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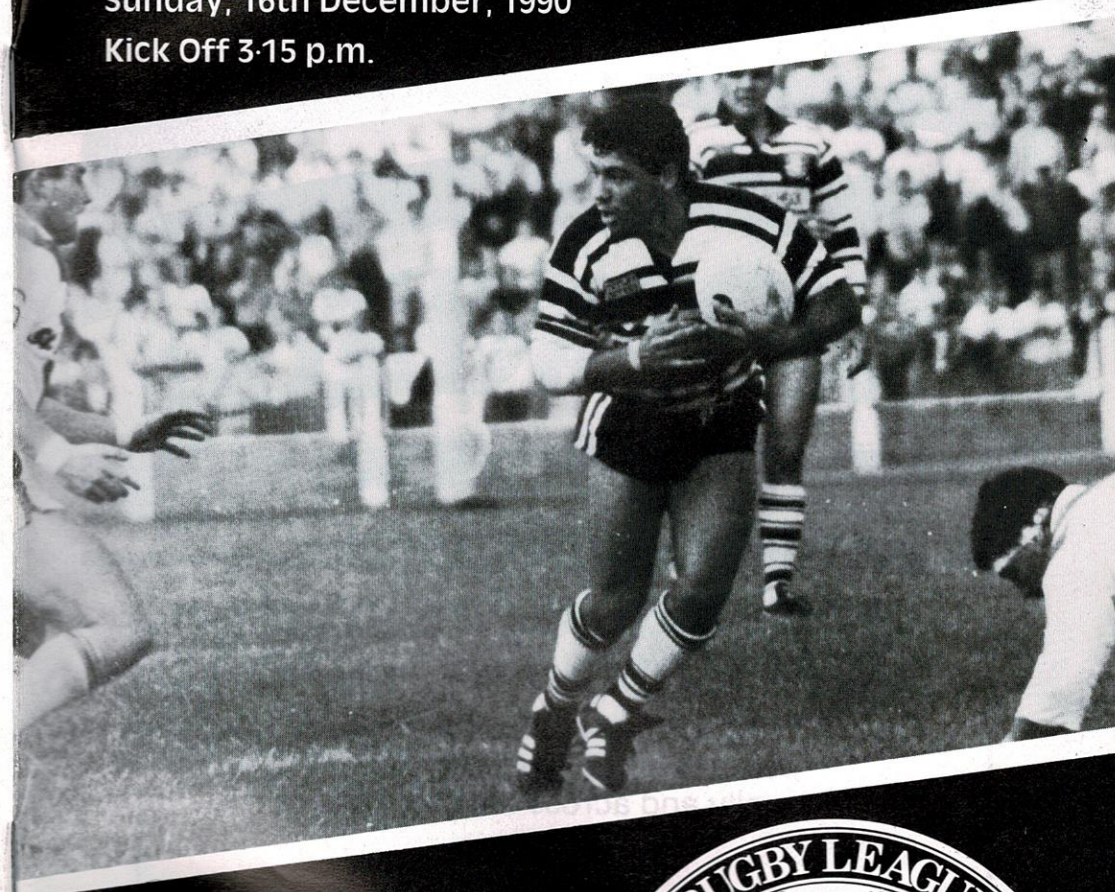

As this season progresses a couple of factors are clearly emerging in the competitive atmosphere of Rugby League 1990's style.

Firstly the pace and intensity of almost every First Division championship fixture has clearly increased. As one door closes another one opens and Brian's fellow countryman Noel Cleal will hope to emulate Brian's achievements and keep Hull in pole position in the Stones Bitter Championship race.

Looking back on 1989/90 with Oldham

After a season's absence Oldham returned to the top flight having enjoyed one of the finest seasons for years, taking the Second Division Premiership with one of the outstanding comebacks in history.

As well as finishing third in the Championship race, the Roughyeds also reached the Lancashire Cup Final and went within an ace of the club's first ever Wembley appearance. Only uncharacteristic end-of-season away defeats at Workington and Swinton cost them the Division Two title, having completed a league double over eventual champions Hull K.R.

Like several others Oldham have become labelled a yo-yo club typified by the fact that promotion in 1990 was their fifth since the reintroduction of two divisions in 1973, and their tenth movement between the two leagues in that period. Coach Tony Barrow vowed, after promotion had been achieved, that he never wished to return to Second Division football because it failed to stimulate him. Certainly the Watersheddings faithful will be delighted if he can secure the club's long-term future in the top division though events to date typify the difficult task ahead.

Grounds for optimism for this season came from the 'Roughyeds' excellent showing against First Division opposition last season. In the County Trophy, Oldham eliminated Barrow and St Helens comprehensively both away from their own soil and had the satisfaction of ending Wigan's vice-like, four-year grip on the trophy. Sadly Oldham flattered to deceive in their 18th County Cup final appearance against Warrington and went down 16-24 to a Mike Gregory inspired Wire.

The other cup competitions also served to underline the fact that Oldham were a Second Division side in name only last term. Comprehensive victories over Bramley and Huddersfield took them on a return to Knowsley Road where they might well have repeated the 36-6 Lancashire Cup victory had Duncan Platt not been dismissed. His absence proved crucial as Saints gained full vengeance with a 32-18 success.

Along the Wembley route Oldham produced a fine second-round performance to win at Salford and then produced the upset of the season by shattering the Cup ambitions of joint favourites Widnes with a 16-4 quarter-final victory at Naughton Park. So the Roughyeds looked towards a possible first ever Wembley visit and yet for the fourth time in their history had to endure the bitter disappointment of falling at the final hurdle. Richard Irving's try put Oldham into the lead against First Division neighbours Warrington but Wire fought back to level matters before a late disputed score took them to the Twin Towers to face mighty Wigan. The manner in which Wigan disposed of Wire on the hallowed turf perhaps brought some relief to Oldham supporters amidst the tears.

Consolation was provided in the Second Division Premiership competition when Oldham lifted the trophy for the second time in three seasons, thanks to an astonishing Old Trafford comeback against Hull K.R. Early in the second half the Lancashire side were playing for nothing but pride having allowed their opponents to build a 29-8 lead. Slowly but surely a Mike Ford inspired Oldham clawed their way back and clinched a famous one-point victory to leave Hull K.R. players and supporters in a state of shock. The old Trafford success was Oldham's third of the season over the Robins making it the more frustrating that the title had gone to Craven Park. Oldham lost only one of their opening ten matches and went into their Challenge Cup semi-final against Warrington with a sequence of 16 cup and league victories behind them. However, a surprise defeat with a weakened side at Workington cost them so dearly.

Having drastically re-shaped his side during the 1988/89 season during the fight to avoid relegation, coach Barrow made few major signings, electing instead to successfully blood youngsters of the calibre of **Tommy Martyn** and **Trevor Croston**. Leading the points scoring was one of his previous signings, former Widnes star **Duncan Platt** and other notable captures, **Richard Russell** from Wigan, **John Henderson** from Leigh and **Paul Round** from Saints, featured regularly among the try scorers.



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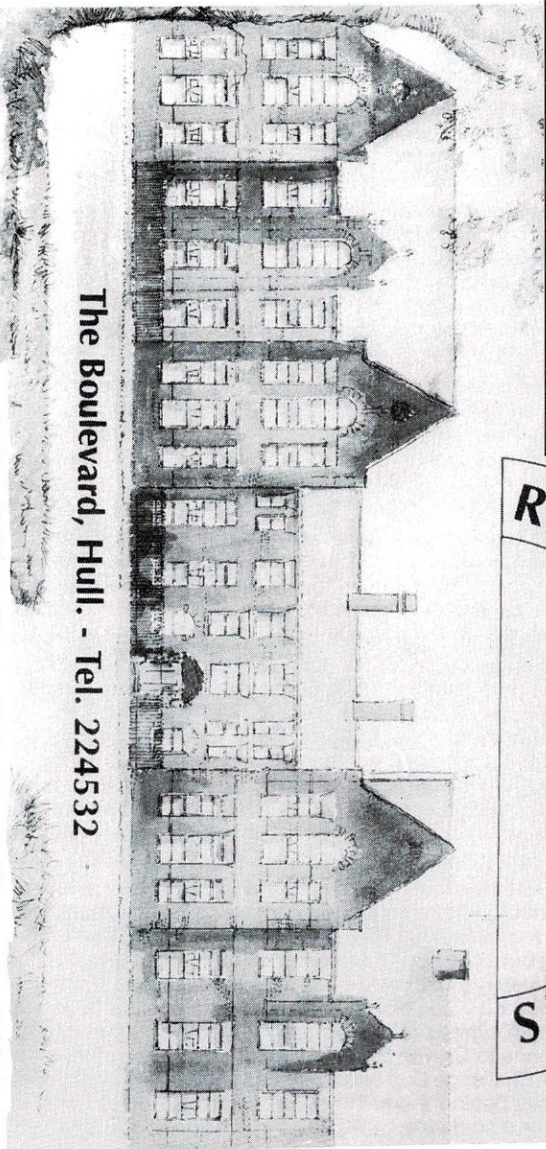
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Certainly Tony Barrow has the interest of Oldham fans at heart; "Oldham fans are among the most knowledgeable and fanatical in Rugby League. After last season's disappointment nothing would give me greater pleasure than to take this club to Wembley for the first time. Since arriving at the Watersheddings I must have heard the tale about the club's heatbreak 1984 Cup semi-final defeat a thousand times and Frank Myler's Oldham side almost made it in 1986 but froze on semi-final day against Castleford. The team I have here at Oldham reminds me of the Leigh side which won the Challenge Cup in 1971, tremendous team spirit binding everyone together in a common cause."

Barrow's self-confessed love of making a bargain signing has paid handsome dividends at the Watersheddings. Among the first of Barrow's signings following his arrival at Oldham in November 1988 was goalkicking Widnes full-back **Duncan Platt**, who has stepped out of the shadow of brother Andy, the Wigan and Great Britain forward.

Ex Moldgreen junior **Richard Irving** has made the right-wing berth his own in the face of competition from New Zealander **Charlie McAlister** and Castleford's 1986 Wembley centre **Gary Hyde**. Long-serving utility back **Des Foy** has made a welcome return to the Watersheddings after a brief stay in Australia where he toured with the 1984 lions and gained the first of three Great Britain caps, at stand-off, opposite Wally Lewis. Back in the centre berth, the pacy former Under-24 international scored five tries in a home defeat of Hunslet last January.

Castleford junior product **Paul Lord**, brother of Leeds full-back Gary, has improved dramatically under Barrow's guidance last season whilst Australian stand-off **Brett Clark** is in his second spell in British football having helped St. Helens to the 1987 Wembley Final against Halifax. Last season the Western Suburbs half-back faced competition from brilliant former Leigh Miners teenager **Tommy Martyn** but Barrow has been able to find places for them both upon Oldham's return to the top flight.

Scrum-half **Mike Ford** is another to have graced Wembley, appearing for Wigan in their epic 1985 defeat of Hull F.C. The former Under-21 international left Central Park for Leigh, eventually returning home to Oldham and gaining a place in the 1988 Lions tour party.

During the Summer Barrow released one of his hottest prospects, prop forward **Leo Casey** in a £100,000 plus deal with Featherstone Rovers but still has a formidable pack at his disposal. Converted hooker **Richard Russell**, switched to number nine, 'because he had all the attributes' according to Barrow — has rediscovered the form which earned him Colts and Under-21 international honours whilst at Wigan and has kept former Rochdale and Widnes livewire **Andy Ruane** on the sidelines.

Barrow's eye for a bargain has shaped one of the most effective back-row threesomes in the business in the form of second-row forwards **Keith Newton** and **Shaun Allen** and dynamic skipper **John Cogger**. Newton had the satisfaction of scoring the dynamic try against his former club Widnes in last season's Challenge Cup quarter-final victory at Naughton Park, while former Under-21 international centre Allen has found a new lease of life as a regular second rower.

Cogger, an Australian bundle of energy who won the 1987 Second Division Player of the Year award whilst with lowly Runcorn, finished second in the Oldham try chart last season with 24.

Towards the close of their promotion campaign Barrow began planning for the First Division, signing Halifax utility back **Tony Anderson** to add to the experience of ex-Leeds prop **John Fairbank** and highly rated former Saint **Paul Round**. During the close season he added Leeds' out-of-favour winger **Norman Francis** and Widnes' classy forward **Derek Pyke** and Oldham recommenced life in the top flight with high hopes.

They didn't set off on the right foot going down to a surprise 24-27 County Cup defeat at Second Division Salford but opened their league campaign in impressive style, overcoming Leeds 32-22 at the Watersheddings. A narrow 12-17 reversal at Wakefield was followed by a 28-22 home success over Castleford with debutant **Norman Francis** scoring a try and Australian stand-off **Brett Clark** an outstanding performer. Oldham's fortunes continued to fluctuate with an away defeat by Widnes and a 25-28 home defeat by Hull K.R. (who must have breathed a heavy sigh of relief following last season's results between the two sides) being followed by a 24-14 win at Sheffield and narrow 4-2 home defeat of Warrington which took Oldham into third position in the Sones Bitter Championship. From

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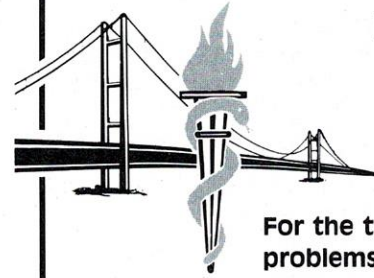
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these events have turned decidedly sour with four consecutive league defeats (15-38 at Wigan, 16-18 at home to Bradford Northern, 10-28 at Castleford and 18-24 at home to Widnes) leaving the Roughyeds languishing in the lower reaches of the league. Some solace was provided by a 26-6 Regal Trophy defeat of Salford but further misery ensued when last Sunday Barrow saw his side surrender a 16-4 lead at Batley to suffer a shock cup exit. The game was marred by the controversial dismissal of Oldham loose-forward John Cogger following an incident involving a lady steward, a decision which Barrow described as "diabolical". At the time of going to print Oldham were awaiting the results of an appeal to the Rugby League but their immediate priority is to return to winning ways at the Boulevard this afternoon.

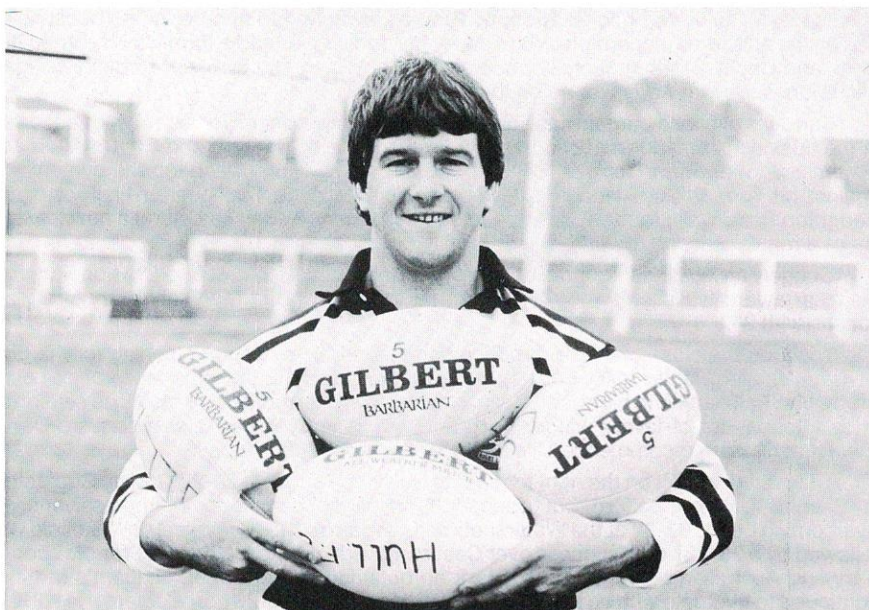

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Flashback – Hull F.C. v Oldham

Back in 1982 when Humberside Rugby League ruled the roost Hull F.C. and Hull K.R. were drawn apart in the semi-finals of the John Player Trophy. Rovers were paired with the surprise team of the tournament, Swinton who had narrowly disposed of neighbours Salford in the quarter-finals whilst Hull F.C. were drawn to meet Oldham who had caused a major surprise by disposing of Leeds at the Watersheddings. Oldham's coach Peter Smethurst was quite happy with a tie against the Airlie Birds; "we think we can beat Hull as we seem to raise our game against First Division opposition and their style of play suits us."

The Airlie Birds didn't make the ideal preparation for the Cup clash, a narrow home defeat by Bradford Northern leaving them nine points adrift of runaway leaders Widnes who registered their thirteenth consecutive league success at Featherstone. Hull's Cup opponents Oldham moved to joint pole position in the Second Division along with Carlisle following a narrow 11-5 home success over Halifax.

Hull's appeal against a one-match suspension imposed on hooker Ron Wileman failed so the lively hooker was forced to miss the Oldham confrontation. That meant Tony Duke retaining the number nine jersey and Team Manager Arthur Bunting had an anxious wait before being able to name Mick Crane in his starting line up, the classy forward having

made a remarkable recovery from an ankle injury sustained in the Bradford defeat. Terry Day and Tony Dean had also recovered from injury to replace Barry Banks and Kevin Harkin at half-back and with Trevor Skerrett overcoming a recurring ankle injury Hull were at full strength to take on ambitious Oldham. As twelve months previous when the Airlie Birds faced Barrow Hull found themselves clear favourites to go through to the final. However, the 10-13 defeat by the Cumbrians erased any fear of complacency this time around.

Ironically Hull had disposed of Barrow in the previous round thanks primarily to a majestic performance by Steve Norton and a repeat of the repertoire of skills proved too much to handle for the Lancastrians. Norton's destruction of Oldham at Headingley had reporters searching for appropriate adjectives. As Paul Fitzpatrick of the Guardian commented after the game; "Norton is in his pomp at the moment and any rugby league devotee wishing to see a highly-gifted player performing at the limits of his talents should hurry along now to see him before the magic begins to fade. A soccer writer once said of George Best that trying to pin him down was like trying to capture a shaft of sunlight in a matchbox. Substitute the name of Norton for Best and you have the picture. Opponents can make nothing of him at present, with his changes of pace, his bewildering

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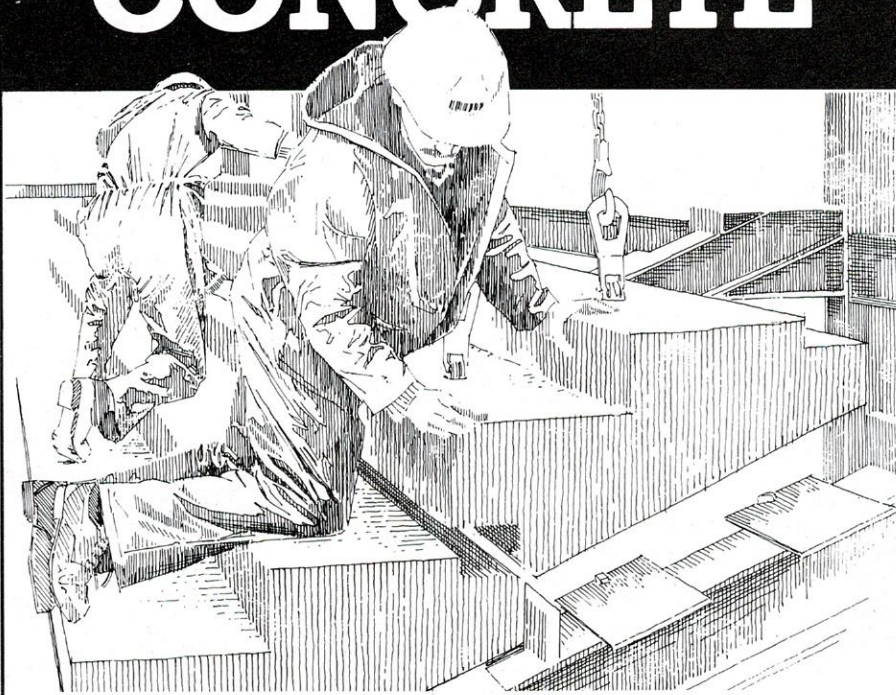
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switches of direction, long passes, short passes and passes suddenly slipped out when he appears to be held in the tackle. There is a touch of arrogance about him too and more than once he invited dispossession by thrusting the ball under the opponent's nose before drawing it back into his chest and carving away on another mesmeric run.

Norton's dominating display had both colleagues and opponents handing out accolades.

Charlie Stone, Hull's captain said simply: "he is our team," while Tony Dean expressed the admiration of a scrum-half who knows the worth of a great loose-forward. "He has so much flair it is not always easy to follow him but I have become accustomed to his style and we work well together. It's made such a difference to my game — I don't have to concentrate on just the basics — that I wish I had joined Hull five years ago."

Perhaps the greatest tribute paid to Norton was by Oldham forward Bob Mordell who flattened him with a late, high tackle a few minutes after he had put through Dean for Hull's first try. Even that blow did not prevent Norton getting his pass out.

Of the 12 tries Hull had scored in the John Player competition prior to this game Norton had been involved in eight. He laid on all three in the third round victory at Barrow and was the creator of all four in the defeat of Oldham. Norton paid tribute to the supporting play of Hull's backs, in particular Day, who scored twice at Barrow and got another against Oldham coming off the loose-forward's distribution. The stand-off was also the link man who got James Leuluai away for the most spectacular try of the game after Norton had opened the way in midfield. Leuluai read the situation well to take Day's inside pass and race away in style for his second try. Norton of course got the Kiwi moving for his first try when he needed to use more power after seeming to miss the opportunity at first. The New Zealand Test centre made another long run in a second half display that was a vast improvement on the first period and other recent indifferent displays. Leuluai's five tries on the road to the final proved his capabilities when totally involved but his tendency to drift out of the game was frustrating from Hull's point of view.

Although penalties were 10-7 in Hull's favour Oldham won the scrums 12-8 yet still could not prevent Tony Dean dominating at scrum-half.

As Raymond Fletcher of the Yorkshire Post commented afterwards; "even to a hint at a Test Cap at his age would probably embarrass him but I have not seen a better scrum-half this year. None have shown the same combination of work rate and individual skill allied to teamwork."

Although the margin finally reflected the difference in class Oldham rose above their Second Division status and with less than 20 minutes left only trailed 6-7. Former RU forwards Alexander and Mordell were not out of place in a typical RL cup tie, while Nicholson rocked Hull twice with surprising pace for a prop.

The attendance of 11,400 was a semi-final record for the competition and Hull's 22 points equalled the highest score for a semi-final.

Hull K.R. went on to defeat Swinton in the second semi-final and the Airlie Birds gained revenge for their Premiership Final defeat by their neighbours the previous May with a 12-1 success in the all Humberside clash at Headingley. Ronnie Wileman's spectacular touchline run for a try in the corner was the highlight of a bruising encounter which saw the late dismissals of Roy Holdstock and Hull skipper Charlie Stone.

Scorer of the match-winning try

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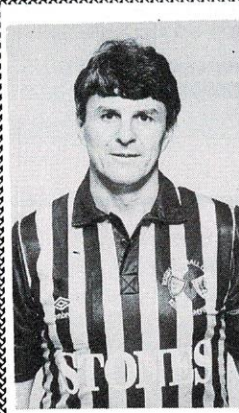

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Reflections of a Decade Ago

OCTOBER 1980

Following two heavy defeats Hull F.C. attempt to restore lost pride on their visit to Salford and have been warned by Team Manager Arthur Bunting that they must show more application than they did against Hull K.R. and New Zealand. Bunting enhances the importance of correcting their defensive game and morale is boosted by the return of Trevor Skerrett after a two-match suspension. Unsettled Charlie Stone also returns to the side as does skipper Steve Norton who missed the New Zealand game through injury. New signing Barry Banks goes straight into the side at centre with Paul Woods fit to take over at full-back. Hull's task is a difficult one since Salford approach the game having rattled up 62 points in their previous two games, including an impressive 26-10 win at Widnes. At the Willows they have lost only once, 19-25 to St. Helens and Hull will have to thwart the pace of Keith Fielding and Maurice Richards on the wings.

Hull F.C. return to winning ways in fine style, producing their best display of the season to suppress Salford. Their pack function magnificently with Steve Norton an inspiration. Hull's six, with Stone a tireless worker, take charge from the opening minutes to supplement a tight and uncompromising defence.

Bob Gaitley on loan from Hunslet, gives an outstanding display, splitting Salford's cover time and again with Barry Banks making a useful debut. The return of Paul Woods at full-back adds much needed aggression while Paul Prendiville shows clinical finishing, completing a hat-trick of tries. Hull take the lead through a Gaitley try after 15 minutes which Lloyd goals and lead 11-3 at the break following a Paul Prendiville try and Woods' drop goal. They press home their dominance with further tries by Prendiville and Tim Wilby but are pegged back by a Salford revival which leaves Hull 21-16 ahead. The Airlie Birds retain their composure to race clear with tries by Charlie Birdsall, Paul Prendiville and Trevor Skerrett and two Sammy Lloyd goals clinch a 34-16 victory. The win leaves Hull F.C. eighth in the table with eight points from six games.

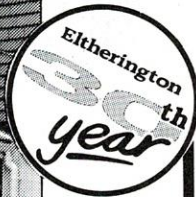

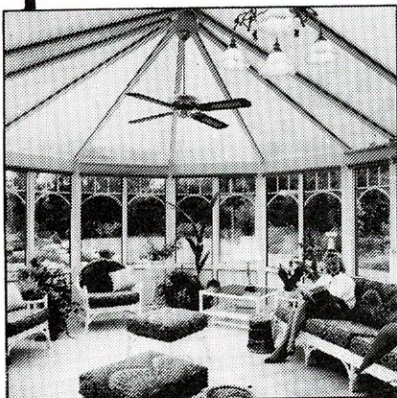

ALLIANCE TEAM MARCH ON RELENTLESSLY

Following the disappointment of narrow defeat in the Yorkshire Senior Competition Cup Final at Odsal, our Alliance side have returned to winning ways in the league and having extended the sequence to 12 wins now look clear favourites to retain the Championship title.

Hull's proud unbeaten record going back almost a year and comprising 26 consecutive victories was wrecked in the wind and rain of Odsal as an experienced Northern side edged home 6-4. Sadly the Airlie Birds never produced anything like their true form and didn't adapt to the conditions as well as their Second Division opponents.

In the first half when they had the wind at their backs Hull surrendered too much possession through penalties and lost five scrums against the head. A nightmare opening saw Northern take the lead after just 40 seconds with a try. Lee Hanlon levelled matters with two penalties but just before the break Bradford restored the lead with a 35 yard penalty and Hull rarely looked like taking that advantage away as they left their best form behind them.

The following Tuesday evening coach Steve Crooks had the satisfaction of seeing his side recapture their form and erase the Odsal disappointment with a 24-10 away success at Warrington though the win was marred by an injury to new signing Mark Jones. Two days later it was announced that Jones was to see a specialist following a recurrence of the ankle injury which previously had sidelined him for a fortnight.

For the derby with Hull K.R. at Craven Park Hull were strengthened by the return of Gary Pearce from his loan spell with Sheffield Eagles. In a thrilling contest Hull had to come from behind four times to retain their unbeaten league record against a determined Robins outfit.

Rovers had just cause to be very disappointed but Hull always appeared to have the edge. The fact that the visitors scored three vital tries on the sixth tackle emphasised Rovers tendency to lose concentration. It was just six minutes from time when **Dean Busby** capped a fine display to touch down for the eighth try of the game, **Lee Hanlon** added the conversion and Rovers' wholehearted challenge was finally suppressed.

The opening try was a classic effort as Rovers' **Paul Speckman** slipped a short ball to **Mike Crane** who ducked a tackle and made 70 yards before putting **Steve Hadi** over. **Graham Cook** added the conversion but Hull drew level on the half hour when **Gary Pearce** provided the link for **Jason Eastwood** to go over and the Welshman added the touchline conversion.

Rovers restored their lead early in the second period when Hadi outflanked the cover for his second score but the game continued to tilt both ways as **Paul Harrison** touched down for Hull, Pearce's conversion putting Hull 12-10 in front.

Rovers then enjoyed their best spell of the game and tries from **Paul Fletcher** and **Steve Richardson** seemed to have consigned Hull to their first league defeat of the campaign. To their credit the Airlie Birds demonstrated championship form and **Jason Eastwood** reduced the deficit to two points with his second try before Busby had the final say.

Halifax were the next to stand in Hull's way and the fact that the Thrum Hall side were the last side to defeat Hull in a league fixture some 12 months ago made the clash more intriguing.

Despite facing a heavier pack and conditions which made handling especially difficult, Hull were always prepared to keep the ball alive and their enterprise paid off with six fine tries.

Gary Pearce had a lively game at stand-off on his return to the Boulevard, kicking six goals and **Rob Nolan** bidding for a rapid return to the senior side did his prospects little harm with a solid display. Nolan opened the scoring when a poor clearance kick by Halifax left him with space to spare. **Chico Jackson** outwitted the cover to go under the posts from close range and with four goals by Pearce against a Peter Bell try and two goals from Lee Roberts for the visitors Hull were well on top at the interval.



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Hull continued to dominate as **Shaun Patrick**, back from his loan spell with Doncaster, scuttled over from dummy half, **Neil Turner** scorched half the length of the field after at least six Hull players had handled in their own twenty five and **Richard Price** enhanced his first team claims with two late tries as he finished off sweeping passing moves.

Pearce goaled the first two, while all Halifax had to show was a try from Ben Beevers improved by David Needham though Hull's victory was marred by an injury sustained to **Lee Marsden**.

With the senior side idle due to their early exit from the Regal Trophy, coaches Brian Smith and Noel Cleal used the following week's Alliance home fixture with Wakefield Trinity to give several senior players the chance to retain match fitness. From the first team who lost narrowly at Widnes, Brad Webb, Brian Blacker, Marquis Charles, Phil Windley, Andy Dannatt, Michael Dixon, Jon Sharp and Rob Nolan were included to face Trinity and as expected Hull had few problems in strengthening their top position. With much of the game played in heavy rain spectacular football was always at a premium and with **Andy Dannatt** outstanding Hull exerted plenty of pressure but only led by **Rob Nolan's** try, goaled by **Lee Hanlan** against two **Kevin Harcombe** penalties until the 30th minute when the lively Nolan sent **Phil Windley** over Hanlan again converting.

As conditions continued to deteriorate Hull steadily tightened their grip and added further tries through **Hanlan** (two), **Steve Feather** and **Mike Dixon**, with Nolan kicking two goals.
