

THE HISTORY OF HUNSLET R.L.F.C.

1977 - 78

The season 1977/78 signalled the completion of the first stage of Hunslets Rehabilitation and the start of the second stage — Survival in the First Division.

Hunslet were determined to spend wisely on players and not be rushed into adding to the squad for the sake of it. In fact Hunslets directors decided the best value for money way to add to the clubs playing strength was a trio of one year contracts to top New Zealand players. At the end of September Lindsay Proctor (forward), Murray Netzler (Hooker) and Gary Kemble (a young full back) would arrive to become Hunslets first Kiwis since Edgar Wrigley in 1913.

The season started with the Yorkshire Cup and an excellent success marred by crowd trouble. Hunslet beat Hull K.R. 14-8 with Dickie Brown scoring a try and setting up another. After the game some Hull K.R. "supporters" overturned a police car and caused trouble, police reinforcements making six arrests.

Hunslet went out in the second round at Keighley and at the beginning of September the league season started with a visit from St. Helens. In a performance rated as "stunning" Hunslet raced to a 15-0 lead after 16 minutes, as Saints tried to get their bearings on the tight Elland Road pitch. Paul Daleys instructions were to tackle and keep the ball six tackles every time. By the end of the game Hunslet had won 22-17.

The club were looking for 11 home wins to ensure a "safe" total of 22 points. Anything that could be picked up away would be a bonus. After defeat at Featherstone, Hunslet surprised everyone with a 13-10 win at Castlefords Wheldon Road.

The scene was set for the visit of Salford and Hunslet scored two tries to one but the boot of David Watkins (7 goals) saw the visitors home 17-14 and Hunslet entered a losing sequence of five league games in six which took the club into the bottom four.

Hunslet signed Tony Halmshaw from Rochdale for £5000 and were delighted when Bob Gaitley was chosen for the GB shadow squad. Stuart Smith joined from Featherstone, but Dickie Brown, who had scored 9 tries in 10 games before breaking a thumb, lost interest and asked for a transfer. Later in the season Brown would be replaced by Tony Dean.

As Proctor and Kemble settled in and Davies and Griffiths hit top form Hunslets fortunes changed. Hunslet had been knocked out of the Players Trophy at Wigan and returned to Central Park in the league as the first of a run in to Christmas 1977 of five games. Three Davies penalties and three drop goals from the same player were instrumental in an excellent 9-7 win. Victories followed at home to Dewsbury and Castleford and away to Hull (23-3) but a crucial fixture at Wakefield was lost 7-8 and an out of luck Hunslet missed out on two points that in the final analysis would have saved Hunslet and sent Wakefield into the second division.

The new year turned out to be a dour struggle for the club and the club slipped from their New Year position of 8th to 13th as the seasons final run-in commenced. The cruelest blow was a home game with Wigan which Hunslet were winning with two minutes to go. Wigan winger Vigo crashed in at the corner to snatch a victory that denied Hunslet two valuable points. In the remaining seven games Hunslet managed only one victory and were relegated from 13th position with 22 points (which would have been enough to stave off relegation in previous years). For the first time since the re-introduction of two divisions all four promoted teams had been relegated.

Behind the achievements of the first team in capturing victories over Wigan, Wakefield, St. Helens, Hull, Hull K.R. and Castleford, the second team took the 'A' team Y.S.C. Cup. The side was well led by Kenny Sykes but contained only three possible stars of the future — Foster, Kirk and Watts.

Over at Belle Isles, the Hunslet Parkside junior teams were winning all the trophies and club scouts were queuing up to sign them. Hunslets inability to recreate the "production-line" of talent was inherent at Parkside and would hamper them but not stop them looking for a quick return to the first division in season 1978/79.

BRITISH COAL TESTS . . . GREAT BRITAIN v AUSTRALIA

Tickets for the British Coal Test between Great Britain and Australia at Wembley in October will be half the price of next months Silk Cut Challenge Cup Final. Seats for the long awaited Anglo-Aussie clash on Saturday 27th October are priced £15, £12, £10 and £8, compared with a top price of £29 for April's sell-out Cup showpiece.

The Rugby Football League are also offering discounts for the British Coal Series with the Kangaroos, current Worlds Champions and unbeaten in any match on the last two tours of Britain in 1982 and 1986.

Wembley party trip organisers will be rewarded with an extra free ticket for every 20 purchased. Organised school groups can obtain a 25 per cent reduction with £8 seats available at £6.

Fans will be encouraged to book for all three British Coal Tests by being offered £1 off each

ticket in a triple order.

The Wembley encounter on 27th October — the first Rugby League Test in the capital since 1973 — is followed by the Second Test at Manchester United's Old Trafford on 19th November and the Third and Final meeting at Elland Road, Leeds, on 24th November, all kicking off at 2.15 pm. Tickets for the northern venues are priced £12, £10 and £8.

The League's Director of Marketing and Television, Maurice Lindsay, said: "The Board of Directors has decided that the massive 50 per cent ticket price reduction offers an across-the-board incentive for supporters — old and new — to witness this clash of giants at the countrys top stadium.

The object of the other schemes are to encourage group bookings and school parties for the Wembley fixture and persuade fans to commit themselves to all three British Coal Tests."

The League is currently finalising plans with British Coal, sponsors of Great Britain in a four-year £750,000 deal, and their London agency for a support programme of media, ground and programme advertising, plus a series of special promotions.

JOHN FIELDHOUSE: Recent signing from St. Helens. Gt. Britain International - Man of the Series against the Kiwis has settled in and playing the sort of rugby that made him an International.

RICHARD IRVING: Signed for Oldham in August, 1987 from Moldgreen ARLFC and impressed coach Eric Fitzsimmons with his strong running wing displays, scoring tries against Keighley and Rochdale. Scorer of just two tries - against Wigan and Wakefield-last season.

JOHN HENDERSON: Signed from Leigh club, this prolific try-scoring centre suffered through injury for much of last season and scored 8 tries. Scored 31 tries in 1985-86 and another 27 in 1986-87 for Leigh, gaining selection for Lancashire and scoring a try in a 22-22 draw with Papua New Guinea in 1987. Guested for Sydney Wests in 1985.

CHARLIE McALISTER: A sensational capture from Bradford and Bingley RUFC in February 1988, scoring 9 tries and 15 goals in 18 appearances in his debut season. Had a summer spell in Australia with the Newcastle Knights in 1988, improving his defensive abilities. Kicked four goals in the 1988 Second Division Premiership Final. New Zealander with great strength and pace and the ability to play in a variety of back roles.

KEVIN MEADOWS: One of the First Divisions most under rated wingers, having previously played for St. Helens and Warrington. Scored 16 tries in 38 appearances in 1987-88. In his second spell at Oldham where he once scored 5 tries in a First Division match against Salford in 1984. Seven tries last season included a hat-trick in a 64-2 Lancashire Cup slaughter of Workington.

DUNCAN PLATT: Goalkicking full-back signed in November, 1988, from Widnes. Brother of Wigan and Great Britain forward Andy, he was in Widnes' Premiership winning team in 1988 and contributed 80 points from 16 appearances in their championship win. Excelled for Oldham and scored 41 goals and 96 points in his debut season. Kicked 2 goals on his debut at Thrum Hall in the 12-0 win last December. RICHARD RUSSELL: Oldham's major off-season signing, coming from Wigan, where he had gained Great Britain, Colts and two Under 21 international selections in 1987 and 1988. Played in every back role at Central Park but received very few opportunities last season. Represented Wigan in the 1987 Lancashire Cup and Premiership Final. MIKE FORD: BARLA Young Lions tourist to New Zealand, in 1983, signed for Wigan from Oldham, St. Annes ARLFC in August of that year. Won Challenge Cup (1986), Lancashire Cup (1985 and 1986) and John Player (1986 and 1987) honours, before joining Leigh. Gained four Under 21 international caps between 1986 and 1987 and also had a spell with Sydney Club Eastern Suburbs. Toured Down Under with the Lions last summer, scoring 5 tries in 7 appearances. Signed for hometown Oldham in January, 1988, after an unhappy spell at Hilton Park, and was outstanding as Oldham defeated Featherstone in an epic Second Division Premiership Final. Totalled 8 tries and 3 drop goals in 19 appearances as Oldham swept to the Second Division Championship in 1987-88. Three tries last season.

STEVE ROBINSON: Signed from Saddleworth Rangers 2 seasons ago and has progressed to be a very fine winger.

NEIL CLAWSON: Son of much-travelled former Trinity and Great Britain prop forward Terry. Neil is another front-rower with lots of ability. Joined Oldham from Featherstone in May, 1986 and scored 2 tries in 26 appearances in 1988.

JOHN FAIRBANK: Former BARLA international forward signed from Leeds in November, 1987, from Elland ARLFC. One of five League-playing brothers and son of former Leeds and Huddersfield forward Jack. Played 19 games in his debut season for Leeds, but was surprisingly allowed to leave Headingley last August. Strong, forceful 21 year-old whose best is yet to come.

ANDY RUANE: Former Widnes and Rochdale Hooker, signed for Oldham by Eric Fitzsimmons, his former coach at the Hornets. A great worker in the loose, with goalkicking skills, he scored 12 tries, 15 goals and 2 drop goals for Hornets in 1987-88. Made his presence felt at Watersheddings, claiming the No. 9 jersey and kicking his first goal against Workington Town in the Lancashire Cup Tie. One of the most impressive performers in the relegation year, scoring 4 tries and 18 goals.

PAUL ROUND: Signed for £66,000 from St. Helens in August, 1987, instantly repaying Oldham with 16 tries in 26 appearances and gaining inclusion in the Lancashire teams which opposed Yorkshire (scoring a try) and Papua New Guinea in 1987. Originally a back-row forward who has played on the wing and at full-back. Nine tries last season

including ones in home and away meetings with Halifax.

LEO CASEY: Recruited from St. Annes ARLFC in April 1988, this hard grafting propforward scored 3 tries in 8 appearances for the club in 1987-88. 7 tries last season. **JOHN COGGER:** An outstanding signing from Runcorn Highfield last season. This inspirational Aussie had picked up the Second Division Player of the Year award in 1987 and starred in Oldham's end-of-season matches, scoring a try hat-trick against Featherstone and totalling 6 tries for the club, to go alongside seven scored for the league's wooden spoonists. Can play loose-forward or stand-off.

SHAUN ALLEN: Appeared for St. Helens in 1985 and 1988 Premiership Finals and also in their 1984 Lancashire Cup winning side, gaining an Under 21 international debut for Great Britain against France in 1984. Played centre and in the back-row for the Knowsley Road club, joining Oldham, initially on loan, last season, scoring

a try against Widnes.

PAUL LORD: Signed from Stanley Rangers ARLFC as a stand-off but recently playing on wing. Represented Yorkshire at Under 21's level and Great Britain. Has great pace. COLIN HAWKYARD: Current benificiary and an unsung workhorse of the Roughyeds pack, being a frequent scorer and a tireless defensive player. 3 tries in 37 appearances in 1987-88, and a further 4 tries last term. Played for Oldham in the 1986 Lancashire Cup Final against Wigan. Had a 3-match loan spell at Huddersfield in 1981-82.

KEITH NEWTON: Strong back-row forward signed from champions Widnes last season, opening his try account for Oldham with two in the 40-9 Cup win at Dewsbury in the first round. Adding another two in a big defeat of Feathersone at

Watersheddings.

GARY HYDE: Another of Tony Barrow's recruits, joining Oldham from Castleford, after winning Great Britain Under 24 international honours as a centre in the early 80's. Has played centre and loose-forward for Oldham, scoring the first of four tries in a 23-22 defeat at Salford. Played in 7 major Finals for Castleford, including their 1986 Wembley defeat of Hull K.R.

BRETT CLARK: St. George half back who has recently signed a 1 year contract for Oldham. Will need no introduction to fans. Brett played at Knowsley Road in the 1986/87 season. One of the most popular of Saints recent overseas signings. Oldham continued to build for the future during the summer, with England Schools Skipper CRAIG MORT (16) being added to the starlets already at Watersheddings. NEIL FLANAGAN, TOMMY MARTYN and STEVE ENTWISTLE all starred on the BARLA Youth Tour of Australia this summer.

COMMENTS by our Coach Graeme Jennings

As this is the last home game for the year, it's time to reflect upon the 1989-90 season.

I found it astounding that we had to play 5 games in the first 2 weeks of the competition, while other sides had played only one game after 3 weeks. From these early games our injury toll was always mounting. Now we are in the position of having to wait 3 weeks betweeen our 2nd last game to our last game, these situations should never arise and would put any club at a disadvantage.

Criticism of referees has been considerable, in particular dismissal of players from the field. At the time of writing, Hunslet has had 10 players sent off, 9 of whom were exonerated. Needless to say such exonerations don't help after the fact.

Hunslet have proved themselves in the latter stages of the season, in both Alliance and First Team. I am sure the strength with which Hunslet are finishing, the foundations for good performances against leading teams in 2nd division are evident.



Finally I would like to thank everyone associated with the club both on and off the field for the efforts this season and in particular the supporters for their loyalty and support.

This club is blessed with some fine young players as well as good experienced campaigners, I have no doubt that their efforts will bring success once again to Hunslet.





Hunslet fans have always enjoyed cheering their heroes, and among the list of all time greats none were cheered as heartily as the local born lads.

One such 'great' was Freddie Williamson, born in 1921 and brought up in Middleton attending the local council school. From the school he was chosen for Hunslet City Boys and played with the side from 1934-1936.

Fred was a great all rounder at sport and so was his brother William. Sprinting, Hurdling, Boxing, League and Union were all mastered by the Williamsons.

Both lads started in open age rugby at Morley R.U.F.C. where they worked their way up the teams. William got to the first team first but by the time Freddie was ready to be selected the club dropped William to make way for him. This took the edge off Freddie's "Promotion".

Freddie worked in engineering as did so many Hunslet men at the time. It was while on war work in 1940 that Freddie badly burned his hand to the point where amputation was considered. Freddie battled his way to recovery and after six months of hospital, he was back at work. It was still touch and go whether Freddie could play rugby again, but under the encouragement of Aubrey Casewell, Freddie turned out for the Hunslet Engine Company amateur side.


All the old skills returned to him and in 1943 at the age of 22 Hunslet signed him on, for a fee of £115. After the period of wartime football Freddie settled in at Hunslet as first choice winger.

Freddie was noted mainly for his tough tackling and was probably the best tackling winger in the league. This was remarkable for a time when wingers were employed solely for their speed. Freddie though possessed plenty of pace and the tries came regularly, over 126 in 10 years.

Freddie achieved County Honours and was respected throughout the game. He suffered a number of semi-final defeats with Hunslet and was unlucky with injuries, breaking fingers, nose, ribs and shoulders. He bounced back from disappointments every time to give the Parkside crowds continued pleasure until at the age of 35, Hunslet had to ask him to stand down for the younger men such as Potter, Child, and Alan Snowden.

There was no packing in though and Freddie moved to Doncaster to continue his career, with a mind to play as long as possible and then move into coaching. A man of Freddie's experience and ability could have gained him coaching positions at any club, but inevitably it was back to Parkside where he coached the younger players for a number of years.

"Fearless" Freddie Williamson the local hero was known as "Ahr Freddie" by Hunslet fans and significantly that term of endearment was one held by the great Albert Goldthorpe so many years before. A Hunslet "Hall of Fame" would never be complete without him.


Anyone who has not paid up by this date will have their seats and tickets cancelled, with no money refunded.
