


Welcome to Spotland for our Boxing Day fixture against neighbours Oldham, to whose Directors, Officials, Players and Supporters we offer a particularly warm welcome.

This is Oldham's first visit to Spotland and is the first meeting between the two teams since Good Friday 1987, when Oldham provided the opposition for the last ever match at the Athletic Grounds. On that occasion Oldham were emphatic winners and went on to promotion and the premiership final when they beat Featherstone Rovers. Last Sunday Oldham put up a fine performance with twelve men against St. Helens at Knowsley Road in the third round of the Regal Trophy, which is

further evidence of their all round ability.

We now have to put last week behind us and re-build the Season from scratch, starting with today's game.

The festive treat of the year brings two of the top second division clubs together today. Oldham, currently lying either second or third (depending on which league table you look at) were the last visitors to the Athletic Grounds two years ago when they were promoted. That season saw Oldham win at Watersheddings 24-12 and at the Athletic Grounds 58-6. Last season saw Oldham struggle in the league but have some well deserved victories in cup matches. An inspired purchase of John Cogger caused a mini revival which saw them nearly hang on to First Division status.

Top try scorers last season were Paul Lord and Paul Round with 9 each. Top goal and points scorer was Duncan Platt with 41 goals and a total of 98 points. Finally a Merry Christmas & Happy New Year to all supporters of both clubs.

OLDHAM R.L.F.C. PEN PICTURES: 1989/90 SEASON

JOHN FIELDHOUSE Recent signing from St. Helens, Gt. Britain International — man of the series against the Kiwis. Has settled in and playing the sort of rugby that made him an international.

RICHARD IRVING Signed for Oldham in August, 1987 from Moldgreen ARLFC and impressed coach Eric Fitzsimmons with his strong-running wing displays, scoring tries against Keighley and Rochdale. Scorer of just two tries — against Wigan and Wakefield — last season.

JOHN HENDERSON Signed from Leigh club, this prolific try-scoring centre suffered through injury for much of last season and scored 8 tries. Scored 31 tries in 1985-86 and another 27 in 1986-87 for Leigh, gaining selection for Lancashire and scoring a try, in a 22-22 draw with Papua New Guinea in 1987. Guested for Sydney Wests in 1985.

CHARLIE McALISTER A sensational capture from Bradford & Bingley RUFC in February, 1988, scoring 9 tries and 16 goals in 18 appearances in his debut season. Had a sumer spell in Australia with the Newasatle Knights, in 1988, improving his defensive abilities. Kicked four goals in the 1988 Second Division Premiership Final. New Zealander with great strength and pace and the ability to play in a variety of back roles.

KEVIN MEADOWS One of the First Division's most under rated wingers, having previously played for St. Helens and Warrington. Scored 16 tries in 38 appearances in 1987-88. In his second spell at Oldham where he once scored 5 tries in a First Division match against Salford in 1984. Seven tries last season included a hat-trick in a 64-2 Lancashire Cup slaughter of Workington.

DUNCAN PLATT Goalkicking full-back signed in November, 1988, from Widnes. Brother of Wigan and Great Britain forward Andy, he was in Widnes' Premiership winning team in 1988 and contributed 90 points from 16 appearances in their championship win. Excelled for Oldham and scored 41 goals and 96 points in his debut season. Kicked 2 goals on his debut here at Thrum Hall in the 12-0 win last December.

RICHARD RUSSELL Oldham's major off-season signing,

coming from Wigan, where he had gained Great Britain Colts and two Under 21 international selections in 1987 and 1988. Played in every back role at Central Park but received very few opportunities last season. Represented Wigan in the 1987 Lancashire Cup and Premiership Finals.

MIKE FORD BARLA Young Lions tourist to New Zealand, in 1983 signed for Wigan from the Oldham, St. Annes ARLFC In August of that year. Won Challenge Cup (1985), Lancashire Cup (1986 and 1988) and John Player (1986 and 1987) honours, before joining Leigh. Gained four Under 21 international caps between 1985 and 1987 and also had a spell with Sydney club Eastern Suburbs. Toured Down Under with the Lions last summer, scoring 5 tries in 7 appearances. Signed for hometown Oldham in January, 1988, after an unhappy spell at Hilton Park, and was outstanding as Oldham defeated Featherstone in an epic Second Division Premiership Final. Totalled 9 tries and 3 drop goals in 19 appearances as Oldham swept to the Second Division Championship in 1987-88. Three

STEVE ROBINSON Signed from Saddleworth Rangers 2 seasons ago and has progressed to be a very fine winger.

NEIL CLAWSON Son of much-travelled former Trinity and Great Britain prop forward Terry, Neil is another front-rower with lots of ability. Joined Oldham from Featherstone in May, 1986 and scored 2 tries in 26 appearances 1988.

JOHN FAIRBANK Former BARLA international forward signed by Leeds in November, 1987, from Elland ARLFC. One of five League-playing brothers and son of former Leeds and Huddersfield forward Jack. Played 19 games in his debut season for Leeds, but was surprisingly allowed to leave Headingley last August. Strong, forceful 21 year-old whose best is yet to come.

ANDY RUANE Former Widnes and Rochdale hooker, signed for Oldham by Eric Fitzsimmons, his former coach of the Hornets. A great worker in the loose, with goalkicking skills, he scored 12 tries, 15 goals and 2 drop goals for Hornets in 1987-88. Made his presence felt at Watersheddings, claiming the No.9 jersey and kicking his first goals against Workington Town in the Lancashire Cup tie. One of the most impressive performers in the relegation year, scoring 4 tries and 15 goals.

PAUL ROUND Signed for £65,000 from St. Helens in August 1987, instantly repaying Oldham with 16 tries in 26 appearances and gaining inclusion in the Lancashire teams which opposed Yorkshire (scoring a try) and Papua New Guinea in 1987. Originally a back-row forward who has played on the wing and at full-back. Nine tries last season including ones in home and away meetings with Halifax.

LEO CASEY Recruited from St. Annes ARLFC in April 1985, this hard grafting prop-forward scored 3 tries in 8 appearances for the club in 1987-88. 7 tries last season.

JOHN COGGER An outstanding signing from Runcorn Highfield last season. This inspirational Aussie had picked up the Second Division Player of the Year award in 1987, and starred in Oldham's end-of-season matches, scoring a try hatstick against Featherstone and totalling 6 tries for the club, to go alongside seven scored for the league's woodenspoonists. Can play loose-forward or stand-off.

SHAUN ALLEN Appeared for St. Helens in 1985 and 1988 Premiership Finals and also in their 1984 Lancashire Cup winning side, gaining an Under 21 international debut for Great Britain against France in 1984. Played centre and in the backrow for the Knowsley Road club, joining Oldham, initally on loan, last season, scoring a try against Widnes.

PAUL LORD Signed from Stanley Ranger ARL as a standoff, but recently playing on wing. Represented Yorkshire at U/19's level and Gt. Britain. Has great pace.

COLIN HAWKYARD Current beneficiary and an unsung workhorse of the Roughyeds pack, being a frequent scorer and a tireless defensive player. 3 tries in 27 appearances in 1987-88, and a further 4 last term. Played for Oldham in the 1988 Lancashire Cup Final against Wigan. Had a 3-match loan spell at Huddersfield in 1981-82.

KEITH NEWTON Strong back-row forward signed from champions Widnes last season, opening his try account for Oldham with two in the 40-9 Cup win at Dewsbury in the first round. Added another two in a big defeat of Featherstone at Watersheddings.

GARY HYDE Another of Tony Barrow's recruits, joining Oldham from Castleford, after winning Great Britain Under 24 international honours as a centre in the early 80's. Has played centre and loose-forward for Oldham, scoring the first of four tries in a 23-22 defeat at Salford. Played in 7 major Finals for Castleford, including their 1986 Wembley defeat of Hull K.R.

BRETT CLARK St George half back who has recently signed a 1 year contract for Oldham. Will need no introduction to Saints fans. Brett played at Knowsley Road in the 1986/87 Season. One of the most popular of Saints' recent overseas signings.

Oldham continued to build for the future during the summer, with England Schools skipper CRAIG MORT (16) being added to the starlets already at Watersheddings. NEIL FLANAGAN, TOMMY MARTYN and STEVE ENT-WISTLE all starred on the BARLA Youth tour of Australia this summer.

No doubt Halifax and Hull K.R. will want a say in how things finish, and there's the Challenge Cup and premiership to look forward to.


So, the half-team report is good ... let's hope Hornets can graduate at end of term?

Enjoy the match.





Individua

Most Tries in a Match

VINCE GRIBBIN, SHANE COOPER AND CHRIS BIBB each scored six tries in a match. Gribbin was in the centre when he grabbed his half-a-dozen as Whitehaven beat Doncaster /64-0 in the first round of the John Player Special Trophy on 18 November 1984.

Cooper matched that when the stand off scored six for St Helens in a 64-2 Division One home defeat of Hull on 17 February 1988.

Then Chris Bibb raced up from full back to score six for Featherstone Rovers in an 86-18 John Smiths Yorkshire Cup first round home defeat of Keighley on 17 September 1989.

Most Goals and Points in a Match

PAUL LOUGHLIN OF St Helens, with 16 goals and 40 points in the 112-0 home defeat of Carlisle in the first round of the Grünhalle Lager Lancashire cup on 14 September 1986. The centre's total included two tries.

Highest Away Score

Leigh's 88-2 Division Two victory at Runcorn Highfield on 15 January 1989 also produced the widest winning away margin during the 1980s.

There were two 32-32 draws during the decade. Hunslet and Swinton shared 64 points in a Division One match on 20 September 1988, while Huddersfield Barracudas drew 32-32 at home with Keighley on 17 April 1986.

REGAL TROPHY SEMI-FINAL — ST HELENS V HALIFAX — SATURDAY 23 DECEMBER 1989 KICK-OFF 2.15pm

Halifax are aiming for their first final appearance in the competition since they were the inaugural winners in 1971-72. Then they beat Wakefield Trinity 22-11 at Oldham when the cournament was the Players No 6 Trophy. This is only Halifax's third semi-final, their last being in 1984-85.

St Helens are appearing in their eighth semi-final with their one victory being two years ago when they went on to beat Leeds 15-14 in the Final.

Although this will be the ninth time a Division Two side has appeared in the semi-finals, Halifax are hoping to become only the third to reach the final and the first to win the Trophy. Hull lost 19-13 to Widnes in the 1975-76 final and the following season Blackpool Borough went down 25-15 to Castleford.

Halifax and St Helens have met only twice before in the competition with each winning one as follows:

1972-73 (I) Halifax 20 St Helens 22 1984-85 (3) St Helens 8 Halifax 14



The record score in a semi-final is Wigan's 36-8 defeat of Leigh in 1985-86 with Warrington's 35-4 defeat of Widnes in 1986-87 the widest wining margin. There has been only one drawn semi-final, in 1980-81 Castleford and Warrington drew 5-5 at Wigan before the latter won the replay 22-10 at Leeds.

The record attendance for a semi-final was set in 1987-88 when 13,538 saw Leeds beat Wigan at Bolton Wanderers soccer ground.

Wilf George, the Halifax winger, has scored at least one try in all three previous rounds for a total of six as follows:

Wilf George of Halifax has scored tries in five successive matches. His total of eight tries came as follows:

Mark Lord's try scoring run ended at six when the Rochdale Hornet's winger failed to score in the 25-18 home defeat against Bramley on Sunday. The try scoring runs of Andy Goodway, Wigan, and Andy Williams, Batley, both ended at five in weekend matches.

POINT SCORING RUN

Mark Aston took his point scoring run to 53 matches when he scored Sheffield Eagle's goal in the 18-2 Regal Trophy Third Round defeat against Castleford of Chesterfield. The scrum half's run has brought him a total of 430 points from 209 goals including 16 drop goals and seven tries. He has scored in every Sheffield match since the start of last season.

WINNING RUN

Oldham's winning run ended at nine matches when they lost 32-18 at St Helens in the Third Round of the Regal Trophy.

There is now no team with a winning run of five or more matches.

St Helens have gone 12 matches without defeat, including a 12-12 home draw against Dewsbury in the Regal Trophy Second Round.

LOSING RUN

Runcorn Highfield losing run was extended to 25 matches when they lost 28-10 at home to Whitehaven on Sunday. They have gone 36 matches without a win including an 8-8 draw at home to Workington Town on 22 January 1989. Their last victory was 20-12 at home to Fulham on 30 October 1988.

OLDHAM — THE ATHLETIC GROUNDS — THE FINAL ENCOUNTER

If Hornets had a choice of who their opponents would have been for their final match on the Athletic Grounds, I am sure the men from Watersheddings would have been their "Number One" choice. As it was fate decided that Hornets' last opponents on the ground they had occupied for over 90 years were their great rivals, who had made many an appearance on that historic venue. None more so than on 12th April 1924 when as Challenge Cup Finalists Oldham played Wigan attracting 41,831 to the Athletic Grounds

As for the match itself it was a case of "no contest" as Oldham coached by Eric Fitzsimmons inflicted on Hornets, ironically, their heaviest home defeat in their history. Oldham were yards faster as they tore shreds in the Hornets' defence time after time. Oldham took the lead after four minutes — Foy spinning in for a try. Casey soon crossed to give Oldham a 10-0 lead. Whatever hope Hornets had of getting back into the game disappeared in the 18th minute when hooker Andy Ruane was sent off for a high tackle. Following this full back Mark Sanderson went off injured and Hornets were in complete disarray and further tries from Foy, Atkinson, and Ford gave Oldham a 24-0 lead at the interval.

It was all one-way traffic in the second half. Graham was lucky to stay on the field after a high tackle on Aaron Sawyer (it looked equally as bad as Ruane's). Then the one bright moment for Hornets as Sawyer scored the last touch down by a Hornets' player on the Athletic Grounds, after a fine pass by Neil Cowie. Oldham soon emphasised their superior pace as Foy completed his hattrick, followed by tries by Ford and Walsh. Hornets seemed then to give up the ghost, Atkinson and Walsh soon crossed the line and substitute Irving had the significance of scoring the final try on the athletic Grounds.

In more ways than one this was a sad day for Hornets' followers, but no one could take away the fact that on the day it was Oldham who had all the class.





Amateur Review

There is one thing which is absolutely certain in the game of Rugby League these days, the amateur game has expanded beyond everyone's wildest dreams. The game is now being played almost everywhere in the country. From North East to South West, lads are kitting up of a weekend to take part in the world's greatest collision sport!

While the game at professional level is improving at all levels with better quality rugby, higher crowds, more media coverage and stronger clubs in its traditional base, the game at amateur level has spread throughout the country and, despite what the RFU propaganda bleats, Rugby League is, by a massive majority, a largely AMATEUR sport.

We cannot expect the pro. game to expand to all corners of the country unless these people know a little about it. Good foundations are laid via the grass roots of the amateur game, then a professional club in that area has more chance of success.

Due to the sterling work done by the team of development officers, youth rugby in particular has shown a massive increase in recent years. In the traditional RL areas, this will keep our game healthy for many years to come.

However, the game cannot go at breakneck speed into a great expansion programme without a serious examination of the existing parameters of each particular area. This is more apparent at the traditional base of the game, much closer to home. New clubs spring up all the time and, while this is great in an area new to the game, problems can arise when this goes unchecked in areas like Rochdale. Two new local teams are gaining credibility in the Pennine League, Smallbridge and Trafalgar, but Milnrow/Newhey have considered scrapping their 'A' team due to a shortage of players.

No-one is suggesting that new clubs deliberately "steal" players, it is a fact that a number of players move clubs at some stage and this has had an unfortunate effect on one club. In an area like ours there can only be so many players available at any one time, so the leagues and BARLA must keep watch in order not to let expansion take place at the expense of other clubs.

BARLA is a successful organisation, they must oversee the game at grass roots and decide its future. Let's look forward to the '90s with a sound base through a STRONG club network, with expansion where it is needed.


