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




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
Yorkshire League Winners 1908/09, 1920/21, 1952/53, 1955/56 1957/58

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
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
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STONES BITTER RECORD PRIZE MONEY

The 1989-90 Stones Bitter Champions will receive a Rugby League record £40,000 prize cheque . . . a 60% annual increase.

The bumper payout marks the launch of a new three-year £750,000 sponsorship of the League Championship and Premiership competitions by Bass North.

Prize money for the three other Stones Bitter titles is also increased by more than 50% with £18,000 for the Second Division Champions, £15,000 for the Stones Bitter Premiership winners and £8,000 for the Second Division Premiership victors.

Half of the 1989-90 sponsorship fee of £225,000 is to be distributed in prizes, including runners-up awards, the remaining £112,500 being invested in the League's Capital Development Fund.

Rugby League Chairman, Bob Ashby said: "The lifting of the Stones Bitter Championship Trophy has been traditionally recognised as the greatest team achievement in a 13-a-side code. This massive increase in the top prize in the Stones Bitter showcase fully reflects the honour of finishing at the top of the table after a demanding eight months campaign.

"Rugby League reached new invigorating heights last season marked by a 25% increase in attendances in the streamlined Stones Bitter Championship, the League title not being decided until the last match of the season, and a record-breaking gate of 40,000-plus for the Stones Bitter Premiership doubleheader at Old Trafford."

Paul Hughes, Marketing Director of Bass North said: "We are convinced that the increased prize money further lifts the prestige of the Stones Bitter Championship and Premiership and consolidates the happy partnership that exists between Bass and the Rugby League.

"We believe the marketing programme we have developed with the Rugby League has contributed to the growth in popularity of the game and the increased crowd attendances, and we look forward to the future with confidence."

STONES BITTER AWARDS

Rugby League's premier Man of Steel Award scheme is to be sponsored by Stones Bitter in a new three-year £50,000 deal.

The Man of Steel title was launched in 1977 and is awarded to the personality judged to have made the most impact on the season, the 1990 award being doubled by Stones Bitter to £4,000. Prize cheques and silver goblets are also presented to the First and Second Division Players, Young Player, Coach and Referee of the Year, the 1990 title winners to receive £1,000. The two runnersup for each of these five category awards will be presented with £200 and an inscribed

The Stones Bitter Man of Steel Awards will be presented at a new style gala dinner at the Holiday Inn, Manchester, on Thursday 10th May, 1990. Great Britain and Wigan skipper, Ellery Hanley lifted the 1989 Man of Steel Award to extend his record to three

WELCOME TO OLDHAM

RICHARD IRVING: Signed for Oldham in August, 1987 from Moldgreen ARLFC and impressed coach Eric Fitzsimmons with his strong-running wing displays, scoring tries against Keighley and Rochdale. Scorer of just two tries-against Wigan and Wakefield-last season. JOHN HENDERSON: Signed from Leigh club, this prolific try-scoring centre suffered through injury for much of last season and scored 8 tries. Scored 31 tries in 1985-86 and another 27 in 1986-87 for Leigh, gaining selection for Lancashire and scoring a try, in a 22-22 draw with Papua New Guinea in 1987. Guested for Sydney Wests in 1985.

CHARLIES McALISTER: A sensational capture from Bradford & Bingley RUFC in February, 1988, scoring 9 tries and 15 goals in 18 appearances in his debut season. Had a summer spell in Australia with the Newcastle Knights, in 1988, improving his defensive abilities. Kicked four goals in the 1988 Second Division Premiership Final. New Zealander with great strength and pace and the ability to play in a variety of back roles.

KEVIN MEADOWS: One of the First Division's most under rated wingers, having previously played for St. Helens and Warrington. Scored 16 tries in 38 appearances in 1987-88. In his second spell at Oldham where he once scored 5 tries in a First Division match against Salford in 1984. Seven tries last season included a hat-trick in a 64-2 Lancashire Cup slaughter of Workington

DUNCAN PLATT: Goalkicking full-back signed in November, 1988, from Widnes. Brother of Wigan and Great Britain forward Andy, he was in Widnes' Premiership winning team in 1988 and contributed 80 points from 16 appearances in their championship win. Excelled for Oldham and scored 41 goals and 98 points in his debut season. Kicked 2 goals on his debut here at Thrum Hall in the 12-0 win last December.

RICHARD RUSSELL: Oldham's major off-season signing, coming from Wigan, where he had gained Great Britain Colts and two Under 21 international selections in 1987 and 1988. Played in every back role at Central Park but received very few opportunities last season. Represented Wigan in the 1987 Lancashire Cup and

MIKE FORD: BARLA Young Lions tourist to New Zealand, in 1983, signed for Wigan from the Oldham, St. Annes ARLFC in August of that year. Won Challenge Cup (1985), Lancashire Cup (1985 and 1986) and John Player (1986 and 1987) honours, before joining Leigh. Gained four Under 21 international caps between 1985 and 1987 and also had a spell with Sydney club Eastern Suburbs. Toured Down Under with the Lions last summer, scoring 5 tries in 7 appearances. Signed for hometown Oldham in January, 1988, after an unhappy spell at Hilton Park, and was outstanding as Oldham defeated Featherstone in an epic Second Division Premiership Final. Totalled 9 tries and 3 drop goals in 19 appearances as Oldham swept to the Second Division Championship in 1987-88. Three tries last season

IAN SHERRATT: Former Bradford Northern prop joining Oldham in April, 1987, as part of a deal which took Great Britain forward David Hobbs to Odsal. Has enjoyed two successful spells in Australian country football. Scored two tries in 12 appearances for Oldham in the promotionwinning 1988 season and was drafted into the side following the sale of tour man Hugh Waddell.

NEIL CLAWSON: Son of much-travelled former Trinity and Great Britain prop forward Terry, Neil is another front-rower with lots of ability. Joined Oldham from Featherstone in May, 1986 and scored 2 tries in 26

JOHN FAIRBANK: Former BARLA international forward signed by Leeds in November, 1987, from Elland ARLFC. One of five League-playing brothers and son of former Leeds and Huddersfield forward Jack. Played 19 games in his debut season for Leeds, but was surprisingly allowed to leave Headingley last August. Strong, forceful

21 year-old whose best is yet to come.

ANDY RUANE: Former Widnes and Rochdale hooker, signed for Oldham by Eric Fitzsimmons, his former coach of the Hornets. A great worker in the loose, with goalkicking skills, he scored 12 tries, 15 goals and 2 drop goals for Hornets in 1987-88. Made his presence felt at Watersheddings, claiming the No.9 jersey and kicking his first goals against Workington Town in the Lancashire Cup tie. One of the most impressive performers in the relegation year, scoring 4 tries and 15 goals.

PAUL ROUND: signed for £65,000 from St. Helens in August, 1987, instantly repaying Oldham with 16 tries in 26 appearances and gaining inclusion in the Lancashire teams which opposed Yorkshire (scoring a try) and Papua New Guinea in 1987. Originally a back-row forward who has played on the wing and at full-back. Nine tries last season including ones in home and away meetings

LEO CASEY: Recruited from St. Annes ARLFC in April 1985, this hard grafting prop-forward scored 3 tries in 8 appearances for the club in 1987-88. 7 tries last season.

JOHN COGGER: An outstanding signing from Runcorn Highfield last season. This inspirational Aussie had picked up the Second Division Player of the Year award in 1987, and starred in Oldham's end-of-season matches, scoring a try hat-trick against Featherstone and totalling 6 tries for the club, to go alongside seven scored for the league's wooden-spoonists. Can play loose-forward or

SHAUN ALLEN: Appeared for St. Helens in 1985 and 1988 Premiership Finals and also in their 1984 Lancashire Cup winning side, gaining an Under 21 international debut for Great Britain against France in 1984. Played centre and in the back-row for the Knowsley Road club, joing Oldham, initially on loan, last season, scoring a try against Widnes

TERRY FLANAGAN: Long serving loose-forward/ hooker who received a club record £31,000 benefit cheque during the summer and was also linked to bigspending Rochdale. Has played for Great Britain on four occasions and toured Down Under in 1984. Five Under 24 caps, plus three Lancashire caps gained in 1980-82. Good ball distributor and a real 100% trier. One of only three surivivors from their 1986 Lancashire Cup Final

COLIN HAWKYARD: Current beneficiary and an unsung workhorse of the Roughyeds pack, being a frequent scorer and a tireless defensive player. 3 tries in 27 appearances in 1987-99, and a further 4 last term. Played for Oldham in the 1986 Lancashire Cup Final against Wigan. Had a 3-match loan spell at Huddersfield in 1981-82.

KEITH NEWTON: Strong back-row forward signed from champions Widnes last season, opening his try account for Oldham with two in the 40-9 Cup win at Dewsbury in the first round. Added another two in a big defeat of Featherstone at Watersheddings.

GARY HYDE: Another of Tony Barrow's recruits, joining Oldham from Castleford, after winning Great Britain Under 24 international honours as a centre in the early 80's. Has played centre and loose-forward for Oldham. scoring the first of four tries in a 23-22 defeat of Salford. Played in 7 major Finals for Castleford, including their 1986 Wembley defeat of Hull K.R.

Oldham continued to build for the future during the summer, with England Schools skipper CRAIG MORT (16) being added to the starlets already at Watersheddings. NEIL FLANAGAN, TOMMY MARTYN and STEVE ENTWISTLE all starred on the BARLA Youth tour of Australia this summer.


I love my football and will continue to play while I enjoy the thrill of it all. Like everyone else, I'll only get a place on merit, though. Competition for places is the key to success.

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BRENDAN HILL

Burly Brendan Hill is back from a hectic summer stint with the Easts club in Brisbane, preparing, like the majority of the Thrum Hall squad, for his first taste of Second Division football. He is determined that it will be the briefest of stays in the lower division for Halifax.

The former Leeds and Bradford Northern frontrower was the hidden, unsung British player out in Australia this summer. While superstars like Hanley, Schofield, Gregory, Lydon and Offiah strutted their stuff in front of bumper crowds, under the glare of Sydney's mass media, Hill opted to join the "Tigers' of the low profile Brisbane league.

The 10-club Brisbane competition is a far cry from the one which was regarded as the second best in Australia, a few years ago. The advent of the glamourous Brisbane Broncos, and their subsequent entry to the Sydney Winfield Cup competition, robbed the Brisbane competition of it's thirty/forty best players, including it's superstars – Wally Lewis, Gene Miles, Allan Langer, Greg Dowling and Kerrod Walters

It is now, effectively, a feeder league for the Broncos, with the very real possibility of a second team from Brisbane, or at least the Queensland state, joining the Winfield Cup in the not-too-distant future.

But even as a tledgling competition, the Brisbane league manages to produce some great players, and Hill enjoyed his time at a well-respected club which was upt at the top of the league for much of the summer. Easts have produced such powerful forwards as Cavill Heugh, Martin Bella, and Hill's former Leeds colleagues Trevor Paterson and Gavin Iones in the 1980's.

But now, one of Rugby League's fallen heroes is looking to get back to the big time and into representative football again. His barnstorming running qualities have made Brendan a favourite with the fans, wherever he has played – but not always with the coaches.

As a youngster at Headingley, Hill waited a couple of years to graduate from Colts football to first-team football, and then made an immediate, dramatic effect. His first try for the club was in a snow-bound confrontation with Halifax, in January, 1985.

Within months the 19 year-old Hill had been named in Peter Fox's first Yorkshire County team – defeating Lancashire at Wigan – and followed that by being chosen as a reserve for Great Britain's team for the 1985 test series against New Zealand. Early in 1986, he appeared for Maurice Bamford's Under 21 side which defeated France 6-2 at Whitehaven.

Soon, though, he became disillusioned with Leeds' spendthrift policies, and the arrival of veteran Jeff Grayshon, effectively reducing his chances, was the



final straw. He wanted a transfer and eventually rejoined Barry Seabourne, his Leeds Colts coach, at Bradford Northern. That was a dream move, as he followed in father David's footsteps.

David had won a Yorkshire Cup winners medal in Northern's 1965 defeat of Hunslet, and, 22 years on, Hill emulated him by starring in Bradford's 1987 replayed Final defeat of Castleford. In a pack containing the likes of Skerrett, Noble, Hobbs and Fairbank, Hill's tank-like charges alerted the media and tour selectors.

It was no less an authority than Alex Murphy who declared that he was amazed at the omission of Kelvin Skerrett and Brendan from Great Britain's 1988 Lions touring party. Props were, after all, in short supply.

Brendan's transfer from Odsal to Thrum Hall failed to arrest Halifax's headlong slide into Division Two, but, in a determined bid to start 1989-90 season at peak fitness, he decided to spend the off-season Down Under. It was his second summer spell in the Southern Hemisphere, having appeared for Mangere East, in Auckland, during the summer of 1986.

"I prefer playing to training without a match", says Brendan, "and I'm hoping for a big season with Halifax. Relegation was a big disappointment for us all, but we must use it as a springboard to bounce back into the big time."

"All the players want a successful league season and, maybe, a cup run or two. That's not impossible for this side. And then there's the Premiership Final at Old Trafford – every Second Division player will be dreaming of that occassion on 13 May."

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
Man of the Match David Holmes on his way to the first of his two tries against Rochdale.




