

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AMATEUR SCENE


An important development on the amateur scene was announced recently when Jackie Reid of Egremont was appointed Chairman of a new Coaching and Development Committee charged with setting the policy for the expansion of the game under its governing body, The British Amateur Rugby League Association.

As BARLA's senior Vice-President, Jackie has already played a significant part in what has been called 'One of the biggest success stories in sport."

He will be Manager of Great Britain's Youth Team which is to tour New Zealand later this summer. Two of Town's young stars, Stephen Wear and Wayne Kitchin toured the southern hemisphere a couple of years ago with BARLA under Jackies' management and I know he is filled with a great sense of pride when he receives reports of the success "his lads" are achieving in the pro game wearing Town colours.

The Australian Schoolboys, who are undefeated at Test level and have lost only one match in their entire history are about to be challenged! BARLA's International Youth Manager Geoff Owen stated the other day. He intends to bring the best of British Youth Rugby to his training centres now to prepare them for the forthcoming tour to Britain of the Australians. Geoff said, "We are not saying these younger players should not sign professional forms, after all we all want to provide the professional clubs with the very best potential for the future, in order that we can beat the Australians at International level. But we do ask players to sign with pro clubs on amateur forms, so they will be eligible to play against the Australians Schoolboys.

Derwent Park Rangershave had little success in playing matches as everyone else during the recent cold spell of weather, however the U17's did play one game recently. They were involved in the Cumbria Cup quarter final against Kells U17's. Played on a thawing pitch which had a greasy surface, they lost narrowly to Kells 8 points to 10 points.





FROM THE ARCHIVES

Saturday 3rd March 1962 Challenge Cup 2nd round Oldham 0 Workington Town 5

Town supporters who made the journey to Oldham for the cup tie were rewarded with victory in a game as pulsating as any could remember. The pattern was established early on when Oldham veteran McIntyre began to dominate the set-scrums. This meant Town devoted nearly all their energies to defence, but it was a task they tackled with magnificent eart and the home supporters were almost driven frantic as their players tried in vain to force a gap.

Town opened the scoring via a Brennen penalty when Oldham were caught offside. The Lowden tried to double the lead with a drop goal which hit a defender. Oldham, with the advantage of so much scrummage ball were exerting intense pressure, but were thrown back into confusion as Town scored a try almost from their own line. Lowden started it, Archer kept up the running and Pretorious was there to cover the last 35 yards with a glorious curving run for the try. Brennan who had earlier missed a long range kick saw his shot bounce back off the upright.

The second half saw isolated Town raids in 40 minutes of non-stop Oldham attacks, but Town responded with a magnificent tackling stint and thoroughly deserved to move on into the next round.

GARY HYDE: Spent a decade with his home town of Castleford and played twice for Great Britain U24's in the early 80's. Played at left centre in the Cas side which beat Hull K.R. 15-14 in the 1986 Wembley final. He joined Oldham in December 1988.

PAUL LORD: Signed for Oldham as a 17 year old from an amateur club in Wakefield where his great pace attracted the Oldham scouts. Came as a stand-off but has made his home on the left wing. One of Oldham's most prolific scorers.

TOMMY MARTIN: The baby of the squad at 18, Tommy has the perfect pedigree. His father and uncle were both Great Britain forwards. Tommy signed from Leigh Miners and toured Australia with the BARLA Young Lions in 1989. Hit the headlines when he scored Oldham's fantastic comeback try against Hull K.R. in the 2nd Division Premiership Final in May 1990.

CHARLIE McALISTER: Big centre or wing now playing in the back row of the pack. Charlie was spotted playing Union for Bradford and Bingley and signed after trials in January 1988. Before coming to England he played for the New Zealand Maori's at Union and was an All-Black trialist. Talented with the ball and a powerful runner he had a spell with Sydney League Club Newcastle Knights in 1988.

KEITH NEWTON: Widnes born and bred, Keith signed for the Chemics from local amateur rugby. Made around fifty appearances for them, many as sub and jumped at the chance to join Oldham in January 1989. He was voted Man of the Match in the Silk Cut Challenge Cup 3rd round match at Widnes in 1990.

DUNCAN PLATT: Another Widnes player, signed for Oldham in December 1988 and was one of Tony Barrow's first signings.

Landed 125 goals last season despite damaging an ankle in the Lancashire Cup Final and missing the next seven matches.

PAUL ROUND: Signed from St. Helens. Played twice for the Great Britain U24's in 1984 and represented Saints at Wembley in 1987 scoring a try in an appearance as substitute.

ANDY RUANE: Started his career with home town club Widnes and moved to Rochdale Hornets from where he joined Oldham in the summer of 1988. Scooped most of the Club's Player of the Year Awards in 1988/89 but had bad luck with injuries in 1989/90 when he began to face competition for the hooking role from Richard Russel.

RICHARD RUSSELL: Oldham snapped him up from Wigan in the summer of 1989. A Great Britain Colts and Under 21 player as a centre but later switched to hooker.

SHAUN ALLEN: Began his career with St. Helens for whom he did enough to earn a Great Britain Under21 honours as a centre in the 1984 match against France. Joined Olunam in March 1989. Usually plays second row but also turns out as loose-forward, hooker and centre.

BRETT CLARK: An Aussie who first came to England to play for St. Helens. Was the Saints stand-off in their 19-18 defeat by Halifax at Wembley in 1987. Joined Oldham at the start of the 1989/90 season.

TONY ANDERSON: Signed from Halifax in the spring of 1990. Had wretched luck since moving from Thrum Hall. In his second game for Oldham he broke his nose and on his comeback at Workington, he broke his ankle. Spent the summer of 1990 getting back to fitness and looking forward to 1990/91 season.

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WHAT EVER HAPPENED TO?



TONY COLLOBY

Tony lives only two miles from my home, so it was quite easy to pop along and talk to him at his home just above Oxenholme railway station.

Tony was actually born in Bradford and moved to Kendal in 1939 at the outset of the war whilst his father was serving in the forces. He began playing rugby union at the local Grammar School, but on leaving at 15 he played soccer. A year later he was persuaded to join Kendal R.U.F.C. and by the time he was seventeen he was playing for the County R.U. team and played on 15 occasions at stand-off.

He was eventually signed by Harry Pickthall for Whitehaven in 1961 for £2,000, which practically bought his first house. In 1964 he signed for Town, being persuaded by Tom Mitchell, playing most of his time on the wing. During his time with Whitehaven, he was on National Service and played for the Army team on numerous ocassions, but never at Twickenham, although he was reserve there twice being replaced by a 2nd Lieutenant on both ocassions - typical I suppose.

Tony has a thriving joinery business on the outskirts of Kendal employing his three sons, Paul who plays soccer, Ian, who played a little rugby union and Stephen. He has had his own business for nearly twenty years and is married to Val, a Kendal girl. At the end of his career with Town, he had an accident at work on a planing machine and had to have a couple of finger ends stitched back on. Tony was given a free transfer and played for two seasons with Blackpool Borough. In 1969 he was transferred to Salford for £2,000 Town receiving half the transfer money. Here amongst stars like Paul Charlton, Ken Gill, Richards etc, and playing wing to David Watkins, Tony played the best rugby of his career and was often in the top three or four of the try scoring list. This was at the age of 31 and later he had a bad cartilage operation and played one more season and was displaced by Keith Fielding. Tony then went to Barrow for a season and a half, but his knee was giving him trouble, so in his mid-thirties in 1975 he decided to call it a day.

The highlight of his career was playing in that memorable game when Cumberland beat the Aussies at Derwent Park in October 1963. His biggest disappointment was losing to Leeds 12-7 in the Players No6 Final whilst playing for Salford.
