

# MATCH REPORT Great Britain 19pts Australia 12

ELLERY HANLEY and his gallant warriors finally silenced the Aussies at Wembley yesterday.

The Kangaroos had notched 37 consecutive wins on

British soil in the last 12 years.

But coach Mal Reilly's men ripped the form book apart in the first Test.

And how skipper Hanley, winger Paul Eastwood and stand-off Garry Schofield deserved a rousing standing ovation from the 52,000 crowd.

## Heart

Hanley proved beyond doubt that he is the finest player in the world with a magnificent man-of-the-match performance

Eastwood, drafted into the squad in place of Welsh wizard Jonathan Davies, scored two magnificent tries and kicked three goals.

And Schofield, switched to stand-off during Britain's

successful tour of New Zealand in the summer, ripped the heart out of the Aussies with some superb tactical kicking.

But the entire British team played their part in Britain's finest Test triumph for years.

World champions Australia, so confident of victory, were cut down to size and face a tremendous battle if they are to come back and stop Britain carrying off the Ashes for the first time in 20 years.

It was Britain who created all the early pressure and midway through the half they got their reward when Eastwood landed a penalty after Aussie loose forward Robert Lindner had been penalised at the play-the-

Just before the interval Steve Hampson, who had brilliantly taken a high ball, was penalised for kicking out in a tackle and Aussie skipper Mal Meninga levelled the

Power
Britain rocked them five minutes into the second half when Hanley made a superb break before kicking ahead and from the play-the-ball centre Daryl Powell put Eastwood over for a try.

The Australians hit back almost immediately with a

superb break from centre Mark McGaw, who put Meninga in for a try.

But Hanley hoisted a high kick from which fullback Gary Belcher fumbled and there was Offiah to pick up and plunge over for a try that Eastwood goaled.

Schofield dropped a goal but McGaw raced in for a try that Meninga superbly goaled.

The Aussies were just one point behind but Britain never gave up and when Schofield kicked ahead, collected the ball and passed to Powell, there was Eastwood to power over for another try.

In the final two minutes Eastwood made certain of victory when he landed a penalty.



shrug off the euphoria that surrounded Great Britain's historic First Test victory over the ex-invincible Australians

Neutral scribe that I am, I was caught up in the tide of emotion that land of Hope and Glory cascaded over Wembley.
I cannot think that Sir Edward Elgar, in 1901, ever imagined how inspirational that particular section of Pomp and

Circumstance would turn out to be.

A week yesterday, Land of Hope and
Glory became part of some cunning
psychology by the Great Britain back-

room boys.

Australia were not allowed to train on the Wembley pitch. They were brought early into the tunnel where, especially early into the tunner where, especially for first-timers, nerve ends are at their rawest. And they had imposed upon them Wembley's traditional individual introduction of the teams.

introduction of the teams.

Actually the Aussies didn't fall for the peeling off by number game, as Great Britain did in their usual manner, but their decidedly nervous start suggested to me at any rate that Britain's "delaying tactics" had a considerable affect.

How about "There's Always Be An England" as an encore at Old Trafford?

Apart from Great Britain's team

Apart from Great Britain's team triumph, there were two other notable things about a win that opens up the way for Great Britain to regain the Ashes for the first time since Frank Mayler's men — who included Wigan forwards won the 1970 Test series Down Under by 2-1. Doug Laughton and Dave Robinson -

The first was the impeccable per-formance of French referee Alain Sablayrolles, who gave a new meaning to sign language in the realms of

sport.
When big Paul Sironen indicated that

When big Paul Sironen indicated that the referee had missed a knock on, Monsieur Sablayrolles made it clear that, indeed, he had NOT missed a thing, simply by pointing to his eyes. When, in the dying minutes, Paul Eastwood clearly wasted time in his preparation for the match-clinching penalty goal, he employed the superbly unambiguous gesture of stabbing a unambiguous gesture of stabbing a finger at his wrist watch.

After the game, Australian coach Bobby Fulton claimed that if the referee had awarded his men as man penalties as he gave Great Britain, Australia would have won by the same score.
Was it not simply a case of Alain

Sablayrolles becoming the first referee on this tour to cotton on to Australia's sly offside tactics and punishing them whenever they transgressed?

I gave the Frenchman ten out of

ten.
The second notable thing was the television coverage of the game by the BBC. For once they presented the event as though they genuinely cared for Rugby League, rather than giving the impression that they were doing the game a favour.

Even more impressive than that in my book was the way Wigan coach John Monie gave the whole thing a refreshingly new articulate, authoritative and sophisticated outlook - and the way commentator Ray French responded to him by a quite brilliant reading of the

Monie and French were working together for the first time. They make a fine team.

Notable is scarcely adequate to

Notable is scarcely adequate to describe the towering display of Great Britain skipper Ellery Hanley whose individual and inspirational brilliance overshadowed Australia's best, thrilled TV audiences across the world and earned him the Man of the Match

The Black Pearl looked fit to die — or kill — for Great Britain as he headed his warriors in the Wembley tunnel. In a sporting sense it could be said that he "murdered" the world champions with his tigerish tackling, never-say-die running and, most damagingly, classical kicking which directly produced two

tries.

Malcolm Reilly told me after the game that in his opinion Hamley's performance puts him among the greatest Rugby League players of all time. He is right. That Hanley is set to equal Billy Boston's total of 31 Great Britain caps in this person puts him as a greatest left.

this series puts him on a pedestal of

greatness.

That he has also successfully coped with the added responsibility as captain of our international side introduces an extra dimension that will assure Hanley of Rugby League immortality.







# 1921/22 SEASON

WHEN Wigan entertained Widnes on the 27th August 1921, the crowd at Central Park witnessed the beginning of a new era. Over the next 25 years one man alone would set many individual records tumbling, and lead the club to many famous victories. That man was Jim Sullivan. During the course of his first season in the Wigan colours, Sullivan kicked 99 goals which beat the previous highest mark by 16.

In the league championship, 22 wins and 1 draw from 32 games saw Wigan take second place. Notable results included a 55 - 3, 13 try rout of Warrington at Central Park. Just 18 days later the team lost the return match 6 - 10. The longest winning streaks were both only 5 games long, although just after the start of the season Wigan had a 7 match unbeaten run (3 wins, 1 draw + 3 wins). This inconsistency led to the club missing out on top spot.

In the Lancashire League championship, 16 wins from 22 outings gave Wigan another second place, relinquishing the trophy which they had won the previous year.

The Lancashire cup was a complete non starter. The team went down 0 - 5 at Broughton Rangers in the first round. Wigan did gain some revenge with a 12 - 3 home win in the league competition a week later.

February brought the beginning of the Rugby League Challenge Cup, and a home pairing with Wakefield Trinity. A 15 - 6 victory gave them another home tie in round 2. This was won 52 - 6 against Hunslet and set up yet another home game in round 3. Keighley provided Wigan's rivals for a semi final spot, and were overcome easily in a 11 try 45 - 0. win. Wigan faced a strong Hull team in the semi final which was played at Headingley, Leeds and that was where Wigan's cup run ended with a 5 - 18 defeat. Hull went on to lose the final 9 - 10 against Rochdale at Leeds in front of a record 32,596 crowd.


In the championship play off Wigan's second place in the league championship gave them a home game against Hull. It was a case of revenge is sweet as Wigan triumphed 27 - 8. Wigan's final opponents were Oldham, for the fourth time in 6 finals. In the previous 3 games Wigan had won the first meeting and Oldham the next two.

The final was played at the Cliff, Broughton. The only player surviving from Wigan's last championship final in 1913 was Percy Coldrick, now 34 years old and a regular in the Wigan team for 10 years. In a tight, hard-fought game the only try of the match was scored by Jerry Shea, a docker from Newport in Wales, who had been signed earlier in the season. Four goals from Jim Sullivan and one from Howley put the icing on the cake for Wigan's 13 - 2 victory.

It was trainer Tommy McCartys first Knockout competition win, and went some way towards making up for defeat in the Challenge Cup final 10 - 21 against Huddersfield two years

# **WIGAN GREATS**



# 1921/22 PERCY COLDRICK

WHEN Wigan lost the opening game of the 1924/25 season, the fans were seeing the end of a distinguished career. In the 3-8 defeat at the hands of Swinton, Percy Coldrick played his last game for the Wigan club.

Albert Percival Coldrick was born in Newport, South Wales, in 1888, and played his first match for Wigan on the 7th September, 1912. Widely regarded as the fastest forward of his day, he was capped by Wales and toured Australasia in 1914. He played in all three tests against the Australians, scoring one try, and he also played in the only test of the New Zealand leg of the tour.

Percy retired, after twelve years in the Wigan colours, aged thirty-six, with a Championship winners medal from 1921/22 and Lancashire Cup winners medals from 1912/13 and 1922/23. In all, he played 281 games for Wigan and scored 80 tries. He died on the 26th December, 1953 aged 65.
