Willows Preview

THIS afternoon we have pleasure in welcoming Oldham to the Willows for the Second Round of the Silk Cut Challenge Cup.

Incidentally, this is the first time in 16 years that the sides have met in the Challenge Cup, the last occasion being in the 1973-74 season when Salford won by 26 points to 12 in a first round tie, here at the Willows (see foot of this page).

In actual fact, in all the 93 years that the two clubs have been competing against each other in both the Northern Union Cup (as it was originally known) and the R.L. Challenge Cup, it is incredible that Salford and Oldham have only met on 7 occasions (one of them being a replay). Full details of these games are given on page 31.

In this season's competition, Oldham had to overcome Huddersfield and Workington Town to reach this second round stage.

The Roughyeds were unfortunate to have been drawn out of the hat for a Preliminary Round game but they had few problems in disposing of the West Yorkshire side by 30 points to 8 with Clark, Allen, Newton, Cogger and Fairbank scoring the tries and Platt adding 5 goals.

In the First Round, whilst Salford were beating amateurs Bison Sports, Oldham were scoring a victory over Workington Town by another 30 points to 8 score line. John Henderson scored 3 of the tries and offers came from Clark and Platt. The latter added a goal to the four kicked by Atkinson.

Over the last twenty years, the furthest that today's sides have progressed, in the Competition, is to the semi-final stage but both clubs have only managed that on one occasion each.

Another fact is that both clubs have gone out a similar number of times (7) at this Second Round stage.

At the present time. First Division side Salford are in deep relegation trouble, whilst Second Division side Oldham are riding high and looking promotion certainties. Everything points to a close game but in the cut and thrust of Cup tie football anything can happen. It all adds up to a thriller for the spectators.



TODAY'S spotlight falls on utility player Andy Mercer who has played both in the threequarters and second row.

The former West Park R.U. (St. Helens) club player signed professional forms with Salford during the close season of 1986. However, it was not until last season that he made his first team debut against Halifax in the John Player Trophy first round match at Thrum Hall on November 13th 1988.

Up to last week end, 23 years old Andy has made a total of 19 appearances, including 9 as substitute. Three outings have been on the wing and seven in the second row.

The recent Challenge Cup 1st Round Tie against Bison Sports gave Andy something to smile about . . . he scored his inaugural try for the club, his only one so far on first team duty.

At the present time, he is striving to establish a regular first team spot and judging by his Alliance Team reports he could soon achieve that aim.

DUNCAN PLATT (Full back): Signed from Widnes in December 1988 and kicked 41 goals over these last few months of the season. Steady player and obviously a useful goalkicker who likes to link up with his attack. Brother of Wigan and G.B. forward Andy Platt.

RICHARD IRVING (Winger): Snapped up by Oldham from Moldgreen A.R.L. club. Won both BARLA G.B. and Yorkshire honours. His club expect great things from him as he gains experience.

DES FOY (Centre): Toured Down Under in 1984 and is the younger brother of Martin Foy. Originally played for Widnes but figured in the deal that took prop forward Brian Hogan back to Naughton Park. G.B. International, very pacy centre.

JOHN HENDERSON (Centre): Signed from Leigh for £50,000 in September 1988. Represented Lancashire. Rated as one of the fastest inside backs in the game. Played almost 150 games for the Hilton Park club and his four tries last weekend took him past the career century mark.

GARY HYDE (Centre): Former Castleford player who signed for Oldham in December 1988. Another pacy centre who has represented G.B. under 24s and Yorkshire County.

PAUL LORD (Winger): Been at Watersheddings since April 1985 when he turned professional from Stanley Rangers A.R.L. club. Bags of pace and has represented BARLA G.B. and Yorkshire at Under 17 level.

BRETT CLARK (Stand off): Clever half back who had a spell in this country with St. Helens during the 1986-87 season. Following his transfer from Western Suburbs, Australia he scored 19 tries from 36 appearances. More recently he has been playing for the St. George club in Sydney.

MIKE FORD (Scrum half): Former Wigan player who spent several good seasons at Central Park. Played in the magnificent 1985 Challenge Cup Final against Hull, alongside Brett Kenny. Moved on to Leigh, then Oldham. Toured Down Under in 1988.

LEO CASEY (Prop): Recruited from St. Annes A.R.L. club in April 1986. Hard grafting prop

who scored three tries in eight appearances for the club in 1987-88 and seven tries last season.

RICHARD RUSSELL (Hooker): Signed from Wigan, after he had appeared for the G.B. Colts and Under 21 sides. Played in every back position at Central Park and is probably best at stand off.

ANDY RUANE (Hooker): Former Widnes and Rochdale Hornets hooker. A great worker in the loose and a good goalkicker. Made his presence felt at Watersheddings and made 30 appearances for Oldham last season.

JOHN FIELDHOUSE (Prop): Signed from St. Helens G.B. International who is noted for his tremendous tackling stints. Man of the series against the Kiwis in 1985. Settled in well at Watersheddings.

KEITH NEWTON (Second row): Strong forward signed from champions Widnes in January 1989. Opened his try account for Oldham with two in the Challenge Cup first round win at Dewsbury last season.

KEITH ATKINSON (Second row): Former Oldham Colts player who turned professional in August 1984. Competent goal kicker who has been a good utility player at Watersheddings.

JOHN FAIRBANK (Second row): Former BARLA International forward signed by Leeds in November 1987 from Elland A.R.L. club. Surprisingly allowed to leave Headingley and he joined Oldham in September 1988. Strong player and is one of five league playing brothers.

JOHN COGGER (Loose forward): Outstanding signing from Runcorn Highfield. Created a massive impression at Oldham since joning them. He was Second Division Player of the Year in 1987. Formerly with Western Suburbs, Australia

SHAUN ALLEN (Loose forward): Appeared for St Helens in the 1985 and 1988 Premiership Finals and also in their 1984 Lancashire Cup winning side. Joined Oldham, originally on loan, before signing in March 1989. Represented G.B. Under 21 side.

The Man behind the Team

COACH to the Oldham side is former Warrington boss Tony Barrow who has been at Watersheddings since November 1988, when he succeeded Eric Fitzsimons.

Tony has now been involved in the professional game for 27 years after signing for St. Helens as a player and making his debut later on the 27th April 1963 against Hull at the Boulevard. He made just two appearances in the 1962-63 season but with the likes of Vollenhoven and Killeen, chances were few and far between. In the 1964-65 season he began in the centre and was a substitute in the 1964 Lancashire Cup Final. Then came substitute appearances in the 1966 Challenge Cup and the Championship Finals but by now his versatility as a player was a bonus for Saints. In 1967 he appeared on the wing in the Lancashire Cup Final and replay. After 8 years at Knowsley Road he was transferred to Leigh in September 1970 and immediately he was switched to stand off. He then appeared in the 1971 Challenge Cup Final, when the Hilton Parkside took the honours against Leeds by 24 points to 7. In 1972 he captained Leigh to a Floodlit Trophy win before moving to Wilderspool as assistant coach with Alex Murphy.

Eventually Tony took over the reins at Warrington in March 1986 when he followed on from Reg Bowden.

He was at Wilderspool until November 1988 and in that time they were Premiership winners and beaten favourites, John Player beaten favourites and Lancashire Cup beaten favourites.

In his short time at Watersheddings he has seen them relegated from Division One but now revitalised they are handily placed for an instant return to the top flight.

Memories of Bygone Days

A series of extracts from programme notes and press cuttings giving an insight into events from past seasons.

SEASON 1913-14

THE financial troubles of the club that have occupied the minds of the officials during the summer having been disposed of, the management has turned its attention to the season about to commence, and are in a position to present their followers with an excellent programme, in which is included home and away fixtures with five of the leading clubs in Yorkshire.

There are not, however, any new players of note secured, but that was the state of affairs a year ago, and yet, from a playing point of view, Salford had a good season and finished in such a position that, had the new rule relating to the allocation of fixtures been in operation, they would have had as their opponents the cream of the clubs in the adjoining County.

The players have been diligently training for two or three weeks, and half a dozen of the juniors are showing form good enough to entitle them to a trial amongst the seniors.

Launce, whose progress since his connection with the club has been consistent, will again figure at full back, and there is Dai John to fall back upon if necessary.

The threequarter line will be selected from W. Thomas, Mesley, Loveluck, Callender, Wilde, Goldsmith, Ratcliffe, Clifford and Cook although the last named is doubtful.

For half back, there are John, May, Waite, Hampson and Clegg; also there is a splendid set of forwards available.

Walter Edward Clegg is a stand off half back from Weaste, who possesses height and weight. The only new man in the threequarters is Joseph Hulme, formerly of the Grenadier Guards, who played for the team which won the Army Championship last season. He will play as an amateur.



Eight minutes later loose forward **Andy Burgess** scored a good try when he weaved his way through the visitors defence. Again **Kerry** was bang on target. (8-0). At this stage Barrow were well served by Tongan forward **Tuavao** who is on loan to the Craven Park club. He and loose forward **Maguire** worked hard to inspire a lacklustre Cumbrian side but their attacks were both laboured and devoid of many ideas. It came as no surprise when Salford increased their lead through a smart try by **Steve Kerry**. He chased a brilliant kick by **Cassidy** and won the race to touch down between the posts. He also added the conversion. (14-0).

Blease came on for Gormley and was just in time to see Tex Evans score a cracking try when he intercepted a loose pass and raced fully 80 yards down the touchline to

score. Kerry failed with a difficult kick. (18-0).

After the break **Worrall** drew two men into the tackle and gave a sweet pass to **Cassidy** who did the rest. **Kerry** pulled his kick wide. (22-0).

It wasn't all cheers though and Barrow gave the Reds a shock when Burns scored in

the corner. Marwood was short with his conversion attempt. (22-4).

This try spurred the visitors on for a brief spell but **Evans** brought the crowd to its feet by kicking down the field, chasing and finally taking the ball on the bounce, shaking off the attention of winger **Trainor** and touching down for a cracker of a try. Much to everyone's disgust though, the referee brought everyone back for a scrum on the Reds '25' after an earlier infringement. Thirty seconds later Barrow had a try disallowed for a forward pass. **Mercer** and **Gormley** took over from **Burgess** and **O'Neill**.

In the 70th minute **Evans** was on hand to score after **Lee** had made the opening. **Kerry** was wide with his kick. (26-4). In the final five minutes Salford added two further tries through **Gibson** and **Worrall** with **Kerry** adding a goal to the latter.

Reflections

A LOOK BACK AT THE FIRST DIVISION SINCE THE TWO DIVISION SYSTEM WAS RESTORED IN 1973-74.

SEASON 1985-86

SURPRISE winners of the First Division title were West Yorkshire club Halifax who climed 9 places from the previous season to take the honours.

Amazingly, they were not a high scoring team and their points for column is only slightly better than 12th placed Bradford Northern. Still, they only lost 5 matches which is what counts at the end

It was the run in at the end of the season that saw them take the title. In the final seven matches, they were unbeaten and whilst other teams were slipping up, they came through to pinch the title from Wigan by just one point. That season Wigan had by far the best attack and defence but defeats at St. Helens (away) and Oldham (home) cost them the chance of taking the Division One Championship. Halifax had to settle for a draw in both their clashes with Wigan but they scored league doubles over York, Castleford, Hull, Warrington, Bradford Northern and Swinton so you can't argue with that.

On the other hand, Wigan had big victories over Dewsbury (58-8), Featherstone Royers (62-0), Swinton (42-0), York (42-2) and Bradford Northern (42-10).

Steve Ella scored 4 tries against Dewsbury and Ellery Hanley repeated the trick against Hull K.R. in the play offs.

Salford rallied to finish in tenth spot with victories against Wigan (12-8) and Halifax (22-6) their main achievements. Only once did they score more than 30 points, that occasions being against Dewsbury whom they defeated by 36-8.

JOHN HENDERSON — CENTURY OF TRIES

JOHN Henderson of Oldham scored 4 tries last Sunday and has now scored over a century of touchdowns. His career total of 102 is made up of 17 for Oldham, 84 for Leigh and one for Lancashire. Prior to last weekend he had notched up 98 tries but the four against Fulham in Oldham's 52-4 victory, took him past the 100 mark.

Henderson's three tries in the 30-8 Silk Cut Challenge Cup first round defeat at Workington Town was his first hat-trick for Oldham but he achieved the feat six times for Leigh.

The former Saddleworth Rangers amateur made his senior professional debut with Leigh in the centre at home to St. Helens on 22 August 1982 when they drew 19-19 in a Stones Bitter Championship match.

His most prolific season was 1985-86 as he scored 31 tries and finished fourth in the try chart. He was sixth the following season with 27 but has not reached double figures since.

Henderson moved to Oldham for £50,000 and made his debut at Castleford on 25 September 1988. Playing in the centre he scored a try in 22-19 Stones Bitter Championship victory.



Details of this match are outlined at the foot of page 3. At that time Salford were coached by Les Bettinson.


Programme information concerned the transfer of forward Barry Kear to Hull, after failing to settle in Lancashire.

In the same season as the above Challenge Cup Tie, the league points were shared.

At the Willows the Reds won a thriller by 15 points to 12 (Fielding 3 tries) whilst the return game at Watersheddings saw Oldham win a tight game by 4 points to 2. Two goals by lan Holland doing the trick.



August 19th 1969 result: **OLDHAM 11 SALFORD 20**

Oldham went into this match having lost at home to Swinton in the Lancashire Cup by 28 points to 24. Salford had also gone out of the County Cup at the hands of Wigan by 25 points to 9.

Salford R.L.J.C. They Served Us Well"

COLIN DIXON

CERTAINLY one of the most popular players to have worn the famous red jersey was Colin Dixon who first arrived at the Willows in December 1968, making his debut that month against Wakefield Trinity at the Willows.

He originally began his R.L. career, however, at Halifax in 1961 after signing for them

from a Cardiff junior club.

After appearing in the 1963 Yorkshire Cup, 1964 Eastern Championship and 1965 and 1966 Championship Finals for Halifax, he was transferred to Salford for a £13,000 fee and had a magnificent 11 years at the Willows in which time he shared a joint Benefit with forward Mike Coulman in 1979.

His representative career saw him play for Other Nationalities and captain, Wales (13 times) and G.B. (14 times). He toured Down Under in 1974 and appeared for Wales in

the 1969 European Championship and in the 1975 World Cup.

Colin played for Salford at Wembley in 1969 and also appeared in three County Cup Finals, the John Player Final and the Floodlit Cup Final. When he retired at the end of the 1979-80 season, he was coaxed back into playing for Hull K.R. He then became coach at Halifax in October 1982, took them into the First Division but was sacked in November 1984 even though the side were playing well! In July 1986 he became coach at Keighley and remains at the club at the present time.

Whilst at Salford, Colin made 48 appearances, including 9 as substitute and he

scored 91 tries and just one goal for a haul of 275 points.

His best season was in the 1971-72 campaign when he made 42 appearances and scored 17 tries.
