WE'RE PUTTING OUR SHIRTS ON OLDHAM





I wonder sometimes where some newspapers get their material from. A case in point was a story that appeared in one national paper a few days ago, suggesting that there might be something in an Oldham move for Ray Ashton.

It appears that Leeds had cut Ray's fee from £25,000 to £20,000 to help him find another club and it was reported that the player would fancy a return move to Watersheddings.

Well, let me put the record straight once and for all. I never have shown interest in Ray and I never will.

I have nothing against the lad, but I happen to believe that I already have the best scrum-half in the country in Mike Ford.

Mike has been producing some terrific stuff recently and he had an excellent game in top company at Hull KR where he played Welshman David Bishop off the park. A lot of people have been pressing Bishop's claims for international recognition, but in heavy, windy conditions far more suited to Bishop's style than Ford's, my man showed him what intelligent, creative scrum-half play is all about.

The way he is playing at present, Mike must surely be making the selectors sit up and take note and that brings me to another point: the decision to take the first Test against Australia next autumn to Wembley Stadium.

Personally, I think the decision is off the mark. I am well aware that the Fulham contingent — here today — will think otherwise and I can well understand their point of view.

But is the time ripe for taking such a prestige match to London? What sort of a

gate will it attract compared with the 50,000-plus crowd that watched the Kangaroos in the first Test on the last tour at Old Trafford, Manchester?

I would love to be proved wrong, but I think a lot of supporters here in the North will think twice about making the long trek to Wembley for a match that will be televised. We have a lot of games and a lot of competitions and there is a lot of expense involved for the regular fans, especially those with families.

The decision to play on a Saturday, rather than a Sunday, will make it even more difficult to get a big crowd into Wembley and I think officials will have to rely heavily on attracting supporters from London, the southern counties and possibly South Wales.

At best there will have to be a massive marketing campaign and it will be interesting to see how the London newspapers cover the event with pre-match features etc.

The powers-that-be obviously think there is sufficient interest outside the traditional League areas of the North to make the venture worthwhile.

Certainly, there is no finer attraction for the committed League fan that the first Test against the Aussies . . . especially now that we have a realistic chance of building on our third Test victory in Sydney in 1988 and our series win against New Zealand earlier this season.

I have no doubt that Old Trafford would be packed to the rafters. Wembley? I hope for the best, but fear the worst. Let's hope for everyone's sake that the game's marketing and promotional men have got it right.

TODAY'S

Welcome to Fulham

TODAY we welcome the officials, coaching staff and players of Fulham, who have made the long journey from London to make their first appearance at Watersheddings since they were here in a John Player Trophy preliminary round tie in November, 1987.

Having taken 19 points from their 17 Second Division games to date, the Londoners are well pleased with their efforts this season and are currently anxious to pick up more points in their quest to qualify for the top-eight Premiership play-off.

Travelling up the M6 and the M1 is nothing fresh for the Fulham boys these days because, unlike the club's early days, all the playing staff are London-based and the club has close connections with the London amateur game and the capital's District Development Officers.

Indeed, during the week of our first visit to the Chiswick Polytechnic stadium in November, where we won 40-10, Rugby League officials had spent several days in London carrying out a feasibility study on the prospects of expansion in the capital.

It was performed with the fullest backing and co-operation of the Fulham club and its Australian coach Ross Strudwick, who believes London is ripe for the sort of promotion and expansion which enabled the Sydney League to spread north to Brisbane and the Gold Coast and south to Canberra a season or two ago.

Now comes news of the decision to play the first Test between Great Britain and Australia next autumn at Wembley, and Strudwick, the former Halifax coach, describes that major decision as "fantastic news" for the furtherance of the game in the South.

"It will give the Londoners a game they can relate to," says Ross, "and the benefits should rub off on the Fulham club. There are a lot of people down here and there is a lot of money knocking about. But it is no good playing one Test and then forgetting it. We want more big games to spread the gospel, even if venues other than Wembley have to be found."

Commenting on his club's performances this season, he added: "We could do with a bit more strength, but we have done well with what we have. Take away teams like Hull KR, Halifax, Rochdale and Oldham, and we have nothing to fear in the Second Division, as we proved when we beat Doncaster in the Challenge Cup to earn a home tie with York.

"We have brought through about five amateur lads from the London area this year. We have to build on that, although there are difficulties because so many of the players in the London amateur clubs are Australian or New Zealanders."

There are several overseas men in the Fulham side, too, but two of them will be missing today — big prop Eric Kennedy, an Aussie who is currently out of action with a swollen mouth, and former Oldham favourite Hussein M'Barki, who has only just completed an eight-match ban and is not likely to be considered for a return to Watersheddings.

Another Oldham man, winger Mike Taylor, is now at Fulham, having travelled to London via Halifax, and there will be a warm welcome for him today.

The half-backs are both Aussies — stand-off Brett Daunt and scrum-half Wayne Sanchez — and there are two Kiwis in the side in centre Red McCabe and loose-forward Dave Gillan, who has been resident in the UK for nearly ten years.



Since then he has been in impressive form. making 10 consecutive First Team appearances, including the remarkable away victory against fellow promotion rivals Hull Kingston Rovers.

Says Keith: "There are always high and low spots for any player, but I don't think I've ever played as well as I did against Hull. I've never felt such spirit or unity as a team — it was a fantastic occasion."

Now Keith is planning for next season: "I'm really looking forward to getting down to some intensive training. I want to make the most of all the time I've got so I'll be concentrating on body-building and working on my speed to make sure I will really be on top form for September."



The driving forces motivating Keith are coach Tony Barrow and conditioner Ossie Rowe. "I owe a lot to the pair of them. They are completely truthful. They'll tell you if you're not working hard enough but at the same time they are just as quick to give you the praise you deserve" he saus.

Keith's ambition is to maintain his first team position and return to Australia, where he had a successful spell with Canterbury in the close season in 1985.

Travelling the world is second nature to Keith, who was born in Dusseldorf, Germany. His RAF father took him across the globe but now Keith is much nearer home — he lives a mere 200 yards from Watersheddings with his wife, Nova, 24, and seven-month-old baby daughter Sally Anne.

"Life couldn't be more enjoyable. I'm hoping to give up my HGV driving job to buy a newsagents so I can really dedicate myself to the game," says Keith, who is back on the road helping Oldham motor into the First Division where they belong!
