I respect tradition but realistically - saturation at the expense of a sharper athelete and a stronger comp.





SAINTS CENTURY As I write these notes. I've just

about got my breath back after Saints demolition of Trafford Borough here last Sunday-week. For those of you who slept for the last ten days the final score was 104-12. Saints second ever highest points total. The final score probably was a fair reflection on the difference in class and ability of the two sides and no disrespect to Trafford, but they were probably the worst side I've seen at Knowslev Road. Thank God Saints played! Far too often lowly clubs have come to Saints and have left beaten but not disgraced due to a lackluster Saints performance. but not Trafford - they were obliterated. Some people believe that results like the Trafford game are bad for the game in general. It probably is, and shows exactly why we had to have 3 Divisions this season. and possibly why sides in all cup competitions should be seeded. However, the win will certainly help the sides confidence on the park and has certainly given the Saints fans something different to shout about.

RECORD

For the record, as I said above, 104 points is Saints second ever century and second highest win. Anthony Sullivan became the first Saints substitute to come on and score a hat-trick and becomes the first Saints player to score three tries on his home debut. 20 tries equalled the club record-achieved against Carlisle who were beaten 112 nil here five seasons ago. SCHOFIELD LOSES LEEDS CAPTAINCY





Shaun Allen

A hard-working member of the pack, Shaun joined Oldham from St. Helens in the Tony Barrow era. He has figured in many of Oldham's most important matches in recent seasons and has returned to the senior squad under Peter Tunks after impressing in pre-season training.

Keith Atkinson

Local lad, Keith came through via the Colts and played in France for Great Britain Colts a year or two ago. Full of courage, he is one of the unluckiest players in the game, twice having returned to action in the second-row after major spinal surgery.

Tony Barrow

Prop or second-row, aged 19, and the son of Oldham's former coach of the same name. Tony jnr. played junior RL in his native St. Helens, earned county honours as an under-17 and followed his father to Watersheddings where he is emerging as a hard working forward.

Ian Bates

Dewsbury boy and the nephew of former GB internationals,

Alan and John Bates. Small, but with the heart of a lion. Basically a scrum-half, but can play at stand-off, hooker or even full-back, anywhere in fact, where he is asked to worry the opposition.

Richard Blackman

A Londoner, Richard made his way north to Dewsbury to play for Dewsbury Moor, Yorkshire and Great Britain youth before signing for Oldham two years ago. Fast, tricky and elusive, he impressed in the pre-season Carlisle sevens and will be looking for a senior chance this season, on the wing.

David Bradbury

Signed from Leigh Miners after touring New Zealand with the BARLA under-19 squad, David is a strong-running loose-forward, who impressed on Oldham's pre-season tour of France.

Gary Burns

Stand-off or scrum-half, Gary is a typical Widnesian and a typical half-back . . . cheeky, with a touch of humour! Reminds one a lot of Ray Ashton at his age and if he plays as well, he'll do all right. Toured New Zealand with BARLA.

Richard Irving

A blockbusting winger from the Huddersfield area, Richard won youth international honours before turning pro for Oldham in Eric Fitzsimons's first spell at Watersheddings. Played regularly in the first team for the past couple of seasons.

Chris Joynt

A young man from Wigan whom Oldham believe will have a big future. Chris is 19 and he joined Oldham after winning county youth honours in the same team as Tony Barrow junior. Went to Australia last summer, along with his Oldham colleagues Paddy Mitchell and Richard Pachniuk, to play for a NSW country team.

Simon Longstaff

Simon was a young man whom many clubs were chasing. Almost joined Oldham in the first instance, but opted for Halifax and finally came to Watersheddings towards the end of the 1990-91 season when things did not work out for him at Thrum Hall. A versatile player, he could have made a big name for himself in atheletics but has chosen Rugby League - and Oldham - to make it big in sport.

Charlie McAlister

A New Zealander, Charlie signed for Oldham three years ago from Bradford and Bingley RU club in Yorkshire. Can play centre or second-row and is also a good goal-kicker. A powerful man, Charlie has played in Australia and has just been appointed as the club's vice-captain.

Barrie McDermott

Strong and powerful despite his 19 years, local boy Barrie is yet another member of the BARLA squad to throw in his lot with Oldham. He is a dedicated young professional and he's quickly made enough impression to earn a place on the bench in Oldham's early season matches.

Tommy Martyn

A player of exciting potential, Tommy is the son of former Leigh, Warrington and GB forward Tommy Martyn and the nephew of Mick Martyn, who set scoring records as a forward with Leigh in the early 60's. He is a stand-off or centre, who can 'sniff' tries out of nothing - a 'poacher' of the Rugby League variety who can turn a match at a stroke.

John Maxwell

John is a forward with a promising future, but illness and injury have restricted his appearances so far. Deserves more luck and has the pedigree to do well when he gets it.

Keith Newton

One of the more experienced players in a young squad, Keith had several seasons with home town club Widnes before signing for Oldham for £12,000 during Tony Barrow's reign as coach. A hard working prop or second row man, he can bob on a bit when the gap appears. Prefers second row.

Vince Nicklin

An Aussie with a New Zealander's passport. Vince came to Oldham from Sydney via Limoux in France. Sort that one out! As a boy he played with St.George and Easts in Sydney, before making a name for himself in France and then joining Oldham in the summer. Currently playing full back, but can also operate at half back, stand off or in the centre.

Richard Pachniuk

A 20 year old from Dewsbury with Polish grandparents, Richard starred in the 'A' team last season, did well pre-season in France and made his debut in the first home game of the current season against Leigh. A clever, creative, thinking type of hooker, he is expected to go a long way.

Paul Round

One of the most respected and well known forwards in the Rugby League, Paul signed for Oldham from St.Helens for £65,000 four years ago. The fee was set by tribunal and at the time was an Oldham club record. A long striding running forward, he has recently been elevated to club captain, a position which he regards as a great honour.

Richard Russell

A local lad who arrived "home"

at Watersheddings via Wigan. Played for Wigan on the wing in the World Club Championship match against Manly but is now regarded as a hooker or loose forward. Creative player with an excellent pair of hands.

Tim Street

Career followed a similar pattern to Russell's. Local lad he signed for Wigan and then moved to Leigh and Swinton before joining Oldham in the summer in a swap move, with John Fairbank and Neil Clawson going to Station Road. A strong prop, Tim earned GB Colts and Under 21 honours during his Wigan days.

Steve Warburton

Steve was the BARLA open age international stand off last season. He signed for Oldham from Warrington amateur club Woolston and made his debut as substitute against Hull in the last match of last season. Did well and enhanced his reputation further in France. A clever attacking player with poise and class

As can be seen from above Oldham slightly hold the upper hand in Lancashire Cup encounters, mainly due to 4 successive wins over Saints in the late 1950's including 2 Final successes in 1956 and 1958. However, Saints hit back to win the next 4 meetings including the 1968 final before the Roughveds defied all the odds in 1989 when as a Second Division side they came to Knowsley Road and murdered Saints 36-6. On the other hand, in Post war cup ties overall and Division One encounters Saints have been far superior. To date this season. Oldham have made a very good start defeating 1st Division Swinton 22-21 in the 1st Round ten days ago, beating Leigh in their first home league encounter 46-19 and drawing with Sheffield Eagles at Don Valley on the opening day of the season 16 all, young star Tommy Martyn scoring in each game, and are hot favourites to win the 2nd Division title under new coach Peter Tunks. Last season they were relegated for the 6th time after a very disappointing league campaign, despite fine home wins over Castleford, Hull, Leeds and Warrington, Oldham, with 20 points from their 26 league games from 10 wins, but only 3 wins away from Watersheddings proved their achilles heel. In the respective cup competitions they had rather mixed fortunes coming only eighty minutes away from Wembley before losing to eventual winners Wigan at Burnden Park Bolton 30 points to 16 in the semis - on route winning at Bramley 38-6 and Workington 20-15 and at home to Salford 40-3. In the Lancs Cup Salford knocked Oldham out at the Willows at the 1st stage 27-24 and in the Regal Trophy a fine home win over Salford 26-6 was followed by an embarrassing 2nd Round exit at lowley Batley 20-16.



Many a doughty Rugby League team can trace its origins to a band of enthusiasts conjuring up the idea while downing a pint of bitter in a tap-room 'commitee meeting'.

But the tipple was nothing stronger than dandelion and burdock laced with sarsparilla when a side destined to make its mark on the local amateur scene was born in 1946.

Johnson's Temperance Bar, Liverpool Road, was the focal point from where the celebrated Glover's Ropery outfit burst onto the 13-a-side stage - a fitting venue when it is considered that most of the imbibers were under age at the time.

Prime movers in orchesrating the youngsters into a feared force were former Saints full-back and Ropery boss Charlie Crooks, and stalwart Bill 'Bumper' Cardwell, from Lewis Street, who took up the teams managerial reigns.

Liverpool Road newsagent Crooks, who appeared in the Wembley defeat by Widnes in 1930, was instrumental in supplying his new charges with both a blue-and-white strip and the benefit of his vast experience. Taking their name from a Glover-Street based wire works, where many found employment, the Ropery graced the Under-19 League for just three seasons, but remained unbeaten throughout and picked up silverware galore. A record breaking 119-0 victory over Haresfinch was arguably the highpoint of a remarkable run of success-a win which came on the day Cahoo Cottage won the Grand National at odds which also hit the century mark.

A pictoral gem of those distant days has been unearthed and, although it is not suitable for reproduction, identification of the line-up should set tongues wagging in the pubs and clubs around the Saintly borough.

Most of the group will now be over or around the 60 mark, and understandably with the passage of time, several have died, including Dwyer, Bacon, Halton, Sephton and Maloney.


No doubt they will now have the ball out in the great beyond but, as for the rest, it is a fascinating exercise to cast a reflective eye on those Ropery stalwarts of the early post-war years when Rugby League was booming after years of grinding austerity.

The 'Sandbeds' (behind Liverpool Road), Brown Edge and the Recreation Park, Boundary Road, were among the pitches where Les Barrow's starlets pitted their skills against daunting opposition such as Clock Face, Thatto Heath and United Services.

'Clock' provided Pat Corbett for the Saints, and Josh Gaskell took the Knowsley Road ticket from the Services set-up, while Glover's Ropery could proudly point to Smith and Bamber (Warrington) and Halton and McCawley (Salford) as players who ventured into the professional ranks.

But probably their greatest claim to fame was that England and Saints stand-off Peter Metcalfe cut his oval ball teeth in the Ropery squad, at a time when other members of his family were helping to run the club.

Other misty-eyed memories of those days include loose-forward Barrow, a brilliant tactitian, and centre Maloney, regarded as the



best in the junior league at the time.

Facilities-wise Ropery had to content themselves with a bucket of cold water and a towel shared between 13 in often freezing temperatures. Brrrr!

Touchline characters and reseves abounded with the Tatlock and Lynch families, Dinkie Downie, Jackie McGill, Paddy Foy, Dickie Kelly and Bob Mellor being names to stir the ageing memory banks.

No doubt the spirit of those newspaper- and-string ball days around deepest Greenbank still burns brightly, and talk of a nostalgia-soaked reunion is indeed a welcoming prospect.



Be it a heavyweight forward or a flying wing threequarter there are few that tackling machine Bernard Dwyer cannot deal with, but he has been swept off his feet recently by a tiny tot who is proving to be quite a handful!

For another little lady has cooed her way into the affections of the tough-asteak forward and wife Jackie doesn't mind one bit - having presented Bernard with his great big bundle of joy.

Bouncing babe Kelly Marie made her debut at Whiston Hospital last month, weighing in at a bonny 9lbs 2 oz, and leaving a doting mum and dad wrestling with the knotty problem of organising a christening date that will not clash with the Saints fixture list.

Happy event number two for the delighted Dwyers came with Bernard's return to action after a nagging hamstring strain - just one of the many injuries that have bedevilled him since signing for Saints in 1984.

So the chunky 14 stone son of Thatto Heath was in understandably buoyant mood when I chatted to him as he nursed the good-as-gold new arrival at his Roby Street, Toll Bar, home.

'Double Agent' Bernard played both codes of rugby at St. Austins and Edmund Campion schools, gaining Merseyside, Lancashire and England under 16 Union caps, in company with a certain young placekicker named Shaun Edwards.

Fifteen-a-side with Moss Lane Colts and League with Saints under-17 squad was the Dwyer oval ball menu before taking the professional ticket, following recommendations to the Saints board by coaches Bob Dagnall and Johnny Fishwick.

But realisation of Bernard's dream of senior rugby became a nightmare due to injury setbacks, including jaw fractures against Castleford and Salford, plus vertebrae damage also sustained versus the Red Devils.

Typical of the man, the determined Dwyer fought his way back to fitness and strives to keep in peak condition through extra training stints and weightlifting sessions at Tom Tatlcok's gym.

"Physiotherapist Jeanette Smith has played a big part in curing my pulled hamstring and has proved a real Godsend since arriving at Knowsley Road," said Bernard.

"When you are a little 'un like me you have to work hard to maintain maximum body strength," he chuckled, as I quietly took due account of the jumbo-sized shoulders and generally muscular frame. Summer 1989 found our subject guesting with Australian club Manly, a trip organised by Paul Vautin and Michael O'Conner who, like Dwyer, were in the Saints team hammered by Wigan at Wemblev.

"I was substituted then," said Bernard," and did not complete the action replay in the season's Cup Final due to a head wound needing 17 stiches which I suffered a few minutes from time. My collision with Andy Platt was a pure accident which left me groggy, but I recoverd sufficiently to go up for my medal, while being chosen players' player-of-thematch helped ease the pain."

"But you were still talking 'broken biscuits' that night," chipped in Jackie, now fondly cuddling Kelly Marie after a slick 'straight from the coaching manual' pass from hubby Bernard.

And a quick glance at the Dwyer pedigree reveals that the Knowsley Road stalwart is a real chip off the old block with Dad, also named Bernard, a household name in schoolboy and junior rugby in his hey day.


I have personal recollection of St. Austins Shool half-backs Aurther Pimblett and Tommy Finn forming a devastating midfield trio with loose-forward 'BD' as Dwyer senior was known in the late 1940's and beyond.

And for good measure his wife Beryl is a sister of the late Norman Wills, a Lancashire schoolboy giant and contemporary of Saints vice-chairman Eric Ashton while at Rivington Road School

What are the main hopes for the future then for a rejuvenated Bernard Dwyer junior?

"To steer clear of injury, keep my first team place, and find a job after being unemployed for some time," said a pack star famed for his on-the-field work rate.

With on-the-spot knowledge of Bernard's skills with nappies, pins and talcum powder I reckon he wouldn't go far wrong as a child minder!



DOUBLE CENTURIONS

The late Jim Sullivan is regarded as the greatest coach ever seen at Knowslev Road. He had what we would call today a thoroughly professional approach to the game. For Sully, winning was all that mattered. Indeed. such was the fear of complacency from his side that his favourite expression was always 'No mercy' particularly against lowly opposition. It was interesting to read the comments of current coach Mike McClennan before the Trafford match, when he talked about no-one looking for a 'cheap win'. Like Jim Sullivan, Mike wanted no mercy from his teamregardless of the status of their opponents. That is the only way to play the game.

As everybody knows, the Saints' attacking machine treated the fans to a veritable riot of scoring, climaxed by Les Quirk's dazzling surge to score try number twenty and bring the score past the century mark for the second time in the Saints' history. Those looking for the shattering of individual records were to be disappointed, however, except for a memorable 12 goal performance from stand-in kicker Bernie 'The Boot' Dwyer. This more than makes up for a point-less

1990/91 season for the burly second rower. Yet Bernard's true value to the side is the way in which he prevents the opposition from scoring-by tackling way above his weight every time he takes the field!

Although the chase for the

elusive 'ton' provided a thrilling last quarter, the incident in which Phil Veivers was concussed enraged spectatorsespecially when the assailant got off with barely a warning. I am certain that this was at the back of referee Connolly's mind when he dismissed the Trafford stand off Jones after a dangerous-looking tackle on Allan Hunte. Indeed the referee initially waved play on before the intervention of the linesman and Jones's subsequent dismissal. Perhaps the tackle looked worse because Hunte lost the ball, vet it certainly was not as damaging as the other offence-although Allan will doubtless argue to the contrary! Down to twelve men, Trafford's fate was sealed, capping the end of a hectic week in which they were lucky to field a team at all, according to former full back Steve Tickle. They accepted their defeat in a sporting manner, however, and I am sure we will wish them better luck for the rest of the season.



The Saints now have the proud record of being the only team in the League to have reached the elusive century on two occasions. It would be wrong to play down the achievement-the look of sheer delight on young Sullivan's face when Ouirk sailed over for the 'ton' said it all. A great boost for team spirit, certainly. Let us hope that the lads can go from strength to strength and bring back the Lancashire Cup to Knowslev Road for the first time since 1984.







By now Saints were really confident and in the 62nd minute slick passing between Fairclough and Hodgkinson put Riley in for a try in the corner. (26-12).


In the 74th minute Man of the Match Darren O'Brien put Bernard Dwyer in for a try under the posts, converted by Fenlon. (32-12).
