strength in the Wigan pack during the Cup run at Wembley.

SHAUN WANE (prop) — Signed for the club in September, '81, from St. Patrick's ARLFC. Man-of-thematch when Wigan overturned Manly in the World Club Championship in October, '87. A series of injuries prevented him adding to the GB caps gained in '85 and '86. A strong player who has played in every pack role for the club.

IAN POTTER (second-row) — International forward signed three times in his career by Alex Murphy. One of the unsung heroes, but much appreciated by his colleagues. A tackling machine who has helped to win a series of trophies.

ANDY GOODWAY (second-row) — Signed from Oldham for a fee of £65,000. Ever-present in Wigan's 1987 championship side and a member of the Wembley-winning side. Has the strength of a forward, the pace of a back. Chosen for the Great Britain 1988 tour but had to decline due to business ventures.

ELLERY HANLEY (loose-forward) — Top-class loose-forward who last summer completed a marvellous spell for the Balmain club. A natural athlete, who has also captained the Lions Tour. Rated by some the most exciting player and very strong at going forward. Joined Wigan in a £150,000 rated transfer from Bradford Northern. The game's top personality who has a phenomenal scoring record.

IAN LUCAS (prop) — A youngster with a big future. Has come up through the ranks of Central Park to win Colts and International honours. A good, strong player.

MARTIN DERMOTT (hooker) — Hooker and Skipper of the Great Britain under-21s side last season. Had an outstanding schools football career. Signed from St. Patrick's and destined for stardom.

ANDY PLATT (second-row) — Wigan lad signed from St. Helens in a record cash signing of £140,000. A recent member of the 1988 British Tour. Made his debut for Wigan against Hull KR.

IAN GILDART (second-row) — A 19-year-old second-row forward with a promising future ahead. Signed from local amateur club Leigh Rangers. Recently played in both under-21 international games against France.
