

TWIN TOWERS AHEAD...



ake no mistake about it, today's visitors Oldham, are a Second Division side in name only. Their relegation last season was a major surprise and they look set for a quick return to the top flight having lost only two of eighteen League fixtures this term (at Halifax and Rochdale). In addition they have notched up some impressive Cup performances, defeating Barrow 46-2, St. Helens 36-6 (both away) and Wigan 19-18 in the Lancashire Cup and Salford in the Challenge Cup.

Those results have been achieved thanks to a very strong squad which includes talented and pacy threequarters such as Des Foy and John Henderson and promising young forwards like Leo Casey. Foy is a former Widnes and G.B. player and the Chemics link is strong throughout the Watersheddings outfit, since Keith Newton, Andy Ruane, Duncan Platt and John Fieldhouse have all appeared in black and white in the past. Oldham recruits from further afield include Aussie stand-off, Brett Clark (via St. Helens) and big Maori centre, Charlie McAlister.

There is a widespread feeling throughout the town of Oldham that this is their year for Wembley, a feeling that has been fuelled by the recent success of their neighbouring soccer team. History is not on their side because of course the Roughyeds have yet to visit the famous twin towers despite having reached four semifinals. Their most recent appearances at that stage of the competition came in 1986 when they were defeated 18-7 by Castleford at Central Park. Prior to that they lost to Hull K.R. in a second replay in 1964, to Hull in 1960 and to Widnes in 1934. However, such a sequence cannot go on forever and sooner or later Oldham will reach their goal. The Widnes job today is to try to make sure that they wait at least one more year!

THE CAPTAIN

he Oldham captain, John Cogger, returns today to a part of the world which he knows very well, because he was formerly the star player at Runcorn Highfield for three seasons.

When the Australian-born loose forward became disillusioned with Highfield last season, he chose to go to Watersheddings and he has continued to earn rave reviews there.

Basically the strengths of his game are speed, aggression and a sound kicking ability; skills which have made him the top try scorer in Division Two football this season. Formerly with Western Suberbs in Sydney, John was voted Greenalls Second Division Player of the Year in 1987.

OLDHAM

STAR MAN



S till only 24 years old, it seems as if Michael Ford has been around the R.L. scene for an age, simply because of the impact that he made as a teenager.

A product of Oldham St. Annes A.R.L.F.C., he signed for Wigan in August 1983 and quickly became their regular scrum-half. It was as Brett Kenny's half-back partner in that classic Challenge Cup final of 1985 that Ford shot to prominence and his performance that day no doubt had a big part in the decision of Eastern Suberbs to sign him on for the summer of that year.

Whilst at Central Park he obtained G.B. caps at Colts and U-21 level, but the signing of Andy Gregory in January 1987 caused him to seek a transfer and he subsequently signed for Leigh. In 1988 he moved to Oldham and in that same year he was a surprise selection for the Tour down-under, although in the event he failed to make any of the Test sides.

THE COACH

n November 1988, the then Warrington coach, Tony Barrow, felt as though he was not receiving the full support of the Wilderspool board and so he shocked the R.L. world by walking out on the Wires.

Almost immediately he took over the vacant coaching position at Oldham and though relegation followed he has gained a great deal of popularity amongst the players and supporters of his new club.

Anyone who has heard his frequent appearances on local radio will be aware of his no-nonsense approach to the game, an attitude which he also possessed during a highly successful playing career as a centre threequarter with St. Helens and Leigh. At Hilton Park he played an influential role in that club's first ever Wembley visit in 1971. Can he do the same for Oldham?







THE KEITH ELWELL INTERVIEW

his week's interview is with the former Widnes and Great Britain hooker, Keith Elwell who is still heavily involved in the game as player/coach with amateur side IBIS. Keith played in all seven of Widnes' Wembley appearances between 1975 and 1984.

Keith's most memorable games are the first and last finals in which he played. "The first game against Warrington in 1975 seemed to be over in five minutes! I remember being very nervous beforehand as the thought of actually playing at Wembley was awesome. In 1984 Wigan were so hyped up and had flown in prop-forward Kerry Helmsley from Australian side Balmain especially for the final, but he and his fellow countryman Mark Cannon failed to impress. Perhaps it was the fact that both of these victories were against teams coached by Alex Murphy that makes them my favourites.

"The 1981 victory over Hull Kingston Rovers was probably the game in which we played the best football. We got off to a tremendous start with that try from Mick Burke and then Mick George crossed for a second. We knew then that it was going to be our day and we were able to sit back and relax a little. The final try from Andy Gregory heralded the start of the evening's celebrations!

"Things were a lot different the following year when we took on the other Humberside giants, Hull. After a good lead we let them back into the game and when the final hooter went we all felt so flat. There were 80,000 people there and we had nothing to show for our efforts, it was a real anti-climax. We then took on Hull in the Premiership Final and had a good victory which only served to fire them up for the replay at Elland Road.

"With regards to the defeats in 1976 and 1977 against St. Helens and Leeds respectively, the least said about them the better! I've never even bothered watching recordings of them.




"Turning to today's quarter-final tie it seems that lady luck is starting to shine on Widnes with this being the third consecutive home match and the third against Second Division opposition as well. Having said that, Oldham are a very good side and have already beaten Wigan and St. Helen's this season. They have some very good players like ex-Widnes stars John Fieldhouse, Keith Newton, Duncan Platt, Andy Ruane and Des Foy. They also have a great player in captain and loose-forward John Cogger who is renowned for his try-scoring abilities and in his days with Runcorn was linked on several occasions with Widnes. Nowadays I'm heavily involved on the amateur side of the game with IBIS and we're also on the lookout for a piece of silverware at the end of the season. We have got a great bunch of lads down there who work very much for each other and this team-work plus some exceptional tackling has seen us through some tough games in recent weeks, including two very good wins against Winwick and Nutgrove. We're joint top of the Division and have a tough run-in, but I'd rather have it that way."

With a helping from lady luck it would be great to see both Widnes and IBIS picking up their respective trophies in April!



WEMBLEY MYSTERY?

IT'S always been a mystery to me why Oldham and Swinton for that matter have never been to Wembley.

When you look back at some of the great names, who have graced the red and white hoops especially in the 50s—it is all the more puzzling.

Oldham have appeared in only four semi-finals—since finals were switched to Wembley—and I suppose the nearest they got was in 1964.

They drew 5-5 with Hull KR at Leeds, and then in the replay at Swinton were leading 17-14 in extra time when the game was abandoned due to bad light.

That was in the days before floodlights, of course. Everyone at the time except the Rugby League, realised that the kick-off time was far too late if extra time were needed. And, almost inevitably, it was.

In the third game, Hull KR ran out 12-2 victors at Huddersfield and qualified to meet Widnes at Wembley.

If Oldham had got through, they could have created history which would still stand today—as the

only Division Two side to get to a Wembley final.

They can of course achieve that feat this year if they win today and what a great weekend it would be for the people of the East Lancashire town with Oldham Athletic almost certainly going to be in the Littlewoods Cup final the day after the Challenge Cup final

Hull KR fans still claim that Widnes could not have beaten Rovers 13-5 in the final had the Robins' star forward John Taylor not been suspended two days before the final.

There were few packs who could boast better players than Derek Turner—later to lead Wakefield to three Wembley wins in four years—Sid Little, Charlie Winslade and Jack Keith. Around that time Ron Rowbottom, who was in the Widnes Wembley side of 1950, appeared in their front row on occasions too.

It's strange how certain games stick in your mind. Back in 1958 I have vivid memories of Cracknell and Davies absolutely destroying Widnes 44-8. I wrote at the time "I wasn't sure whether I was watching Oldham or Harlem

Globetrotters".

Yet for all those great players, Oldham managed to only win one major trophy—the Championship. And they nearly lost that.


Former Widnes player, Colin Hutton, whose last minute goal gave Hull a 10-9 win over Halifax in 1956, nearly did it again the following year—but this time Oldham escaped with a 15-14 victory.

For the record, Oldham's other Challenge Cup semi-final defeat came in 1934, by 7-4 against Widnes and 12-9 against Hull in 1960—both games at Station Road. Recently they went down to Castleford 18-7 at Wigan in 1986—the only time a team that put them out in a semi, has won the cup.

Naturally, Widnes fans would be delighted to see their favourites back at Wembley for the first time in six years, but I wonder how many realise that Mike O'Neill is the only player to have started a final there.

Tony Myler and David Hulme have both made one appearances as substitues. I'd like to see them reach the final again for Tony's





ver the last decade or so, few players have demonstrated as much footballing ability or provided as much pure excitement for the spectator as Tony Myler.

From such an inauspicious start Tony began to rise through the ranks during the coming seasons with perhaps one of his greatest memories coming in 1982 when he was named in the fifteen to take on the mighty Hull F.C.

"I was disappointed at being named as substitute. even though I had played reasonably well in previous League and Cup games. Walking out at Wembley was a moment that I will never forget, the roar and clapping from the fans made my nerves completely disappear. I played in the second half. owing to an injury to Mick Burke at full-back, my first ever game in that position. When Stuart Wright intercepted the ball and went nearly the full length of the field to put Widnes 14 points to 4 up, I thought "this is it", a winners medal at Wembley."


As we all know, that time it was not to be.

Successive seasons saw many trophies coming to Naughton Park and Tony starring for Great Britain both at home and abroad. 1986 saw Tony take part in the ill fated Ashes series against the Aussies.

"I played in all three Test matches, the first at Old Trafford in front of a 50,000 crowd was a fantastic feeling, although we were beaten in all three games. pride was restored to a degree with a performance that must have heartened all the supporters who had followed us through the Test series"

After a long and successful career and having played with many great players in many great teams, Tony's comments about the current Widnes side are tribute indeed.

"This present Widnes side is the greatest team I have ever had the privilege to play alongside at any level. There is so much power and pace it is frightening what we can achieve and I want very much to be a part of it. I would like to finish my career at Widnes. I have never thought otherwise."


