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

THE DAVID TOPLISS COLUMN

Welcome back to Belle Vue for yet another home game - our fifth in a row. There is no truth in the rumour that Trinity don't have to play away matches this season, and our first will be for the opening of Sheffield's new Don Valley Stadium on Wednesday, 26 September, kick off 8 pm



Prior to our visit to Sheffield, of course, we have two very important dates, with this afternoon's home fixture against Oldham being followed by our first Yorkshire Cup Final clash for sixteen years, against Castleford at Elland Road.

It's a marvellous feeling to have taken Trinity to their first major Final since the 1979 Wembley Final - let's hope it's more successful than that occasion and that it's the first of many for a team which is improving steadily each week.

Everyone has been quick to point out that Wakefield have enjoyed the luck of the draw in the Yorkshire Cup - and no one here is disputing that fact. But it was overdue and we still had the games to win. We've won them all convincingly - although no one is kidding themselves that everything is rosy - and against Dewsbury, I felt we won with something to spare.

Dewsbury came out fired up as expected, but we matched them for commitment and even the disruption caused by Mark Conway's unlucky injury absence worked in our favour. Chris Perry was outstanding in his first appearance at scrumhalf and must have run the official man of the match, Billy Conway, very closely for the award.

Chris has proved a very handy man to have around this season and has developed into the kind of utility man which all successful sides seem to have. Look around the league, at all the leading clubs, and you'll see quality utility men like Fed Byrne (Wigan), Barry Dowd (Widnes) and Jeff Hardy, at Castleford, performing outstandingly in a variety of roles.

The prospect of playing Castleford at Elland Road does not frighten me because I have always done well at the ground during my career. It's been a lucky ground, with a number of successes there during my career with Hull. And, we've no reason to fear Castleford after completing a league double over them last season.

But the very fact that Wakefield Trinity's will be appearing in a final is sure to increase awareness in the progress we are making.

It is a fitting reward for the long-serving clubmen at Belle Vue - John Thompson, Nigel Bell, Billy Conway and Phil Eden - and it also offers an early taste of the big time for youngsters like Gary Price, Richard Slater, Lynton Morris and David Jones. And Kevin Harcombe couldn't have timed his comeback better, could he?

Firstly though, there is the little matter of facing Oldham this afternoon. None of us would swap two points for a Yorkshire Cup win, because First Division survival, and ultimate prosperity, is always uppermost in our plans. Cup success is a bonus - but one which we will readily accept.

Oldham were Second Division Premiers last season. They also contested the Lancashire Cup final and went within eighty minutes of appearing in their first Wembley Final. In Tony Barrow they have one of the most demanding coaches in the business and Oldham will be a test for any side in the top flight.

Significantly they gave Leeds a hiding last week, to stone for their Lancashire cup setback at Salford, and they will be looking to surprise Trinity this afternoon. We will be just as keen for the two points.

Hopefully, our success in the Yorkshire Cup will attract new and old supporters to Belle Vue. Our crowds are continuing to improve and we sincerely hope that the people of Wakefield turn out in force to watch us in next Sunday's Elland Road Final.

It will be an occasion not to be missed and the players will be doing everything within their powers to win Trinity's first trophy in 22 years.

On a personal note, I'd like to welcome to Belle Vue the many friends I made during a happy spell with Oldham - it's great to see the famous old club back in the big time, where they belong.

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TODAY'S VISITORS

Oldham visit Belle Vue for the first time in almost exactly two years, this afternoon, looking for their second league win at the start of their return to the First Division. A tremendous 32 - 22 Watersheddings defeat of Leeds erased the memory of a surprise Lancashire Cup setback at Salford.

Tony Barrow's men are back in the First Division after finishing third in the promotion race, going on to win the Old Trafford Premiership Final for the second time in three seasons, with one of the most amazing comebacks ever seen in a major Final. It was consolation after a season in which they came so close to winning the Lancashire Cup and reaching Wembley for the first time in their history.

Each time, Barrow's men were denied by his former Warrington club, and they desperately want to succeed at First Division level this season, after a yo-yo existence over the past four seasons. Only uncharacteristic end-of-season slip-ups at Workington (14 - 21) and Swinton (12 - 15) cost them a fourth Division Two championship triumph.

This afternoon's Oldham line-up is certain to show wholesale changes to that which drew here 12 - 12 in October 1988. No more than five of that team remain in contention for a place, following a summer in which the shrewd Barrow's has signed such seasoned professionals as Derek Pyke, Ronnie Duane, Austin Donegan and Norman Francis.

Full-back Duncan Platt was a member of the Widnes side which eclipsed St. Helens 38 - 14 in the 1988 Premiership Final, and he landed a goal as the Chemics completed a Championship/Premiership 'double'. Platt kicked 126 goals for Oldham in his most consistent season to date, impressing with a fine attacking display in their Cup semi-final defeat by Warrington and starting the new season with four goals against Leeds.

Winger Richard Irving was an influential member of the promotion-winning squad throughout 1989/90. The ex-Moldgreen winger scored 17 tries, including one in the Lancashire Cup Final, Oldham's solitary effort in the Cup sem-final defeat at the hands of Warrington, their only try in a 9 - 6 victory over Hull KR, at Craven Park and one against the Robins at Old Trafford.

Ex-Leigh centre John Henderson recovered from an early-season injury to score 17 tries, including one in the Premiership victory over Hull KR. Winger Paul Lord weighed in with 29 touchdowns to finish top try scorer in Oldham's fifth promotion-winning season since the re-introduction of two division football in 1973. Lord grabbed a vital effort in the Old Trafford defeat of Hull KR.

New Zealander Charlie McAlister remains one of the most popular players to play for Oldham. Having scored 8 tries and 16 goals last term, he has made a successful transition from centre to second row where his blockbusting running wreaked havoc against Leeds and brought a decisive try. Another 'survivor', although he did not face Leeds, is ex-Great Britain centre Des Foy, who returned to the club following a brief, unhappy spell with Newcastle Knights in Australia. Foy's tally of 10 tries included a five-try spree in the home defeat of Hunslet.

Michael Ford is another mainstay, continuing to look one of the best scrum-halves in the business, having benefitted from the experience of touring Australasia with the 1988 Lions party. His scoring contribution last season was limited to 8 tries and 2 drop goals, but the former Wigan and Leigh man created so many more.

Former St Helens and Great Britain Under 21 international back-rower Paul Round, a makeshift full-back or winger two years ago, is back in his more familiar second-row position, where he gained Under 21 honours in 1984.

The strong-running Round scored two impressive tries in Oldham's all-important Easter Monday 30 - 2 defeat of neighbouring promotion-rivals Rochdale Hornets.

Play-anywhere former Wigan star Richard Russell, was a substitute last week, being an outstanding utility back whilst at Central Park, and a former Great Britain Colts and Under 21 players. He operated with equal success as hooker or loose-forward last season, scoring eight tries.

Second-rower Shaun Allen substituted for Mal Meninga, when St. Helens defeated Hull KR in the 1985 Premiership Final against Hull KR, and again made a substitution appearance in their 1988 final against Widnes. Allen is a former Under 21 international and operates equally well at centre or back-row.

Former Great Britain front or back-row forward John Fieldhouse arrived at Watesheddings via spells with Warrington, Widnes and St. Helens, and includes 1987 and 1989 Wembley Finals among four major finals.

His career has also brought him seven Great Britain caps, including one at Old Trafford in the First Test against the Australian touring team, four years ago.

17-try Australian Brett Clark has re-produced the form, for Oldham, that made him a shrewd St. Helens capture from Western Suburbs four seasons ago, when he appeared in the Wembley Cup final. It was his interception try which gave Oldham their early lead last Sunday.

A leading try-scorer for Oldham, and one of three contenders for the Second Division Player of the Year award he won whilst with Runcorn Highfield three years ago, was dynamic Australian loose-forward John Cogger. His 24 tries included a hat-trick at home to Hunslet and Oldham are delighted that he returned to

Watersheddings after protracted contract negotiations appeared to have borken down. influence is vital.

Ex-Leeds prop-forward John Fairbank came Oldham in a 1988 deal which took Test front-ro Hugh Waddell to Headingley. He has matured into outstanding forward in his own right, showing the f that won him amateur international honours, w scoring 8 tries on the promotion trail.

Andy Ruane arrived at Oldham after spells widnes and Rochdale Hornets, and was a staly performer in last season's desperate fight against relegation, scoring 4 tries and 15 goals. This seas in competition with Russell, he has scored eight trie

Keith Newton is another former Widnes player, v has repsonded to the regular opportunity of first-te football. The undoubted highlight of the seco rower's impressive season was the scoring Oldham's match-winning Cup quarter-final try of seven in 1989/90 - against his former Widcolleagues.

While Barrow leaned heavily on experience in quest for an instant return to Division One, he a blooded some of the finest young prospects in game - such as teenagers Neil Flanagan and Tre Croston, with his son Tony, Chris Joynt and Richi Blackman also waiting in the wings.

The best of the prospects, though, is goalkick centre Tommy Martyn, son of the former Leigh a Warrington forward of the same name. The teenage influence altered the nature of the Old Traffc Premiership final last May, and he was man of match against Leeds last weekend. Martyn should a Great Birtain Under 21 international this season.

And the man who led Warrington to 18 Premiership success, strengthened his squad with t acquisition of Halifax's match-winning Australi utility back Tony Anderson, but saw the pa Australian carried off with a broken ankle Workington last April. Anderson's future is still doubt after complications.

They will be hoping that Derek Pyke, the form Leigh, Widnes and Lancashire County prop, recove quickly from the knee injury sustained against Leek while 1984 tourist Ronnie Duane is due an injury-fr run after endless problems dogged his promisi career at Warrington.

The 'Roughyeds' won all fourteen Division Tv matches at the Watersheddings, and few teams w relish visiting there in 1990/91. But the key to the survival could be their away form and that's whakes this afternoon's contest such an intriguing one

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
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
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MATCH REPORT

Sunday, 2 September 1990 John Smith's Yorkshire Cup Quarter-Final **WAKEFIELD 26: HALIFAX 17**

New Trinity captain Andy Kelly led his men for the first time as the side showed three changes to the line-up which had defeated Hunslet in the Yorkshire Cup first-round. Chris Perry switched from stand-off to the right-wing, allowing Tracey Lazenby the No.6 jersey, with Kelly back in the second-row and Nigel Bell and Andy Wilson on the bench.

Trinity reached their first Yorkshire Cup semi-final in seven years with a hard-earned defeat of fallen giants Halifax. But they struggled to finish the stubborn resistence of Second Division opponents relying more on endeavour than inspiration.

Trinity held the upper hand throughout the game, after erasing an early deficit with Mark Conway's 18th minute try, but their insecure defence must have worried David Topliss. Every time they looked to have killed the Halifax challenge, Wilf George popped up with typical blockbusting efforts, before impressive Martin Wood scored late on to keep Halifax's feint hopes alive until the final hooter.

The visitors, in high spirits after an unexpectedly easy passage at Doncaster, made all the early running and it was ex-Trinity half-back John Lyons who opened the scoring with a 6th minute drop-goal. Four minutes later, much-travelled back-rower Alan Platt cheered the vast Halifax contingent in the impressive 6,492 audience by landing a good penalty goal.

Trinity missed an opportunity to reduce the deficit when Harcombe fired wide with a 30 yard penalty attempt, but responded to the challenge two minutes later, with a stroke of good fortune helping them into a 6-3 lead.

Mark Conway wriggled free of a cluster of defenders on the Halifax quarter-line but seemed to have over-hit his grubber kick for the line. The ball struck the upright, however, richocheting into the ingoal area and allowing Conway to win the race for a fortuitous touchdown. Harcombe landed the simple conversion.

It was 8-3, three minutes later, with Harcome landing a penalty goal after hooker Andy Walker was floored by a high tackle from Lyons. The Trinity hooker was in the thick of the action at this point, and he and Halifax counterpart Jason Ramshaw were sin-binned for ten minutes by referee Holdsworth in the 26th minute.

Trinity should have extended their advantage when Price, Conway and Kelly combined skilfully, but Harcombe, in a left centre position and with the line open, put down the chance. Three minutes later that miss looked even costlier, as Halifax opened out stylishly down the left flank for Wood to send Hutchinson away and Wilf George beat the cover superbly and stretched out for a try which made it 8-7.

Nigel Bell replaced Steve Potts five minutes fi the break and the long-serving forward immedia set-up the position from which Trinity scored tl crucial try just before the interval.

After Kelly and the hard-working Richard Slater gone close, Cup specialist John Thompson forced way over for an all-important try and Harcombe add the extras with a difficult, angled conversion.

Thompson, whose rare tries last season include cup-tie efforts in the Challenge Cup against Swin and Sheffield, fully deserved his score for an unstint first-half effort.

Halifax soon made their intentions clear on resumption and Platt landed a 25 yard penalty goa reduce the deficit. But they were back in the cont only temporarily.

Conway's high kick caused panic, and Slater nea uncovered Perry on the right, the hasty pass go into the touch on the first tackle. From the result scrum referee Holdsworth awarded one of a numl of scrum penalties, to Trinity, and lively hooker Ar Walker threw a long pass which sent Gary Pr. driving through the heart of the Halifax cover for important try, inevitably goaled by Harcombe.

Dogged Halifax refused to concede defeat and af a spell of pressure Ramshaw's pass freed George the corner for the winger's second try. Again, the hor fans were relieved to see Platt's kick drift wide.

On the hour, Wakefield again seemed to ha ensured their semi-final place, as Conway's high ki was pursued by Price and the impressive David Jon whose pass sent skipper Kelly over. Harcombe land his fifth goal and it was 24-13.

Still, never-say-die Halifax came again, and Lyc made the break from which loose-forward Wo scored their third try. But Trinity, with man-of-th match Conway, winger Jones, Gary Price and Key Harcombe most impressive, had done enough ensure overdue Cup progress. The chance of overdue Cup Final appearance now beckons.

PROFILE - ANDY MASON

ANDY MASON - BACK IN THE GROOVE

The season began in earnest for Trinity's freescoring centre Andy Mason against Rochdale Hornets.

He opened his try account with two opportunist efforts, as Wakefield romped to their biggest first Division victory for nine years, and the signs look good for the coming nine menths.

And now the former Trinity skipper has his sights on the milestone of fifty tries for the club. just three years after leaving Leeds in one of the most controversial transfer deals in history.

Mason . . . Conway . . . Rayne . . . and . . . Fox, in exchange for Gary Spencer and John Lyons. No wonder, David Topliss still shakes his head in disbelief at his good fortune.

The 28 year old, who joined Bramley from Roundhay RUFC in January 1985, has been noted throughout his Rugby League career for his tryscoring consistency. It was that ability to poach tries on a regular basis which made him one of Topliss's initial transfer targets. He has not disappointed.

Andy grabbed 32 tries in only 53 appearances for the 'Villagers', during which time he became Bramley's ninth post-war Yorkshire County player. Maurice Bamford, who allowed him to leave Leeds, also called him into the Great Britain squad for the 1986 Ashes series.

He totalled five tries, including a try-scoring debut at Hull, in his brief 17-match stay with Leeds, before embarking on a career with Trinity. And Sunday's brace of touchdowns against the Hornets took him to the 47 mark, after only 92 appearances.

Mason's try-every-other-game ration has been crucial to Wakefield Trinity's First Division survival over the past two seasons. Each time he was the club's top try-scorer - refuting the criticism of those who said he could not match it with the best at the top level.

His try hat-trick, even in a 17 - 34 defeat at the Boulevard last March, gave him great personal satisfaction. It was the first by a Trinity player at First Division level since 8 January 1984 . . . when a certain Wally Lewis starred in a 31 - 22 defeat of St. Helens

Few players will be more disappointed than Mason that Yorkshire's annual slaughter of Lancashire has been temporarily abated. It invariably provided an annual showpiece for him to display his talents to a wider audience.

But the fact that Peter Fox's men have been denied a clash with the Kangaroos is tempered by the fact that Mason's 17 tries (a personal best) helped to secure ninth spot in 1989/90, earning Trinity their first duel against Australia in seventeen years.

"I've always regarded try-scoring as a fundamental part of my game", he has said in the past, "and it helps my confidence when I'm scoring regularly."

Few players have matched his consistency in that department in recent years, and all at Belle Vue are hoping that he reaches the magic halfcentury mark in the note-too-distant future.

Due to the promotion and relegation fluctuations which both clubs have endured, Trinity and Oldham have met only seven times at First division level during the seventeen seasons since the 'split' in 1973/74. Here, we highlight three of those encounters, plus the classic promotion battle in 1988.

ALLIANCE ANALYSIS

LOOKING AT TRINITY'S PROGRESS IN THE SLALOM LAGER CHAMPIONSHIP

After promotion from the Second Division of the Slalom Lager Alliance Championship, no one at Belle Vue is under any illusions about the enormous task Trinity face in retaining their status in the top flight.

And if they needed a reminder, Ian Brooke and his new assistant, long-serving half-back David Wandless, saw the extent of the challenge they face when their youthful squad faced a Leeds side which would not have been out of place at first-team level, in their opening match.

An 8 - 38 defeat at the hands of last season's Championship runners-up hardly reflected the commitment of a young Trinity line-up which fought gamely to the final whistle. They were simply out-gunned by a vastly more experienced side.

Brooke believes that it is imperitive for Trinity to maintain their place in the First Division because that is the way his youngsters will learn by playing against the best, on the best grounds.

"Leeds were a far more experienced side", says the ex-Great Britain centre, "and, that's the way it will be in many cases at this level. When you've got lads like 16 year-old Richard Goddard and Nigel Wright, it's asking a lot to make such a leap in standards.

"But they, and others like Mark Colbeck and new signing Mark Webster, will learn quickly from the experience.


"Significantly, Trinity were one of only three First Division clubs not to have Alliance teams also in the top section last season. We've rectified that situation, now, leaving only Bradford Northern and Sheffield Eagles (whose Alliance team made their entry for the first time only last season) as the odd two out.

"I'm confident we can do enough to stay in this league - and then we can go on from there."



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

CONWAY RUES CRUEL INJURY SETBACK

"It's so frustrating. To miss a semi-final, of all matches. But, hopefully, the boys will ensure there's a Final to look forward to."

Trinity's attacking inspiration Mark Conway was reflecting on the leg injury which sidelined him for Trinity's all-important Yorkshire Cup semi-final meeting with Dewsbury.

It was his first absence at first-team level for 53 games and nearly two years, since the 1988 home John Player tie with Carlisle. And he had badly wanted to show the man who released him from Leeds, Maurice Bamford, that he was wrong - yet again.

But hopefully Trinity will have won through to their first Yorkshire Cup Final in sixteen years and Mark Conway will be contemplating appearing in a major Final at Elland Road . . . seven years after being denied, what many felt was his rightful chance.

Former Stanley Rangers junior Conway first came to prominence in a Leeds team which qualified for the John Player Final against Wigan in 1982/83 season. As a teenage goalkicking scrum-half, he deputised for international Kevin Dick in the quarter-final at Barrow . . . and was the star of the show, scoring a brilliant try and two goals.

In the semi-final against Widnes, at Fartown, it was Conway's ice-cool pressure kicking which secured Leeds' 8 - 2 victory. His four goals seemed to have won him a first major Final appearance.

But Dick was fit to resume for the Final clash with Wigan and coach Robin Dewhurst went for the experienced Great Britain half-back, leaving Conway kicking his heels in frustration on the bench.

Leeds lost 4- 15 and for Mark there was not even the consolation of a substitute's appearance. It remains his biggest disappointment.

So, a Yorkshire Cup Final appearance on 23 September would be overdue reward for a man whose career has been revitalised since leaving Headingley for hometown Trinity. And, while it may have been a culture shock, initially, he has

no doubts now that the transfer was the making of him.

"There's more of a team spirit at Trinity, although I still get on well with many of my former Leeds colleagues", he says. "We're all pulling the same way and that's what makes playing for Wakefield so enjoyable.

"It was always my ambition to play for Leeds. I'd idolised players like John Holmes and Les Dyl and it was a dream-come-true to play alongside them. But, on reflection, it was never going to happen for me at Leeds.

"I was rarely given the extended run that might have built my confidence. At Belle Vue, I've hardly missed a game in three years and that's been the difference. My confidence soared and it's shown in my game."

Conway's general play and consistent goalkicking form won him the Trinity Player of the Year award for the second time in three years, in 1990, and the former Colts tourist and Great Britain Under 21 international may yet achieve his ambition of full Test honours.

"I'm not concerned about losing the goalkicking duties to Kevin Harcombe", adds Mark. "I can take or leave the job, I don't mind either way.


"But it's good that Kevin came back to the club because his was a talent that was too good to squander. Now, he's playing better than ever.

"And I can concentrate more on my own game. I think my supporting game has improved already this season and I'm looking to score a lot more tries than the six of last season. That was a disappointment to me and my aim is to significantly improve on that figure."

No one at Belle Vue has done more to turn the club's fortunes around than the bargain-basement signing from Leeds. His half-back partnership with 1982 Colts tour colleague Tracey Lazenby has been critical to Trinity's climb towards success.

Conway deserves to savour the atmosphere of a major Final, after almost a decade as one of the game's finest entertainers. And he realises that when he came 'home' to Wakefield, he found the grass to be much greener than it was ever likely to be with 'millionaires' Leeds.


