

The way I see it, as the season unfolds, we have won the Charity Shield and the Lancs Cup, with the rest still to go for. If you're looking for a team to win the lot, then we have to be in pole position.

he season got off to a dream start for Oldham, just what they needed to re-establish their claim as First Division material, by winning two of their three matches so far. They overcame the big spending Leeds, and the recent Yorkshire Cup winners Castleford by the scores 32-22 and 28-22 respectively at the Watersheddings, but sandwiched in between was a narrow defeat at Wakefield 17-12.

Coach Tony Barrow who came to Oldham in November 1988, believes a big squad of forwards is essential in his quest to stay up there with the top clubs. He sold prop Leo Casey to Featherstone for £100,000 and then spent the fee wisely buying Derek Pyke from Widnes for £50,000, Austin Donegan the St. Helens forward at £20,000, Ronnie Duane the Warrington forward/back for £15,000 and Norman Francis the Leeds winger for £30,000. These signings will no doubt strengthen the existing team with such notables as Ruane, Fieldhouse, Newton, Russell, Round, McAlister and Keith Atkinson who is currently injured. The backs are solid and pacey with Foy, Henderson, Lord and Irving a match for most sides.


Oldham were most definitely the surprise package last season with notable Cup wins over St. Helens, Wigan, Salford, Barrow and Widnes, all First Division sides. However, they will be the first to realise that playing in the First Division week in and week out is a different proposition to

raising their game for a one off knock-out competition.

The rapport between Widnes and Oldham fans has always been very good. Many Widnes spectators wished them well after the Challenge Cup quarter-final last season here at Naughton Park and the support continued at last year's Premiership final, when they shouted for each other's team against the White Rose opposition.

Tommy Martyn has been a bit of a teenage sensation after being a big hit on the young Lions tour of Australia in 1988. Oldham won the race for his signature, and with such illustrious relatives as father Tommy the ex-Leigh and Warrington international, and equally talented uncle



This season he has scored three times already with an unusual hattrick against Leeds involving a try, a conversion and a drop goal.



HE names of ICT Widnes Hall of Fame will soon be announced, but one name on the list is certain to be Nat Silock. Ron Girvin looks back on his

Nat, who lost count of the number of appearances he made for Lancashire, was one of only three forwards to go on two tours Down Under while on the Naughton Park

He was the first in 1932 and 1936. He was later to be followed by Jim Mills and Mick Adams who is the only forward to have appeared in more Test matches.

Nat, a mountain of a man, who had tremendous power and pace, played 12 Tests from 1932-37.

Adams had 13 appearances but two of those were as a substitute, so perhaps Nat could claim some sort of record as the 'most' capped forward.

In those days of course, there were not the number of Tests that we have today. France weren't playing Rugby League then and there was no Papua New Guinea either.

Nat played two Tests, against New Zealand and Australia in the 1932 tour; all three when the Kangaroos came here a year later, all three in Australia in 1936—when he was accompanied on the tour by the great Tommy McCue—and two in 1937. He was on a losing side on only two occasions.

But the 1936 tour probably resulted in the big man missing out on perhaps the most coverted medal of all. In the days of a championship play-off, Widnes lost to Hull while Silcock and McCue were on tour.


"If we had been playing in the final I'm sure Widnes would have won the title for the first time", he said.

It was, however, against the Australians in 1929 that Nat pulled off a feat which many old timers talk about today.

As the 1930 Wembley souvenir put it in his pen picture: "Combining weight with speed, Silcock has distinguished himself in the new style of open forward play. He has some spectacular tries to his credit and the wonderful way in which he overtook speedy Australian wing threequarter (Finch) will long be remembered"

Silcock played in the second row in that Wembley Challenge Cup final against St. Helens. It was the first time the Chemics had even been in the final but they pulled off what is regarded in RL history as one of the greatest Wembley shocks with a 10-3 triumph.

The Widnes team of local lads—only South



African Van Rooyen was an outsider—beat a star-studded Saints side 10-3, all the points coming in the first half.

Five years later Silcock had moved up to the front row, but his second Wembley trip ended in disappointment as Widnes lost 11-5 to a Hunslet side who played with 12 men for half the game because of a shoulder injury to Morrell sustained as he scored a try.

Nat had only two years to wait for another Wembley trip. This time he went as captain and led Widnes to a great 18-5 win over Keighley and put the icing on the cake by getting the fourth try.

Nat regarded that as possibly his greatest moment of his career. It was a career which started in 1923-24 and ended suddenly in the 1937-38 season.

"I woke up one morning before a Warrington match with pains in my chest. The doctor said that I had an

internal problem and that my career was over." Unfortunately in later life he suffered badly from arthritis.

Sadly he reflected: "The conditions we played in were terrible some times. You couldn't get a proper bath and often in cold water. There are times when I wish I had never played the game."

Thankfully Widnes followers of the 20s and 30s were glad he did to become one of the greatest players of all time.
