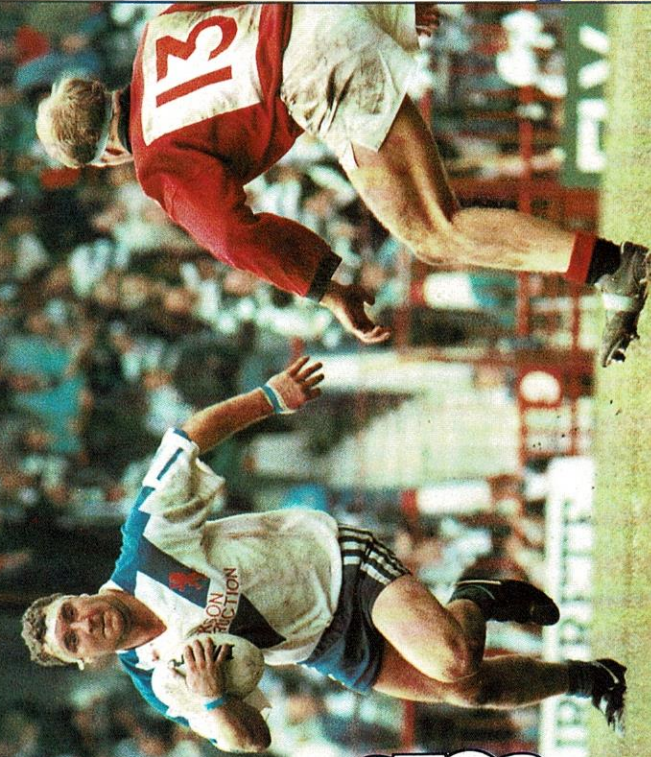

FRENCH RECORD

France ran up their highest score in a Test against Great Britain with their 25-18 victory at Headingley on Saturday.

Their previous highest scores were 24-15 a Grenoble on 5th April, 1959 and 24-16 at Perpignan on 17th March 1985. France scored only three tries on Saturday compared with six in the 1959 win and four in 1985.

France's defeat ended a record run of eight successive wins over France.

MIKE FLETCHER

Mike Fletcher has broken the Hull K.R. records for most goals and points in a season. he broke the points record of 366 by Steve Hubbard in 1970/80 with an early try in the 26-6 home defeat of Halifax.

The goals record of 166 by George Fairbairn in 1981/82 went with Fletcher's five goals in the 32-12 victory at Runcorn Highfield.

Fletcher's totals now stand at 169 goals and 386 points including 12 tries.

WORST RECORD

Barrow have finished the season with the worst Division One record of all time. They are the only Division One side ever to concede over 1000 points (1033) and their one win from 26 matches is also the worst.

Barrow's only victory was 29-22 at Featherstone Rovers on 29th October, followed by 18 successive defeats. Their 90-0 defeat at Leeds is another Division One record.

Barrow's 201 points is the lowest total since the re-introduction of two divisions in 1973, but Brighouse Rangers managed only 79 from 34 matches in the first ever Division One of 1902/03.

WINNING RUN

Castleford have the current longest winning run of eight matches all in the Stones Bitter Championship.

LOSING RUN

Runcorn Highfield have lost 40 matches in succession and gone 51 without a win. their last win was 20-12 at home to Fulham on 30th October 1988, while they drew 8-8 at home to Workington Town on 22nd January 1989.

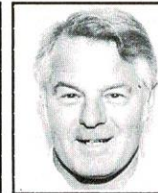

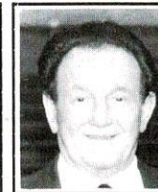

INTO THE LIONS DEN

OLDHAM

RICHARD IRVING

Signed for Oldham in August, 1987 from Moldgreen ARLFC and impressed coach Eric Fitzsimmons with his strong-running wing displays, scoring tries against Keighley and Rochdale. Scorer of just two tries - against Wigan and Wakefield - last season.

CHARLIE McALISTER

A sensational capture from Bradford & Bingley RUFC in February 1988, scoring 9 tries and 15 goals in 18 appearances in his debut season. Had a summer spell in Australia with the Newcastle Knights in 1988, improving his defensive abilities. Kicked four goals in the 1988 Second Division Premiership Final. New Zealander with great strength and pace and the ability to play in a variety of back roles.

KEVIN MEADOWS

One of the First Division's most under rated wingers, having previously played for St. Helens and Warrington. Scored 16 tries in 38 appearances in 1987-88. In his second spell at Oldham where he once scored 6 tries in a First Division match against Salford in 1984. Seven tries last season included a hat-trick in a 64-2 Lancashire Cup slaughter of Workington.

DUNCAN PLATT

Goal-kicking full-back signed in November, 1988 from Widnes. Brother of Wigan and Great Britain forward Andy, he was in Widnes' Premiership winning team in 1988 and contributed 80 points from 16 appearances in their championship win. Excelled for Oldham and scored 41 goals and 98 points in his debut season. Kicked 2 goals on his debut here at Thrum Hall in the 12-0 win last December.

RICHARD RUSSELL

Oldham's major off-season signing, coming from Wigan, where he had gained Great Britain Colts and two Under 21 international selections in 1987 and 1988. Played in every back role at Central Park but received very few opportunities last season. Represented Wigan in the 1987 Lancashire Cup and Premiership Finals.

NEIL CLAWSON

Son of much-travelled former Trinity and Great Britain prop forward Terry. Neil is another front-rower with lots of ability. Joined Oldham from Featherstone in May 1986 and scored 2 tries in 26 appearances 1988.

JOHN FAIRBANK

Former BARLA international forward signed by Leeds in November 1987, from Elland ARLFC. One of five League-playing brothers and son of former Leeds and Huddersfield forward Jack. Played 18 games in his debut season for Leeds, but was surprisingly allowed to leave

Headingley last August. Strong, forceful 21 year-old whose best is yet to come.

ANDY RUANE

Former Widnes and Rochdale hooker, signed for Oldham by Eric Fitzsimmons, his former coach of the Hornets. A great worker in the loose, with goalkicking skills, he scored 12 tries, 15 goals and 2 drop goals for Hornets in 1987-88. Made his presence felt at Watersheddings, claiming the No. 9 jersey and kicking his first goals against Workington Town in the Lancashire Cup tie. One of the most impressive performers in the relegation year, scoring 4 tries and 15 goals.

PAUL ROUND

Signed for £65,000 from St. Helens in August 1987, instantly repaying Oldham with 16 tries in 26 appearances and gaining inclusion in the Lancashire teams which opposed Yorkshire (scoring a try) and Papua New Guinea in 1987. Originally a back-row forward who has played on the wing and at full-back. Nine tries last season including ones in home and away meetings with Halifax.

JOHN COGGER

An outstanding signing from Runcorn Highfield last season. This inspirational Aussie had picked up the Second Division Player of the Year award in 1987, and starred in Oldham's end-of-season matches, scoring a try hat-trick against Featherstone and totalling 6 tries for the club, to go alongside seven scored for the league's wooden-spoonists. Can play loose-forward or stand-off.

SHAUN ALLEN

Appeared for St. Helens in 1986 and 1988 Premiership Finals and also in their 1984 Lancashire Cup winning side, gaining an Under 21 international debut for Great Britain against France in 1984. Played centre and in the back-row for the Knowsley Road club, joining Oldham, initially on loan, last season, scoring a try against Widnes.

PAUL LORD

Signed from Stanley Rangers ARL as a stand-off but recently playing on wing, represented Yorkshire at U/17's level and Great Britain. Has great pace.

KEITH NEWTON

Strong back-row forward signed from champions Widnes last season, opening his try account for Oldham with two in the 40-9 Cup win at Dewsbury in the first round. Added another two in a big defeat of Featherstone at Watersheddings.

GARY HYDE

Another of Tony Barrow's recruits, joining Oldham from Castleford, after winning Great Britain Under 24 international honours as a centre in the early 80's. Has played centre and loose-forward for Oldham, scoring the first of four tries in a 23-22 defeat of Salford. Played in 7 major Finals for Castleford, including their 1986 Wembley defeat of Hull K.R.

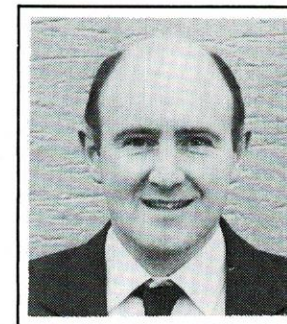

To be a mascot on match day costs £20, but that includes a Swinton Replica jersey, mascots will be accepted up to the age of 14, book now for next season.

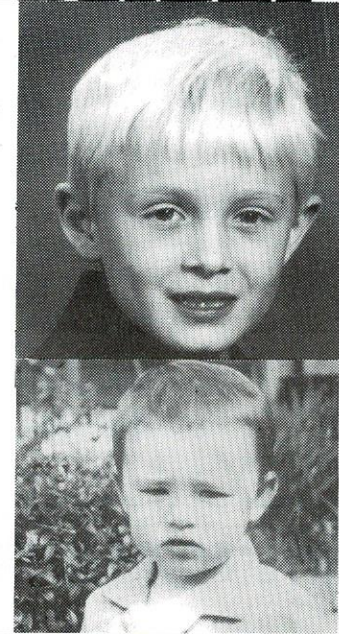

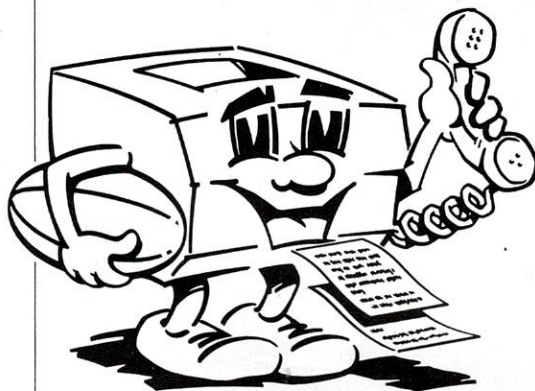

MEMORIES

by John Edwards

SWINTON 1907-8

Although most Rugby followers were looking forward to the visit of the New Zealand Tourists and the joining to the Northern Union of Welsh clubs Ebbw Vale & Merthyr, coached by Jack Evans, Swinton fans realised, due to the Clubs continuing perilous financial position, a long hard season was ahead of them. The selling of Walter Cheetham to Wigan, Arthur Booth to Hull KR, Billy Dixon & Charlie Woods to Oldham had not helped the side with only young local juniors being signed in replacement. On the eve of the opening game the signing of James Downing from Llanelly was announced.

The season opened with a decisive 22-0 home defeat of St. Helens which was followed by 3 away defeats before Runcorn became the first team to win at Chorley Road this season. The 1st Round of the Lancashire Cup saw a home victory over St. Helens by 7-0 before the first visit to Wales when Ebbw Vale won 10-2. Oldham, who went on to win the Lancashire Cup and were the league leaders, defeated the Blues 13-0 in the 2nd Round of the Lancashire Cup.

Swinton were due to play the NZ Tourists on November 30th but torrential rainfall resulted in the postponement of the game until the following Wednesday. In heavy rainfall throughout the game, Swinton were defeated 11-2 fielding the following side: Townson, J.H. Smith, Wallwork (G), Valentine, G.H. Jones, Downing, Griffin, Barnett, Davies, Lloyd, Pomfret, Simister, Taylor. This was followed by a 0-33 defeat at Warrington which was the Lions heaviest NU defeat and widest losing margin.

The indifferent form of losing away and, generally, winning away continued and in January, Swinton pronounced the return of Joey Morgan, from Salford, Jack Preston, from Warrington and Bob Valentine from Manchester United. All veterans whose experience was hoped would strengthen the squad. Jack Wharton arrived from Millan but they failed to prevent Warrington from gaining a 21-0 victory at Swinton, a record home defeat.

After defeating Hull KR and Ebbw Vale, Swinton lost 9-5 in the 1st Round of the Cup at Hull, the eventual Cup Finalists and the season continued in its dismal way with 4 consecutive defeats before the season ended with a 20-3 home victory over Dewsbury.

Swinton lost all 15 away league games plus 2 Cup games - a total of 17 games. The last away victory was on February 23rd, 1907 at Rochdale followed by 18 consecutive defeats and it was no surprise the club finished in 21st position, their lowest position.

Forward 'Harry Barnett' led the tryscorers with 9 and Billy Wallwork who kicked 10 goals, led the points scorers with 32. Forwards Billy Simister and Dan Davies played in both Lancashire County games.

The Lions disappointing run continued and the Board, despite its many efforts to improve the playing fortunes, were hampered by the continuing financial hardship.

SATURDAY - Oldham lost 10-6 to Warrington in the Challenge Cup Semi-Final in emotional and controversial circumstances as winger Paul Lord scored in the corner from a kick through by Mike Ford, only to be disallowed for off-side by John Holdsworth, that try would have levelled the scores with the conversion to come, the arguments will go on forever, but Oldham who like ourselves have never been to Wembley must have been sick.

SUNDAY - Oldham were promoted without playing as Rochdale beat us at Station Road.

MONDAY - Oldham announce plans to develop the Watersheddings. They include a new 2,500 Seater stand, and Executive boxes on the Herbert St. side. The Executive boxes and new terracing on the popular side could be completed in time for next season, with the stand ready for the following season.

WEDNESDAY - Record buy Tony Anderson only signed the previous week for £70,000 from Halifax damaged ankle ligaments at Workington as Oldham lost 21-14, more trouble as John Fieldhouse and John Fairbank were both sent off. John Cogger has to fly home to Australia, where his father is seriously ill.

SUNDAY - A victory over Carlisle 48-16 brings an unhappy week to an end and within two hours Oldham Athletic draw 3-3 with Manchester United in the FA Cup semi-final.

Oldham come here today and wind up an eventful season in the league, on Monday at home to Rochdale in an all ticket match.

● British Satellite Broadcasting will screen all the games of Great Britains tour to New Zealand in the summer, including live coverage of the three tests in June and July.

A contract has already been agreed for the company to cover 30 domestic league and Premiership games for each of the next two seasons, with Sunday games kicking off at 6.30 p.m.

League spokesman David Howes said all first Division grounds will need to bring floodlighting up to television standards and instal gantrys by next season.

Loans will be available from the league to help. B.S.B., who are due to launch nationwide on April 29th, intend to screen Australian league action on Thursday evenings during the summer. The BBC will continue to cover the Silk Cut and Regal Trophy matches plus Internationals. Granada will screen 12 live matches on Saturdays and Yorkshire TV will continue to show highlights on Sunday nights. It's looking good.

● Hull KR's Mike Fletcher broke the clubs points in a season record last week passing the 366 pts scored by George Fairburn (1981-82) and Steve Hubbard (1979-80). He also beat George Fairburn's record of 166 goals in a season.

● Leeds want to increase the number of seats at Headingley to 5,000 at a cost of £150,000.

● Jeremy Guscott, the England and Bath centre turned down Huddersfield's offer of £300,000 to turn professional, we will let you form your own opinion of that!

● Chester FC are talking to Widnes about sharing their ground, whilst their new ground is being built.

● John Holdsworth will referee his second Cup Final at Wembley this year.

● Salford have signed Darren Betts the 19 year old brother of Denis, Salford's defeat at Castleford was their heaviest ever. We heard a rumour from a reliable source that half way through the second half, Castleford walked off,.....and Salford still couldn't score.

That should wind them up for the Agecroft Cup on August 5th.

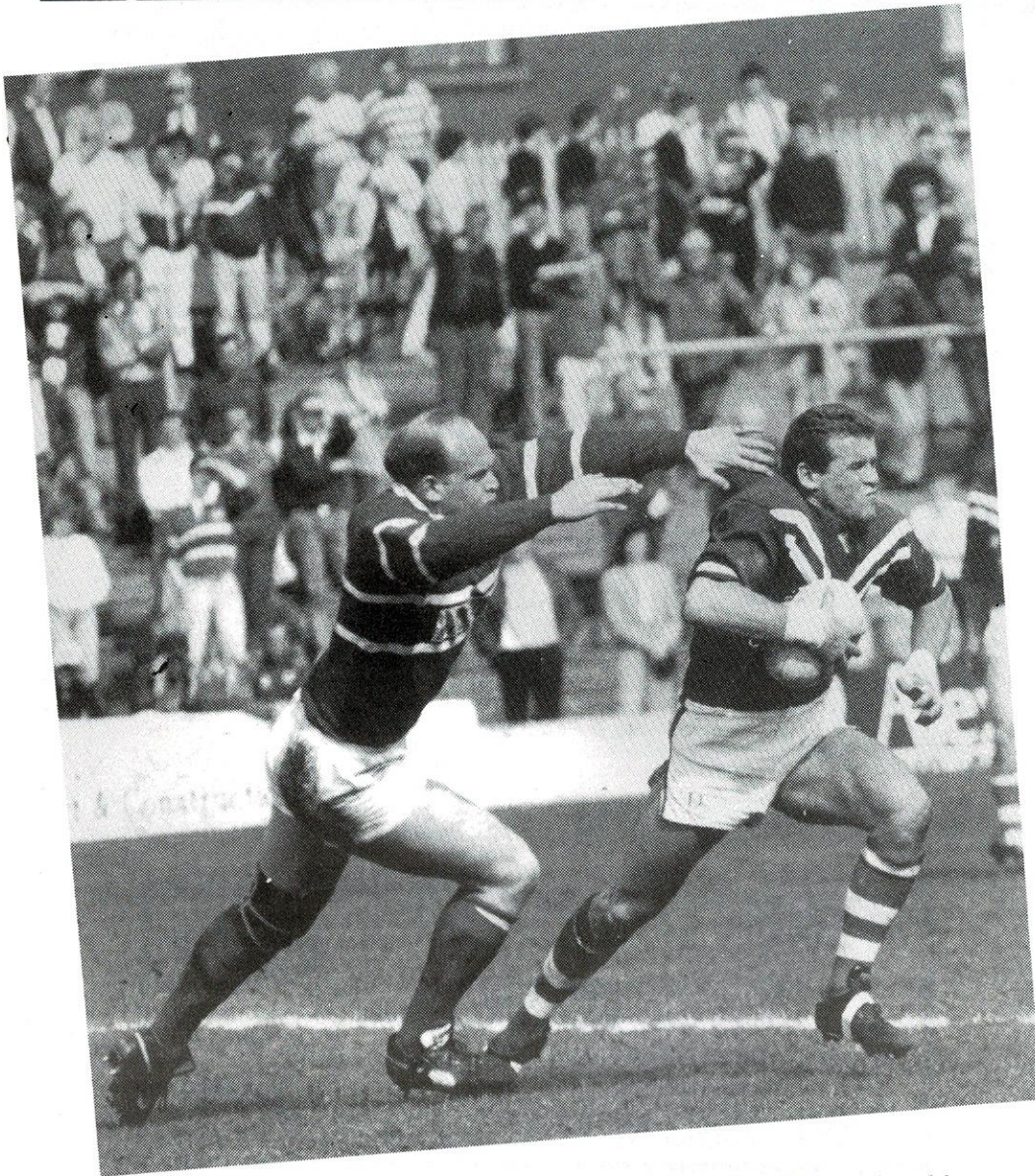

VERDICT


After enjoying an impressive unbeaten 8 game run that put the Lions in a strong position to achieve a home game in the Premiership Play Offs, the team has suffered three consecutive defeats i.e. York (away), Rochdale Hornets (home) and Huddersfield (away). I'm sure that as far as you loyal fans are concerned the recent mini slump has proved to be an anticlimax to the season but the recent defeats have highlighted the fact that our first team squad is simply not strong enough to maintain a promotion assault next season. Our problem began five weeks ago during our emphatic win at Lancaster when we lost the experienced Steve Snape with a bad shoulder injury and the fast improving Tony Morrison who was sent off for a high tackle and consequently received a harsh 8 match suspension. Two weeks later at York our playmaker Keith Holden sustained a nasty foot injury that forced him to miss the Rochdale and Huddersfield games. Our bad luck continued when Logan Edwards, our promising Kiwi forward, had to return home and the overdue first team comeback of hard man, prop Les Chadwick was delayed against Rochdale because of the Strangeways prison riots. Les who is a prison officer, was summoned to Strangeways at noon on the day of the Rochdale game and has been working around the clock ever since. The injury jinx struck yet again in the 37-16 rout against the high flying Hornets when the ever present Paul Topping sustained an ankle injury that forced him to miss the Huddersfield game. The only good news that we have received lately has been the successful return to the first team after injury of Paul Mellor and that Terry Scott has successfully undergone an operation to pin the shoulder that he damaged at Carlisle in January. I sincerely hope that these two lads who have been

jinxed with injuries enjoy an injury free run next season. It is a blow to have 7 players out of an 18 man strong first team squad out of action at this critical stage of the season but it highlights the fact that if the Lions are to be promoted at the end of next season four quality players must be signed during the summer. If the squad isn't strengthened I'm afraid that the Lions will remain a Second Division outfit for the foreseeable future.

I have been rebuilding the first team squad this season by wheeling and dealing having signed 14 pro's at the expense of selling 11 pro's, but there is a limit to what can be achieved in the transfer market when there is no ready cash available to strengthen the team. I shudder to think what would have faced us in the First Division next season if we had gained promotion this time round.

I sympathise with the Board of Directors because in all fairness they have found themselves in a chicken and egg situation. They have had to find a considerable amount of money over the last 5 years for ground safety improvements at Station Road and have also struggled to keep the club afloat on average home gates of around 1600. It should be noted that the club need an average home gate of 3,000 to break even. Consequently, the Board has found itself in a difficult position and unfortunately team strengthening has been a difficult task at times. The Club is currently crippled financially and desperately needs a massive cash injection.

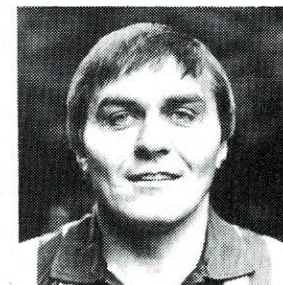

With today's game likely to be our last home game unless we should repeat last years feat drawing in the Premiership, then work will commence shortly on the ends of the stand.

Last Saturday the Manchester Evening News carried a story about the possibility of Blackpool Football Club playing next season at Station Road, news had leaked out and Jack McNamara rang Ian Clift to justify the story, however during the course of his report Jack who has always given us super coverage and been a good friend of Swinton Rugby Club mis-quoted Ian as being a Swinton Director, Ian of course had been a director and chairman for close on ten years but resigned from the board last year.

He does, of course, still hold a majority shareholding, but to shed light on the subject so that all our hundreds of rumour mongers cannot have a sensationalised close-season, it was Steve Walmsley who had started the ball rolling a month ago talking to his friend Geoff Warburton, Commercial Manager of Blackpool and ex working colleague at Bolton Wanderers.

Geoff had mentioned that Blackpool were seeking a deal with any north-west club re ground-sharing for the next two years, whilst Bloomfield Road was bulldozed and the proposed £50m superdome built, with Blackpool over £1½m in debt, this venture was for 365 day a year use, Owen Oyston had been trying for two years to get this scheme off the ground with private investment. Now Blackpool and Preston supporters get on together a bit like Swinton and Salford, and therefore Blackpool would not consider a move to their nearest neighbours, neither would the police! Preliminary talks were held at Station Road and have been discussed by the Blackpool board along with it must be stressed MANY OTHER PROPOSALS.

Should nothing come of OUR offer, then we would at least have first refusal in floodlights, seats and other items, if the demolition takes place this summer, other than that we need the lights BEFORE next season come what may.

For the record the extra revenue created would have been a great boost to Swinton, but the other MAJOR factor was that floodlights, seats and many other items would do nothing but good for *this club*.

It has been mentioned before, but we are exploring every avenue in the quest to make more use of this stadium, which is why the Manchester All Stars American Football team will stage six games here within the next two months, we even offered Chester FC a home last week, after they were turned down by Manchester City, it is no use using 7 acres of land 20 times, for an hour and a half, in forty weeks.

Paul Topping had his leg in plaster as a precaution to protect ankle ligaments, damaged against Rochdale. Keith Holden suffered a bad knock on the ankle at York and of course missed both the Rochdale and Huddersfield games, which gave new signing Keith Waterworth his debut at Fartown. He was soon off the mark with an early drop goal.

Terry Scott is making progress after a successful shoulder operation and is looking forward to next season.

Steve Snape was due to see a specialist today (Tuesday) re his shoulder.

Mike Hancock is making good progress, but Terry Flanagan will miss today's game with a knee injury sustained at Huddersfield.

Dave Maloney is to have another operation soon on his knee, whilst John Allen is also looking forward to next term after suffering setbacks.

Chairman's Message



What a whirlwind of a season this has been, and never a dull moment, TWENTY EIGHT players have joined Swinton since Jim Crellin re-joined us last summer, many others have left the club. We led the table for the first month and have never dropped below seventh position.

As we entered the new year we lost our only game in 13 at Oldham when a serious injury to Paul Mellor as well as Paul Topping being stretchered off eventually led to our downfall as we had led for the first half hour, however, we recovered to win all of the next eight matches and also an epic battle at home to Wakefield in the Silk Cut 1st round saw us draw level at 10-10 in the last minute, the match was played in terrible conditions and our lads proved their fitness and determination after being 10 down after only ten minutes.

Which brings me to my final summary, although we suffer through lack of

spectators, many who do attend have shown their true colours this past few weeks by not only selling the tickets they were sent for the Disneyworld trips, but many have helped and supported in other ways, I take this opportunity to thank you sincerely.

You will find elsewhere in this programme that prices will rise next season, I wish to draw your attention to the fact that ALL Season Tickets bought before the 1st JUNE will be on sale at THIS seasons prices.

I urge you to help yourself and the club by early purchase. In closing I would like to thank all supporters, sponsors advertisers and friends of the club, not forgetting the valuable work done by the clubs Blue Bond Agents to whom we are indebted.

I have stood on the terrace at Station Road since I was a boy of 5 and if I had one wish it would be that we could attract another 1,000 spectators per game, that would indeed solve MOST of the problems at SWINTON RUGBY CLUB.

With that thought in mind I wish you all a happy and pleasant summer and look forward to seeing you next season which will start on JULY 29th at Station Road, with the FEARNLEY SEVENS.
