



Introducing Oldham . . .

VINCE NICKLIN-An Aussie with a New Zealander's passport, Vince came to Oldham from Sydney via Limoux in France. As a boy played with St. George and Easts in Sydney, before making a name for himself in France and then joining Oldham during the summer. Currently playing full back, out can also operate at half-back, stand-off or in the centre.

RICHARD PACENIUK—A 20 year old from Dewsbury with Polish grandparents, Richard starred in the 'A' team last season, did well pre-season in France and made his debut in the first home game of the current season against Leigh. A clever, creative thinking type of hooker, he is expected to go a long way.

RICHARD IRVING—A blockbusting winger from the Huddersfield area, Richard won youth international honours being turning pro for Oldham in Eric Fitzsimon's first spell at Watersheddings. Played regularly in the first

team for the past couple of seasons.

SIMON LONGSTAFF—Simon was a young man whom many clubs were chasing. Almost joined Oldham in the first instance, but opted for Halifax and finally came to Watersheddings towards the end of the 1990-91 season when things did not work out for him at Thrum Hall. A versatile player, he could have made a big name for himself in athletics, but has chosen Rugby League—and Oldham—to make it big in

CHARLIE McALISTER—A New Zealander, Charlie signed for Oldham three years ago from Bradford and Bingley Hill RU Club in Yorskhire. Can play centre of secondrow and is also a goalkicker. A powerful man, Charlie has played in Australia and has just been appointed as the club's vice-captain.

BARRIE McDERMOTT—Strong and powerful despite his 19 years, local boy Barrie is yet another member of the BARLA squad to throw in his lot with Oldham. He is a dedicated young professional and has quickly made enough impression to earn a place on the bench

in Oldham's early-seson matches.
TOMMY MARTYN—A player of exciting potential, Tommy is the son of former Leigh. Warrington and GB forward Tommy Martyn and the nephew of Mick Martyn, who set scoring records as a forward with Leigh in the early 60s. He is a stand-off or centre, who can 'sniff' tries out of nothing . . . a 'poacher' of the Rugby League variety who can turn a match at a mistake.

AUSTIN DONEGAN-At 17 stone, the biggest man on Oldham's books. He joined Oldham from St. Helens and is a young prop in whom Oldham have high hopes. Very fast for a big man, he can show the old back or two a clean pair of heels.

NEIL FLANNAGAN—A local lad, Neil is a scrum-half who won international honours as a young amateur and had several clubs chasing his signature. Recently he attracted the attention of

Hull with his all-action displays.

JOHN HENDERSON—Former Leigh centre and a prolific try-scorer. John signed for Oldham for £50,000 and after a summer of discontent-he was one of only several contract rebels—he has made his peace, won back his first team place, and is looking as keen as in his early days at the club.

CHRIS JOYNT—A young man from Wigan whom Oldham believes will have a big future. Chris is 19 and he joined Oldham after winning county youth honours in the same team as Tony Barrow junior. Went to Australia last summer, along with his Oldham colleagues Paddy Mitchell and Richard Packniuk, to play for a NSW country team.

JOHN MÁXWELL-John is a forward with a prominent future, but illness and injury have restricted his appearances fo far. Deserves more luck and has the pedigree to do well when he gets his chance.

PADDY MITCHELL—Another youngster signed from local amateur rugby, Paddy is a ball player of the old school. Can play centre or stand-off, but the sort of player who has the physique to switch to loose-forward if the opportunity ever presents itself. His ball handling could prove tailor made for the No. 13

CRAIG MORT—Former captain of England schoolboys, Craig a hot property before he signed for his home-town club. Loose-forward is his favourite position, but he learned his trade in the Oldham 'A' team as a full back and is now operating either at No. 13 or in the second-row.

KEITH NEWTON—One of the more experienced players in a young squad, Keith had several seasons with hometown Widnes before signing for Oldham for £12,000 during Tony Barrow's reign as coach. A hard-working prop or second-row man, he can bob on a bit

when the gap appears. Prefers second-row.
ABRAHAM PHILLIP—A centre or wing from the Moldgreen club in Huddersfield, Abraham also went on the BARLA youth tour of New Zealand. Big and strong, he scored a marvellous try at Villeneuve-sur-Lot on Oldham's French tour, pushing off five



defenders in a run from his own half. DAVID PITTS—An outside half with a good

boot, David joined Oldham during the summer from Bromley in a straight swop for Steve Entwistle. Played well in France and in early 'A' team matches.

DUNCAN PLATT—Brother of Wigan's Test forward, Andy Platt, Duncan signed for Oldham for £35,000 from Widnes and has scored 250 goals and 17 tries for the club in 74 appearances. A fine marksman, he recently attracted Halifax's attention.

STEVE ROBINSON—A winger who was formerly with Saddleworth Rangers, Steve is a steady and reliable threequarter. Earned county honours as an amateur and has played a lot of senior rugby for Oldham over the last three

DARREL ROGERS—Another teenager from the local DDA side. Can play full back, stand-off or centre. Signed just before the French trip, he was taken on the tour but was sadly sidelined with a foot injury throughout the

trip.
RICHARD RUSSELL—A local lad who arrived 'home' at Watersheddings via Wigan. Played for Wigan on the wing in the world club championship against Manly but is now regarded as a hooker or loose-forward. Creative player with an excellent pair of hands.

TIM STREET—Career followed a similar

pattern to Russell's. Local lad, he signed for Wigan and then moved to Leigh and Swinton before joining Oldham in the summer in a swop move, with John Fairbank and Neil Clawson going to Station Road. A strong prop, Tim earned GB colt and under 18 honours during his 194

STEVE WARBURTON—Steve was the BARLA open-age international stand-off last season. He signed for Oldham from Warrington amateur club, Woolston and made his debut as substitute against Hull in the last match of last season. Did well and enhanced his reputation further in France. A clever, attacking player with poise and class.

SHAUN ALLEN—A hard-working member of the pack, Shaun joined Oldham from St. Helens in the Tony Barrow era. He has figured in many of Oldham's most important matches in recent seasons and has returned to the senior squad under Peter Tunks after impressing preseason training.

PAUL ROUND—One of the most respected and well-known forwards in Rugby League, Paul signed for Oldham from St. Helens for £65,000 four years ago. The fee was met by tribunal and, at that time, was an Oldham club record. A long striding running forward, he has recently been elevated to club captain, a position which he regards as a great honour.

TERRACE TALK

by 'LYONESSE'

THERE could be some interesting exchanges this afternoon as a result of the recent deal between Oldham and Swinton which turned John Fairbank and Neil Clawson into 'Lions' and Tim Street into a 'Roughyed' . . .!

Oldham may not have been quite as active in the big-name transfer market as some clubs but they are certainly looking to the future with their signing of no fewer than six of the Great Britain BARLA youth team who tourned New Zealand this summer, including their captain Paul Hourigan. Tony Anderson has moved to Bradford for £70,000 while John Cogger's contract has been terminated by mutual agreement. The club has signed a sponsorship deal with Castlemaine XXXX which could bring them £250,000 over the next three years depending on the success they achieve.

There have been several other lucrative sponsorships announced recently—Great Britain's £500,000 sportswear deal over four years with Umbro—Workington's £100,000 shirt sponsorship with Russell Office Systems plus a £75,000 kit deal with Bukta—Warrington have agreed a new three year contract with Greenall Whitley—Featherstone signed an agreement with Beazer Homes (Yorkshire) Ltd with the value linked to success in League and Cup matches this season, and CIS will continue funding the Charity Shield match for £80,000 over the next three years.

If money really is the incentive which brings results, Scarborough Pirates should zoom to the top of Division Three. A treasure trove of £1 million has been promised to them by Robert Gibb, owner of Flamingo Land theme park, if they gain promotion this season. Those of us who like to keep records of all movements on and off the field during matches will have to concentrate hard this season. Now for some close-season news from RL Headquarters—The Rugby League is to assist 2nd and 3rd Division clubs with their travel costs, which will be a big help to clubs like Carlisle, Workington, and London Crusaders who have to play each other four times this season.

The proposal to exempt First Division clubs from the preliminary round of the Challenge Cup and Regal Trophy was rejected as it didn't receive the ½ majority required. Widnes must have been wishing it had applied to the Lancashire Cup as they went out to Workington at Derwent Park in the only preliminary tie.

Hull President, Roy Waudby, has been elected to the Rugby League's six man board as Director of Finance replacing Joe Seddon. Maurice Lindsay and Bob Ashby were reelected. Mr. Lindsay, when he completes his year as President at the end of this season, will be the next League Chairman as Bob Ashby steps down after five years. The other three members are Harry Jepson, David Oxley, and Rodney Mather. I had no sooner made a list of club coaches than it was out of date again. Firstly Chris Arkwright left Highfield following the departure of Alan Bishop and former Swinton scrum-half, Willie Johnson, took over as player coach, then came the news of the sacking of Alex Murphy from Leigh leaving Kevin Ashcroft in charge. Alex's position will not be filled due to the financial situation. Keighley have sacked Tony Fisher and Ian Fairhurst will take over until a replacement is found. These notes were written before the match at Post Office Road so I hope there haven't been any more since.

Jack Lewis

John Thomas Lewis was born in 1874 at Rainscough and, after playing a few games with a local Kersal junior team, joined Swinton when only 16 making his debut on February 27th 1892 as a right wing gaining a permanent place the following season. He was soon capped for Lancashire becoming the Lions leading try scorer in 1894-5 and the following season when he also won the Booth Hall running plate, a feat he repeated again in 1898. During his Rugby Union career he played 120 times scoring 37 times. He played a prominent role in Swinton joining the Northern Union maintaining his position as the Blues leading try scorer achieving the record of 26 tries and 78 points in 1899-1990, when he won a Northern Union Cup medal, which was not beaten until 1924-5 by Frank Evans and 1913-4 by Matt Ryder. During his Northern Union career he played 152 times scoring 76 times.

His extraordinary speed quickly made him famous on both the Rugby and running fields where he won many races throughout the country. His brilliant runs along the touchline raised great enthusiasm and a strict attention to training kept him in

wonderful condition and fit in every respect.

He was 5ft. 6in. tall weighing 11st. 7lb. and following his retirement in 1905 due to persistent knee problems, he became a licensed victualler and the secretary for the local licence holders Association and assistant secretary for the Salford Division of the Manchester and Salford Ring Throwing Association.





30 YEARS AGO

Saturday, September 16th, 1961— SWINTON 7... WAKEFIELD 22

Following that match, Swinton were rocked by a transfer request from Peter Smethurst after being dropped for the matches against Wigan and Wakefield. He was put on the transfer list at a record £7,500—a lot of money in those days when a crowd of 10,000 only netted receipts of £1,200.

20 YEARS AGO Sunday, September 12th, 1971—SWINTON 28...YORK 8

This was the Lions ninth win in eleven games. Gordon Lewis was on the end of a Kenny-Evans-Kenny-Philbin passing movement to put the first points on the scoresheet but Cadman failed with the kick from the touchline. However, Kenny kicked a drop-goal (2 points) for a 5-0 lead. A long pass from Harold Bate sent Alan Buckley in, and a movement started by Cramant resulted in Gomersall going over. Cadman converted both, 15-0. Buckley was forced to retire with a leg injury and less than two minutes after replacing him Gowers added a drop-goal for an interval lead of 17-0.

York replied soon after the restart when a Rippon try was converted by Hill and Swinton responded with a superb passing movement involving Gowers, Davies, Kenny, and Lewis with Fleay making the touchdown. Cadman's goal made the score 22-5 and York scored in the last minute with a try by Dunham, 28-8.







Wigan, who took the British crown in a thrilling championship finish last April, will know their opponents on 22 September when the Australian club title decider is played at the Sydney Football Stadium.

The last Anglo-Aussie title clash in 1989 saw Widnes defeat Canberra at Manchester United's Old Trafford ground. Foster's had earlier supported the 1987 meeting between Wigan and Sydney aces Manley at Central Park, Wigan which led to the challenge being upgraded and granted official world status by the International Board and the Australian Rugby League.

The 1991 Foster's World Club Challenge at Anfield will kick-off at 8 pm with extended highlights being screened on BBC TV's Sportsnight later in the same evening, plus live telecast in Australia.
