LADY Luck was once again on Saints side last Monday when, for the third time on the run they were drawn to play at home against 2nd Division opposition. Whilst in the 1st Round Saints comfortably overcame Hull K.R., last Sunday, in the 2nd Round, they nearly blew it against Dewsbury, so Oldham can't be underestimated today — especially when you consider that they were the last team to beat Saints back in September by 36 points to 6 in the 2nd Round of the Lancashire Cup. That night Saints were easily beaten although they had a much weakened side out and both Roy Haggerty and Stuart Evans were dismissed. After my very off-target prediction in last weeks programme I'm reluctant to stick my neck out this week although if I was pushed I would have to say that I think the Regal Trophy semi-finalists will be St. Helens, Wigan, Featherstone Rovers and Castleford.

Widnes trouble

The new Rugby League headquarters ruling on head high tackles looks to have hit Widnes particularly hard in their quest to retain their League Championship trophy for an unpresidented third time on the run. Paul Moriarty was recently banned for eight matches for breaking Hugh Waddell's jaw of Leeds and now after last Saturday's 2nd Round Regal Trophy tie at Central Park, both Joe Grima who was sent off and Mike O'Neill (trial by video) look to face similar bans when they face the disciplinary committee. When you take into account that Emosi Koloto has been out injured since the end of September and is not expected to return until late Fębruary, it seems that Widnes coach Doug Laughton has got serious problems amongst his forwards. It is now clear that every professional player must watch his step whilst on the field regarding high tackles as eight matches looks like it's going to be the normal ban for any first offender.

Aussie Dollars or British Caps

At long last the Rugby League have decided that any player who is chosen to tour New Zealand with Great Britain next summer and declines to go will not be allowed to go to Australia instead, and play for an Australian club. It was rumoured that several top British stars were considering going to Australian sides who were offering them hugh contracts rather than touring with the Lions.

It's a bold decision to make as one top star has already threatened to take the Rugby League to court over the ruling. Wigan's Andy Platt and Widnes's Alan Tait and Martin Offiah have said that they don't want to tour and whether they are selected for the tour or not despite their requests remains to be seen, as if they are selected they can't now go to Australia and play over there.

The decision by the Rugby League poses our top professional players a problem because if they sign for an Australian side and then refuse to go because they are selected to tour with Gt. Britain they could be fired by the Aussie club concerned for not fulfilling their contracts, where as, if they leave a decision until after the tour squad is announced it will give them precious little time to arrange for a contract to play in Sydney.

I personally think that this decision is the right one for British Rugby League. It is so important for the sport in general that Gt. Britain are a major force and if Britain are to have any chance of having a successful tour all the top stars must be available to play. For my money any player who declines to tour solely for his own personal gain i.e. he will get more money on a Sydney contract that on a Gt. Britain tour, should never be allowed to play for Gt. Britain again, as playing for your country should be the highest honour in Rugby League.

JOHN HENDERSON: Signed from Leigh club, this prolific try-scoring centre suffered through injury for much of last season and scored 8 tries. 

BRETT CLARK: St George half back who has recently signed a 1 year contract for Oldham. Will need no introduction to Saints fans. Brett played at Knowsley Road in the 1986/87 Season. One of the most popular of Saints recent overseas signings.






A shock defeat for the Saints against the unfancied Yorkshire side. Despite a gale force wind, the standard of goalkicking was positively amazing! Indeed Castleford's Great Britain international Arthur Atkinson used the freak conditions to great effect. Following an infringement by Saints' forward Ben Halfpenny just after half time, he placed the ball on his own '25' and booted the leather between the posts at the Pavilion End — at over 75 yards the longest goal ever seen at Knowsley Road and a record unlikely to be broken. As Premier reported in the St. Helens

Newspaper:

"It was the sort of performance that made the spectators rub their eyes and wonder whether they would wake up by falling out of bed. Fancy a player kicking a goal off the touch line in the teeth of a powerful wind; kicking another from a yard inside his own half: another from 75 yards range, on his own '25', so to speak. I had only one grievance against this Castleford marvel. He did not attempt to kick a goal from the front of his own posts. Why I do not know. The form he was in and the assisting wind made me feel inclined to believe that he would have succeeded and would have sent us home with something to talk about for the rest of our lives."

REGAL TROPHY THIRD ROUND

WIGAN will be aiming for their fifth successive semi-final appearance when they visit Leeds in the third-round of the Regal Trophy on Saturday. But Leeds are the only team to have beaten them in the competition during this period, winning 19-6 in their last semi-final appearance in 1987-88 at Bolton. Wigan won the trophy in the previous two years and again last year.

St. Helens are going for a third successive semi-final appearance. Of the other third round teams Sheffield Eagles, Featherstone Rovers and Dewsbury are aiming for their first semi-final appearance. Castleford's last semi-final was in 1980-81, Halifax's in 1984-85 and Oldham's in 1987-88

RECORD CROWDS

A total of 49,126 spectators at the Regal Trophy second round ties produced a record aggregate for this stage of the competition since it began as the Players No 6 Trophy in 1971-72. The previous best was 46,273 at the eight ties in 1984-85.

The second round total has almost doubled since 25,446 saw the eight games in the first season.

The 15,564 crowd for Sunday's Leeds v Bradford Northern tie was the biggest-ever in the competition outside the final, beating the 13,413 at the Castleford v Hull second round game in 1981-82.

WINNING RUN

St. Helens' winning run ended at nine matches when they were held to a 12-12 home draw by Dewsbury in the second round of the Regal Trophy.

Oldham now have the current longest winning run of nine successive matches made up of seven in Division Two and two Regal Trophy ties.


